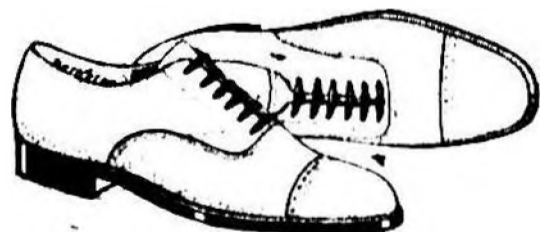

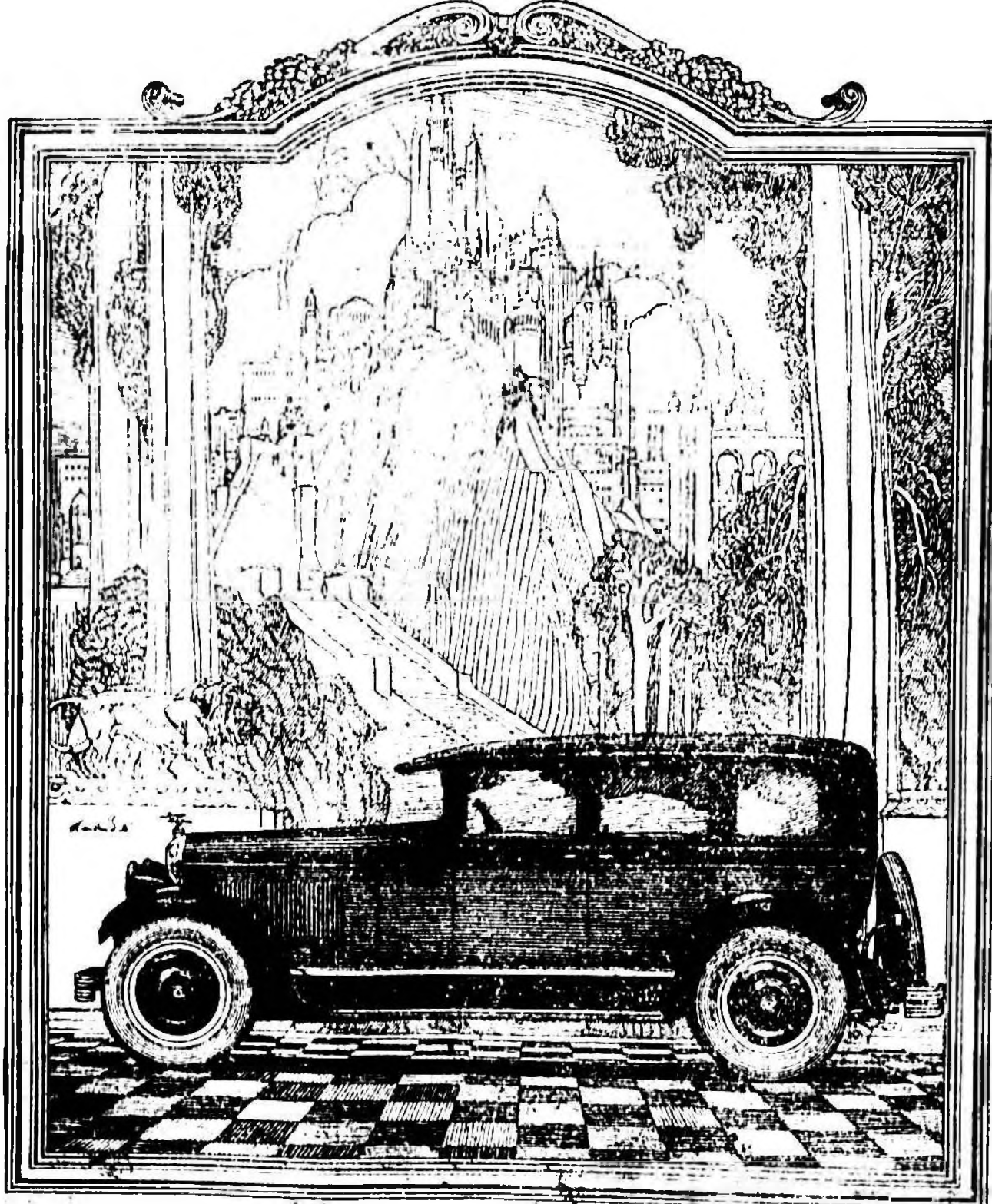

Such people can visualize money. They know what a dollar means. But when it comes to the intangible values, the unmeasured values, they cannot grasp the problem at all.

Suppose, then, to such people, The Herald presents a picture like this: Some day there will be a long spell of dry weather in Florida. Some day Lake Monroe will reach a low water stage.

The Herald would even feel safe in asserting that one epidemic caused by the pollution of Lake Monroe would cost the taxpayers of Sanford more than would the building of twenty sewers.

