## Take Your Family To Sunday School

Too many people send their children to Sunday school. Don't send your children - take them - then you will be there yourself. You need the Sunday school and the Sunday school needs you. Nobody stays too young for Sunday school very long and nobody ever gets too old. More than thirteen centuries ago a great Christian leader said that the Bible is "a stream where alike the elephant may swim and the lamb may wade." And just last year J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the F.B.I., writing on "Crime and the Sunday school," stated:

"It is quite impossible to believe that progress along the road to righteous living may be accomplished without the guidance of the Bible. It is the source of spiritual food, the solution of life's problems, and the inspiration for Christian living."

The modern Sunday school, with its teacher training courses and graded lessons, has much to offer to students of all ages from the Cradle Roll to the adult classes. Perhaps there is no other activity in which we can engage where the rewards are so great for so small investment, and so altogether desirable. Bible study educates both the intellect and the heart. Allusions to biblical characters, incidents, parables, and proverbs are so common in literature that often one cannot read a magazine article or newspaper editorial intelligently without biblical knowledge. Most men and women who have not attended Sunday school lack such knowledge. They are to be pitied.

In the Scriptures we learn both by precept and by historical confirmation that "Righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a reproach to any people." Moreover, the life of the community is enriched with its social activities under religious auspices, and its opportunities for developing leadership. And the Sunday school is more than a place to receive benefits; for those who are qualified, it is a rich opportunity for service. So, for what you can get from it and for what you can give to it - take your family to Sunday school.

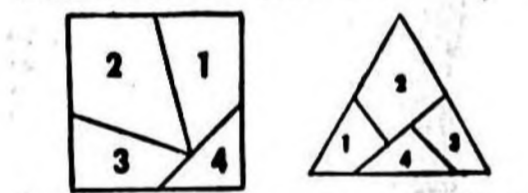

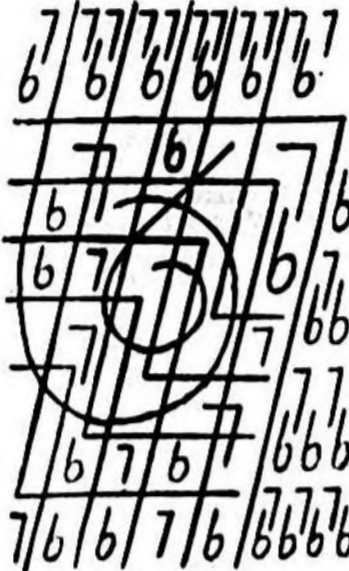

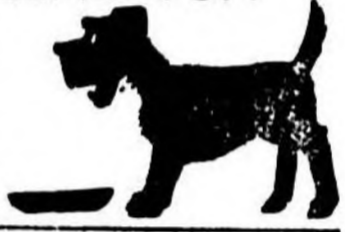

## Margaret Mitchell Dies As Result Of Accident Injuries

Author Of "Gone With The Wind" Dies After Being Hit By Reckless Motorist

ATLANTA, Aug. 16 (AP)—Margaret Mitchell, author of "Gone With The Wind," died today as doctors prepared for an emergency operation to try to save her life. Miss Mitchell, 43, was struck down by a speeding automobile on Peachtree Street last Thursday night. She and her husband, John R. Marsh, were crossing the street to go to a movie near their home. Miss Mitchell never fully recovered consciousness. Doctors said she had a fractured skull, fractures of the pelvis, and other injuries. The hospital listed her age as 43. She was taken to the operating room at Henry Grady Memorial Hospital this morning. She died at 11:59 A. M. (EST), before the operation was performed. Doctors did not reveal immediately what operation was planned. X-rays had shown a fracture of the skull from near the top to the spine. Marsh, a semi-invalid as the result of a heart attack several years ago, was not at the hospital when his wife died. Her brother, Stephens Mitchell, left to inform Marsh. Mrs. Stephens Mitchell was the only member of the family in the operating room when Miss Mitchell died. Funeral arrangements were not announced immediately. Miss Mitchell and her husband were crossing the street when over the center line and smashed into her. She was dragged 16 feet. Marsh held his wife in his arms.

Johnson, city sanitary officer, this morning.

## County Clerk Plans Display Case For Seminole Historical Archives

County Clerk O. P. Herndon is planning to secure a display case for the showing of historical archives of Seminole County, he announced today. The decision to start a collection of relics and historical documents was prompted by the presentation of pioneer Sanford citizen and former municipal judge, of the former Mayor William O'Dwyer has declared in favor of pay increases for the city's top elected officials, including a hike in his own salary from \$38,000 to \$50,000 a year.

## SEA DIVING

Barton yesterday had himself hoisted back to the surface after being lowered in his diving bell to 3000 feet. This is probably the deepest any man has ever gone alone. He and his assistant, Charles Beale, are searching for the wreck of the Albatross, which is believed to have sunk in 1864.

## A. M. Phillips Dies After Short Illness

A. M. Phillips, pioneer resident of Sanford, died this morning at 2:00 A. M. at an Orlando hospital following a short illness. At the age of 87, he lived with his family from Sanford to Green Cove Springs and later to Starke, returning to Sanford in 1915 where he has resided for the past 34 years. He entered service with the Atlantic Coast Line railroad in Tampa in 1911 and at the time of his death was serving as a conductor with the railroad. He was a member of the Order of Railway Conductors and has resided with his wife at 216 Park Ave. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Phillips and two sons, Wallace M. Phillips of this city, and Dr. Lewis A. Phillips of Winter Garden. Other survivors include four grandchildren, Wallace Phillips Jr. and Merrill Phillips of Sanford, Marcel Elaine Phillips and Leah Joanne Phillips of Winter Garden, and a brother, A. F. Phillips of Tallahassee.

## Europe Told To Do More To Assist Itself

Marshall Plan Chief Says Nations Must Export More Goods To Earn Dollars  
PARIS, Aug. 16 (AP)—Marshall Aid Chief Paul G. Hoffman told European trade leaders today their countries are doing less than they should to earn their U. S. dollars.

At a news conference yesterday, Hoffman pointed the new British Dollar Export Board for trying to find additional U. S. markets. He also said that Belgium was doing work on this line. He told the OEEC delegates that there is a great need for their governments to give their manufacturers incentives to win and hold a place in that (American) market. First, he said, there must be a willingness to earn more dollars; then the United States would see about how it could give this effort technical help.

## Mickey Flees As News Leaks Out His Wires Tapped
