

Gas Leaks, 24 Treated

Authorities evacuated six residences this morning in the Park Ridge subdivision south of Sanford and county firemen forcefully entered a private utility water station to shut off a leaking chlorine tank that blanketed a small area with chlorine gas. Fire department officials reported 12 persons were taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital by ambulance for treatment. A hospital spokesman said the number of persons being treated in the emergency room had reached 24 by 11 a.m., many of them schoolchildren, and more persons were expected to come in later today.

A hospital spokesman said two persons were admitted. They were identified as Mrs. Elva M.

One Vote Decides **Ballot Question**

By a narrow one-vote margin Winter Springs voters Tuesday decided they don't want a fulltime administrator to run their community, but indicated if that becomes necessary, they would rather have a mayor instead of a city manager. In a straw ballot on both questions, voters cast 146 votes for a full-time city administrator and 147

But in the second part of the ballot they expressed a decided preference for a full time mayor over a city manager with a vote of 211 to 67.

City Council will ultimately decide the question of whether there will be a \$14,000 a year full time administrator and if so whether it will be an elected mayor or appointed city manager. Deadline for candidates to file for the Nov. 8 municipal





n 1975, the county's fire protection service won a national award from the National Association of Counties. But three of the county's fire stations operate from trailers as eadquarters, and most of the furniture at the stations is provided

fire division personnel at their own expense. When the county first began to provide fire protection, the ounty commissioners considered a fire tax rate of \$1 per \$1,000 of ssessed valuation, but "that was not enough to provide paid personnel at all fire stations. So they set the rate at \$1.50 which llowed us to have two men on duty at all times at each station. For that amount of tax money we could provide the service the

commissioners wanted," according to Kaiser.

'In the 1974-75 budget year, "we took \$30,000 and bought three single-wide and one double-wide trailers for fire stations and Office (a national company which rates fire protection services to help insurance companies determine insurance rates) dropped me lean-to sheds for other stations," Kaiser said."

Three fire stations now operate out of trailer headquarters - at didway, Five Points and Chuluota. The Fern Park station is in a single-family house, and the Paola station is in an industrial park warehouse. The Sanlando and Geneva stations are in prefabricated metal buildings, and the Goldenrod station is in the former headquarters of that area's volunteer fire department.

"The only fire station that resembles a permaner said Chief Kaiser, "is in Forest City."

But the \$1.50 rate for the 1974-75 budget required the use of bout \$362,000 in federal revenue sharing money. For the next budget year (1975-76), the county commissioners voted to spend \$227,000 on fire protection from revenue sharing, and the current year's budget uses about \$350,000 in revenue sharing money and \$148,000 in federal "anti-recession" funds.

But the coming fiscal year's budget contains no revenue sharing money for firefighting. The commissioners decided each county program should pay its own way since the amount of revenue sharing money is subject to variation and may not be continued indefinitely.

The commissioners first considered a \$2 rate for fire protection for the coming fiscal year, which would have provided a budget increase of six per cent. A budget supported by a \$1.50 rate would be 13 per cent less than the current budget, and a budget at a \$1.53 rate would "correct the current deficiencies" with an 11 per cent reduction below the current budget of \$1,464,662.

Some items in the coming fiscal year which have been funded entirely out of the fire budget will be shared with the county's general fund, which is supported by all county taxpayers. In the new budget, half the cost of the fire division's communications system and a fourth of the fire division's ad-

ministrative costs will be paid out of the general fund. This means that \$75,000 in communication costs, which have been paid out of the fire prevention budget, will move to the general fund, which will also include \$25,000 for a 911 emergency elephone number system. Also, \$12,438 in administration of the fire division will be paid out of the general fund.

