Ganas appears to be fairly well qualified for the position too. He was director of athletics at the Pensacola Naval Air Station for two years. Since leaving the Navy, he has traveled throughout the state and inspected recreational facilities to get a wide variety of ideas that can be used here in our fair city. Ganas states that he has been made offers to take such a position in Tampa. He thinks that Fort Lauderdale is one of the best recreational setups in the state.

We hope that the new com-

mission will digest some of this and at least give it some consideration at the first opportunity. It will be a nice making Sanford a fine recreational center.

Henry Pickard Is Rated Best Sports Comeback In 1945

A year ago, the divot followers were saying that slender Henry was all through with the links—that the arthritis and sinus trouble, which crippled him so badly in 1944, would keep him from ever giving the pros any trouble again.

Pickard just laughed at his rivals, rested as much as he could on his farm in South Carolina, and kept plugging on the fairways around Charleston, hoping for the best.

It was just 12 years ago when Henry was 25 that he got himself a national reputation by defeating Walter Hagen for the Carolina open championship.

Ribbentrops' Warfare Plan Turned Down

Proposal Of Foreign Minister Was Too Drastic Even For German Command

NUERNBERG, Jan. 9.—(AP)—British prosecutors have introduced evidence showing that Joachim von Ribbentrop proposed warfare which even the German High Command thought too drastic.

Hitler's foreign minister was shown to have called for lynching of any Allied fliers who had bombed German cities. This was turned down by the High Command. Instead, the Army and Air Force agreed to apply lynch law to low-level attacks on civilians, shooting parachuting German airmen in the air, strafing of civilian trucks, on attacks, on trains marked with a red cross.

The on-time champagne salesman also was shown to have urged Japan to declare war on the United States. He informed Mussolini in 1940 that Spain's Generalissimo Franco was ready to enter the war.

The documents closed the case by British prosecutor Sir David Maxwell Fyfe against the so-called statesman for Hitler's third Reich. The prosecution now is turning to the Army High Command. Evidence is being presented against Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel and Colonel General Alfred Jodl, who are on trial before the international tribunal with von Ribbentrop.

Plan To Rebuild German Economic Empire Revealed

BERLIN, Jan. 9.—(AP)—There is evidence today that German industrialists are working behind the backs of occupation authorities. Cartel investigators believe their aim is to rebuild the Reich's economic empire.

The investigators of the American Military Government have uncovered a secret memorandum from an official of Germany's second largest chemical trust to his fellow directors. It was written by the former chairman of the board of IG Farben, A. G. Hana Vorchheimer, and is dated Sept. 8, 1945.

The big business official told the directors that the occupation of Germany might last for years. He said they cannot wait to begin reconstruction until the occupation period has passed. He went on to outline a scheme which includes renewed ties with industry in the United States.

Seven Negroes Escape Death In Accident

Lafayette Allen, negro of 801 Pecan Avenue, together with six negro companions as passengers in his car, narrowly escaped serious injury shortly after midnight. Retaining to Thirteenth Street on the Southwest Road in Goldboro, he failed to negotiate the curve, skidded, went through "Cap" Burke's yard, veered against a porch, knocked down a stone wall, then crashed into and nearly caved in a newly built frame store, according to Police Chief Roy O. Williams.

Chief Williams, who said he arrived at the scene of the accident before the dust had hardly settled, stated that Allen had been arrested on reckless driving charges. At the time of the accident Allen and his companions were returning from "The Bucket of Blood," a negro juke joint on the Southwest Road.

SERGENT ACCUSES HONMA

MANILA, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A Manila dispatch from General Hays pointed out an accusing finger at Lieutenant General Honma. M/Sgt. James Balaban of New Haven told a military commission today that Honma drove along the Bataan route which watched Allied war prisoners die of torture, starvation and murder. Honma is on trial for such atrocities as the Bataan death march but contends he was unaware of them.

