

Kill Feather-Bedding Uphed

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Supreme Court upheld today a lower court decision that would allow railroads to eliminate "feather-bedding" - unnecessary work-by operating em-

An appeal by five railroad brotherhoods has been before the court for some weeks. The decision was handed down last Nov. 28 by the 7th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Chicago.

Today's opinion by the court was unsigned. But was simply "per curiam" or "by the court." Justice Arthur J. Goldberg, former labor secretary, did not participate.

Today's action means that after some routine moves the railroads can legally go ahead with work rule changes that would stop the featherbedding.

During the proceedings, Louis J. Wagner, president of the Order of Railroad Conductors and Brakemen, said that the unions "will have no alternative" but to strike if the changes eventually materialize.

Before a strike takes place, President Kennedy would appoint an emergency fact-finding board. This would delay any strike action for another 60 days.

The unions represent about 200,000 conductors, switchmen and other employes who work on trains. They brought the lawsuit on the claim that the carriers were violating the Railway Labor Act by their proposals.

The Supreme Court opinion said that both parties had exhausted all legal procedures in the long dispute and "are relegated to selfhelp" in adjusting it.

Under the new rules, about 13,000 firemen displaced by the diesel locomotive would be dismissed and 25,000 other jobs would be abolished over five years. The pay structure would be revised to raise about 150,000 salaries.

Rules that bar crews from working beyond certain change points would be climinated and crews could take trains into yards without payment to standby yard crews.





Although he isn't discouraged by the so-called "freeze economy," Mr. Roumillat does see quite clearly the need for Sanford and Seminole County people sticking together, as never before, in order to get our economy back on the Main Line, Part of the goal can be accomplished by keeping our local taxpaying merchants in business with the simple and painless plan of buying things from them whenever it is possible to do so.

As important as it is to buy at at home, it won't solve the problem by itself. Money must circulate in a healthy economy. That brings us to another extremely important function of the Chamber: bringing in payroll industries so that the city and county may have a 12 month payroll. The citrus industry, as we all know, is seasonal and always has a summer slack. The chamber's watchfulness for industrial prospects, and its efforts to bring them to this area, is under the chairmanship of Scott Burns. We like Mr. Burns selection for the job because he is a real fighter and doesn't give up easily. What's more, he is in the center of Sunford's business life, as manager of Florida Power and Light and thus is able to see at first hand the need for fresh year-around payrolls. There are more groceries on Mr. Burns own table

when the economy is humming. The Sanford Herald has offered already to work hand-in-hand with Mr. Roumillat, Mr. Burns and everybody else in the organization. It takes the chamber, and every man in it, to get the job done. And the hope-oper-

ated community daily is properly part of the team.

We can help, and will help. But you, the citizen and reader, can be of immeasurable assistance, too. If you hear about an industry that is thinking of relocating (perhaps some industry related to your own line of work), by all means get in touch with the chamber. Such 'Tips' have been helpful in the past, both here and in other communities. Remember that you, the individual citizen, are the eyes and ears of the chamber. Your information if it isn't passed along may never reach the right ears. and it may never be acted on. There are still, unfortunately, too many of us who think only in terms of our own narrow interests, forgetting that we will all prosper if the city and county prospers (and we will suffer if the city and the county as a whole suffers).

Let's resolve to think of the growth and economic solidity of Sanford and Seminole County and its area first - even above whatever narrow interests we may have. If we work in harmony as a team-the Chamber, the newspaper, and each Individual citizen-there is hardly a way to lose.
