

Howell Park Sales Pass 100 Mark in Month, Hefler Reports

The 100 mark in sales of homes in the new Howell Park development, built by Hefler Construction Co. in Seminole County, was passed last week, Herbert Hefler, president, announced.

At present 120 of the new, completely air conditioned homes in the 1,200 acre planned community are under construction, and it is expected the first families may move into the big development within the next month.

Hefler said strong interest has been shown in the new community, which features the first completely air conditioned homes in their price bracket (\$12,500 - \$24,500) anywhere in Florida—by people from the Seaboard and adjacent areas.

One of the many attractive features of the new Florida area which Hefler selected for the establishment of the largest planned community of its kind, were the numerous lakes in the immediate region. This is reflected in the naming of each of the six different model homes, which are known as the "Lake Fairview", "Lake Harbor", "Lake Dover", "Lake Country", "Lake Harbor" and "Lake Apollo."

Hefler, who ranks first in the nation in the number of individual residential units constructed, reports that the sales of Howell Park homes thus far reflect the popularity of the top and lowest priced models, which thus far lead in the sales record. The \$14,500 "Lake Fairview" and the \$12,500 "Lake Apollo" are selling ahead of the other four models, though each of the latter are represented well in the sales column.

The present schedule calls for the start of at least 200 homes in the Howell Park development before the end of 1959, he said.

Man-Satellite Test Falls Short Of Goal, But Capsule Survives

Recovery Is Major Step In Program

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—A test model of the Mercury satellite which will carry a man into space was launched today as one of the nation's space programs came to a close. The 15-minute test capsule fell short of its goal but was recovered from the sea.

"If I had had my way, I think I would have gone this time," said Navy Lt. Cmdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr., one of the future specimens, before it was known that trouble in the Atlas intercontinental missile caused the capsule to fall several hundred miles short of its target.

Science Finds Clues To Noah's Flood

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—A Columbia University scientist offered evidence today which he believes will support the story of the great flood described in the Holy Bible.

According to the Bible, the great flood which Noah survived by building the ark was caused by torrential rains which lasted 40 days and 40 nights.

Dr. Rhodes W. Fairbridge said his worldwide study of sea fossils over a 16-year period and evidence furnished by other scientists show that coastal areas in many lands were suddenly covered by vast expanses of water.

Fairbridge fixed the date at about 4,000 B.C. This is about the time that the floods mentioned in the Bible, Buddhist writing and other chronicles took place.

He did this by charting the rise and fall of sea levels caused by ice ages and the shifting of ocean beds.

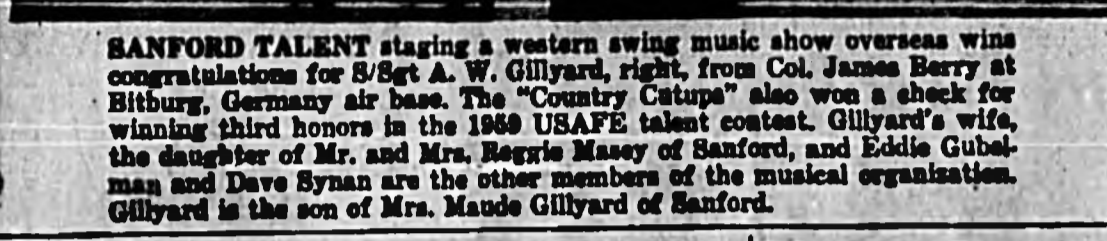
Fairbridge discovered fossils that he was able to connect with particular times in history and determine when sea levels swelled and receded. He collected some of them while skimming off western Australia.

"The sea level reached its highest peak about 6,000 years ago," he said in an interview with United Press International during the International Oceanographic Conference at the United Nations.

"The water rose gradually, inch by inch through the centuries. Suddenly it covered the coastline and moved inland," rising about 800 feet above land.

Fairbridge said the great flood was a catastrophe because man was unaware of the power of the elements and unable to protect himself.

"The flood played a great part in making man more intelligent," Fairbridge said. "He had to think or go under water. And in later years men in other areas had to find means of covering himself or else freeze to death."

UN Rushes Survey Of Laos Fighting

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—U. N. authorities rushed plans today to get a team to Laos by this weekend to investigate charges of an invasion by Communists from North Viet Nam.

The government of Argentina, Italy, Japan and Tunisia, the four nations designated as investigators by the Security Council, were expected to assign members of their UN delegation to look into the situation.

This Laotian government announced today in a communique that its troops have recaptured a post in Samneua province.

The communique said the post was retaken as two rebel battalions were reported in the region of Samneua, in the same province.