NAZI ARRESTED

LONDON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A British dispatch from Germany says British security officers have arrested the Nazi who probably is the only surviving witness of Adolf Hitler's private life. The British news agency Reuters discloses that General Seaton of New Berlin is in Allied custody. Propaganda Minister Goebbels and Deputy Bormann also witnessed these scenes. Both are dead.

BATTLE BREAKS OUT

ROME, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A full scale battle is said today to have broken out between a band of about 1,000 Sicilian Separatists and a strong force of Carabinieri reinforced by regular Italian troops. Italian press dispatches say the battle is raging in the town of Pizzolungo in Sicily.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The simplest things can occupy the mind of a leading military figure. At the moment, the thought of such simplicity gives Major General Claire Chennault more comfort than all the glory he has reaped from his "Flying Tiger" fame.

Chennault heads the United States 14th Army Air Force. He has arrived in Shanghai by plane after a fast flight from San Francisco. Although he retired from the Army in October, he still wears his beribboned uniform and the insignia of a Major General. He has told inquirers that he is prepared to make a survey of post-war trade and business possibilities in China. He has been quick to add that he has no plans whatever to enter business for himself. All he wants is a good rest before he starts his survey. If he gets what he wants, he'll be perfectly happy and this is his heart's desire. General Chennault said, "I have a house in Kumming the Chinese built for me. It has two fireplaces and I love fireplaces. I am going there and sit in front of the fire for a week and relax."

MAY TOUR RUSSIA

MOSCOW, Jan. 9.—(AP)—At least two American sports promoters are exploring the possibilities of getting baseball, football and volleyball teams and track and swimming stars to tour the Soviet Union. They have attracted huge crowds of Russian spectators.

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H. James Gut Named Mayor Of Sanford

Leshner, Williams, Installed As Lodge And Higgins Retire From Commission

H. James Gut, prominent insurance broker, realtor and member of the City Commission for the past nine years, was named mayor of Sanford last night and Higgins, Sanford chief executive for six of the past nine years, retired from the commission.

Following a business session during which the old board acted upon numerous matters, the new commission was immediately formed. Robert A. Williams and Les Leshner, recently elected to fill vacancies created since Mr. Higgins and M. J. Lodge did not seek re-election, were installed as commissioners, and upon a nomination by Mr. Williams, Mr. Gut was installed as mayor.

Following the appointment of N. H. Sayer from the position of clerk to that of acting city manager, the retiring board adjourned. Mr. Sayer, representing the employees of the City, thanked Mr. Higgins and Mr. Lodge for the splendid cooperation extended the employees during their tenure of office and expressed the pleasure derived from their association. Mr. Sayer also presented Mr. Higgins with a smoking set and Mr. Lodge with a fountain pen. Both of the retiring members expressed their gratitude to the city personnel and thanked them for their support and faithful cooperation.

Upon the adoption of the new commission, Fred R. Wilson, reminded the members that he had submitted his resignation as city attorney in December, 1944, but that no action had been taken at that time. Commission George Bishop stated that he had hoped Mr. Wilson would continue his service to the City and that the commission unapologetically expressed an identical desire. No further action was taken on Mr. Wilson's request.

Mr. Sayer informed the Commission that due to the automobile and trucks that are being parked on the streets all night long during cleaning activities, particularly in the business district near the hotels, the commission instructed Mr. Sayer, City Engineer Ralph Lubinski and Police Chief Roy Williams to take corrective action at the next meeting of the board.

Chief Williams told the Commission that there are many amusement vending machines in Sanford. He issued by the City and that he had been forced to make a number of arrests because the machines are being used for gambling purposes. Mr. Sayer informed the board that the machines are licensed at \$10 per quarter.

He also pointed out that since Chief Williams had made numerous arrests, he had withheld issuing any such licenses until the matter was brought before the board. Commissioner W. C. Hill pointed out that the fine for each arrest should be as long as they do not pay the price. Chief Williams said he had received complaints from various sources about the machines being used for gambling.

After hearing various members bring out the fact that there are some 40 machines which are licensed at a total amount of approximately \$1600 per year, the board approved the issuing of licenses for the machines and instructed Chief Williams and Police Chief Roy Williams to take measures to suppress illegal use of the vending machines. Mr. Sayer was also instructed to report any complaints to each member of the Commission.

