

## War Puts OPEC 'Out Of Business'

**BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI)**—Leading oil analysts say OPEC is "out of business" until the Iran war ends and even then will be hampered in moves to raise prices for two or three years.

The analysts say the fighting between the Arab and Israeli forces in the Middle East will have the effect of cancelling OPEC's ability to raise prices until the war ends.

"It is out of business until the Iran-Iraq war ends, and even then its ability to raise prices will be hampered for two or three years," Iskandar said.

"The war has frozen everything," said oil economist Robert Mahon, an Oxford University professor.

The long-term pricing strategy called for market and guide OPEC through the 1970s.

DEAR DR. LAMB— My mother is 83 years old and has swollen legs which are swollen from the feet to her knees. The legs are swollen because of hardening of the arteries and poor circulation. At present she's taking potassium chloride 'slow release tablets, Durul and Digi-din. The legs also leak fluid which is hard to stop. What causes this and what do you suggest for stopping it? Is there another medication that can be used to help decrease the swelling of her legs? Her blood pressure is good and the heart is good also.

DEAR READER— The combination of poor circulation and sometimes the abdomen occurs. The success in medical treatment depends a lot on how weak the heart is and how much the heart muscle is damaged. Your doctor is doing essentially everything that can be done in these circumstances. There are limits to what can be done to improve the function of the heart, and it's important that you understand the basic problem and the limitations available in treating it.

### Casselberry City Council Raises Cable TV Price By \$1

With little resistance from Casselberry residents, the city council Monday night passed a \$1-to-\$2 vote ordinance raising Orange-Seminole Cablevision rates from \$4.99 to \$5.99.

The ordinance was passed by a 5-2 vote. The council also unanimously approved an ordinance which would extend cablevision service until December 1991 and an ordinance that would give a 3 percent franchise fee on regular cablevision service. Currently the company pays an 8 percent franchise fee for Horse Box Office service.

The council also ordered the company to pay back all \$10 deposits collected from Casselberry residents for use of cablevision converters.

The company charged the deposits without authorization from the council. Mayor Owen Sheppard said.

The council decided Cablevision could not charge deposits on the converters, he said.

Charles King, general manager of Orange-Seminole Cablevision, told the council that the deposits were for replacement of converters taken by residents who moved. He said a converter costs \$125.

Although the council did not approve security deposits for the converters, it did pass the ordinance with a penalty clause.

The penalty clause states that if a person removed a converter, he will be fined no more than \$300 or imprisoned for no more than 90 days.

Sanford Hospital Team Makes Extraordinary Effort To Save Twins

It was after 3 a.m. at 4:50 feet. The temperature in the plane's cabin registered 100 degrees as one infant suffered its third cardiac arrest. His twin needed help just to breathe.

A medical team from Seminole Memorial Hospital worked frantically over the newborn pair enroute to a special hospital for infants in Pensacola. One baby weighed 10.12 ounces. The other just 10.4 ounces.

The cabin was sweltering and nurse Barbara Bodnar swore the twins "were to be doing this."

Shortly after take-off from Sanford Airport early Saturday, power failed on the battery-operated incubator being used to transport the twins. All pilot Bill Lightfoot could do was improvise — he turned up the heat full force to keep the twins warm.

He also told the plane from 4,500 feet to 4,000 feet to conserve oxygen.

Because one twin had a heart problem, more oxygen was used, Mrs. Bodnar said. She found it necessary to radio ahead and make an emergency stop in Panama City to pick up two more bottles of oxygen. But Police had to wait for them at the airport, and there was little delay, Lightfoot said.

The plane arrived at Pensacola just before 8 a.m.

"We were all soaking wet when we got there," Lightfoot said. "But it didn't matter."

The medical team and pilot said they felt good about the effort.

Then, despite everything that could be done, the smaller twin could not breathe on his own. Lightfoot said.

The larger twin lived for a short time at the hospital, but also died.

### Garfield Plans Appeal

Eugene Garfield will probably appeal the court ruling discharging him from his post as president of the bankrupt Auto-Train Corp., his lawyer said today.

Garfield, founder of the rail carrier and president of Auto-Train since the company was formed in 1971, was ordered by a bankruptcy judge Monday to resign his post as president of the company.

The request to cancel Garfield's \$120,000-a-year contract was made by court-appointed trustee Murray Drabkin, who called Garfield "a burden" hindering attempts to reorganize the company, which declared bankruptcy after running up a \$10 million debt. Since bankruptcy was declared, Garfield has received \$20,000 a year in salary.

David Epstein, Garfield's attorney, said his client was not given due process at the hearing Monday. Epstein complained the judge turned down a request to delay the hearing a week while Epstein familiarized himself with the case he took Thursday.

He also said the judge might have erred in granting parts of Drabkin's motion which did more than terminate the employment contract.

Epstein explained Garfield was elected by the corporation's board of directors, and possibly cannot be removed at the request of the trustee.

Being the unsalaried, powerless president of a bankrupt corporation "may be an empty honor," but it is an honor Garfield may be legally entitled to, Epstein said.