The communique also said that several enemy groups were sighted in Phongsavath province as well as in Samneua province. The two provinces border on North Viet Nam and Communist China.

The United States today bought bare eight placards of supplies including rifles and grenades, canteens, steel helmets with liners and mosquito nets.

India claims the border area as its territory and has accused the Red Chinese of making incursions into it. Nehru sent Chou a letter last March 22 asking for Red China's views on the question, one of a series of messages sent on the issue. It was the March 22 letter to which Chou replied.

Teamsters Sue Orlando Bank For Fund Transfer

ORLANDO (UPI)—A Teamsters Union suit is on file here against the Florida National Bank of Orlando which has refused to release \$399,000 in Teamster funds.

The suit, filed in federal court Tuesday, asks that the money be transferred to the Public Bank of Detroit where it can draw interest. It also asks \$500,000 in damages from the bank.

The action was filed in behalf of Detroit Local 299, of which Teamster boss Jimmy Hoffa is president.

Hoffa seeks to have the funds transferred in compliance with order issued last week by the union's court-appointed monitors.

Bank President O. P. Hewitt has refused to release the funds until the union settles a delinquent \$380,000 account that is in connection with an ill-fated Florida Teamster housing project.

The Sun Valley project, a 2,500-acre housing development originally planned as a community for retired union members, failed in the wake of mail order and financial irregularities.

McDaniel To Be At Medic Meeting

Sanford City Physician Dr. Thomas McDaniel will attend a meeting of the Florida Academy of General Practice board of directors in Jacksonville this week-end. Dr. McDaniel will accompany him. Dr. McDaniel is chairman of the Medical Economics and Insurance Committee of the Florida Academy.

President Faces Second Round Veto Of Works Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower today faced the problem of whether to veto a new public works appropriations bill almost identical to a previous measure he rejected.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen predicted Eisenhower might veto the second bill. Other legislators believed he might sign it but freeze funds for new projects he opposed.

The Senate approved the \$1,185,000,000 bill Tuesday night and sent it to the White House by a vote of 73-18. The House had passed the measure by a thumping 393-93 margin.

In each case, the veto was more than the two-thirds necessary to override a presidential veto.

The second bill contains funds for all 67 new projects which prompted Eisenhower to reject the first version. But it trims all the projects in the bill by 24 percent.

Eisenhower contends the 67 new starts eventually would cost 800 million dollars to complete.

The Democratic leadership apparently was convinced it had the votes this time to override any veto of the measure, which would provide funds for flood control and rivers and harbors projects in the current fiscal year.

Duncan Elected By State Group

Justice of the Peace Hugh Duncan has been elected to the board of directors of the State Association of Justices of the Peace and Constables.

Duncan was named to the 12-man board at the association's Jacksonville convention Sept. 5-8. Constable Melvin Willis of Orlando was elected president.

Civil and criminal court service improvements were discussed at the convention. During the coming year, justices of the peace will try to inform the public on what their Courts do, Duncan said. This is the closest to the people and is the court of first resort, he explains.

The court handles over 500 complaints and files and processes over 200 criminal cases per month. This lightens the load on higher courts.

Unions Turn Down Contract Offer

LITTLE ROCK (UPI)—Two striking unions Tuesday rejected a new contract offer by Swift & Co. to end a five-day-old walkout.

Spokesmen for the United Packerhouse Workers and the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen called the proposal "full of bugs" and "loaded with gimmicks."

Federal mediators said the two sides would meet again today in an effort to end the strike by 17,000 workers in 34 cities across the country.

No Action Slated On Volusia Judge

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—No action is scheduled against Volusia County Judge Max Masfeller, target of unspecified complaints on the conduct of his office.

Gov. LeRoy Collins held a 30-minute conference with Masfeller here Tuesday. After the conference Collins said "I do not feel that further censure or action by this office will be called for."

Mediator Calls 57-Day Old Steel Talks 'Oddest Kind Of Bargaining'

NEW YORK (UPI)—The government's chief mediator, Joseph F. Finnegan, said today the negotiations in the 57-day old steel strike are "the oddest kind of bargaining" he had ever seen.

Finnegan made his comment when asked about President Eisenhower's criticism that "half-hearted bargaining is not enough" and his demand that the industry and union begin "intensive, uninterrupted, good-faith bargaining."

Finnegan, asked if he thought the president's letters to both sides urging action would speed up the negotiations, said:

"Sometimes it jars people loose from their ideas—but only if they want to. In other words, only if they want to bargain and compromise."

Asked if he agreed with the president's statement regarding "half-hearted bargaining," he said "It happens to be consistent with the statements of both parties. They have said they are right where they were when they started."

