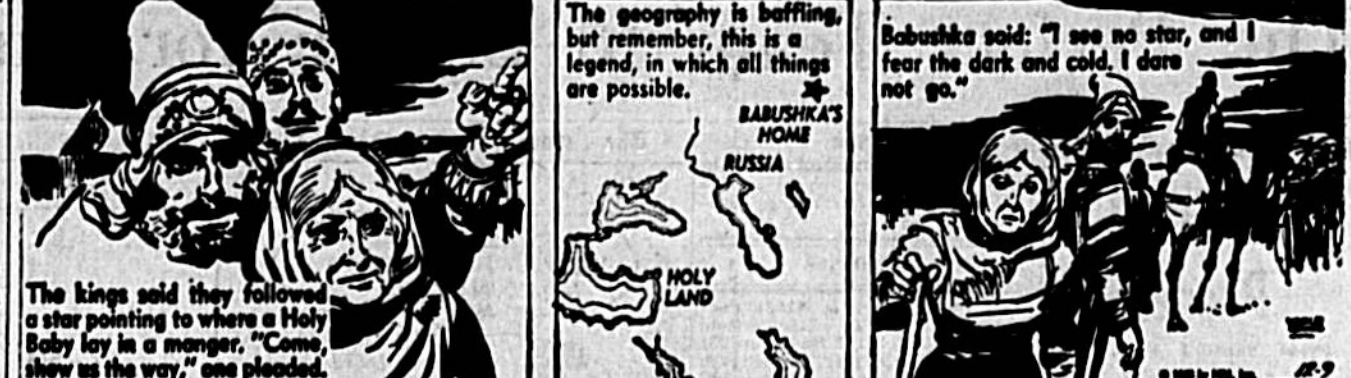

Declaration On Religious Liberty Wins OK

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope Paul VI placed into Catholic law the final four decrees approved by the Ecumenical Council, including a pronouncement on religious liberty which opens a new era for the church.

The pontiff told the more than 2,000 bishops and College of Cardinals assembled in St. Peter's Basilica for the gathering ceremony, they were participating in a "final and stupendous hour."

Pope Paul added, however, the concave "did not attempt to resolve all the urgent problems of modern life," including birth control.

The U.S.-backed declaration on religious liberty was given solemn final endorsement of the decree, acknowledging the right of all men to worship free from interference, was the most "significant immediate act of the council."

The council, first summoned by Pope John XXIII in 1962 and opened by the late pontiff Oct. 4, 1962, passed into church law in its four years of work. There were 168 full sittings and more than 500 votes.

The historic gathering officially ends today in a state ceremony to be attended by representatives of more than 80 governments and international organizations. That ceremony will be in St. Peter's Square.

All four final decrees of the council in church history received overwhelming votes for passage today before the pontiff placed them into law.

Paul also abrogated the excommunication of Michael Celestino, who was barred from the church in 1954 by Pope Pius XII because of his ecclesiastical policies as a patriarch of Constantinople. This controversy was the start of the rift that split the church into the current Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches.

The four decrees put into effect today were the final ones in a group of 16 passed by the council. The decrees were:

- On the role of the church in the modern world. It was one of the most hard fought and touching on birth control and nuclear warfare. It was one of the most hard fought and touching on birth control and nuclear warfare.
- On missions, giving missionaries in the field a voice in the church's central missionary board.
- A declaration on the priesthood which gives general guidelines for parish work and recommends social welfare and pensions for priests.
- On freedom of worship. This decree states that all men are free to worship according to the dictates of their conscience, without coercion by the state. Pius XII's restrictions against eating meat on Friday is ready for proclamation at any time, Vatican sources said today.
- However, Paul has put off issuing the bull until after the Ecumenical Council, they said. The historic gathering ends Wednesday.

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ISTANBUL, Turkey (UPI) — A 900-year-old breach between Roman and Orthodox Catholics ended today in simple ceremonies held simultaneously by here and in the Vatican.

The services announced mutual excommunication in 1054 of Rome and Constantinople, the old name for Istanbul. The action permits members of the both churches to participate in each other's services.

Pope Paul VI was represented at the Orthodox service here by a seven-member delegation led by Lawrence Cardinal Shehan, archbishop of Baltimore.