Believing it can serve the people of Sanford in no better cause than in publicity that might lead to an improvement in the city's sewage disposal method, this newspaper intends to ask again and again for favorable action on the matter on the part of Sanford's city commissioners.

All Florida, As Well As Miami, "Went Crazy"

Under the caption, "Treat The People Right," The Miami Tribune takes a swing at Miami hotel and restaurant proprietors who take unfair advantage of patrons.

The editorial would be applicable to any kind of business run on a plan of unfair treatment of customers. But The Tribune speaks particularly of hotels that advertise minimum rates and makes a practice of having accommodations at such rates all "taken" when travelers apply for them.

The Tribune also tells of a restaurant keeper in a western town who was hauled into police court for serving the same piece of tough steak over and over again to hurried travelers coming to his place between trains.

Miami, it is said, is trying to provide protection for visitors against the gouging hotels and eating places. Uniform prices for uniform accommodations are sought, and fair prices for food are urged, quite as much for the good of Miami as for the comfort of strangers in its gates.

Last summer and fall and winter, Florida went sort of crazy in the matter of over-charging. The whole state seemed to be obsessed with the idea of making a hundred percent profit on everything it did.

Here in Sanford there was less of this craziness than in any other town of which we have knowledge. But even this sensible town has people who went after a hundred percent profit, and who still are asking prices that are unreasonable and unfair.

Miami is working out a plan to bring prices back to normalcy, and then, Miami-like, it will capitalize those lowered prices to such an extent that the people who have cooperated in price-lowering will literally "clean up" through the increase of their aggregate business.

And Miami, let us in all honesty agree, is by no means the only town in Florida that needs a campaign with a "live and let live" slogan. It should be carried on with the zeal of a state-wide drive.

"Florida In Overalls" Has A Great Future

Under the caption, "Florida Wears Overalls," The Dearborn Independent, Henry Ford's magazine, publishes a short editorial that has already been read by many thousands of people in other states.