In court action Monday, when cancelled contracts between Auto-Train and Garfield, Vice President Richard Goldstein and Philip Craver, president of Railway Services Corp., an Auto-Train subsidiary.

Goldstein voluntarily resigned two weeks ago at the trustee's request.

Auto-Train spokesman Tom Tucker said the trustee believed keeping Garfield on as an inactive president served no purpose while hindering efforts at soliciting new sources of money for the company.

**Cabinet OKs \$40 Million Loan For Shands Hospital**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — The Cabinet today approved a \$40-million loan considered essential to the existence of the University of Florida's Shands Teaching Hospital in Gainesville.

Cabinet members voted 7-0 to release the \$14.5 million first installment of the loan, which will be used to renovate the hospital's 29-year old building and construct a new facility.

The key vote was Gov. Bob Graham's because state law requires the governor's approval before money is transferred from the state's working capital reserve fund.

He said his decision to vote for the loan was influenced by the fact that the project is being pushed by the Board of Regents.

ORLANDO — Golfing legend and longtime Orange County resident Arnold Palmer broke the ground to mark the commencement of construction of the \$41 million Orange County Convention-Civic Center today.

The public was invited to this unique event, which featured Palmer hitting a golf ball from a specially formed sandtrap to break the ground.

The groundbreaking ceremony was held at the Civic Center site at the intersection of the Bee-Line Expressway and International Drive in south Orange County.

**Jurors Recommend Life**

OCALA, Fla. (UPI) — A circuit judge will await results of a pre-sentence report before deciding whether to follow a jury's recommendation of life imprisonment for an ex-Tennessee prosecutor convicted of first degree murder.

Circuit Judge Wallace E. Sturgis Jr. is not bound by the recommendation of the jury of eight women and four men in the case of Raymond Ellis Taylor Jr., 34, a former prosecutor at Dayton, Tenn. Under Florida law, a conviction for first degree murder is punishable by either the death penalty or life imprisonment.

The jury deliberated only 25 minutes Monday before making its recommendation of life imprisonment.

**Library Gains Rare Books**

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — The University of Florida has dipped into privately-donated library funds for \$200,000 and bought the 4,000 books and manuscripts in the New England authors collection of Parkman Dexter Howe of Boston.

Some of the volumes had been in the Howe family since 1864.

Among the manuscripts were two unpublished poems, handwritten by Emily Dickinson.

The first editions included 500 by poets Oliver Wendell Holmes and John Greenleaf Whittier.

Other first editions are works by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, James Russell Lowell, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Herman Melville, Richard Henry Dana, Henry David Thoreau, Louisa May Alcott, Harriet Beecher Stowe and William Cullen Bryant.

**PSC Mulls Pricing Plan**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — The Public Service Commission still wants to give consumers the chance to pay more or less for their electricity according to the hours it is used.

But the PSC is having trouble figuring out a fair and workable rate structure for time-of-day pricing.

The commission instructed its staff Monday to revise a proposed set of rates that, if approved, would be imposed on the state's four major power companies.

**Ex-Judge Leaves Prison**

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — Former Circuit Judge Sam Smith of Lake City left the Federal Correctional Institute at Lexington, Ky., Monday, paroled after serving 18 months of a 18-month sentence for possession of marijuana, federal probation officials said.

A spokesman for the minimum security prison said Smith, 56, was released at 11 a.m. and left for an unknown destination on a commercial airliner.

In Jacksonville, Larry Harris, Smith's parole officer, said he expected to hear from Smith within the next few days to set up an appointment with him at the U.S. Probation Office in Jacksonville.

**Cuban Refugees Await Vote**

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — The Miami Beach City Commission meets today to decide whether to accept a promised \$40,000 federal grant to cover the hotel bills of more than 3,000 Cuban refugees through the end of October.

If the commission refuses, the refugees may find themselves evicted by the end of the week.

Miami Beach had been promised \$40,000 to house the refugees through October. That amount was used up by received. On Oct. 15, the city stopped issuing warrants guaranteeing payment for hotel rooms for the refugees.

Since then the State Department's Cuban-Haitian Task Force has offered the city another \$40,000. But Assistant City Manager Hal Cohen — noting the city still hasn't received the original \$40,000 — said, "I don't think much of it."

## After 97 Years, Phils Win Series

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Steve Carlton, baseball's silent man, spoke volumes with his pitches Tuesday night and brought the Philadelphia Phillies their first championship by combining with Tom Seaver on a seven-hit, 4-1 victory over the Kansas City Royals in the sixth game of the World Series.

In winning the Series, four games to two, the Phillies thus ended 97 years of frustration and heartbreak and touched off a wild celebration that was expected to last for days.

Carlton, perhaps the biggest symbol of past Phillies' frustrations, was simply overtopping of past Phillies' frustrations as he allowed just three hits before retiring in the eighth and turning the reins over to the reliable McGraw.

Staked to a 4-0 lead, Carlton appeared headed for an easy victory. But he tried to start the eighth and left to a standing ovation from the crowd of 68,000 after walking John Wathan and giving up his fourth hit, a single by Jose Cardenal.

The pugacious McGraw, who saved the first game and won the fifth to relief, pitched out of the jam but not without putting a dramatic touch to the final game.