J. K. Hoelshand, representing a group of Sanford plumbers, appeared before the commission and requested that the license fee of \$3.00 be reduced to \$1.00. Grady Duncan, Sanitary Inspector, stated that the license fee for electricians was only \$1.00 and expressed his approval of (Continued On Page Two)

FORT WORTH, Tex. — The chunky little guy who shepherds gold's good will to fortune as well as fame should have been a managing editor. Better still (and managing editors may not like the inference) he should have been a sports editor, although that would have been a bad break for sports editors.

Fred (Corkie) Corcoran is God's gift to the boys of the press. He's the guy with the "lead," the fellow who has a story for you in advance.

Not that Corcoran isn't valuable to golf but he would certainly have made a swell sports editor. Always a new angle, always something to brush up a story when you've run out of superlatives and ideas on how to make a golf year readable.

But Corcoran never wrote sports. You'd certainly think so the way he can dash off a story—verbally—that the boys of the press always find use for. Corcoran's whole career is golf—golf—not as a player but as the link's good-will ambassador.

Yet Corcoran, tournament manager of the Professional Golfers' Association—the fellow who arranges the annual tour of the shotmakers who go after the gold and glory—knows other sports like a book. They bill him as the guy who never was stuck on a sports question. Really, though, he misses once in awhile. Take the time he said the last ball player to hit four home runs in one game was Lou Gehrig and had to give 67 soldiers a package of cigarettes each because it really was Chuck Klein. But they don't hang him often.

Corcoran has been tournament manager of the P.G.A. for nine years. In that time he has seen annual prize money for golf's touring troops grow from \$100,000 to \$375,000. And for 1946 there already is a half million dollars in sight. In the nine years the golf pros have drawn down \$2,000,000 in their treks across country.

Goering Charged As Founder Of Gestapo

NUERNBERG, Jan. 9. (AP)—The fat former Reichsmarschal Hermann Goering—squirmed in his seat today at Nurnberg where 22 ranking Nazis are on trial as war criminals. Goering didn't like it when the United States prosecutor called him the father of the Gestapo and the concentration camp. He also was described as more dangerous than Hitler in some respects.

Flock Of Canada Geese Being Wiped Out In Illinois

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. (AP)—One flock of Canada geese is really being a goose. The silly birds are doing their best to commit suicide. Each winter they highlight it to the Horseshoe Lake goose refuge in southern Illinois. The place has been described as a spot that's as safe and secure as a lightning contest on top of an ammunition dump.

The life of a goose with a one-track mind is sad. What happens to her has been told by Frederick Lincoln, a senior biologist for the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. Canada geese make several flights, some down the Atlantic coast, others by the Pacific route. One flock that turns the Hudson Bay and returns to the Horseshoe Lake. Some of the geese, with one-track minds, keep returning all the time. They pay no attention to the greedy hunters who have whacked the flock from 55,000 to 20,000.

Why the birds find Horseshoe Lake such a lure is beyond comprehension, and of course no goose is going to tell. The geese love it—but unfortunately for them, hunters love it, too. Lincoln said, in fact, that some farmers in the area make more money renting blinds than they do raising crops. A goose taking over this array of hunters doesn't have a chance.

Elsewhere in the United States, hunters had 8 days last fall to blast away at the Canada geese. The Wildlife Service took a good look at what was happening at Horseshoe Lake, however, and ordered the shooting there stopped after 22 hours. In that little time, the sportsmen bagged 5,150 geese and crippled another 1,000. That rate is almost five a minute. Lincoln looked on it as a regular death trap, and said that if the shooting hadn't stopped, the entire flock would have been wiped out.

