

## Fired JDC Aide Threatened; Will Appeal Ouster

A 34-year-old shift supervisor at the Seminole Juvenile Detention Center who was fired Friday said this morning she'll appeal that decision.

Her comments came in the wake of an announcement telephone threat she said she received sometime over the weekend.

"It was just a male voice," said Miss Virginia Miller of the Alford Blvd. Sanford said the threatening telephone call she received this weekend. She said she could not determine the age of the caller.

"Why did you let these boys get back-up? We ought to burn you out," she quoted the caller as saying this morning. Miss Miller is planning to contact police about the call, she said.

Miss Miller was fired on an announced child care worker reassignment Friday following a Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS) probe of an alleged beating of five male juvenile inmates at the local center Feb. 28.

Both the child care worker and Miss Miller had been asked to resign by HRS officials following the probe. However, Miss Miller refused to comply with the HRS demand. She was fired Friday, according to John Hoag, HRS public information officer.

"We'll go through the appeal process," Miss Miller's attorney James Perry, Sanford, said today.

The appeal will probably be made to the state's Career Service Commission, according to Perry. The five-member commission hears all appeals of firings of state employees, according to Hoag.

"The decision they make is usually considered final and binding by both parties," said Hoag. "I know the state has referred their rulings to district court, but I don't think an employee has."

Miss Miller's case may go to court, according to Perry. "It depends on how the administrative hearing comes out," Perry said of a court appeal. "It certainly will be considered."

## Altamonte Sinkhole Expanding, Possible Evacuations Warned

Altamonte Springs emergency personnel were standing by today at the site of a sinkhole in the area that began developing in the Palm Springs Apartments parking lot area shortly after noon Saturday.

The apartment complex is on Palm Springs Road, near SR 68 and the Alakamonte Mall.

"If the sinkhole expands five more feet toward one of the buildings, we will order that building evacuated," said Police Lt. Steve Garver today, noting that the sinkhole currently is within 50 feet of one of the buildings.

Garver said city utility department crews are watching particularly a water main which currently is 20 inches to two feet from the hole.

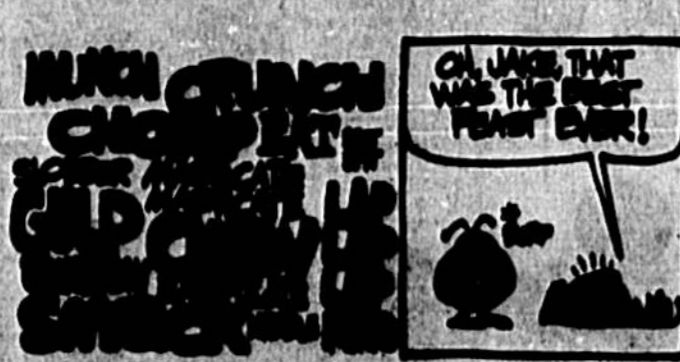

## Wallenda Nephew Stirring Feud

CONCORD, Calif. (UPI) — The claim by Steve Wallenda, a "black sheep" of the Great Wallenda, that he is the only family member left on the high wire is stirring a family feud.

Steve, 55, laid claim to the family legacy Sunday, even as his great-nephew, Karl Wallenda, 75, patriarch of the high-wire-walking family, lay in state at a sports arena in Sarasota, Fla.

The senior Wallenda died last Wednesday in a 10-foot fall from a cable stretched between two towers in Puerto Rico. Funeral services were to be held today in Florida.

"I'm the only actual Wallenda left on the wire," Steve said. "The others are only names. Uncle Karl was it, after that myself. Also, I'm late special state the Uncle Karl was — creating the legend."

