Robert L. Cornell, 61, president of the Florida Petroleum Company since 1931, died early this morning of a heart attack at his home, 2018 Melville Avenue.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock at the Holy Cross Episcopal Church with Father H. L. Zimmerman officiating. Interment, following cremation, will be at Winter Park at a later date. The family has requested that flowers be omitted.

A native of New York City, Mr. Cornell was the son of the late George B. and Eleanor J. Cornell. He graduated from Cornell University in 1911, married Margaret Doherty in 1912 and moved to Florida in 1921 and Sanford in 1923.

Mr. Cornell was a member of Holy Cross Episcopal Church which he served as vestryman and senior warden. He was a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, American Society of Refrigerating Engineers, National Society of Professional Engineers, and was listed in "Who's Who in Engineering."

Union Is Ordered To Stand Trial For Contempt In Soft Coal Mine Strike

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—President Truman today set up an emergency fact-finding board, automatically heading off a nationwide railroad strike scheduled for Monday. The action has the effect of delaying the proposed strike for 60 days.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Judge Richmond B. Keach refused today to drop contempt charges against the striking coal miners union and ordered a trial on Monday.

Welly K. Hopkins, chief UMW attorney, said he would consider over the weekend whether to ask for a jury trial.

Assistant attorney General H. Graham Mason asked that the trial start tomorrow. He noted that since the original court back to work order, issued Feb. 11, "there has been no increase in production of the bituminous mines of this country."

Lucas Threatens Night Session On Potato Question

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Majority leader Lucas (D-Ill.) threatened to hold the House in session tonight unless action is completed before then on a bill to remove government price supports for potatoes and revise cotton controls.

Shortly after the Senate met at noon Lucas told colleagues he would demand final action today or hold them extra hours.

GOP leader Wherry of Nebraska promised cooperation. The problem of what to do about surplus Irish potatoes, piled up under government price props, has been debated intermittently for several days.

Lucas would lift price supports on all potatoes planted after certain date holding the price off until rigid government controls could be clamped down. Potatoes harvested after the deadline— which would be the date which Congress passes the pending bill. The Williams proposal would cover many more potatoes. The Delaware senator said talk of the Lucas plan had prompted many potato growers to rush out and overplant their land. His plan, he added, would save many millions of dollars in supports.

A roll call vote on the Williams proposal was agreed on yesterday, but hours of debate delayed the text. There was a chance the story would be the same today.

Lucas said he was trying to correct a potato price program that had already cost taxpayers \$500,000, before public criticism wrecks the entire government price support program for cotton, wheat, corn and other basic crops.

Laborites Hold To Lead By Slim Margin Over British Conservatives

Plan To Block Communists In Far East, Bared

Special U. S. Mission To Study Far East In Counter Move

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—American official plans for blocking Communism in the Far East unfolded today.

A special mission headed by R. Allen Gaultin, a Monterey, Calif., publisher with wide experience in Asia, will leave early next week on a hurried trip to survey the cold war needs of Malaya, Thailand, Indonesia, Burma and Vietnam.

The last-mentioned is a new state in Indo-China, which promises to become a cold war battleground now that Moscow and Communist China are openly backing Ho Chi Minh against the French-supported regimes which are recognized by the United States and most of Western Europe.

Yesterday's State Department announcement said the Griffin Mission's purpose is to "prepare the way for the most expeditious and efficient use of whatever technical assistance funds may become available."

Informal officials said U. S. government loans and military assistance also figure as a possibility in the survey, under Administration plans to help restore stability and security to the free national and colonial areas of southeast Asia.

Doctor Didn't Believe Mercy Killing Serious

Hospital Librarian Tells Of Sander's Remarks On Death

MANCHESTER, N. H., Feb. 24.—(AP)—A hospital records keeper testified today that Dr. Hermann N. Sander said he knew he had broken a law in the "mercy killing" death of a cancer patient and added "he'd broken his before he'd been through stop signs."

Mrs. Josephine Connor, medical librarian at Hillsboro County Hospital, calmly told a 13-man jury about a conversation she said she heard between a county medical referee and Sander.

Churchill And Anthony Eden Are Re-Elected To House Of Commons

LONDON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Anthony Eden, former foreign secretary and heir apparent to the Conservative Party leadership, was re-elected to the House of Commons today. He beat a Laborite.

Eden, as deputy leader of the Conservative opposition, is slated to take over in the event Winston Churchill returns. Eden's margin of victory was 8,814 votes.

Capt. Michael Astor, one of three Tory candidate sons of Virginia-born Lady Astor, turned in a 29,212 majority to win a seat. Former Secretary of State for Air Harold MacMillan, a Conservative, doubled his 1946 majority in Bromley, polling 23,042 votes to 12,245 for Mrs. Jane Elliott, his Labor opponent.

Earl Whiterton, so-called father of the House of Commons, was another term with a Conservative majority of 16,222 at Hoveham in West Sussex. He has been a member of Parliament 46 years.

Capt. Oliver Lyttleton, twice president of the Board of Trade, and a Conservative, won in Abberdon, a district he has represented since 1910.

Almost all of Labor's top government officials won. There were four exceptions—Sir Frank Soskice, solicitor general; Arthur Creech Jones, colonial secretary; E. J. Edwards, parliamentary secretary of the Board of Trade; David Ross-Williams, undersecretary for colonies.

Among the defeated Conservative seats were Randolph Churchill, son of the Conservative leader; his father, Winston, won, as did most of the Conservative bigwigs.