"It certainly is the oddest kind of bargaining I've ever seen—if you can call it that," he said.

Negotiators from both sides replied to Eisenhower's criticism shortly after getting the letters.

David J. McDonald, president of the United Steelworkers Union 3100, off a reply stating that the union was trying to do just what the president asked. But he said the industry negotiators "have either refused or lack the authority to negotiate, except on the basis of complete denial of any injustice to the steelworkers."

R. Conrad Cooper, chief industry negotiator, charged that the only settlement the union has made possible so far would be a "surrender to... pressures for an inflationary agreement."

"We do not believe such a settlement is desired by the President, by the American people, or by the steelworkers themselves," Cooper said.

The top-level negotiators today worked to complete the preparation of 23 subcommittees, one for each of the major steel-related companies, to tackle individual technical problems. The subcommittees begin meetings Thursday.

Negotiations between the top four-man teams of both sides also will resume Thursday.

Eisenhower's letter made an direct mention of the Fair-Hartley Act, which empowered him to issue an injunction sending the strikers back to work for 90 days. But he noted "It is only when the national safety and health are imperiled that federal law should be invoked."

Administration officials said the president probably will explain the reasons for his invitation to Khrushchev and caution against expecting any dramatic developments or sudden solutions of cold war problems.

It also was considered likely that Eisenhower would request the American people to receive Khrushchev politely and correctly as befits a visiting head of state, no matter how strong their antipathies to the system he represents.

LONDON (UPI)—Kay Kendall, the actress wife of star Rex Harrison, was buried today in a part of Hampstead churchyard known as "Actors' Corner."

Miss Kendall, 32, died Sunday from leukemia.

Hundreds of wreaths were piled up at the graveside by the 18th Century village church of St. John-at-Hampstead, a North London suburb.

Harrison, who knew his wife was suffering from an incurable disease when he married her four years ago, had pleaded "no" to her. He said his money instead to a cancer fund. "But the theater world ignored his request."

Gas Tax Hike Gets Final Approval

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House gave final congressional approval today to a one-cent boost in gasoline taxes starting Oct. 1.

The bill now goes to the White House. Lawmakers of both parties said President Eisenhower was certain to sign it into law.

The measure temporarily raises to four cents the present three-cent a gallon federal tax on gasoline and diesel fuel. The higher levy would remain in force 24 months until July 1, 1971 and bring in almost one billion dollars in additional revenue.

\$25,000 Reward Offered In Bombing At Little Rock

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI)—FBI experts joined Little Rock police today in a search for bombers while the Chamber of Commerce stepped up efforts to publicize a reward for persons who touched off three explosions Monday night.

Two Federal Bureau of Investigation laboratory men started checking the blast scenes Tuesday in hopes of finding evidence that might lead to the capture of whoever set the explosions.

No arrests have been made.

Gov. Orval Faubus described the bombings as "sickening and deplorable" and said he hoped they would not be repeated.

The explosions rocked three separate sections of Little Rock, while a 38-minute period Monday. One damaged an office of the Little Rock School Board. Another shattered part of a building where City Mayor Warner C. Knapp has offices on the construction firm of which he is president. The third totally destroyed a city-owned station wagon used by Fire Chief Wynn Bailey.

No one was injured in the blasts which were believed to have been dynamite.

Two FBI agents were sent to Little Rock on the request of police, a spokesman for the Justice Department in Washington said. Meanwhile, the Little Rock Chamber of Commerce rushed to publicize a \$25,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the bomb throwers.