He got Frank White on a pop to first base for the first out but then walked Willie Wilson to load the bases. After U.L. Washington scored Wathan with a sacrifice fly, George Brett beat out an infield hit into the hole when first baseman Pete Rose could not reach the base in time.

McGraw then worked the count to 3-2 on the dangerous Hal McRae and retired the Royals' designated hitter on a grounder to second to end the inning as the crowd roared its approval.

McRae then bashed the Royals in the ninth but not without stopping a few hearts on the way.

But the fans, who had waited years for the championship, were kept from seeing the fielder in mass because of infield pile-up and attack dogs.

McRae started the ninth by striking out Amos Otis on a 2-2 and then, with the crowd on its feet and screaming on every pitch, he walked Willie Wilson on a 3-3 pitch and gave up

consecutive singles to Wathan and Cardenal. Frank White then hit a foul popup near the Phillies dugout that Boone got in his glove, then dropped. But the play was saved by Rose, who caught the ball before it hit the ground for the second out.

McGraw then struck out Willie Wilson for a record 12th time in the Series to end the game and touch off a fireworks display above the Stadium.

Phillies players, led by Manager Dallas Green, mobbed McGraw and hugged each other before running off the field into the clubhouse to begin a champagne celebration.

"We're the world champs and a lot of people in baseball don't think we could do it," said Green. "I know in my heart we could do it. I'm so proud. We had so much heart and character. This team can beat anybody in the world."

Mike Schmidt and Larry Bowa, who also had known many disappointments in previous seasons shared the spotlight with Carlton and McGraw in the finale.

Schmidt delivered a two-run single in the third inning of

### Phillies Schmidt Named World Series MVP

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Thinking about the previous 173 games of the regular season, championship playoffs and World Series made Mike Schmidt exhale loudly before the next sip of champagne.