Close Friend Of Accused Spy, Vogeler, Found Beside Track

PRAGUE, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Two American Mormon missionaries here by Czech police since Jan. 28 on charges of entering a "prohibited area" were released today and expelled from the country.

The American missionaries, Stanley E. Abbott of Salt Lake, and U. Aldon Johnson of Idaho Falls, Idaho, were released from jail in Olomouc, central Moravia. They were placed on a train with the company of ten plainclothesmen brought to Prague, taken to the airport and whisked off to Zurich, Switzerland, by plane.

VIENNA, Austria, Feb. 24.—(AP)—A man identified by police as the U. S. Naval attache to Bucharest plunged to his death in a railroad tunnel south of Salzburg yesterday. Semiofficial sources said today there is "no hint of foul play."

(In Washington, however, officials said they were not eliminating the possibility that the officer may have been slain. Formal comment was being withheld pending further word from abroad.)

Suit Is Started To Test Legality of Georgia Unit Vote

ATLANTA, Feb. 24.—(AP)—A federal court today asked today if legal under the U. S. Constitution to give a Chattahoochee county farmer 122 times the voting power of an Atlanta businessman.

Under attack in U. S. district court, Georgia's method of taxing county units in a test of popular ballot.

The county unit system packs political power into rural counties, where Georgia voters vote by backing.

With 95 Percent Of Vote Counted Labor Has Majority Of Only Eighteen

LONDON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The Labor Party barely won this parliamentary election and faced the prospect tonight of going into the new House of Commons with a precarious majority. With all but 27 seats accounted for, tonight Prime Minister Attlee's party held 316 seats, Winston Churchill's Conservatives and their allies 281, and the Liberal party seven. Thus the Conservatives, even if they won the remaining seats, could not muster a plurality over the Laborites.

An absolute majority in the 625-seat House is 313. It remained to be seen whether the Laborites could give the Laborites a 30-seat working margin over the combined opposition Laborite leaders had said earlier this 30-seat margin was necessary for an effective parliament.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The only two Communist members of the British House of Commons lost their seats in Britain's parliamentary elections. The general secretary of the party in Britain also was defeated in the general shellacking the Communist took. The defeated Communist M.P.'s are veteran Willie Gallacher and Philip Piratin. Gallacher ran last in a three-man race in West Fife (Scotland). He had 9,301 votes to 23,746 for W. W. Hamilton, the Labor candidate, and 11,145 for E. J. Fisher, Conservative. Piratin was counted out last night in the Stepney district of London.

625 districts electing members to the House of Commons. Several times the count between the Laborites and their combined opposition was a standoff.

At 6 P. M. (1 P. M. EST) the Laborites held a lead of 18 seats over its combined opposition—the Conservatives and the Liberals.

Which ever government wins it will not stay in power long. This posed the possibility of new elections if the Labor Party emerged with a final victory but met defeat in the House of Commons on a vote of confidence.

The total vote in the election, held yesterday, broke all records. In the first 650 districts 25,316,425 votes were counted, compared with the previous high for all districts of 25,018,503 in 1945.

There were 925 House of Commons seats at stake. In the old House of Commons, consisting of 610 seats, the Laborites outnumbered the Conservatives 381 to 202.

When the counting was recessed last night, with Labor holding its big lead, there was jubilation at Transport House, Labor Party headquarters.

At this time the Liberals, third strongest party in Britain, were making a sorry showing in seats won and the "splendid groups" were completely obliterated.

Final Returns Narrow Labor's Lead; New Election May Not Come Till Fall

LONDON, Feb. 27. — (AP) — Labor's overall majority in the House of Commons fell to seven seats today with one of the 625 districts still to vote. Labor's majority in the last parliament was 140.

The slender margin made a new general election this year almost a certainty. There were hints that Prime Minister Attlee and Conservative leader Winston Churchill will delay it until fall under a "gentlemen's agreement."

Most newspapers also forecast another general election in late summer or early autumn. This would give parliament a chance to get the budget and other necessary money bills out of the way. The Labor and Conservative parties would also have time to rebuild their treasuries and campaign machines.

Prime Minister Attlee returned to No. 10 Downing Street and worked at putting together his new cabinet. He probably will have a press conference by the time the Labor members hold a pre-parliamentary caucus on Wednesday.

Senate Group Okays Probe Of Nation's Crime

Judiciary Committee Devises Plan To Study Crime Operations In Nation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27. — (AP) — The Senate Judiciary committee today approved a resolution for a full investigation of possible interstate operations by organized crime.

The resolution, by Senator Kefauver (D-Tenn.), would provide \$100,000 from the Senate contingent fund for the study. Because of this, it must be approved by the rules committee before going to the Senate floor.

Under its terms, the judiciary committee would determine whether organized crime operates in interstate commerce in any transactions which would be in violation of state or federal law.

It would also investigate the identities of persons or firms involved, and seek to find out if interstate crime operations lead to the "development of corrupting influences."

The committee would not be authorized to make recommendations on any state laws relating to gambling or interstate with the state right with respect to gambling.

An amendment by Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) to the original Kefauver resolution, adopted by the committee, broadened the proposed inquiry to look into all forms of organized crime, rather than gambling alone.

Meanwhile in the Senate floor, Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) accused eastern Senators today of trying to force farm prices down and said the result would be a depression.

Thomas, chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, spoke as the Senate passed a vote on potato price supports and cotton acreage allotments.