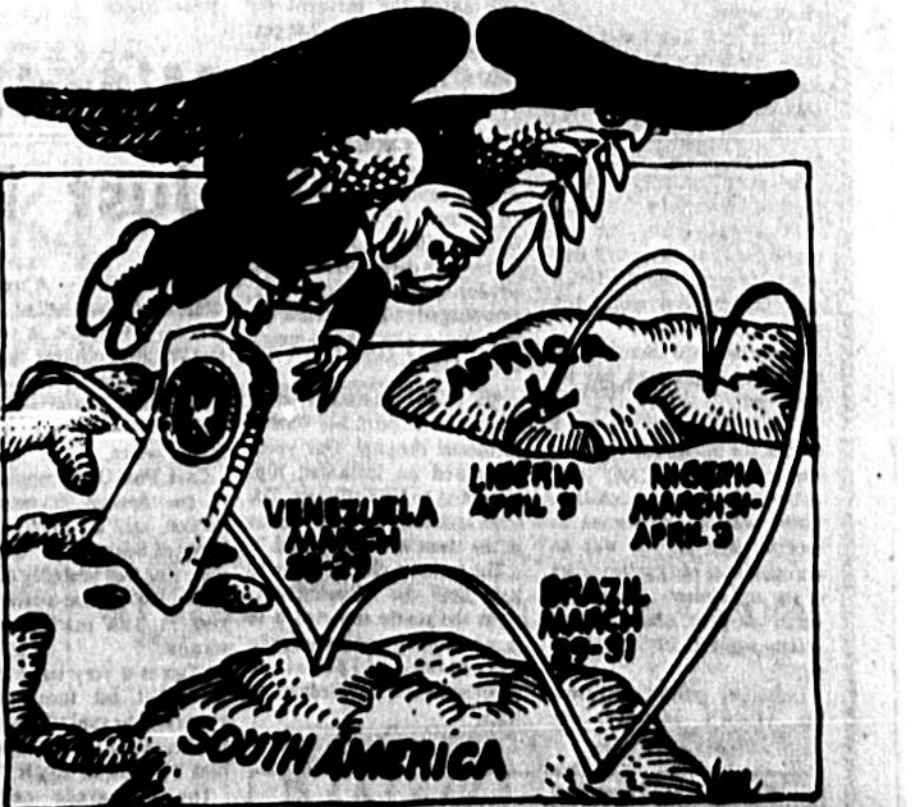
"He has never at any time worked with the Wallendas and, his great-grandfather was there in Florida, Calif."

Three complaints from Steve Wallenda, a circus-walking group, will proceed during the proceedings at the Wallenda family funeral, where Wallenda lay in state Sunday. Other members of the group will form an honor guard.

"The service will be primarily religious in nature," said the Rev. Luther Wilber, a retired Lutheran minister. "It was a deeply religious man. He always said when he was on the high wire that the Lord would lead him."

## U.S. Dollar Hits New Low On Foreign Exchange Market

**TOKYO (UPI)** — The U.S. dollar dropped to another new low in extremely heavy trading on the Tokyo foreign exchange market today, prompting Prime Minister Takeo Fukuda's government to take drastic steps to defend the falling currency.

The dollar ended morning trading at 252.16 yen, down sharply from the previous record low of 250.90 Friday.

More than one million were traded on the market and the Bank of Japan purchased about 500 million dollars said.

During the week of 27, the dollar slid further, hovering five cents by minute.

The dollar's new low represents a 28.3 per cent depreciation from the Smithsonian rate of 238.00 established in December 1971.

The dealers said the dollar's slump was triggered by heavy selling by foreign and Japanese banks to the credit of their clients and by trading firms and manufacturers who are concerned their profits might be eroded as the currency would decline in coming months.

## Radicals Raid Tokyo Airport

**TOKYO (UPI)** — Firebombs throwing radicals Sunday set off the control tower of Tokyo's new international airport in a pitched battle with police and smashed sensitive equipment in an attempt to halt the opening of the \$600 million facility.

A half-dozen, red-banded guerrillas evaded 15,000 riot police to enter the tower at Narita airport. They gutted the communications room with firebombs and smashed radar, flight control and lighting equipment with steel pipes and hammers.

Police and demonstrators fought with clubs and firebombs outside the control tower. Thirty-four policemen and 25 demonstrators were injured.

## Kidnappers Release Espion

**PARIS (UPI)** — The kidnapping of Baron Edward-Jean Espion, one of Europe's wealthiest men, released the industrialist Sunday night without harming him and without collecting the \$5 million ransom.

Espion was freed in a chain and a hand tied part of his little finger chopped off by his abductors before his liberation Easter Sunday, police said.

## JDC Firing

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — The Justice Department today announced the firing of Robert J. Dalton, a 40-year-old man, from the position of director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The firing was announced by Attorney General John N. Mitchell today.