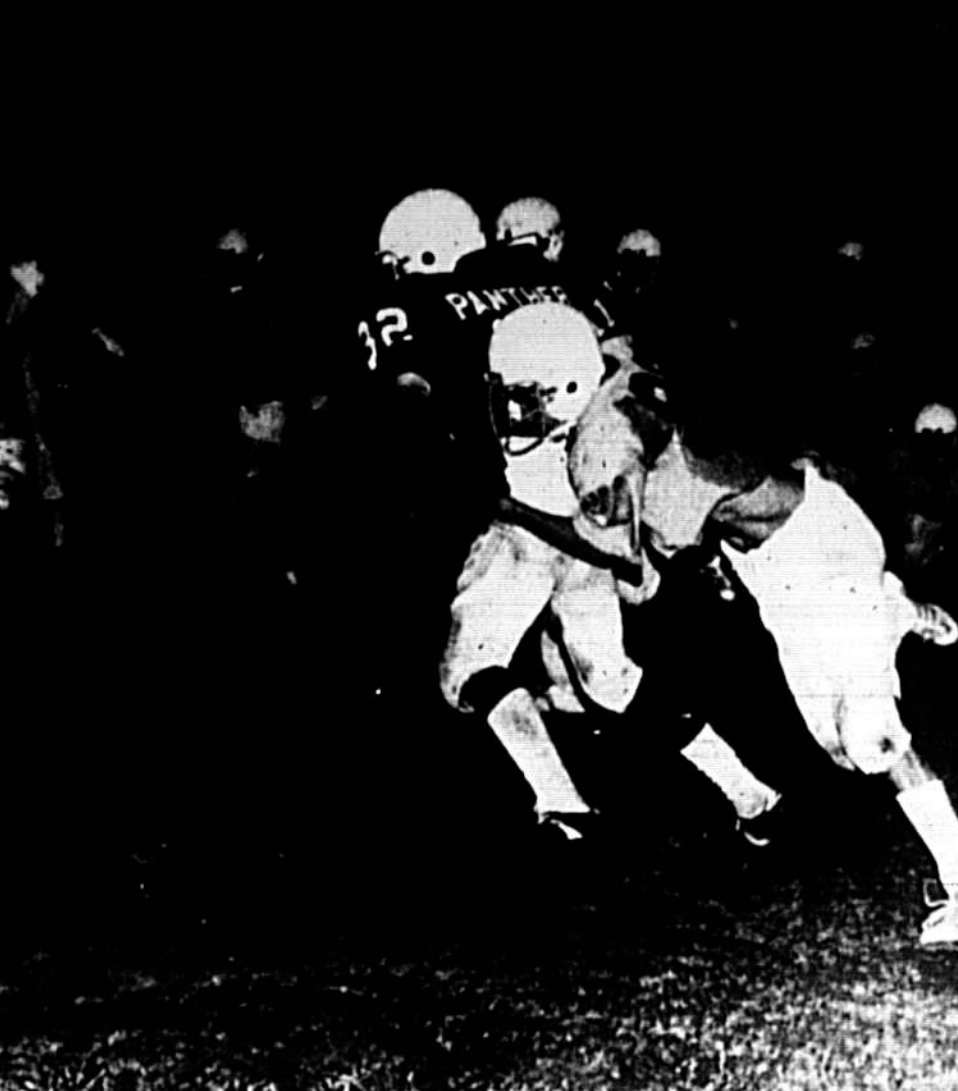

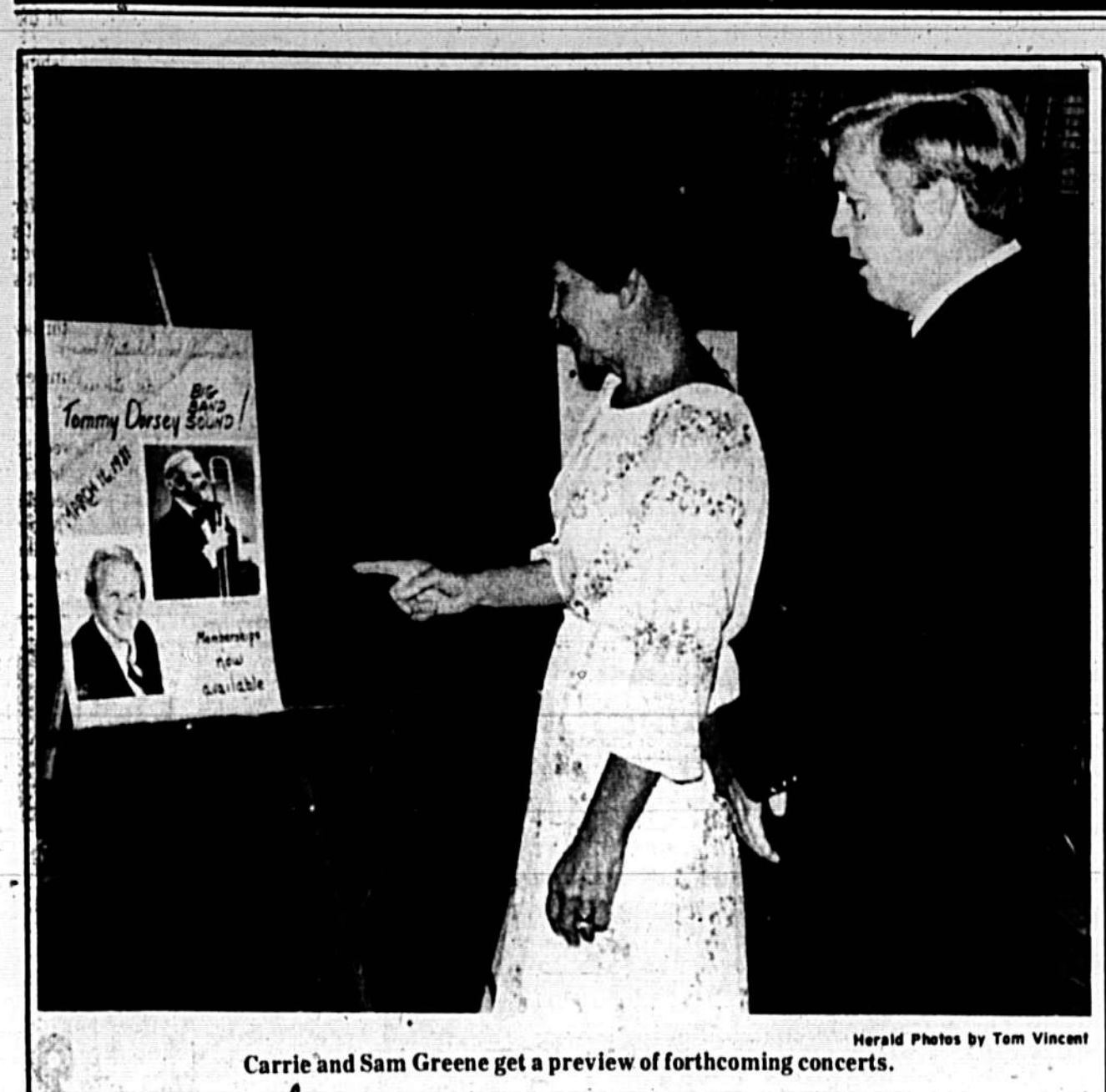

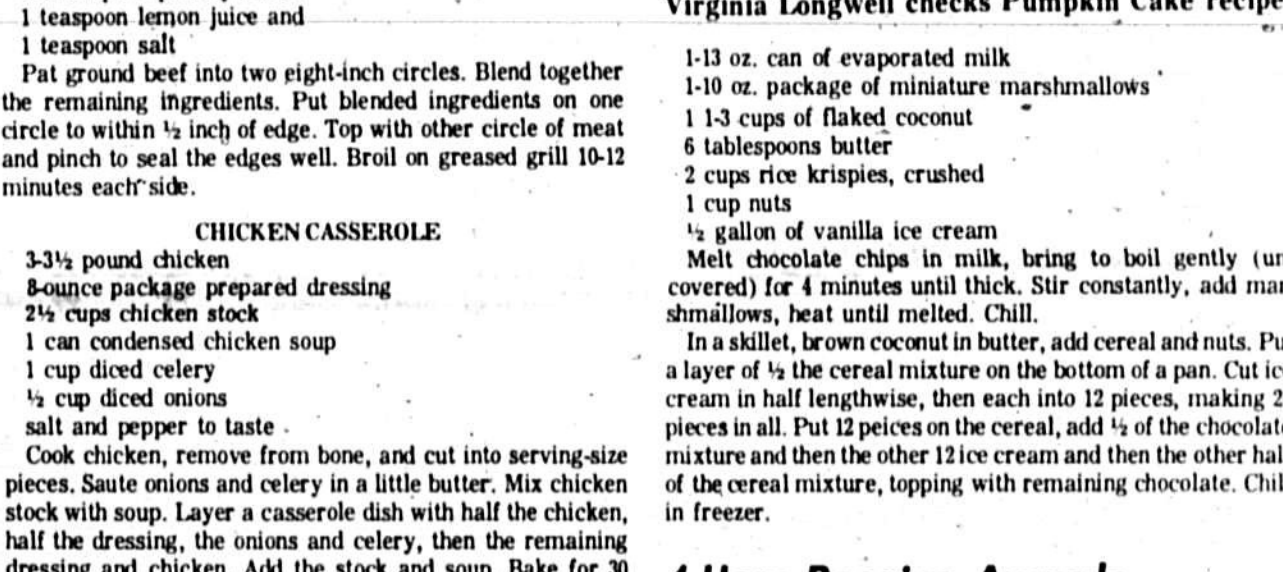

# Ideas For A Complete Meal In Minutes

The hurry-up pace of life today often finds us short on time or just plain too tired to fix elaborate meals. These recipes are for quick-to-fix, nutritious meals with beef that take 20 minutes or less. The result is a home cooked meal served with coffee and goodness. Try them... they may become your favorites, too.

**BEEF-ZUCCHINI 'N' PEPPER KABOBS**  
1 1/2 pounds beef sirloin steak or top, cut into 1 1/2-inch cubes  
1 cup salad oil  
one-third cup red wine vinegar  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon leaf oregano  
1/4 teaspoon cracked black pepper  
1 clove garlic, minced  
3 small mushrooms, cut crosswise into 1-inch pieces  
2 red peppers, each cut into 12 pieces  
Salt  
Combine salad oil, wine vinegar, sugar, oregano, pepper and garlic in small saucepan; cook slowly 10 minutes. Cool. Place beef cubes and marinade in plastic bag or utility dish, turning to coat meat. The bag securely or cover dish and marinate in refrigerator 1 to 2 hours (or overnight). Pour off and reserve marinade. Cut zucchini into 1/2-inch spouts, halfway through each piece of zucchini. Alternately thread beef cubes, red pepper and zucchini pieces on 4 skewers. Brush vegetables with marinade. Place kabobs on rack in broiler pan so surface of meat is 3 to 4 inches from heat. Broil 18 to 20 minutes, depending on doneness desired (rare or medium), turning and brushing with marinade occasionally. Season with salt. 4 servings.

**ITALIAN BEEF SANDWICHES**  
1 pound thinly sliced cooked beef  
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) beef consommé  
1/4 cup catsup  
1 medium onion, cut crosswise in slices  
1 small green pepper, cut in strips  
1 large clove garlic, minced  
1 teaspoon Italian seasoning  
4 to 5 seven-inch pieces French bread, halved lengthwise  
