30,000 Laid Off In Steel Mill; Result Of Wage Losses

multiply, and workers may be laid off by the millions. More lights will go out, more trains will stop running, and coal bins in homes and schools will become empty.

That's why the government is in such a hurry to force a showdown with John L. Lewis. At the moment, the government is pinning all its hopes on the legal proceedings which began yesterday in Washington.

Meanwhile, schools are beginning to feel the pinch acutely. Brigham Young University in Utah has closed down. Its 4,000 students have been numb with cold in unheated classrooms for the last four days. They were sent home two days ahead of their Thanksgiving vacation, and a dozen public schools in Utah county have shut their doors. There was no way of keeping them warm enough for the pupils.

The government has clamped

down news curbs on deliveries of coal to school buildings. Schools, and government buildings too, must apply to the Washington office of the solid fuels administration for coal permits.

What coal there is available is being held strictly for public utilities—electric, gas and sewage disposal plants—for street car and railroad service, for hospitals, and for other essential uses, including the heating of homes.

What's more, a tight checkup has been ordered on the dimwit regulations that went into effect last night in 21 states and in the District of Columbia. Violators face a maximum fine of \$10,000 and prison terms up to one year.

Russians Lose Fight On Troop Inventories

Molotov Over-riden On Lumping Of Disarmament With Location Of Troops

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 27—(AP)—The Russians today lost out in one of their most stubborn battles to date before the United Nations Assembly.

Overriding repeated and strenuous objections from Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov, the UN's 54-Nation political committee has voted to discuss the proposed troop inventory together with the question of arms reduction.

The Russians had been opposed to lumping the two subjects together under one debate heading, but the committee chose to back up the urging of both Britain and the United States to have both issues considered jointly.

In fact, the decision was taken while the committee was voting paragraph by paragraph on a British amendment to the original Soviet proposal for a UN troop census. By a vote of 33 to 12 it decided that the two issues were separate aspects of the same general subject. France voted with Russia in opposition, while the other three members of the Big Five—the U. S., Britain and China—voted in favor of broadening of the discussion.

The committee also approved by a vote of 36 to 12 a British proposal declaring that the troop inventory was the first step toward disarmament talks. It added that the census was needed to help set up UN's proposed international police force. Russia and France also voted against this.

In another section of the resolution there was no opposition. That was the part providing for reports on troops in enemy and friendly states.

Earlier the United States and Britain were on one side of the fence and the Russians on the other in talking about whether the troop inventory should include domestic forces as well as those abroad.

Members of the Sanford Ministerial Association will take part in the program and a special sermon entitled, "The Glorious Church" will be delivered by the Rev. W. P. Yester of the Christian Church. The Holy Cross choir will sing a harvest anthem. Mrs. J. E. Inglesby and Charles Morrison will sing special Thanksgiving solos.

Carpenter Tells Kiwanis Reasons For Thanksgiving

Liberty And Freedom Listed As Among Principal Benefits

There are many things for Americans to be thankful for, the Rev. Mark Carpenter, pastor of Holy Cross Episcopal Church, today told Kiwanis in a talk on the subject of Thanksgiving Day.

Among the things Americans should be thankful for, and which many men take for granted, are liberty, freedom and plenty, he declared.

"One cannot be thankful unless thankful to someone," declared Rev. Carpenter in referring to the need of thanksgiving to God. He pointed out that Thanksgiving by the Pilgrim-fathers was first observed as a fast, rather than a feast day and told of their dangers from wilderness and marauding Indians. He found much to be thankful for.

"The spirit of the day will be lost unless there is an outpouring of thanks toward Almighty God," said Rev. Carpenter.

He emphasized that although this is the second Thanksgiving of peace, there is still war in the world. "We have gone through a period of big business and big government and now we are in a phase of big labor. He pointed out that all three had missed the point of their mutual interdependence. Terming the present a time of decision and cultural crisis, he contrasted totalitarian aims which make man a mere vessel of the state with the Christian aims which regard every man as a child of God, and a person entitled to respect.

"Alms are what people stand for; culture is what they stand on," he declared. He defined war as a pursuit of truth, a strong conviction of right and wrong, a natural law of universal justice such as was the basis of the Nuremberg trials, and considerations of the rights of persons as persons rather than units of the state. He was introduced by Parry Whitaker.