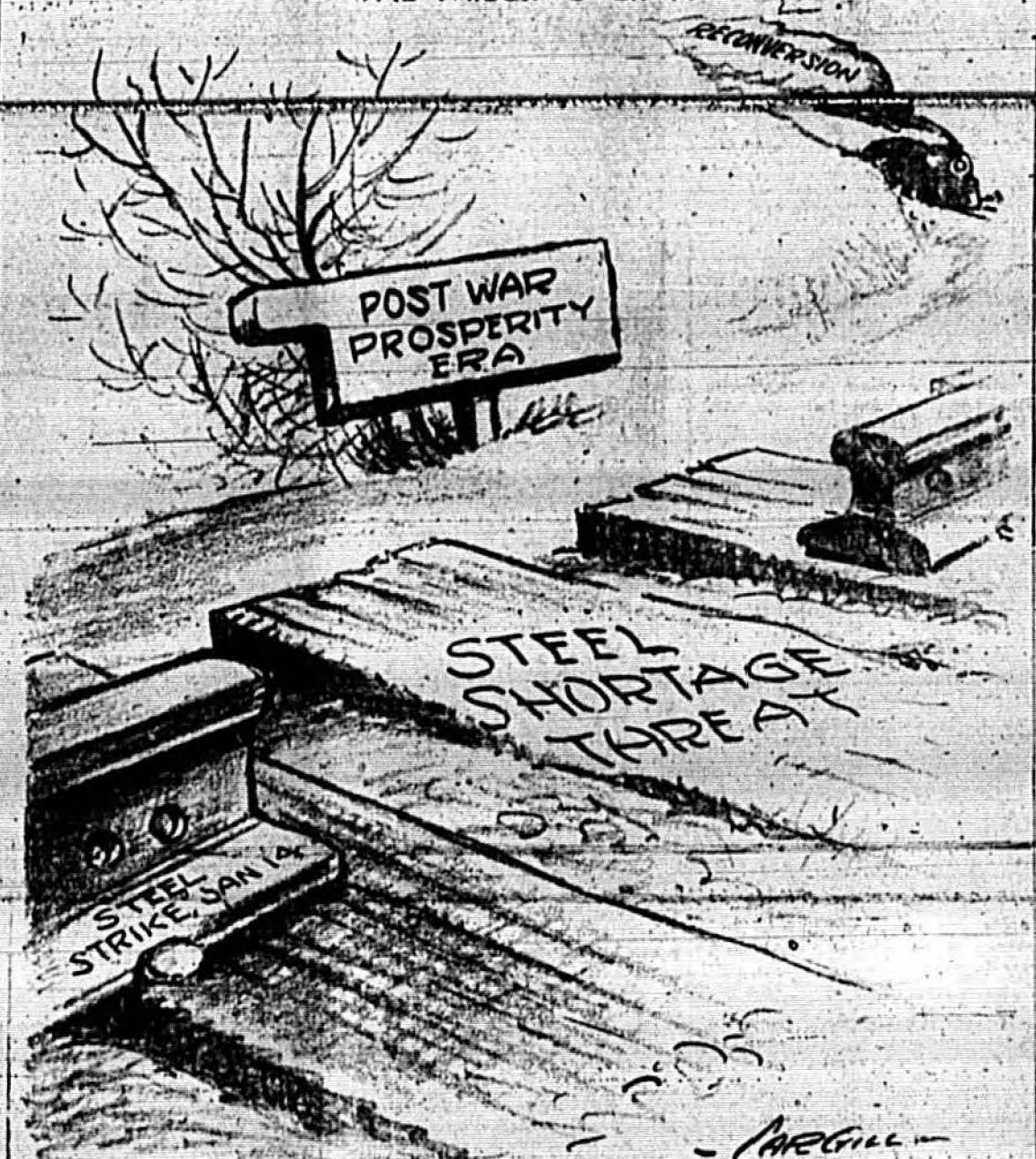

The session of the United Nations Organization in London, opening tomorrow, should be viewed by every American with hope, with prayer and with determination to do what any individual can to contribute to its success.

The League of Nations failed, chiefly because the American people, whose child it was, walked off, disclaiming responsibility and leaving the infant on another's doorstep. The United Nations Organization must not fail. This time not only the parents, but godparents and all other relatives and friends whose lives will be affected by its life, must stand by.