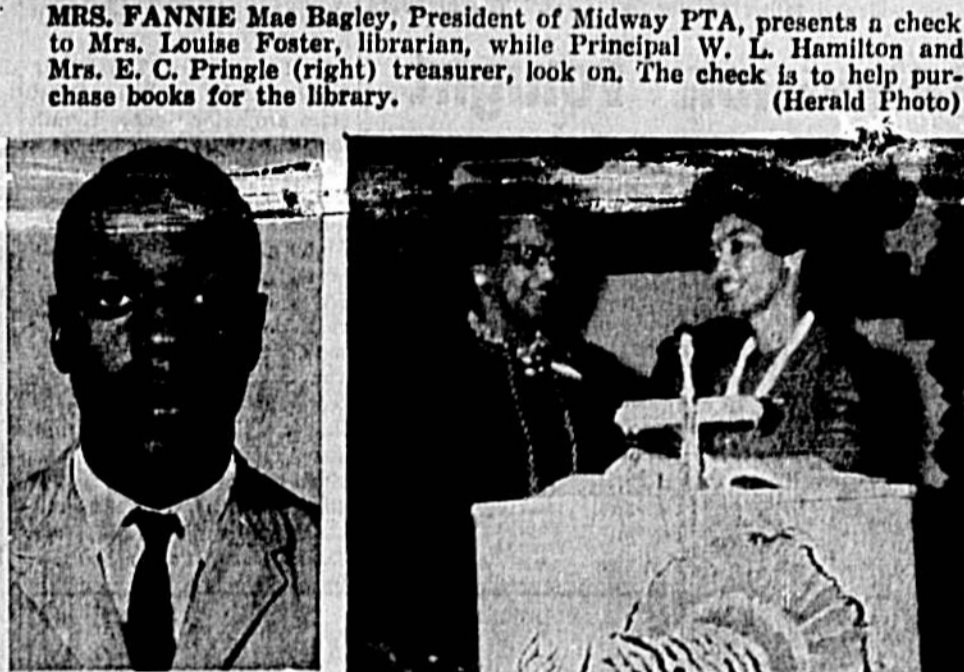
This meeting with the students is free. The instructor donates his time and effort to assure his students that modern math can be fun and interesting.

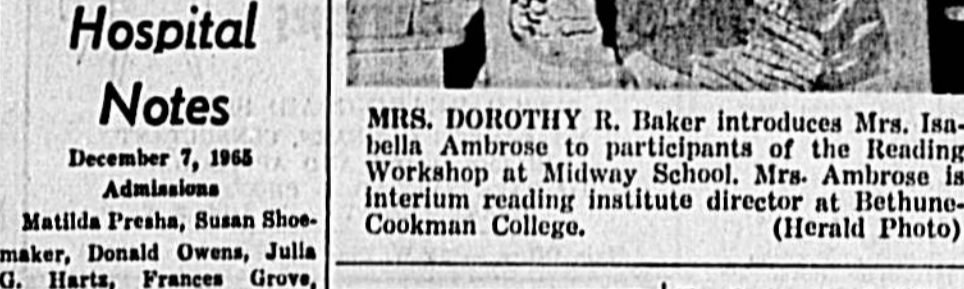

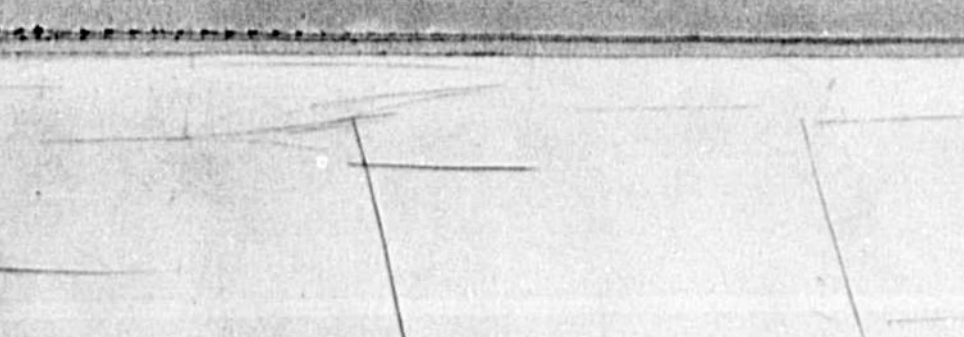

Coroner Rules 'Accidental' In Sailor's Death

Julian P. Hutcheson Jr., 21-year-old sailor stationed at Sanford Naval Air Station, accidentally shot himself to death while hunting Nov. 21 in Ocala National Forest. It was ruled today by W. A. Milton Jr., Lake County judge and coroner.