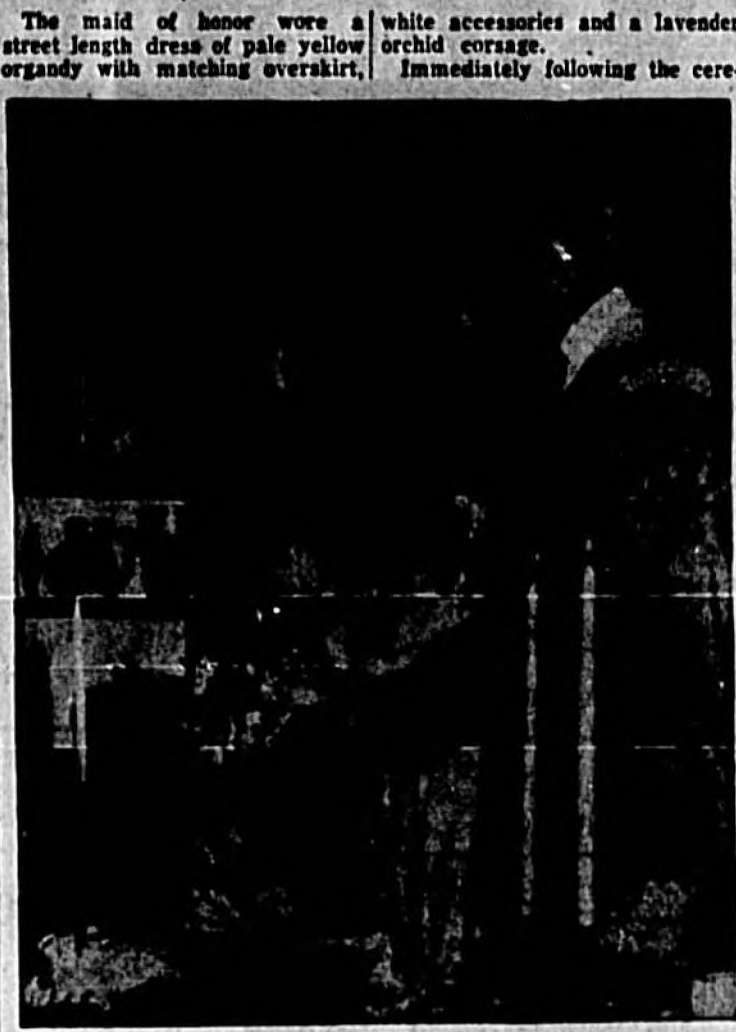

Tips On Care Of Tile Floors

Porch and patio tile floors frequently present a tough cleaning-up problem.

Use a coat of paste wax on hard-wood floors after the application of a good floor cleaner. 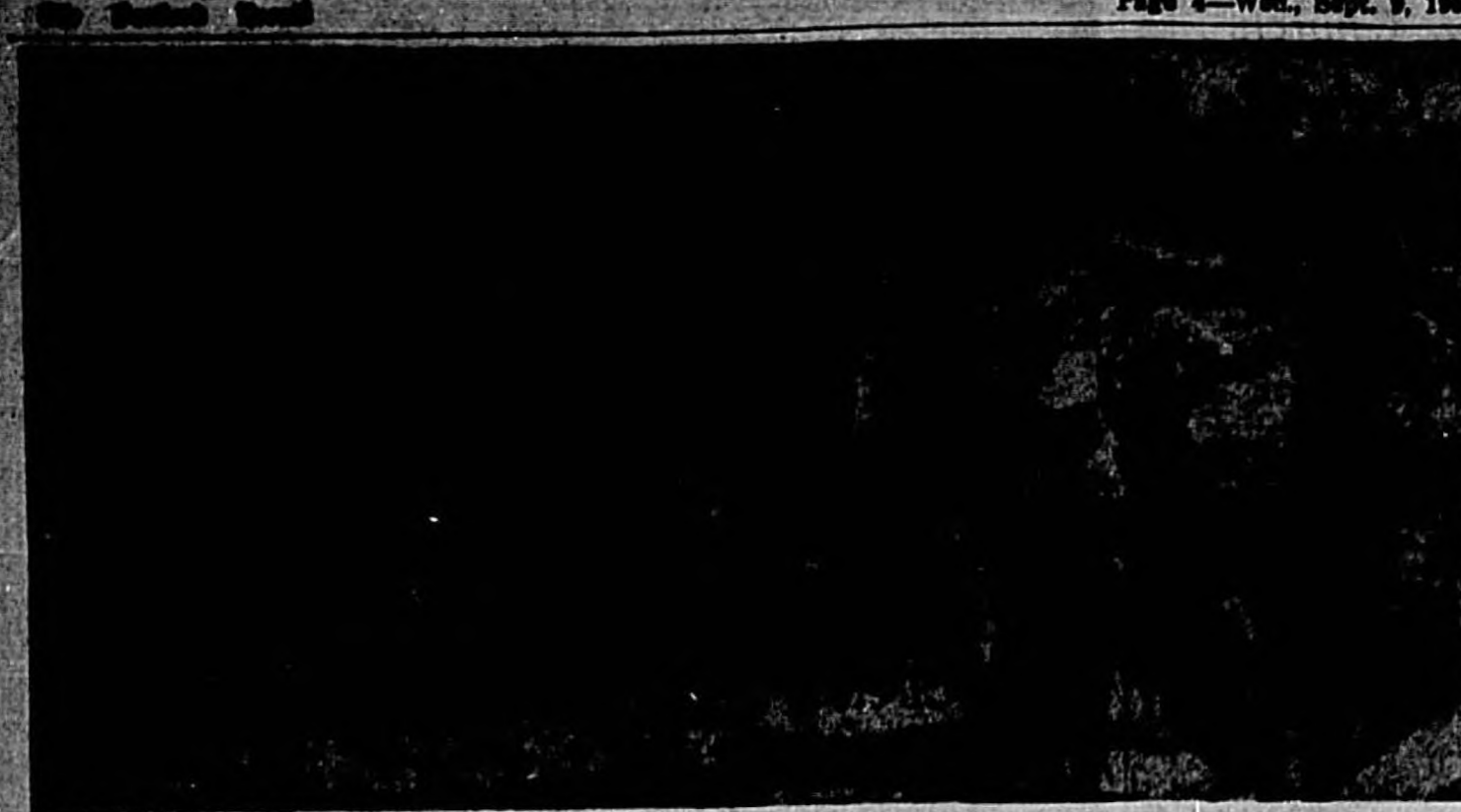