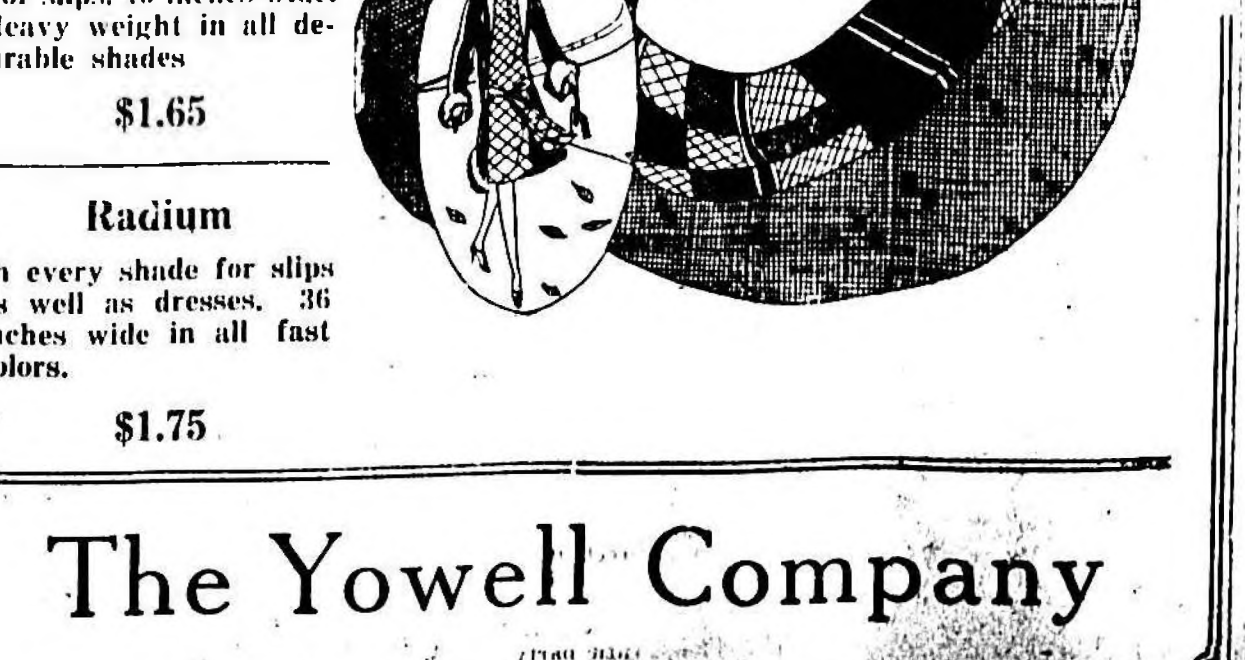

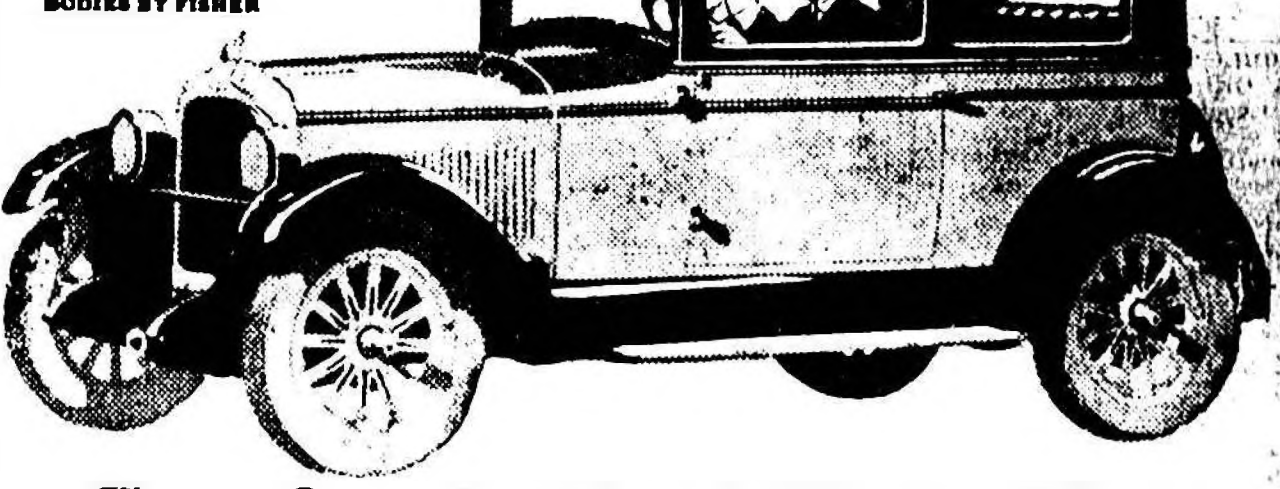

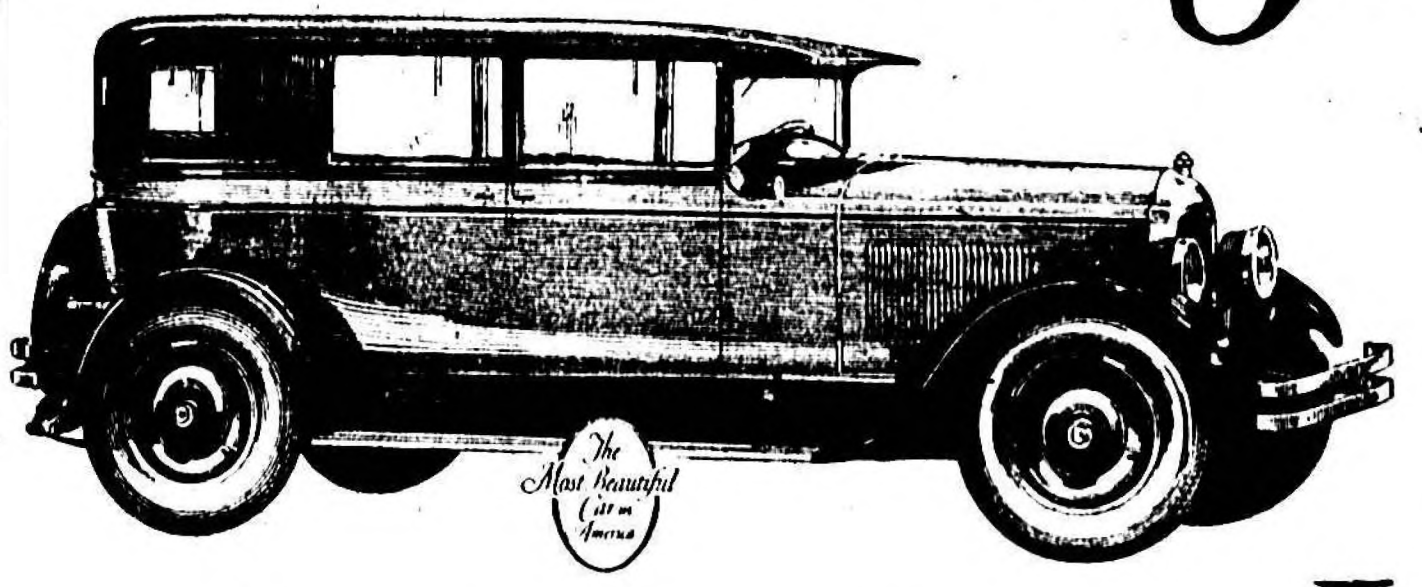