One meeting, whether of foreign ministers or UNO assembly or any other forward-minded group, will not make an enduring peace, any more than one robin makes a summer. But every meeting of many minds around a table on an amicable basis is one step on the good road.

Handling MacArthur
When War Secretary Patterson told a Washington press conference the other day that his department didn't consider it necessary that Gen. MacArthur be advised in advance regarding the Big Three occupation policies for Japan, the American public was startled.

MacArthur, who has been in charge of operations on that big and difficult job, had been quoted as mildly complaining that he wasn't kept closely enough in touch with Washington and was therefore handicapped in his procedure. In a statement to news correspondents, War Secretary Patterson announced that MacArthur was given all the general information possible, with regard to his command, but it was "not necessary that he be consulted in advance."

It is often difficult for a civilian public to grasp the fact that in democracies policies are made, even in military and occupational matters, by civilian boards. Military commanders then carry out the policies. MacArthur has functioned as a soldier in Japan and he appears to have staying Americans to be the whole show. But he is not, any more than the President is the whole show in the general government, whereas final decisions on policy are up to Congress.

MacArthur's long experience in the Philippines, giving him an unusual knowledge of the oriental mind, added to his executive powers, has made him an excellent administrator of Japan. It would be unfortunate if a careless use of words should in any way interfere with the excellent way in which policy and administration are being made and carried out by the board and the commander.

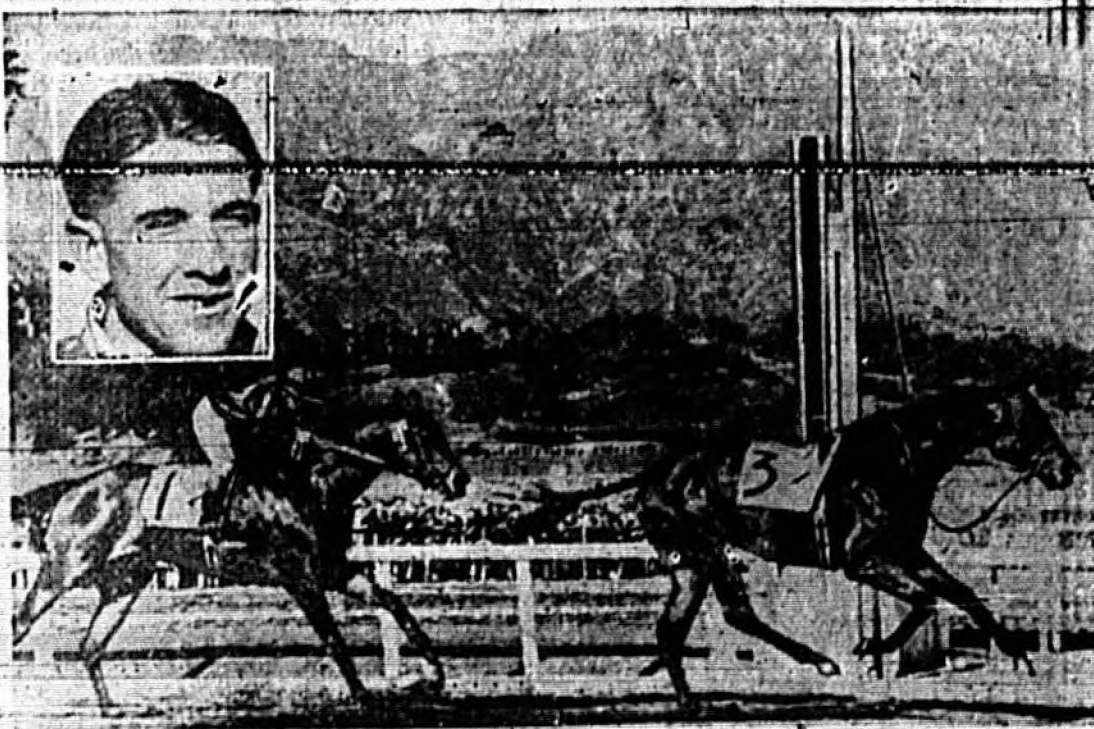
Trautman Assumes Duty As Detroit General Manager