Mr. Dalton had been in the position since 1974. He was fired after a long illness.

## Miami Drug Bust: 'Just Beginning'

**MIAAMI (UPI)** — A weekend drug bust that netted more than \$1 million in cocaine and \$200,000 in cash was "just the beginning" of a major police effort to wipe out the city's drug traffic, Miami police said today.

The bust, which was the largest ever in Miami's history, was the result of a long-term investigation by the Miami Police Department's Drug Squad.

The squad, which was formed in 1974, has been working to break up the city's drug traffic ever since.

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# Sanford Woman Picked Up, Assaulted

A 31-year-old Sanford woman was picked up in a van and assaulted in Sanford after being stopped by a half-dozen men, the woman told Sanford police Sunday.

The woman said she was walking alone on a street in Sanford when a man in a car pulled up to her. The man grabbed the woman and took her to a nearby vacant lot, threatened her with a knife and assaulted her, she told police.

### Navy Gets Pentagon Crumbs

There are increases in the administration's new defense budget which are supposed to take up the slack in our ability to wage conventional warfare.

The focus is on the defense of Europe, and there is no quarreling with the point that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization must overcome the disparity that has developed between NATO forces and those of the Warsaw Pact.

But the budget, and Defense Secretary Harold Brown's statements supporting it, also disclose a de-emphasis on the role of the U.S. Navy in different versions of a European war.

This budget explains why the administration wants to cut the Navy shipbuilding program for the coming year by about \$1 billion.

Eight missile frigates, an attack submarine and three ocean surveillance ships are the extent of new shipbuilding included in the budget.

They would contribute to what Mr. Brown sees as the primary mission of the Navy in a European war—protecting Atlantic sea lanes for the supply and reinforcement of NATO forces and sea units that would have the primary role of preventing an attack from Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union.

If NATO strategists have concluded there is only a secondary role for carrier-based strike forces in defending Europe, we wouldn't presume to challenge that decision.

What we would challenge, however, is whether NATO requirements for the Navy are in line with the size and shape of an American Navy with responsibilities that literally encircle the globe.

Congress deferred funding of any new attack carriers last year in the face of a dispute over whether resources should be put into a single new Nimitz-class nuclear carrier or into smaller carriers.

Plans also have been omitted from the new budget, says Mr. Brown, because a study of the large vs. small carrier issue isn't completed.

Further, there is no funding for carrier escorts and the Argos missile system designed to protect a carrier task force.

Moreover, the Navy was forced to cut back its request for F-14 fighter planes against that same priority.

Mr. Brown's lectures about the high cost of ships, and cost overruns in shipyards, lead us to believe he would be quite pleased to see a defense analysis concluding that the Navy can get along with diminished carrier forces, not just in the European theater but elsewhere.

This would make it unnecessary to confront Congress with an upward revision of the defense budget later this year.

Our fear is that the wish will be the father of the policy—that the necessity of funding strategic weapons programs and a NATO buildup will somehow be found to justify the downgrading of the Navy's global mission.

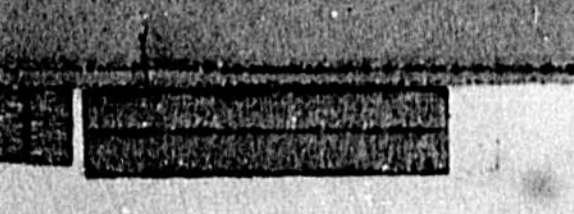
Naval restrictions have warned that the Soviet Union's new navy is designed to make any attempt at an instrument of Soviet foreign policy. The arrival of Russian warships off the coast of Angola during the Soviet-Cuban intervention there in 1975 confirmed that view.

The current Soviet thrust into the horn of Africa — the bay, says President Carter will be addressed by the Navy's new fleet — is clearly part of Moscow's intention to enhance its power for naval operations in the Indian Ocean and the Mediterranean, including the sea routes for shipment of the West's oil supply from the Persian Gulf.

The opening last year of a Soviet naval shipyard on the Russian coast indicates the intention to build a fleet in kind. These Navy plans are a clear warning that the Soviet Navy is beginning to be a serious naval power.

