## Nats Win Is First Of Week As Local Club Hits Cellar

Sanford lost both games of a double-header in Orlando yesterday to drop within one place of the cellar and give the Nats their first victory of the week.

In the opener Orlando took an early lead, making four runs in the second frame. At no time were the Seminoles even tied with the Orlando team as each team made two more tallies during the game.

In the second game Orlando took the lead in the first inning, holding it until the fourth when Sanford tied it up. One run in the fifth by the Nats decided the game in their favor.

Sanford hits failed in the first game as the local boys collected only seven to the Orlando 11. Daugherty looked good at bat for Sanford, getting three hits in four times at bat, one of them being a home run. He is credited with driving home three of the four Sanford tallies.

Eleven men were left on bases during the first game, enough to have won the game easily had the Sanford hits come at the right spot.

## Pepper Urges Occupation Of Dakar, Azores

Florida Senator Says U. S. Should Join Britain In Singapore And Iceland

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(A.P.)—President Roosevelt called in top flight men from his cabinet and the Army and Navy today to discuss stepping up the production of big bombers.

He also designated Major James H. Burns as assistant to Harry Hopkins to handle much of the detailed work under the British-Aid bill. In another step he directed Secretary of Agriculture Wickard to set up a special division to handle work previously assigned to the agricultural division of the Defense Commission. The president last night asked Secretary of State Stimson to obtain "substantial increases" in heavy bomber production. The goal is reported to be 500 heavy bombers monthly.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(A.P.)—Asserting "it is time for the United States to get tough," Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) urged today that this nation in co-operation with Great Britain occupy Greenland, Iceland, the Canary Islands, Singapore and Dakar in West Africa.

## House Changes Decision Upon Murphy Funds

Most Of Money From Land Sales Would Go For Legislative Expenditures  
TALLAHASSEE, May 6.—(A.P.)—Reversing itself overnight, the House today voted 48 to 38 to put \$750,000 of the Murphy Act land sales money into the State general revenue and for legislative expenses and Confederate pensions.

It voted 48 to 34 yesterday to give counties 90 percent of the money and the State 10 percent.

Gov. Holland's administration yesterday on the first of his major financial proposals originally introduced in the House. Other phases of the program have been introduced first in the Senate.

The House approved the bill giving the Murphy Act money to the general fund now goes to the Senate for consideration. The \$750,000 goes to the general fund to build highways and pay county and district road funds, paid through the Florida Highway Fund.

Five bills, including a constitutional amendment to set up the program now go to Governor Holland for signing into law. His approval is assured. The bills provide for paying counties for all roads they have built and under the State highway system, and reimbursing them for about \$247,000,000 of interest already paid or to be paid on highway bond issues.

Robert L. Cox expressed the belief that "as long as we are manufacturing supplies for England, we should see that they get over there. As long as we have instituted a policy of aid to Great Britain, we should carry it as far as necessary."

In a review opening the government's statement in a full dress debate on the conduct of the war, Eden welcomed the "immediate step forward by the United States in deciding to send ships to the Red Sea."

## Decisive Battle In Iraq Nears

England, Iraq Reject Turkey's Offer Of Peaceful Settlement

Germany's Rhineland felt the scourge of a "made-in-England" blitz today—a series of raids in which R. A. F. bombers reported attacks on Frankfurt-Am-Main, Mannheim and other Rhine industrial centers as well as on the Nazi-occupied French coast.

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In the critical Near East situation, a decisive battle for control of Iraq's rich oil fields appeared inevitable after both the British and Iraq were reported to have rejected a Turkish offer of mediation and an Egyptian appeal for a peaceful settlement.

Great Britain today threatened to bomb neutral Baghdad and destroy Iraq's rich field of oil under Iraqi forces, cease their long-day surge of Italian air base as an essential prerequisite to peace negotiations proposed by Turkey and Egypt.