Milton informed The Sanford Herald this morning his ruling was "accidental death by self-inflicted wound."

The coroner said it appeared Hutcheson had started out to hunt a squirrel. He apparently had "gone down" his shotgun but was holding a .45 caliber revolver in his lap. The revolver discharged, the bullet passing through the stock of the shotgun.

Milton said apparently the shot started Hutcheson and the automatic fired a second time, the bullet entering over the right ear and coming out at the top of his head.

Judge Milton said he had decided against having an inquest after reviewing the lengthy investigations carried out by the Lake County Sheriff's Department and U. S. Navy investigators.

The Navy conducted an autopsy on the body and presented its findings to Judge Milton.

At the time of the accident, Navy authorities said Hutcheson had gone squirrel hunting. When he failed to return at nightfall a search party was organized and his body found a short time later.

Hutcheson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Julian Hutcheson Sr., of Savannah, Ga.

Prostitute Plied Trade In Jail, True Bills Charge

NEW YORK (UPI) — The warden of a jail housing federal prisoners was indicted on charges of lying when he denied taking a bribe to permit a prostitute to sell her services to prisoners.

Henry B. McFarland, 71, warden of the Hudson County Jail in nearby Jersey City, N. J., was indicted on four counts of perjury by a federal grand jury.

The federal panel charged McFarland with lying when he denied receiving money to allow inmates to use the jail's "blue room," which was equipped with a couch, television and refrigerator.

The prostitute, identified as Marilyn Jean Fraser, 27, also was indicted on a perjury charge for having denied consorting with inmates for fees of upwards of \$20 plus \$10 for transportation from New York City to Jersey City.

The grand jury began its investigation last year after learning that Miss Fraser had been taken to New Jersey for immoral purposes in violation of the federal Mann Act. She is a former resident of Southern California and originally from Denver, Colo.

Miss Fraser, who has been living in Manhattan under the name of Mary Ellis, was returned to jail in lieu of \$5,500 bail after arraignment before Federal Judge Harold R. Tyler. McFarland, warden at the county jail for 13 years, was scheduled to plead to the indictment.

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Lyle C. Wilson Says: Measure Of Control

The Committee for Electoral College Reform (CECR) generally big city politicians enjoy a large measure of control over presidential elections by reasons of distortions brought about by the enormous disparity in populations of the various states.

CECR cites 12 populous states in which large cities tend to dominate small towns and family farmers in presidential elections. These states represent 250 electoral votes, only eight votes short of a majority necessary to elect a president. The 12 are: States, cities and electoral votes:

- New York: New York, Buffalo, Rochester, 43.
- California: Los Angeles, San Francisco, 40.
- Pennsylvania: Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, 29.
- Illinois: Chicago, 28.
- Ohio: Cleveland, Cincinnati, Columbus, 25.
- Michigan: Detroit, 21.
- New Jersey: Newark, Jersey City, Paterson, 17.

Massachusetts: Boston, 14.
Missouri: St. Louis, Kansas City, 12.
Wisconsin: Milwaukee, 12.
Maryland: Baltimore, 10.
Minnesota: Minneapolis, St. Paul, 10.
The large cities tend to dominate presidential politics in the United States as a whole as well as within their own borders. CECR explains that:

"The 12 states are known as the pivotal bloc vote, controlled areas. In these areas are concentrated the bloc vote groups racial, religious and economic to which the politicians are appealing. Big city politicians have grip control through the bloc vote."

More simply stated, a more effective political organization and discipline can be achieved in an urban area of concentrated population than usually are feasible in small town and country areas. The late Democratic boss E. H. Crump manipulated and won elections in Tennessee with a finely adjusted Memphis machine. The general ticket or at-large method of choosing presidential electors invites similar funny business in every state where one or more large cities provide suitable conditions for tight political organization.

The at-large winner-take-all method tends to dilute the vote of the rural citizen and absolutely to ignore the minority votes of all citizens. In New York, a majority of a single vote out of millions cast would enable one of two contending candidates to take all of New York's electoral votes.

CECR proposes a substitute method of choosing the electoral college. It is the District Plan in which electors would be chosen exactly as members of Congress are elected. Each Congressional district would choose one presidential elector. Two would be chosen in states with more than one congressional district, running at-large as U.S. Senators are chosen.

This would be a fair system. Big city voters would elect their own presidential electors and the small towns also would choose for themselves. Neither would be dominated by the other. All voters in each state would participate in the two at-large elections. The district plan would tend to reduce the political power of pressure groups, racial, religious and labor.