Bandit Put On List Of Most Wanted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Robert Garfield Brown Jr., a lush who "grinned" from small time car theft into vicious bandit, was listed today by the FBI as one of its 10 most wanted criminals.

Brown, 41, tattooed and graying has been the subject of a nationwide manhunt since July 9 when a Vancouver Canadian couple were robbed on a beach at Old Orchard, Maine, and the husband shot without provocation.

The FBI says he frequents bars and dog tracks and drinks to excess. He also is said to be fond of cards, checkers, dominoes and handball. In the past he has worked as a mechanic, service station attendant, carpenter, handbill distributor, lumberjack and tool and die maker.

His outstanding physical characteristics are tattoos on both forearms. The one on the left features a scroll and flowers with the word "Mother" inscribed; the right arm tattoo says merely "Father." Brown stands 5-10 and weighs 180 pounds. He is of medium build with brown, wavy hair, gray eyes and dark complexion.

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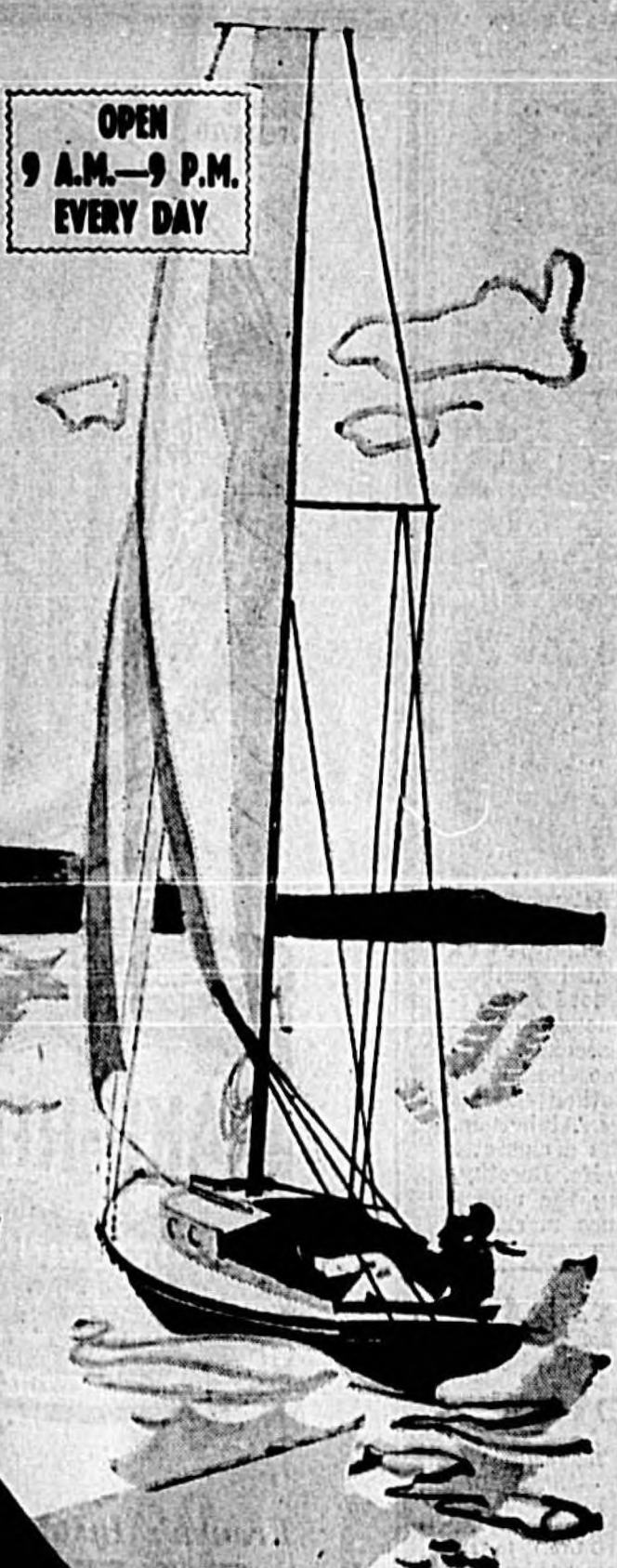