British reinforcements landed at Haifa on the Palestine coast have reached Haifa, 65 miles west of Baghdad in the Egyptian effort to relieve the imperial garrison hammered by Iraqi air forces since Tuesday night. Civilian dispatches said that Turkey and Egypt held their efforts to mediate an settlement between Britain and the contending parties.

Total milk production from 21,936,856 cows for 1939 was 11,508,243,769 gallons. It represented an increase of 212,335 milk cows compared with 1929 and an increase of nearly 600 million gallons of milk. But it was a decrease of over two and one-half gallons for each person because population increased at a higher rate than milk production.

Fruit Juice

Did you know that the American people are drinking more today than ever before in their history? And we don't mean beer, wines and ales. They are drinking more fruit juices, more orange juice, grapefruit juice, prune juice and what have you.

In 1930, the output of canned grapefruit juice was 115,000 cases. Today, it is about 11,000,000 cases. Today, almost half of the entire grapefruit crop reaches the market in the form of juice.

Altogether nearly 24 million cases of fruit juices were sold in this country in 1939 as compared with only 205,000 cases ten years ago.

In all probability the health of the American people will show a marked improvement as a result of this larger consumption of fruit juices.

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Pillow Called Englishman's Favorite Raid Shelter-It Shuts Out Noise

NEW YORK, May 6.—(AP)—Millions of Englishmen are making air raid shelters out of their beds just by putting a pillow over their heads to shut out the noise and going to sleep.

They have found in nine months under bombardment that there aren't any bombproof shelters. The only absolutely safe places when bombs start dropping is out of town and after they begin to fall it's too late to get there.

The next safest place is down in a deep subway station, but stations aren't entirely bombproof. Several hundred South Londoners were drowned in one when a big bomb hit a water main over their heads last Fall.

They crowd the neighborhood saloons until closing time and then go home and go to bed. They hurry to get the streets because houses that are out some of the frightening noise but they figure they are just as safe in a saloon or at home as they would be in an air raid shelter.

Anyone who has seen what a big bomb does knows there isn't much protection against it anywhere.

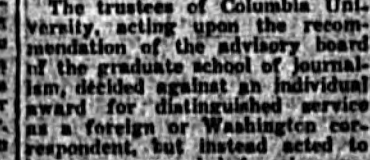

1427 Military Planes Turned Out In April

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(AP)—Aircraft manufacturers delivered 1427 military planes during April, an increase of 211 over the March total.

The figure was announced yesterday by the office of production management, which did not disclose the types of planes nor how many of them went to the armed forces of the United States and how many to Great Britain.

Defense officials said some months ago that they hoped to obtain an output of 1500 planes monthly by early summer, and to get 2100 planes in August, with proportionately sharp increases in the following months.

Deliveries in the four months reported—thus far: December, 799; January, 1036; February, 972; and March, 1216.