All will require increasing attention.

Year 2000 Crucial In Fight Against Hunger

By Harry Ferguson
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Americans are the best fed people in the world. As one expert puts it "in the United States we have the most abundant and cheapest food in the world."

There are pockets of hunger in this country, but it is not because of a shortage of food. We simply have not perfected the technique of getting an adequate amount of food to all citizens. President Johnson's anti-poverty campaign is an attempt to correct that.

The misery of 2.5 billion persons is beyond the comprehension of the average American. In this book "The Great Ascent," Robert L. Heilbrunn wrote a dramatic passage telling what would happen to an American family if its living standard were to be reduced to that of the underprivileged people of the world.

"We begin by invading the house to strip it of its furniture. Everything goes: bed, chairs, tables, television set. We leave the family with a few old blankets, a kitchen table, a wooden chair. The box of matches may stay, a small bag of flour, some sugar and salt. A few moldy potatoes already in the garbage can must be rescued for they will provide much of tonight's meal."

"The bathroom is dismantled, the running water shut off, the electric wires taken out. Next we take away the house. The family can move to the toileted. Communications must go next. No more newspaper, magazines, books. . . . Next government aid must go. No more postmen, no more firemen. There is a school, but it is three miles away and consists of two rooms. They are not too overcrowded since only half the children in the neighborhood go to school."

"The nearest clinic is 20 miles away and is tended by a midwife. It can be reached by bicycle, provided the family has a bicycle which is unlikely. . . . Finally, money. We will allow our family a cash award of \$5. The money is simply our bread winner from expiring the tragedy of an infant's death who must be buried because he could not raise \$2.94 which he mistakenly thought he needed to secure admission to a hospital where he could have been cured."

"This picture is almost by no means exaggerated. Heilbrunn points out that it could be even blacker than he painted it: "It is not uncommon in Hong Kong for a family of four to live in a bunk bed. . . . In Calcutta 200,000 people simply live in the streets."

One of the strange contradictions of the American way of life is that we restrict agricultural production and stockpile surplus food at a time when billions of persons are hungry. As of Oct. 23 this nation had in storage \$2.6 billion worth of agricultural products, including 492 million bushels of wheat and 286 million bushels of corn.

The solution seems simple: let the American farmer go all out in production and let the government sell the surplus abroad. But immediately we run into a stone wall of tariffs, trade agreements and a reluctance on the part of many Congressmen to allow the United States to do business with the Communists.

One example will suffice: There is an American export regulation requiring that 80 per cent of shipments to all Communist nations except Poland and Rumania shall be carried in U. S. ships. That runs up the price of American grain. Foreign shippers will carry a ton of wheat to East Germany for \$2.50 in an American vessel it costs \$1.04. One nation that benefits from this is Canada which has been doing steady business with Communist China in wheat.

Many experts consider 2000 A. D. the crucial year in the world's battle to get enough food to stay alive. By that time the population of the world will have risen from three billion to six billion. The United States probably will be the last classed of well nourished persons—a small island with enough to eat in a world of desperation and hunger—corrective measures are not taken. But we will not be so.

At some date we are said to be so desperate that they will lose or gain only one second in 15 years.

Astronauts Look To Rendezvous

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—Gemini 6 Astronauts Walter Schirra and Thomas Stafford today got the go-ahead for launch Sunday on a suspense-filled orbital chase after Gemini 7.

A space agency spokesman announced in Houston that Gemini 7 Astronauts Frank Borman and James Lovell planned to rocket their capsule into a circular path later today to prepare for the historic space rendezvous attempt.

The Gemini 6 launch originally was scheduled for Monday, but the main obstacle to a Sunday launch and rendezvous attempt was a 1 1/2-in. hole in the 200-ton Saturn rocket, which was passed Wednesday night, 24 hours ahead of schedule.

If all goes as planned, the Gemini 6 pursuit ship will be rocketed aloft at 9:50 a.m. Sunday — less than eight days after the launch of Gemini 7. A rendezvous could

come five hours and 40 minutes later.

Westerners also gave the all-clear sign for a Sunday launch for the Gemini 6 astronauts.

Borman and Lovell, circling earth for the fifth day, were told of the decision to attempt the spectacular rendezvous attempt on Sunday.

"Sounds excellent," Lovell said. "We'll see if we can fit it into the schedule."