Combine consommé, catsup, water, onion, green pepper, garlic and Italian seasoning in large saucepan. Bring to a boil; add beef, cover lightly and cook slowly 15 minutes. Drain off and reserve cooking liquid; dip cut surfaces of bottom and top halves of bread in the liquid. Place hot beef and vegetables on bottom halves and cover with tops of bread. Serve remaining liquid with sandwiches. 4 to 5 servings.

**SPEEDY SOUP-ER BEEF**  
1 pound ground beef  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon marjoram  
1 can (4 ounces) mushroom pieces and stems  
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1 package (10 ounces) frozen green beans, drained  
2 medium tomatoes  
Cooked noodles or Chinese noodles  
Cook ground beef in large frying-pan until lightly browned; pour off drippings. Sprinkle salt and marjoram over meat; add mushrooms including liquid, mushroom soup and green beans. Cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cut each tomato into 8 wedges; add to mixture and continue cooking 1 to 2 minutes or until heated through. Serve on cooked noodles or Chinese noodles. 4 servings.

**BROILED TOP LOIN STEAKS**  
4 beef top loin steaks, cut 1 to 1 1/2 inches thick  
Salt and pepper  
Place top loin steaks on rack in broiler pan (4-inch steaks, 2 to 3 inches from heat; 1 1/2-inch steaks, 3 to 4 inches from heat). Broil at moderate temperature. When first sides are browned, season with salt and pepper, turn, and finish cooking the second sides. Season. Steaks cut 1 inch thick require 12 to 15 minutes for rare and 18 to 20 minutes for medium. Steaks cut 1 1/2 inches thick require 22 to 25 minutes for rare and 25 to 30 minutes for medium.  
To broil frozen top loin steaks (cut 1 1/2 inches thick), place steaks on rack in broiler pan so that top of steak is 3 inches from the heat. Broil steaks until browned on first side, about 22 minutes; season, turn and finish broiling on the second side. Allow 40 minutes total time for broiling the steaks to rare; 45 minutes for medium.