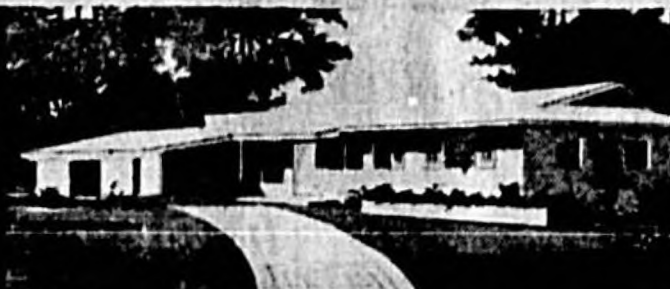

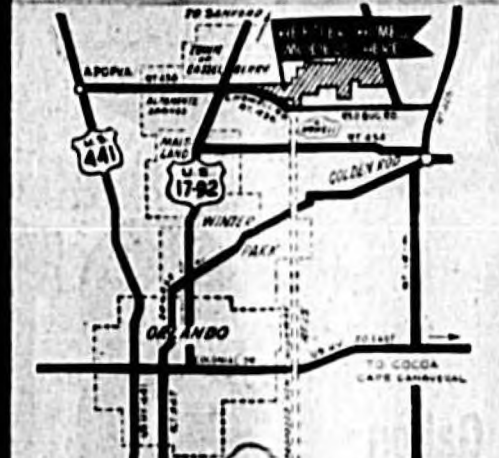

Mexican Airliner Blast Kills Man

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — An explosion aboard a Mexican airliner, apparently caused by a bomb, killed one person Tuesday and started a fire which injured eight others, it was reported today.
 None of the two or three Americans among the 18 persons aboard the plane was known to have been hurt.
 Capt. David Torre Athan, the pilot, landed the plane safely at the oil town of Pozo Rico in southeastern Mexico. Federal authorities impounded the plane in preparation for an investigation of the explosion.

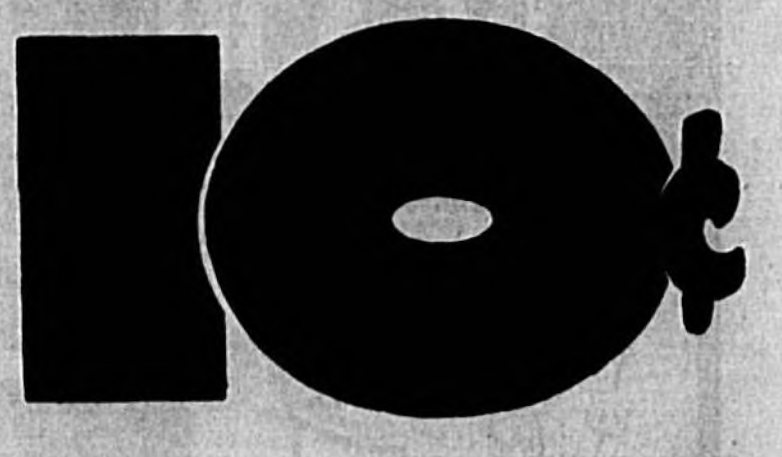

Dow Finsterwald of Tequesta, Fla. Finsterwald played one other time, in 1937.