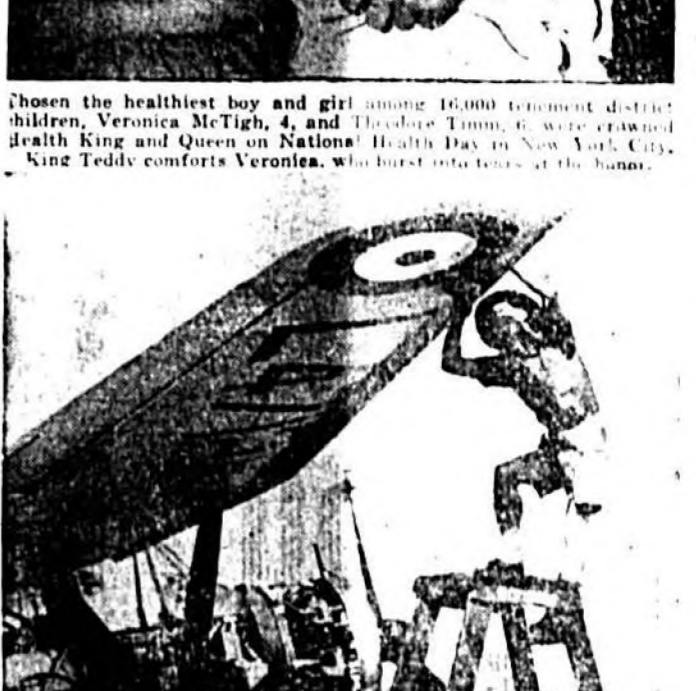

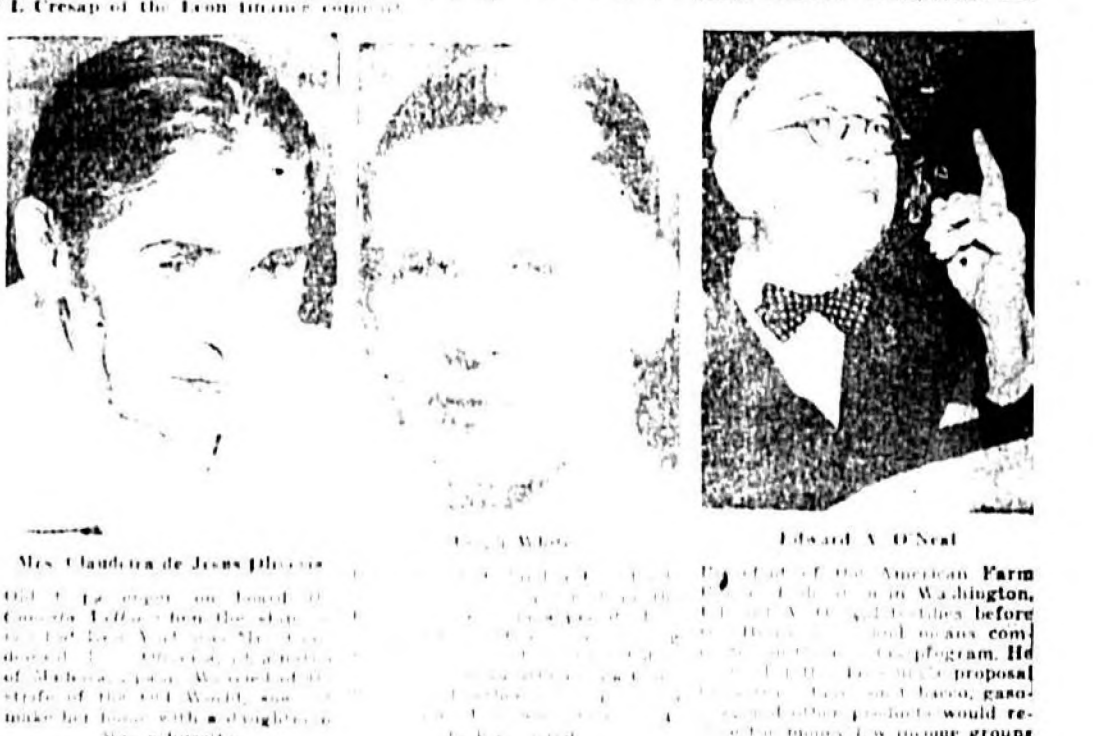

LONDON, May 7.—(AP)—The British House of Commons gave Prime Minister Winston Churchill an overwhelming vote of confidence today after he had disclosed that nearly 600,000 imperial soldiers stand guard against the Axis in the Middle East, and that British escorts enough new American merchant ships to see her through 1942 in the battle of the Atlantic.

The vote was 447 to 2. Churchill asserted "we need a great deal more help from the United States and I expect we shall get it."

He declared further "we intend to defend to the death and without thought of retreat Crete and Tobruk."

It is on Crete that the British and Greeks are making a final stand as Axis troops in the British carrier holding out behind the Axis lines in Libya.
