U. S. TROOPS CROSS LINE AFTER VILLA

FOUR THOUSAND MEN TOOK UP CHASE AFTER BANDIT YESTERDAY

San Antonio, Texas, Mar. 16.—United States troops went into Mexico today in pursuit of Francisco Villa, whose raid on Columbus, N. M., a week ago caused President Wilson to determine to run him down. More than 4,000 soldiers, headed by Brigadier General John J. Pershing, who is in command of the punitive expedition, crossed near here, while a smaller force under Colonel George D. Dodd, entered Mexico some distance from Columbus.

General Pershing and his command entered the international boundary line about noon, according to advices received by General Funston. How far into Mexico the Colonel had penetrated was not known nor did General Funston seem to know. Col. Dodd's column is moving in a southerly direction and the two columns should be within touch of each other before the end of the week. By that time it is expected an infantry support will hold the lines of communication, along which motor trucks for the transportation of ammunition and supplies will be operated.

Although the censorship imposed by General Funston was relaxed tonight efforts still were made to keep secret the details of the plan of campaign, the exact number of men engaged and their actual locations. Pershing's report of his entrance into Mexico served to dispel to a great extent fears that had been entertained in some quarters that resistance would be offered by troops of the de facto Government.

Colonel Bertani, the commanding officer of the Carranza garrison at Palomas, on the south side of the dividing line, promptly joined General Pershing. This force was only some 100 men, but they were reported to have displayed willingness and even eagerness to join in the chase. As a body of Mexican troops will remain under their own command, but a number of them are being employed as scouts by General Pershing.

General Pershing has gone into Mexico with orders to overtake and wipe out Villa and his organization. Unless orders to the contrary are received from those higher in authority than General Funston, the campaign that was begun today will continue until Villa is captured or killed. This, it was said at General Funston's headquarters tonight is the idea General Pershing carried with him across the line. No limits have been placed on the field operations. After the campaign is well under way, it was pointed out circumstances may cause restrictions, but just now the troops are prepared to go anywhere to carry out the President's orders.

A STANDARD ARMY

Plan to Authorize President to Recruit Men

Washington, D. C., March 16.—A joint resolution authorizing the President to bring the Army up to full strength by adding 19,447 men to existing organizations was passed in the house late Wednesday without objection or debate and with but one dissenting vote.

Representative Hay, chairman of the military committee asked for immediate consideration of the resolution, saying the step was necessary on account of the demands on the border for additional protection during the march of the punitive expedition in Mexico. There was no opposition and the resolution was passed in five minutes. On the viva voce vote no hay was heard. Majority Leader Mann delivered a rising vote, which resulted 236 to 1. Representative London, Socialist, of New York voting in the negative. Representative Hay told the house that he recommended this plan rather than a call for the militia or volunteers.

The President wanted to allay any suspicion, he said, that the United States wanted to accomplish anything by the Mexican expedition except pursuit of Villa. The resolution will be called up in the senate today.

Republicans and Democrats worked in perfect harmony for adoption of the resolution despite the fact that their leaders on the military committee disagreed as to the exact meaning of it.

Park avenue north to First street, First street from Park to Sanford, Sanford south to Fifth street, Fifth street west to Magnolia, Magnolia north to Park avenue, line up on First street at Carma Hotel where prizes will be awarded.

Progress in Southeast

Columbus, Ga., March 15.—The Industrial Index says in its issue for this week:

"Alabama has broken all February records for the production of pig iron. Construction details have been completed for the establishment at Savannah, Ga., of a sugar refinery with a daily capacity of 5,000 barrels by a company with capital stock of \$3,500,000. A company is being incorporated in Savannah to build an extensive system of bonded warehouses and compresses. Another cotton mill at Columbus, Ga., will build an addition, the cost to be approximately \$275,000. Plans are being prepared for a \$1,000,000 estate at Palm Beach, Fla. Real estate transactions in a few days in Miami, Fla., amounted to nearly \$1,000,000, many lots having been purchased as sites for fine winter homes. An 8-story office building is to be erected at Miami.

"Contracts are being awarded in Chattanooga, Tenn., for the establishment of a steel plant for a company with capital stock of \$2,000,000. Contracts are being awarded in Chattanooga also for the erection of a 12-story office building to cost \$400,000 or more.