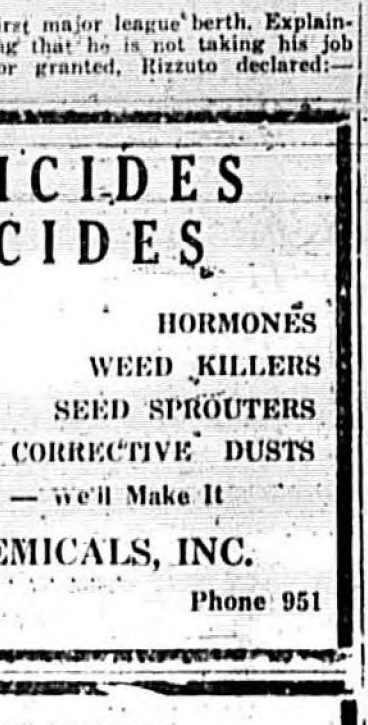

Attlee Speaks At Opening Of UNO Meeting

Says Atomic Power Must Be Controlled To Prevent Ruin And Annihilation

LONDON, Jan. 10, (AP)—In a spirit of grave and sober dedication, Britain's Prime Minister Attlee has opened the first session of the United Nations General Assembly. To the delegates assembled from all quarters of the globe, Attlee set forth the nature of the task for which the new world organization has been called into being.

The British premier said: "The coming of the atomic bomb was only the last of a series of warnings to mankind that, unless the powers of destruction could be controlled, immense ruin and almost annihilation would be the lot of most of the human race."

Attlee then reminded the delegates of past mistakes from which lessons must be learned. He said that the support of the masses of people throughout the world, Attlee said: "They must understand that we are building a defense for the common people."

Turning to the police powers of the new organization, Attlee said that the force is necessary part of a civilized community. The greater the social security and contentment of the population, the less important is the police force, he declared.

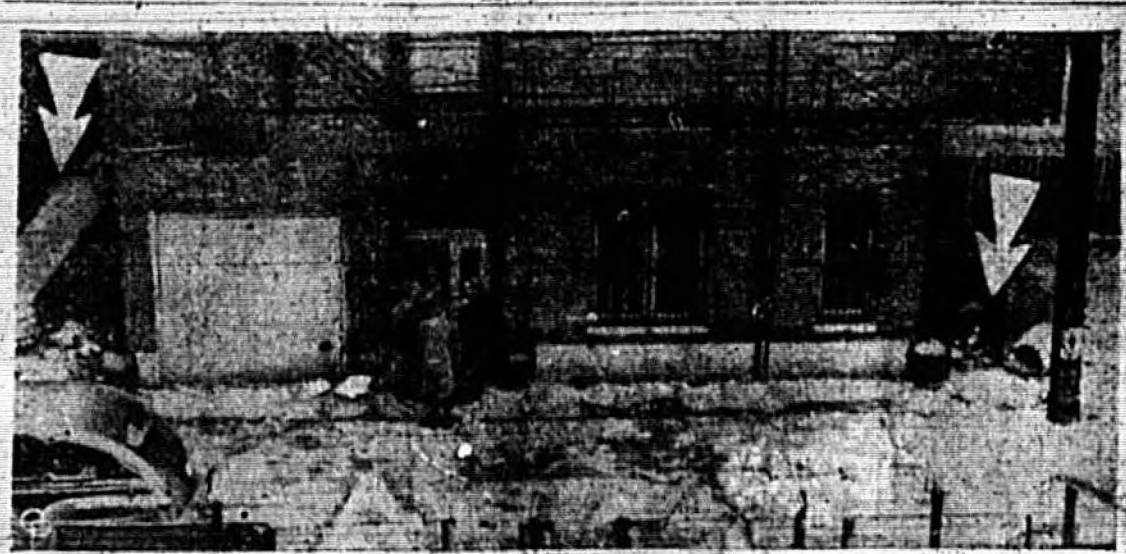