"The reason is that half the workload of the communication center is for countywide purposes," Kaiser said. The center handles all fire department communications with Altamonte Springs (the county and city work together to provide fire protection for the Altamonte Springs area), communicating regularly with 22 government agencies such as cities and civil defense officials, passing fire alarms to cities when fires in cities are reported to the county fire division and emergency ambulance communications with Florida North and Sen

Memorial Hospitals." · When county fire and budget officials began to work on the fire budget, "we didn't just add on a percentage for inflation. We looked at every cost of every piece of equipment and every service we had," Kaiser said. We found we couldn't maintain



Meany Keeping The Pressure On

Whether one agrees with him or not, one cannot but admire doughty old George Meany, who at the age of 83 is seeking another term as president of the

Mr. Meany is unswerving in his pursuit of what ne believes to be right for organized labor, and there are really no new tricks in his methodology.

Consider the recent AFL-CIO Executive Council meeting in Washington, where Mr. Meany captured headlines and prime time one day by announcing his personal support for the new Panama Canal treaties, and expressed the hope that Congress would approve of them.

The next day Mr. Meany was back in there swinging at Mr. Carter for failing to keep campaign promises, for not making jobs the number-one issue of his administration, for not taking care of Arthur Burns, head of the Federal Reserve Board, for not providing public service jobs. Mr. Meany concluded that organized labor has no reason to be happy with Mr. Carter. Carrot and stick.

Granted, on the basis of rhetoric Mr. Meany has some reason to be unhappy. During the recent presidential campaign Candidate Carter said,

among other things:

The full Employment Act of 1976 would be fully implemented.

That the Carter administration would never

use unemployment as a tool to fight inflation.

That as President he would strive to achieve a 4 per cent unemployment rate by the end of his first

That he would encourage private industry to That he would support numerous urban and housing programs advocated by labor.

Labor was unstinting in its support of Mr. Carter. During the campaign the AFL-CIO fielded 120,000 volunteers, installed 20,000 telephone banks pieces of literature. As a result, labor asserted it swung the tide toward Mr. Carter and other Democratic candidates in such key states as Pennsylvania, New York, Maryland and

The least that labor expected from Mr. Carter and Congress was repeal of right to work laws, a common situs picketing law, a \$3 minimum wage, federal hobbling of multi-national corporations, trade protection and a myriad of other beneficial

But, as the saying goes, politics is the art of the possible. Common situs was defeated, forcing labor to abandon its drive for repeal of right to work laws. Federal job-making legislation, while ambitious, is not up to Mr. Meany's expectations. The minimum wage legislation has been scaled down.

Mr. Carter is sensitive to the pressures of organized labor. But for the best of reasons he also is playing a carret and stick.

is playing a carrot-and-stick game, aided by Democrats in Congress. President Carter has alternately rewarded labor by providing billions for training and make-work jobs and then slapped its wrists by resisting demands for even higher

deficit spending or trade protectionism.

Apart from the rank and file members of AFL-CIO, we don't know the popularity of Mr. Meany. According to the polls, the popularity of Mr. Carter is high. Yet both leaders share a common con-

Perhaps the constituents also are playing a carrot-and-stick game. They prod President Carter with George Meany, but also reward Mr. Carter with popularity when he draws the line against the excesses of the AFL-CIO.





That bit of irony is part of the story of two government managers, running the same agency in successive administrations, and pursuing what sounds like a common goal: the decentralization of federal authority.

"When it's at its best our program grows out of the community," said Brown, the activist Democrat who runs ACTION, the federal volunteer services agency. He said his effort to move power in that direction is going smoothly, without bureaucratic resistance. That is in marked contrast to the account of Michael P. Balzano, who headed AC-

TION during the Republican administration and says he en-countered roadblocks at almost every step of his reorganization Balzano has published an account of his frustations, suggesting that they point to some of the problems President Carter will face as he tries to overhaul the federal bureaucracy. "... He will probably encounter most of the roadblocks that we

did," Balzano said in a paper issued by the American Enterprise Institute, a Washington study group.