**CHINESE PEPPER STEAK**  
1 pound top round steak, cut 1/2 to 1 inch thick  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1/4 teaspoon sugar  
1/4 teaspoon ginger  
1/4 cup soy sauce  
2 green peppers  
8 cherry tomatoes, halved  
3 tablespoons cooking oil  
1 clove garlic, minced  
1/4 cup water  
Blanched almonds  
Cooked rice  
Partially freeze steak to firm and slice diagonally across the grain into very thin strips. Combine cornstarch, sugar and ginger; stir in soy sauce. Four mixture over meat and stir. Cut green peppers into thin strips. Quickly brown marinated beef strips (one-third at a time) in hot oil and remove from pan. Reduce heat; add green pepper, garlic and water to pan and cook until green pepper is tender-crisp, 5 to 6 minutes. Stir in meat and tomatoes and heat through. Garnish with blanched almonds, if desired, and serve with cooked rice. 4 servings.

**SALICED CUBED STEAKS**  
4 beef cubed steaks  
1 beef bouillon cube  
1 cup boiling water  
2 tablespoons cooking fat  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/4 cup chili sauce  
1/4 cup sliced pitted olives  
Crush beef bouillon cube, add boiling water, stirring to dissolve. Brown cubed steaks in cooking fat in large frying-pan, 2 minutes on each side. Remove steaks from pan; season with salt and pepper. Stir flour into pan drippings; stir in chili sauce. Gradually add reserved bouillon and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Reduce heat; stir in olives, add steaks and cook slowly 7 to 9 minutes, turning occasionally. Remove steaks to warm platter; serve with sauce. 4 servings.

**FIX-A-FANCY BURGER**  
1 to 1 1/2 pounds ground beef  
Salt and pepper  
Shape ground beef into 4 patties 1/2 inch thick; place on rack in broiler pan so surface of meat is 3 to 4 inches from heat. Broil 8 minutes; season with salt and pepper, turn and broil 7 to 10 minutes (depending upon doneness desired). Season second side. Serve with 1 of the following toppings. 4 servings.  
**TOMATO TOPPING**  
1/2 cup chopped tomato, drained  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup mayonnaise  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Combine tomato, onion, mayonnaise and salt. About 2

minutes before end of broiling time, top each beef patty with about 1 tablespoon tomato mixture. Broil 2 minutes or until mixture is bubbly.

**BUBBLY BLUE CHEESE TOPPING**  
1/2 cup dairy sour cream  
1/4 cup crumbled blue cheese  
Combine sour cream and blue cheese. About 2 minutes before end of broiling time, top each patty with about 3 tablespoons cheese mixture. Broil 2 minutes or until topping is bubbly.

**TANGY TOPPING**  
1/4 cup catsup  
1 tablespoon prepared mustard  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
2 green pepper rings  
2 mushrooms, halved (if desired)  
Combine catsup, mustard and Worcestershire sauce. About 2 minutes before end of broiling time, place a green pepper ring on each beef patty and fill center with catsup mixture. Top each with mushroom half, if desired. Broil 2 minutes.

**ARROZ CON HUEVO**  
1 pound ground beef  
2 cans (15 oz. each) tomato sauce special  
2 cups packaged pre-cooked rice  
1/4 cup water  
2 teaspoons salt  
2 teaspoons chili powder  
1/4 teaspoon cumin  
1/4 teaspoon hot pepper cause  
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
8 eggs  
1/2 red cup (about 1 1/2 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese  
1 medium avocado, peeled and sliced, optional  
In 12-inch electric skillet brown ground beef. Drain off fat. Stir in tomato sauce, rice, water and seasonings. Heat to boiling, then reduce heat and simmer uncovered 5 minutes. Make 8 evenly spaced "nests" in beef-rice mixture. Break an egg into each nest. Cover and cook until eggs are desired degree of doneness, about 3 to 7 minutes. Sprinkle cheese on top of eggs. Garnish with avocado slices, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

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## Doughnut Dividends Delicious

Savvy cooks treasure recipes that please the family and save money. When a recipe yields something in addition to that, some cooks refer to it as a recipe that pays dividends. The accompanying recipe for Doughnuts is such a recipe. The holes from the doughnuts are used to make Pecan Rolls. The procedure goes like this: 1/4 cup warm water (100 degrees F-115 degrees F.)  
2 packages active yeast  
two-thirds cup sugar  
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) softened margarine  
1 egg (at room temperature)  
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) softened margarine  
1 egg (at room temperature)  
4 or 5 cups unbleached flour

**DOUGHNUTS-PECAN ROLLS**  
(Makes 30 doughnuts and 6 rolls)  
1 cup warm water (100 degrees F-115 degrees F.)  
2 packages active yeast  
two-thirds cup sugar  
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) softened margarine  
1 egg (at room temperature)  
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) softened margarine  
1 egg (at room temperature)  
4 or 5 cups unbleached flour