Moreover, with the Russians are beginning to demonstrate their ability to project military power across vast oceanic distances, the Americans are debating whether their own formidable carrier forces represent a concept that is obsolete, too expensive or too vulnerable for the future. The Congress can't work on Mr. Brown's defense budget, if it should have the map of Europe to these continents and sea where naval power may well determine the course of history.

### ANGLE-WALTERS Tax Cuts May Be Short-Lived



WASHINGTON—(HWA)—President Carter is not the only one preparing a hefty tax reduction in this election year. A good many of the nation's governors are climbing on the bandwagon as well.

In California, New York, Maryland, Wisconsin, Minnesota and at least a half dozen other states, chief executives are circling proposals to reduce state taxes or relieve pressure on local property taxes.

What all these governors have in common is a desire to see reductions in November and a conviction that the way to a voter's heart is through his wallet.

But a fiscal survey compiled for the National Governors' Association indicates that tax cuts, while not doubt politically appealing, may not be good economics for many states.

Although most states have boosted bank deposits over the past year or so from the national average, the survey says they have demands for increased spending to meet deferred needs.

During the current fiscal year, according to the survey for the governors' association, expenditures for all states will increase by 11 percent while revenues will grow by only 9 percent.

At the same time, states are finding themselves with the bill for some federal programs that Washington instituted but no longer wishes to pay for—a trend forecast by California Gov. Jerry Brown, for one. And both the cost deficit and a general weakening of the economy this year could slash state budgets.

In California, the state's fiscal deficit could prove to be short-lived.

## Inflation Grows, As Food Prices Lead New Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Swelling food costs boosted the rate of living by 0.8 percent in February, the government said today, continuing that inflation is continuing at a steady pace.

The February increase — which comes to 7.3 percent when figured on an annual rate — was not as high as January's 0.9 percent rise but still higher than any other month since last May, according to the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index.

Food, particularly meat and beverages, was the main culprit in February, rising 1.2 percent in cost, the same advance as the previous month, the department said.

Medical care and transportation costs also posted increases. The department said grocery costs increased 1.3 percent, restaurant prices went up 1.0 percent and alcoholic beverages advanced 0.1 percent.

Beef prices shot up 4.1 percent, compared with increases of about 2 percent in each of the three preceding months, the department said.

Port and poultry prices also showed large increases in February, 2.6 percent and 1.0 percent, respectively.

In a companion report, the department said real earnings for the nation's workers fell 0.2 percent from January's monthly adjusted level.

President Carter has been said to have received reports from several of his top advisers, notably Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal, to demonstrate that the administration is serious about limiting inflation.

Carter announced in January a mild anti-inflation program to try to persuade business and labor to moderate wage and price demands. That effort has been stalled, however, as Carter spent considerable time on other issues such as the coal strike and the Middle East.

Meanwhile, Carter forces have done little to combat excessive new programs like the farm bill on Capitol Hill.

The Labor Department said medical care rose almost as fast as food costs.

In the medical sector, prices of commodities such as prescriptions and non-prescription drugs and supplies increased 0.8 percent last month, slightly more than in January.

### Panel's Aim: Streamline Juvenile Justice System

In an effort to streamline the juvenile justice system in Seminole County, a task force was formed Monday night to establish a system of arbitrators for first-time youth offenders.

The task force is made up of representatives of legal and social agencies.

Currently, juvenile offenders are subject to a lengthy court process. Norman Levin, assistant state attorney, said the group would work as follows: the arresting officer may recommend arbitration. The child and the child's parent or legal guardian must agree to the procedure within three days of notification that arbitration has been recommended.

Once arbitration is agreed to, a hearing before an arbitrator or panel of arbitrators will be set. That hearing must take place within seven days of the arbitrator receiving the complaint.

If a child or his legal guardian rejects the arbitration process, the case would be subject to the formal legal process now in use.

The arbitrator would function like a judge, according to Levin. He would be able to dismiss the case, delay it for further evidence or pass sentence. That sentence could include counseling, work program or restitution in property damage cases.

Requirements for arbitrators include holding a law degree, a degree in behavioral social work or "trained in conflict resolution techniques."

The arbitration process provides several advantages over the present system, according to Levin.

"Instead of taking six weeks to three months to handle a case," said Levin, "it will not take as long as it does now." Levin said that the program will not be required to testify in court. He said that the program will not be required to testify in court.
