

The following are some of the major objectives which I favor, as outlined to the Jaycees Thursday

I am in favor of law enforcement, and will expect the Police to work with the Sheriff's office and the State Road Patrol in the enforcement of laws. Personally, I do not approve of nor patronize gambling devices, slot machines, bolito, etc. The biggest difficulty encountered by the law enforcement officers is the public opinion and the patronage of gambling devices by numbers of our citizens. Such influence results in an attitude of tolerance by a large number of other citizens, even tho they may not; themselves, be law violators. This attitude of citizens creates a most unfortunate influence and lack of respect for authority amongst the younger generation.

I am in favor of resurfacing streets where the work is absolutely needed, and where the use of the street justifies. I am not in favor of new paving in Georgetown and Goldsboro now. These sections should first have better drainage, streets graded, and the necessary sewage facilities. I am not in favor of making assessments against abutting property owners for the resurfacing of streets.

It is my opinion that the City cannot now afford a full time Recreational Director as has been suggested. I am in favor of such recreational facilities as the City can afford. It appears that funds now available might make it possible to construct a swimming pool. From time to time as funds are available additional recreational projects can be considered. Any City Recreational Brogram should be coordinated with the school recreational activities.

For a long-time program the City should have plans for a Sewage Disposal Plant, and the necessary new sanitary sewers. It may be necessary to have a referendum, or a vote, to authorize such improvements and provide for their financing.