Quick Action Urged To End School Strike

Council Of Parents And Teachers Make Plans To Settle School Differences

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 27. (AP)—The Saint Paul Council of Parents and Teachers today demanded emergency action by the city council to reopen the city's 77 grade and high schools which have been closed since Monday as the result of a teachers' strike for higher wages.

Governor Edward Thye already had summoned the Minnesota legislative delegation from Ramsey county—which embraces Saint Paul—to meet with an eight-member strikers' committee today.

The Parent-Teacher Council recommended concrete forms of action to end the strike of some 1,000 teachers. It proposed two measures which would permit the payment of higher teacher salaries.

One suggestion is for immediate court action to have federal and state aid monies excluded from the \$30 per capita limitation placed on yearly municipal expenditures by the city charter. Also proposed is the marking up of federal census figures which would automatically permit an additional \$1,500,000 yearly outlay within the \$30 limit. The group estimated that by bringing census figures up to date the city would show a population gain of about 50,000 since the 1940 federal census.

In Minneapolis, meanwhile, classes are being held today while teachers ponder over a settlement offer. The offer provides a boost of \$1500 annually to a top teachers' salary of \$1800 as against the present \$300 top.

In Saint Paul, the strikers are asking a salary range of between \$2,400 and \$5,000 a year, to replace the present range from \$1,500 to \$2,800 annually.

Rev. James Clark Died Monday A. M.

Rev. James S. Clark died at a nursing home in Orlando at 11 o'clock Monday morning after a lingering illness.

Born in West Virginia Oct. 30, 1859, Rev. Clark was a lawyer on a young man. About 1895, he moved to Alaska to settle an estate, and was ordained as a Presbyterian minister. He served as a missionary in Alaska for 20 years.

Due to ill health, Rev. Clark came to Sanford in 1919 and purchased the Gen. Finnegan estate. He remained until about 18 months ago.

Mr. Clark, after coming to Sanford, conducted services at the mission churches in Weirsdale, Sorrento, Lake Mary and Upland, and for a time conducted a Sunday school in his own home.

He is survived by one grandson: Clark Poston of Orlando. Funeral services will be conducted at the Erickson Funeral Home Friday at 3:30 P. M. Dr. E. D. Bruenkle officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery. Pallbearers include E. J. Frazier, V. M. Green, R. A. King, R. A. Cobb, Geo. Touhy, and R. W. Deane.

Work of the local chapter of the American Red Cross in assisting veterans and their families during the war was highly commended by members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at their meeting Tuesday evening. It was voted to assist the Red Cross in its coming campaign for funds, according to Adjutant John Sauls.

By way of assistance to the Salvation Army, it was requested that members each donate 75 cents or more worth of canned goods which will entitle them to admission at the next meeting.

Seven new members were admitted by the Post: Pat Johnson, Willis Peacock, D. M. Franklin, Raymond Kader, Robert Karne, Louis Rowland and Raymond Hall. Plans for a dance to be held by the post were discussed. The post voted to elect a junior vice commander and a chaplain at the next meeting. Brailley Odham is commander.

Mine Shutdown Seen As Affecting Many Other Industries, Closing Schools

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 27. (AP)—The nation is feeling severe shock today from the soft coal mine strike, the second within a year.

Unemployment in related industries already totals about 70,000, and there are indications that as many as 250,000 workers may be idled by the week's end.

Everywhere the mine shutdown is affecting normal routines. Schools and 21 states are under federal brownout orders, more drastic than anything in wartime. Seventy thousand steel, railroad, and river workers have been idled for lack of work. Sixty thousand residents of Provo, Utah, are pleading for coal to warm their homes. And 21 states are under federal brownout orders, more drastic than anything in wartime.

These hardships are as nothing in the event of a prolonged strike. Chairman Irving Ojls of the board of United States Steel foresees an early shutdown of his company's plants, which already have gone into curtailed operation. Ojls says that coal stocks today are almost non-existent.

In Atlanta, Ga., the manager of the Chamber of Commerce estimates that 40,000 persons will be idled within a week of the strike's continuance.