"Pinellas county, Florida, has sold \$715,000 of road bonds and will proceed immediately with the construction of 73 miles of brick paved highway for which a contract has been awarded.

"There is more activity in railway construction work and more railway extensions are being planned in the southeast than in a long time before. There is a large and constantly increasing volume of construction work and week after week more manufacturing plants are being established.

"These are some of the things that mark the rising tide of prosperity in the southeast.

LABOR STAMPS

Big Eight Hour Day Campaign is Being Carried On

Organized Labor, operating through the Labor Center Association in New York City is sending to Labor Unions throughout the country over 5,000,000 stamps, each meant to carry a special publicity message.

The stamps are to be affixed to letters after the manner of Red Cross stamps and stamps advertising national expositions. Each stamp carries the slogan, "For the Eight-Hour Day—A Movement Nearer to Justice." A portion of the stamp's design shows a day split into eight-hour periods, one for work, one for sleep and one for recreation.

It is the plan to distribute the stamps to all friends of the eight-hour movement, whether employers, union members or sympathizers. Besides sending them out on letters, union members receiving them are asked to paste them on mirrors in the shops, on literature distributed to workmen and on bills and letters that go directly to business men.

The idea of using the eight-hour stamps in a nation-wide publicity campaign was worked out after the Industrial Relations Commission had developed the fact that the Rockefeller interests were paying Ivy Lee \$10,000 per year to act as the Rockefeller press agent. It was suggested that Organized Labor had concentrated its energies so completely on wage fights that it had neglected educational opportunities such as organized capital employed with great skill.

A stamp by the use of which every union member could constitute himself "an Ivy Lee of the Labor cause" was the result.

Children will be asked to paste the stamps on their lesson papers with this note to their school teachers: "Teacher, teach us these truths."

Members of church congregations will be asked to send a stamp to their priest or preacher suggesting a sermon "Nearer to Justice—the Eight Hour Day."

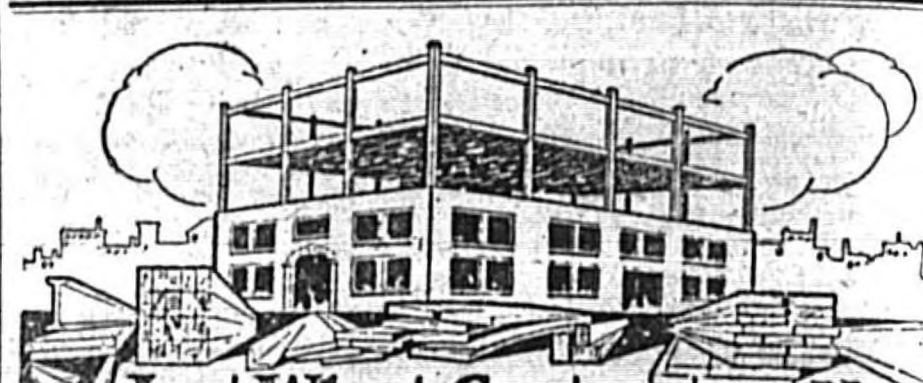

CONGRESS IS WITH WILSON

Washington, March 21. Evidence of co-operation between President Wilson and congress which may lead to an early adjournment at the capital is seen in the administrative action of the senate and house in advancing preparation legislation and practically removing the European and Mexican questions from the field of debate. Although some congressional leaders still believe in session until fall, for administration officials predicted today that adjournment would come late in June or early in July.

A great legislative program still awaits action. It includes the army and navy bills, a tariff commission bill, the Philippine bill, rural credit legislation, several financial and appropriation bills, shipping legislation, revenue measures and the immigration bill.

The President is desirous that congress act on important questions pending before the political conventions are called in June. Work on the Democratic platform has been begun on the assumption that this can be accomplished.