1/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar  
2 tablespoons margarine  
18 pecan halves  
peanut oil  
Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle in active dry yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in sugar, salt, potatoes, 1/4 cup margarine, egg and 2 cups flour; beat until smooth. Stir in enough additional flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, 8 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.  
Meanwhile, combine light brown sugar, corn syrup and remaining 2 tablespoons margarine in saucepan. Heat, stirring, until margarine melts and mixture is smooth. Divide evenly among six greased 2-1/2 x 1-1/2 inch muffin pans. Arrange 3 pecan halves in bottom of each cup; set aside.  
Punch dough down; turn out onto lightly floured board. Roll dough out to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut with a 2-inch doughnut cutter. Place doughnuts on greased baking sheets. Arrange 5 doughnuts in each muffin cup. Herd and cut scraps of dough. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Bake rolls at 350 degrees F. about 20 minutes or until done. Immediately invert rolls onto a plate to cool.  
Fry doughnuts in deep hot (375 degrees F.) peanut oil for 1 minute on each side. Drain on paper towels.

Especially good for parties, brown bagging for work or school lunches is a crunchy cocoa almond combination. It's easy to make, and when cooked is cut into squares. If you fall off the food wagon, top your cocoa almond pumpkin squares with a dollop of whipped cream or ice cream. (COCOA ALMOND)

**PUMPKIN SQUARES**  
1 cup flour  
1/2 cup quick-cooking oatmeal  
1/2 cup soft butter or margarine  
2 cups cooked and mashed fresh pumpkin or canned pumpkin  
1 can (11 ounces) evaporated milk  
3 eggs  
1 1/4 cup brown sugar  
2 tablespoons cocoa  
1/4 cup water  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon each ground ginger and cloves  
1/2 cup chopped natural (unblanched) almonds  
2 tablespoons soft butter or margarine, additional  
Whipped cream (optional)  
Chocolate decoys (optional)  
Make the crust by combining the flour, quick-cooking oatmeal and 1/2 cup butter. Mix until crumbly. Pat into 9-by-13-inch baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes.  
Meanwhile, make the filling by combining the pumpkin, milk, eggs, 1/4 cup brown sugar, cocoa, salt and spices in mixing bowl. Beat until well blended. Pour into crust. Continue baking at 350 degrees another 25 minutes.  
For the topping, combine the almonds, 1/4 cup brown sugar and 2 tablespoons butter. Mix well and sprinkle over filling. Bake another 20 to 25 minutes at 350 degrees until filling is set but still soft. Cool in pan.  
Cut into squares and dollop with whipped cream, if you wish. (ORANGE BAYLIAN)

# Game: Try Market If Hunter Misses Target

Game bird farms and restocking of pheasants in rural areas make this succulent bird more available than ever. Many specialty meat shops carry this game bird year-round, fresh or frozen, and it comes cured, too. Yet, it's really a treat when someone in the family brings home the bird from a successful shooting in the neighboring fields.

There are many ways to prepare pheasant, but it is delicious when baked. Pheasant makes a rich entree. Stuff with a mixture of long grain-wild rice pecans and apples and bake with apple cider and butter.

## PIKASANT WITH WILD RICE AND APPLE DRESSING

- 1 package (6 ounce) long grain and wild rice mix
- 1/4 cup apple cider
- 1/2 cup bacon
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped apples
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pheasant (1 1/2 to 3 pounds)
- 4 slices fatty bacon
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted

Prepare rice mix according to package directions, substituting apple cider for half the water. Set aside. In medium fry pan, cook bacon until fat is rendered (melted down). Add onion and saute until translucent. Slice in apples, pecans and seasonings; cook for 2 minutes. Combine apple mixture and rice; set aside.

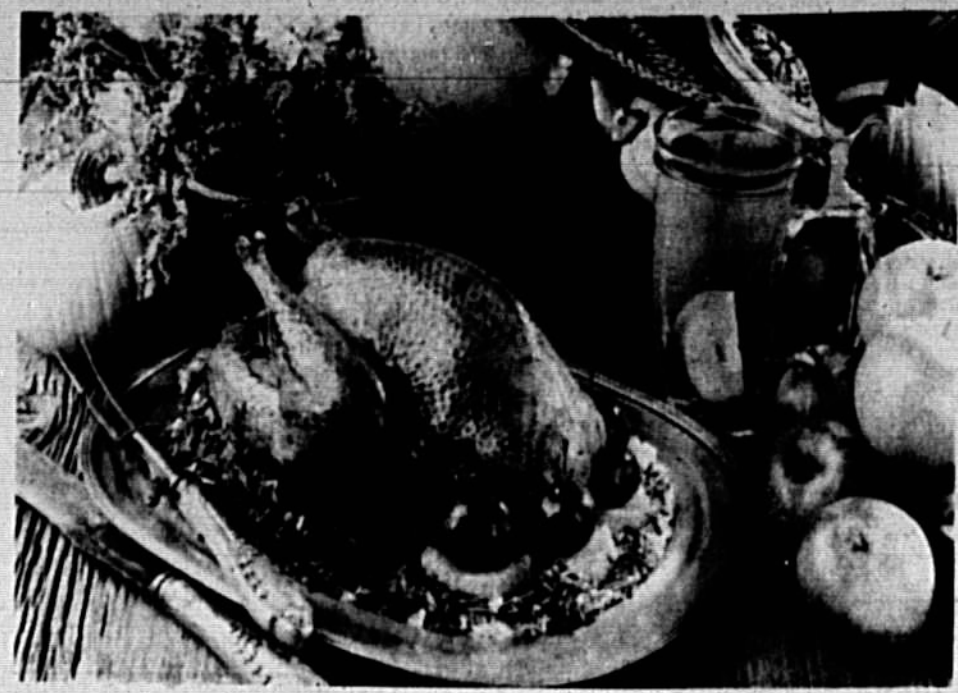
Remove any remaining pin feathers from the bird, rinse and pat dry inside and out with paper towels. Stuff cavity loosely with rice stuffing mixture. Close the cavity with trailing skewers or pins. Tie the legs together and tuck the wings under the body. Cover the breast and legs of the bird with bacon. Place bird in shallow, open pan; roast at 350 degrees, 20 minutes per pound or until internal temperature on meat thermometer is 180 degrees. Place remaining stuffing in a greased covered casserole and bake in oven for last hour of cooking. Baste bird every 20 minutes with melted butter. Remove bacon last 30 minutes of cooking time to allow pheasant to brown. Serve pheasant on a bed of wild rice and garnish with spiced crab apples and orange slices. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 2 to 3 servings.