The U. S. State Industrial Association predicts that 100,000 workers in its steel fabricating plants in Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio will be thrown out of work within a week. And in a month, the Association says, all of its member employs will be idled.

Job layoffs are taking place in increasing numbers daily. At Toledo, Ohio, 27,000 industrial workers were idled today. About 1,500 persons also got suspension notices from the Norfolk and Western Railroad. More than 1,500 other Virginia highway employees received similar notice. Ten thousand Youngstown, Ohio, Sheet and Tube Company workers are scheduled for layoff this afternoon. Another 1,600 steelworkers will be given similar word at Birmingham, Ala.

In Colorado, the state coal consultant, Thomas Allen, is mapping plans to reduce the fuel situation. He is working to reopen abandoned Colorado mines to provide essential fuel by all means possible.

Schools and colleges in Colorado have announced unscheduled vacations, and Utah and Michigan schools are shutting soon because of coal shortages. Communities in the state of Washington also have closed school buildings. A similar situation is approaching in Pennsylvania. Many Pennsylvania schools will lock their doors for Thanksgiving today, and they will remain closed until the miners' walkout is ended by next week.

Nearly 3,000 Acres Planted In Celery

Plantings on celery in Central Florida are now nearing the 3,000 acre mark. On Nov. 16, according to the Florida Vegetable Committee, acreage for the area was 2,736, which included the Sanford-Oviedo, Lake Hart, Zell wood and Oklawaha plantings. Of this acreage, 1,577 is planted to golden variety and 1,159 to Pascal.

Next in line are the Lake Oklawaha area plantings, which total 2,212 of which 1978 are golden and 234 are Pascal. Sarasota is third with 549 acres of which 230 acres is golden and 319 are Pascal.

Total Florida plantings are 3,785 acres in golden and 1,711 acres in Pascal, a full total of 5,496 acres.

The plans call for new fixtures throughout by the Grand Rapids Store Equipment Co., an all glass front and an air-conditioned system.