He said those barriers included resistance in Congress and in the bureaucracy, with employe opposition ranging from foot-dragging to legal action against reorganization steps seen as threatening the power or position of federal workers.

"Mergers and consolidations imply the possibility of changes in grades, salaries and duty stations," Balzano wrote. "Un-

derstandably, this possibility gives rise to fears and opposition. which could become the President's greatest obstacle."

Carter moved to head off that prospect soon after taking office, promising federal workers that no one will be dismissed or demoted because of reorganization.

But Balzano questioned whether there can be a meaningful reorganization of the bureaucracy in which no one loses rank. He headed ACTION, the \$200-million agency that includes the Peace Corps, VISTA and other volunteer activities, for four years, until the Democrats took over the White House. He said he found the agency in dire need of an overhaul. Balzano said it took ACTION an average of 148 days to process a Peace Corps application, 102 days for a VISTA volunteer. By the time the paperwork was done, he said, the program that had sought volunteer help in the first place had sometimes been cancelled.

Furthermore, he said, ACTION's volunteer programs in the United States were dominated almost totally by Washington. "In many cases, those who had the most say about the style and substance of a program activity in a given community had never seen that community," Balzano wrote. But Balzano said he ran into a sort of bureaucratic guerrilla

war against efforts to disperse that power — which would in turn have diminished the grade, and thus the salary levels, of some positions in Washington. Brown said he has encountered no such thing in his efforts to

Sanford To Sheriff: You Go Fly That Plane

Sheriff John Polk says he hopes to have the little police plane that refused to fly back in the air within a few days. Sanford police turned the \$34,000 Cessna 172 over to the Seminole Sheriff's Department this week after Sanford city commissioners decided the police department didn't need the aircraft that was purchased earlier in the year through a federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) grant.

Sanford City Manager Warren Knowles grounded the plane last month after the engine "froze up" for the second time in two months.

Knowles ordered the city's two pilots and employes not to fly in the plane until it's certified safe. "I'm not going to see them splattered over the countryside," Knowles said. The Cessna's Lycoming engine first "froze up," of-ficials said, in late July when a mechanic was flying it to

Georgia for installation of a police spotlight. The mechanic was able to land safely, they said, when the engine "seized" at 7,500 feet altitude. The condition was repaired but occurred again last

month while on the ground at Sanford-Central Florida

Richard Quigley, an assistant to Knowles who was in charge of the aircraft grant for police, said Cessna officials "didn't seem too concerned" when police com-plained about the engine and that a Lycoming representative, when ('d pilots were afraid to fly the plane said, "park it."


Quigley said the city's position is that the engine problem is due to "design failure" on the new four-cylinder model that uses low-lead fuel. "As far as I'm concerned," Knowles said Wednesday,

"the city has nothing more to do with it but we're trying to get back the money we spent on repairs." Sheriff Polk said the aircraft is being repaired at Mid-Florida Aviation, an approved Cessna repair facility at Sanford-Central Florida Airport.

Polk said Cessna on Tuesday extended warranty repairs to include rebuilding of the other three cyclinders of the aircraft engine that has only 112 hours flying time. "It's up to the pilot," Polk said. "If he's willing to take it up, I don't see any objections. I'm sure it will be tested and certified safe before we fly it."

The sheriff's department pilot, Sgt. Jerry Capshaw, said any pilot who flies an aircraft knowing it's unsafe or not properly maintained is subject to an FAA fine and forfeiture of his pilot's license.


"I won't fly it until it's safe," Capshaw said today. He said mechanics are reassembling the engine now and the work is expected to be completed by Friday.

"I do not contend that I made no mistakes when running these banks," Lance said in his opening statement to the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee.

"But to accept the assertion that I could not even manage a small country bank, one must ignore the objective facts," he said. "Some of the claims are erroneous, some are misrepresented, some are exaggerated and some are completely misunderstood because those making the charge do not have all the facts," Lance