The house will pass the Hay Army reorganization bill by Thursday at the latest. In the discussion of this measure there has been evidenced more solidarity among Democrats than has been evidenced at any time since the session began. In fact the general support which has rallied around national defense legislation has been a surprise to the administration leaders who had expected to encounter bitter antagonism. There is no doubt, however, that there are difficulties ahead for the army bill on account of the wide divergence between the senate and house bills. Senator Chamberlain plans to call up the senate measure tomorrow and to move that it replace the public lands water power bill as unfinished business. Whether this will succeed is doubtful because there are several senators who believe that the senate should wait until the house bill has been passed and that it should be used as the vehicle for the preparedness debate in the senate bill. There will be no long delay, however, as the house measure will reach the senate later in the week.

airmen on Metz and other German towns, the sinking of a French torpedo boat destroyer by a submarine in the Adriatic and the reported torpedoing of an Austrian hospital ship by an Entente water boat as recorded in official and unofficial communications.

Berlin chronicles an attack of great violence by the Russians around Driswaty Lake and Lake Narocz, but says the Russians were repulsed with great losses, 9,270 Russian dead having been counted in the Lake Narocz region.

Saturday the Germans in the Vaux-Damloup sector, northeast of Verdun, began another spirited attack against the French, but the French, bringing their curtain of fire into play drove the Teutons back. The attack was not pushed again during Sunday and only intermittent bombardments took place.

Berlin reports the capture of some ground from the British northeast of Vermeles in the direction of La Bassée and the driving of the French from a position northeast of Baden-Villiers in the Vosges. London admits the capture by the Germans of three mine craters at the Hohen-zollern redoubt.

The French guns have been busy bombarding German troops in Champagne and German positions northeast of St. Mihiel.

French aircraft dropped bombs on Metz, munition depots near Ville Darsers and positions elsewhere, while other aeroplanes bombed the aerodrome at Harvestel and Muelhuzen. In aerial engagements a German airship attacked the Entente allied fleet south of Baden Laki and the French brought down three of their ships.

The French torpedo boat destroyer Renaudin was sunk when a submarine sent the vessel to the bottom in the Adriatic.

The Germans deny the responsibility for the sinking of the Dutch steamer Tulantia.

London, March 20.—With the slackening of the fighting around Verdun the Russians have started a big offensive movement against the Germans on the eastern front. A raid by German aeroplanes on the east coast of England and by French

FEARS FELT FOR SAFETY OF OUR MEN

MEXICAN PROMISES TO HOLD VILLA ARE BROKEN

El Paso, Tex., Mar. 21.— The forces of Colonel Carranza were engaged in battle at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon, with bandits led by Villa in Namiquipa, according to a dispatch received this afternoon by General Gavira, Carranza commandant at Juarez. The result of the fighting was not decided at the time of the receipt of the dispatch. Namiquipa is in the district of Guerrero, State of Chihuahua.

Colonel Cano is in command of a force of 900 cavalry which came in contact two days ago at El Valle, with Villa forces which on this occasion fled without giving battle.

Despite the reports that Cano's forces had engaged those of Villa at Namiquipa persons were informed express the opinion that the Carranza forces had failed to hold up their end of the net by which it was proposed to capture the bandit chieftain. There were confirmatory reports received today of the news received for the last week that the Mexican troops not only were failing to cooperate with the American troops, but in certain instances were interfering with them.

Washington, Mar. 21.— The defective Government of Mexico today proposed to the United States the drafting of a protocol under which American and Mexican troops cooperate in running to earth Francisco Villa and his bandits, without danger of misunderstanding or conflict. The terms of such a formal convention would be designed to meet all questions which may arise in the future setting forth the rights of the American expeditionary forces now in pursuit of the bandit chieftain, and the nature of the cooperation expected from the chief of the Carranza Government become known today at the conclusion of a conference between Eliseo Arredondo, Mexican Ambassador designate and Acting Secretary Park of the state department. Negotiations on the details will be in progress several days, but the two Governments are in agreement on the general principles involved.

San Antonio, Texas, March 21.— Francisco Villa may be forced into a fight with the American troops within the next thirty-six hours if reports coming to General Funston's headquarters, both from General Pershing and from Mexican sources are correct. Advice from General Pershing today said that Villa had been reported defeated by Mexican Government troops near Cruces and that he was marching northward in retreat.

General Pershing's report was followed, however, by the unofficial report that Villa still was fighting at Namiquipa, south of Cruces.