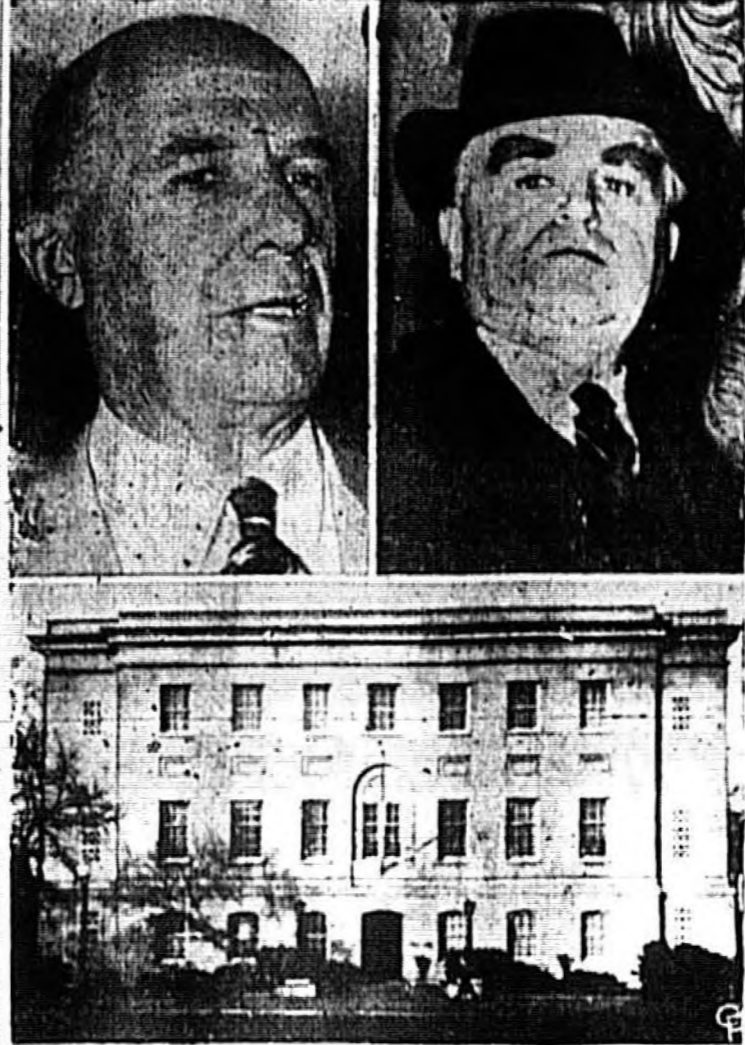

Goldsborough Tells Lewis Miners Made Grave Mistake In Leaving The Pits

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (AP)—The federal judge hearing the contempt charge against John L. Lewis today attacked the main point in the labor leader's defense. Judge T. Alan Goldsborough declared that whether or not the Norris-LaGuardia Act applies in the soft coal case, Lewis and his United Mine Workers will be guilty of contempt if it is proven legally that they disobeyed his restraining order.

No one, declared the jurist, can disobey such an order. If that could be done, he added, the contempt charge would be null and void. Lewis made no attempt to show that he tried to comply with the judge's restraining order. Instead they have based their arguments on contentions that under the Norris-LaGuardia Act the government cannot use the injunction as a weapon in a labor dispute.

Earlier, Goldsborough had said the miners made a great mistake in walking out before the court could rule on their contract dispute with the government.

Lewis' attorney, told the court that they had advised the union that he was within his rights in disobeying the restraining order. The attorney drew a laugh from the courtroom when he remarked that the miners are full of people who took the doctor's advice.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (AP)—The first day of the contempt trial of John L. Lewis was marked by a scolding by the 400,000 striking United Mine Workers from the judge who is hearing the case.

Judge T. Alan Goldsborough told the soft coal miners that they had made a very grave mistake in walking out before the court.

USING WATER SOFTENERS TO SAVE LAUNDRY SOAPS

By Joyce Davis Extension Service Clothing Specialist
Applying water softeners to hard water saves soap, and the amount of softener to use depends on the hardness of the water. One way to check on the amount of softener to use is to apply softener until one-half teaspoonful of grated soap in the softened water will make as much suds as the same amount of soap in a pint of heated rain water. People who live in town or city have the hardness of the water determined by a water laboratory, where it will be measured in degrees or grains. Soft water runs from 0 to 3 degrees, moderately hard from 3 to 6, hard from 6 to 10 and very hard from 10 degrees up.

If you are using moderately hard water, the following suggestions will help! Washing Soda.—Dissolve 1 pound of washing soda (not baking soda) in a quart of hot water. Store in a bottle and label. Use 2 teaspoonfuls of this solution to 1 gallon of water, about the right amount for dishwashing. To 3 wash tub or washer holding 10 gallons of water add 2 cups (16 tablespoonfuls) of the prepared solution. Trisodium Phosphate.—Use one-half-teaspoonful of TSP to a gallon of water, or one-half-cup in a 10-gallon washer.

There is a possibility, too, that other pre-war luxury goods such as a double-breasted suit may again be found in men's shops.

Florida Students Hit Lax Study Training

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 27.—Florida's high school students and college freshmen and sophomores are hitting the part of their training to teach them to study actively and earnestly in the list of educational shortcomings. Reporting on a survey of 4,000 high school seniors and 1,000 college freshmen from nine Florida counties, the Citizens Committee on Education said that more than a third of the high school students and half of the college freshmen attributed their major difficulties to lack of ability to get the most from their books.

Ex-Marine Given 5 Years For Posing As Army Officer

BANGOR, Me., Nov. 27.—(AP)—An ex-Marine has come to the end of a long career of impersonating Army officers and riding around the country in Army automobiles.

Tuesday in federal court at Bangor, 21-year old Martin Mahar of Everett, Wash., was sentenced to five years in a federal prison. The former Marine had pleaded guilty to wearing an Army major's uniform, impersonating an officer and interfering with transportation of a stolen car. Mahar got two years on a charge of illegally wearing a uniform.

The federal district attorney's office explains that Mahar started his crime career with a sentence at the Danbury, Conn. penitentiary for impersonating an officer. He was released on parole after nine months and since then, officials say, he had quite a time for himself. According to the Bangor U. S. court, Mahar stole a Buick sedan from Bangor, Me. and headed for New York where he bought an Army medical officer's uniform. Next he appeared at Rock Island arsenal in Illinois.