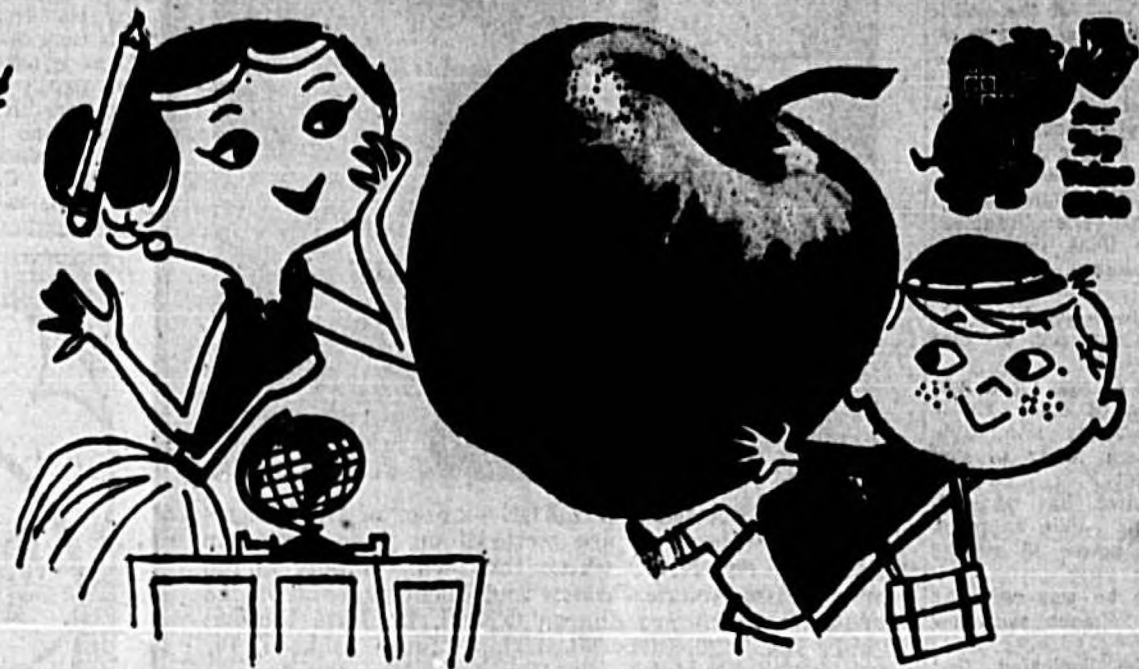

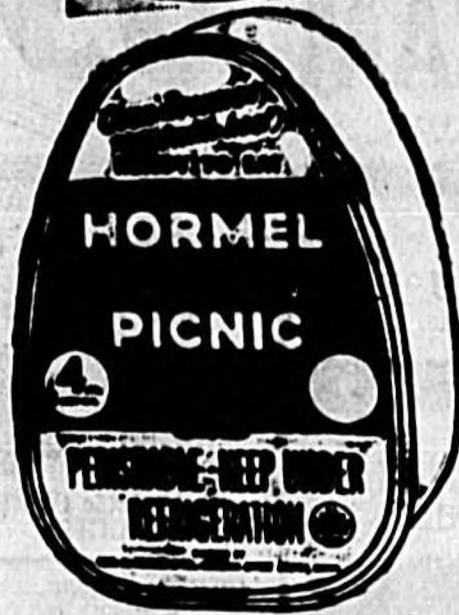

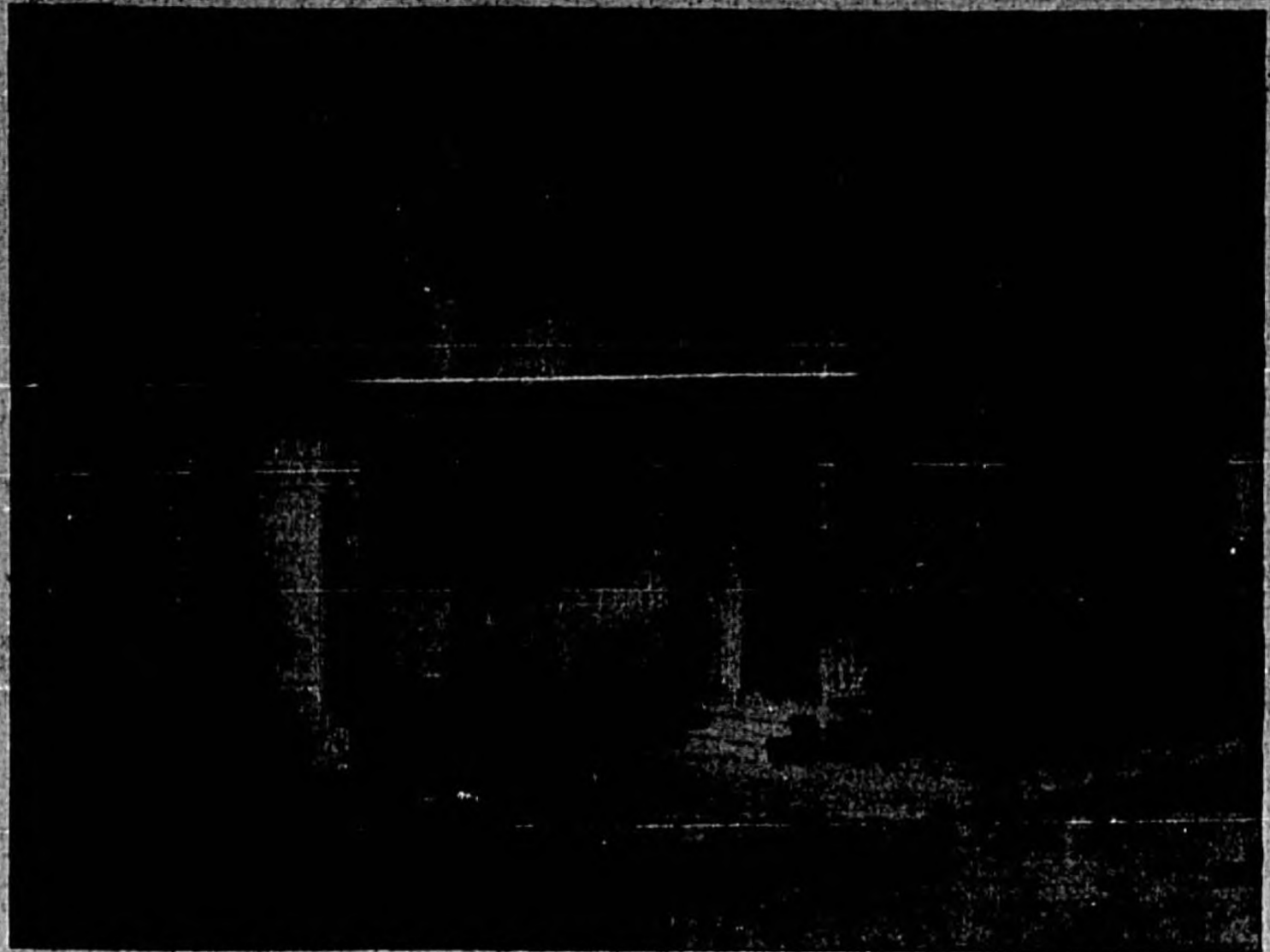

Youth Kills Man Who Bumped Him

NEW YORK (UPI)—A 17-year-old boy accused yesterday that he stabbed a man to death because the man accidentally brushed against him on the street.

The youth, Eugene Roman, who came here from Florida less than three months ago, admitted the bumping was unintentional but said "it made me mad."

Police said Roman was walking with a 16-year-old girl in the Gramercy Park section Monday night when Thomas Jordan, 34, walking in the opposite direction, brushed against him.

Roman, according to police, started an argument with Jordan, who fled. Roman chased Jordan about four blocks, then stoned and fatally stabbed him. Roman was arrested after a cab driver who had witnessed the slaying pointed him out to police.

He was charged with homicide. The murder weapon was not found.

Roman was arrested on the eve of a top-level conference on the growing juvenile crisis. Scheduled to meet today were Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, Mayor Robert F. Wagner and 24 officials and civic and religious leaders.

Police, meanwhile, pressed a stepped-up campaign of arrests that has netted at least 204 youths since last Thursday.

Elementary Schools Get Safety Course

STILLWATER, Okla. (UPI)—Students here will have to play it safe if they want to do well in the classroom.

Stillwater is the first city in the nation to include a full program of safety instruction in all elementary schools.

The program was designed by the Oklahoma Safety Council, which hopes to have it in operation in 5,000 classrooms next school year.

The program will provide teacher and students with special classroom materials, including lesson plans, posters, teachers' guides, workbooks, magazines and other selected items, all designed to impress the need for safety upon young minds.