The Ambassador's two daughters, both of whom—engaged five years—were married at Lucknow in the spring, were known as the "beautiful Baijpalis."

Although the saris, or scarf-like robes with which they draped themselves were as rich and handsome as their mother's, the two never wore any of the marks of caste on the foreheads of their native sisters. They don't really mean anything—just beauty marks, I've been told.

Madame Baijpal, accompanying her husband to a party here the other afternoon, was among a number of interesting guests.

Another was Princess Amina Tousson, a cousin of King Farouk of Egypt. She came to Washington several months ago, took a house in Georgetown, and her name has been romantically linked with several marriageable gentlemen in the social realm.

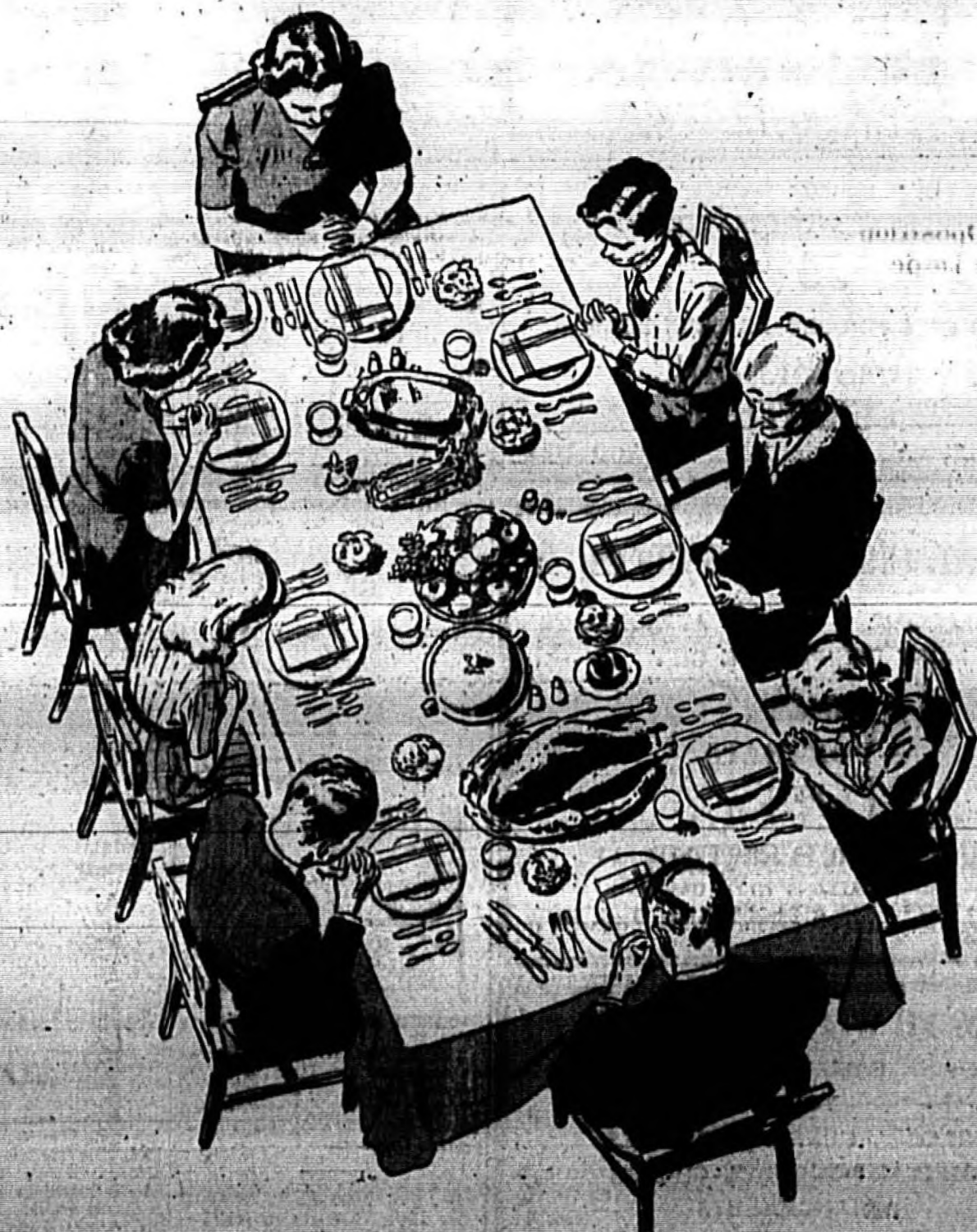

Army To Lose 11 World Series Men From Great Football Team

By FRANK ECK AP Newsfeatures Sports Editor PHILADELPHIA—If you have heard any rumors to the effect that Army is feeling sad about future football games with Notre Dame, forget them.

Of course, in October, Coach Earl Blaik was asked how he felt about losing Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard through graduation next June, and he replied "Please don't remind me."

Blaik also says Army will never be as strong as during the wartime season of 1944 and the fall of 1945. This year's team isn't a pushover but Blaik refuses to rate it with his other two recent vintage because it lacks experienced backfield depth.

However, off what Army did to a good Pennsylvania team and figures to do in the annual clash with Navy at Municipal Stadium Saturday, Nov. 30, the Cadets appear to be better than fair come 1947. They won't be the Terror of the Plains without Davis and Blanchard and the opposition will be even tougher than it was this season. But a rundown of what Blaik will have at West Point next year would warm the cockles of many a football man's heart. Let's take what he loses first. After D. Army loses four others who started against Penn—A. J. Tuckey, Harry Poole, Hal Tazewell and Jim Enos. He also loses U. F. Brown and Shelton Biles who didn't face Penn and reserves Tom Hayes, Jack Ray and Bill West. That's a total of 11.

Five who started and played great against Penn and who will be back for not only next season but also for 1948 are Guards Jerry Steffy and Art Gerometta, Tackle Eddie Bryant, End Hank Foldsberg and Back Elwyn Rowan. A pretty good nucleus, though not much in the backfield.

Another look shows that Bobby Stuart will return to the backfield in '47. A hernia operation sidelined him this year. They think he will be 21 other players who looked good, too.

One of the biggest standouts against Penn after B and D was reserve quarterback Bill Gustafson, a cousin of Army's Andy Gustafson, who coaches the backfield. Bill Gustafson carried six times against Pennsylvania, made 36 yards on the ground, intercepted two Penn passes and completed one out of four he threw. He personally accounted for two of Army's 12 first downs and looked great early in the third quarter when he hid the pigskin behind his high thigh and went 14 yards around right end.

Others who starred in the last half in the Franklin Field massacre were H. H. Livesay, a center with another season who really can tackle; Bobby Folsom, a 19-year-old back with two more seasons; End Jim Rawers, a six-time Ohioan with two more years and Plebes John Shelby of Altus, Okla., and Bill Yeomans of Glendale, Ariz.

Two others who will be very much in Army's grid machine next fall are Arnold Galiffa, a freshman passer from Donora, Pa., and W. W. Scott, Jr., of Winchester, Va., who has two more years in West Point's backfield.

Plenty Of Points Was Everett's Motto

EVERETT, Wash., (AP)—The subject of high scoring high school football games came up, and some of the graybeards from Everett's other days thumbed the records to show that this town probably holds the record for pouring it to the opposition.

Here are some of the old timers' Everett notes:

1927—defeated Benson of Portland, 66-0; 1930—defeated Eugene, Ore., 75-7; 1929—defeated Dallas, Ore., 90-7; 1945—defeated Franklin of Portland, 121-0; 1919—defeated Lincoln of Portland, 125-0; and 1913—defeated Bellingham, Wash., 174-0.

Caldwell, 41, Won 13 in Relief Role

The White Sox hurler, who was third in the percentage column of American League twirlers, faced Williams eight times. He whiffed him twice and on five other occasions Ted went out on what Caldwell calls "sucker balls." Williams got just one base hit.

Caldwell, who in the off-season is plant foreman of a Harlingen citrus co-operative, was the first to sign a contract to return to the Sox next season. He doesn't particularly like the relief pitching job but says "it suits the manager."

Caldwell, who has been twirling in professional baseball for 22 years, feels he still has plenty of stuff.