Oklahoma Safety Council Manager Bob Eastman described the program, which has been underwritten by Stillwater's civic clubs at a cost of \$12 per classroom, as "one of the most important projects we have ever undertaken."

"The child of today," Eastman said, "is born into a world of thousands of potential hazards, most of them unknown to years ago. Basic safety knowledge is as necessary as the ABC's if today's child is to live in our mechanical world."

Consulates Open

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States and Poland will open their consulates in each other's country "in the near future." The State Department said the action stems from an agreement last year and reflects a gradual improvement in relations with Poland since the end of the Stalin era.

Improper Care Of Baby Charge Shakes Jayne

LONDON (UPI)—Jayne Mansfield was reported "shocked and upset" yesterday over a complaint that she kept her baby up too late at a public function.

Jayne and her weight-lifting husband, Mickey Hargitay, took their eight-month-old baby Miklos along Saturday when they attended at 10 p. m. ceremonies which inaugurated illumination at Blackpool, a beach resort.

Frank Sevier, an inspector for the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, was in the audience. He said he would report the incident.

"We are hurt and disgusted at the allegation that we don't look after our baby properly," Hargitay said. "Jayne is shocked and upset."

Admiral's Wife Does Her Share

PORTSMOUTH, England (UPI)—An admiral's wife brought in some extra money for the family coffers by working as a shopkeeper.

Mrs. Elizabeth Urrison earned 25 shillings by cutting the ribbon that started a new lowering a 15-ton ship's keel into place. Her husband, Adm. John Urrison, said proudly: "Five shillings is the placard for laying a keel."