(A roasting chicken may be substituted.)

## ACORN SQUASH PUREE

- 1 medium-size acorn squash
- 1/4 cup light cream
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon bourbon, optional
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Cut squash in half and remove seeds. Place cut side down on baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes, or until tender. Scoop out pulp. Place pulp and remaining ingredients in blender or food processor. Blend until mixture is smooth. Reheat if necessary in double boiler. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 4 servings.

This unique presentation is so named because the raw tuber is sliced nearly, but not completely through and pieces of ham — or any other meat on hand — are wedged between the slices. When baked, the sweetpotato fans out in a beautiful display. The edges are crisply browned, the centers appealingly tender. A luscious cheesy-mustard sauce tops each serving of this hearty, honey dish.

## FANNED YAMS AND HAM

- 4 medium-size North Carolina yams
- 1/4 cup sliced cooked ham (about 8 slices)
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon dried leaf tarragon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Place yam on a wooden spoon large enough to cradle it. Slice down into 4 slices. (The curved bowl of the spoon will prevent the knife from slicing completely through the yam.) Place yams in a 9x13-inch baking pan. Cover with aluminum foil and bake in a 425 degree F. oven 25 minutes. Remove from oven. Slice each piece of ham in half. Fold each half into a triangular shape. Place ham triangle in each yam pocket. Return to oven. Bake 30 minutes longer or until yams are tender. Meanwhile, in a medium saucepan, melt butter; stir in flour; cook, stirring constantly, 2 minutes. Remove from heat; gradually stir in milk. Return to heat, stirring constantly until sauce boils and thickens. Stir in cheese, mustard, tarragon and salt; continue stirring until cheese melts. Spoon over yams. Makes 2 servings.

## Record Number Appealing Taxes

Formal complaints about property tax assessments have increased from about 50 last year to nearly 300 this year, Seminole County Property Appraiser Bill Suter said today.

Suter said 242 petitions for reassessment have been filed as of this morning and he expects the number to reach 300 when all mailed in petitions arrive.

Although some of the 300 are expected to be withdrawn after the appraisal department reviews them, Suter said the Property Appraisal Adjustment Board will probably handle a record number of petitions.

The board will hold an organizational meeting Friday, he said. He said the first topic will be consideration of the hiring of special masters to hear individual appeals.

Suter said the special masters would be qualified professional people in the appraisal business. But the board would decide to rule on the petitions itself, he said.

The Property Appraisal Adjustment Board is made up of three county commissioners and two school board members. Serving on the board are Seminole County commissioners Sandra Olsen, Richard Williams and Bob Sturm and Seminole County School Board members Alan Keeth and Roland Williams.

Suter said he would not blame the state directive to assess the appraisal department reviews them, Suter said the Property Appraisal Adjustment Board will probably handle a record number of petitions.

He termed the petitions "normal occurrences" when people believe their property has been valued too high for one reason or another.

He acknowledged that some tax rates were adjusted upward drastically due to market value change.



## Sub-Compacts Get 'Brake' From State

The state Division of Motor Vehicles recently revised vehicle inspection criteria for judging brakes on sub-compact cars with front wheel drive.

The revision was in response to numerous complaints of sub-compact owners that their brakes failed inspection although their car dealers could find nothing wrong with them, according to Gary Kaiser, Seminole County public safety director.

The county operates motor vehicle inspection stations under state supervision and regulation.

Kaiser said the new light-weight cars with X-brake braking systems were failing the tests that were developed before such cars were manufactured.

But the state announced a new procedure to be used in the event such cars fail the regular braking test.

The regular test involves driving onto the testing machine pads and slamming on the brakes.

If the sub-compact fails to achieve a satisfactory rating, the state advises the car be driven on to the testing machine and stopped by applying the emergency or parking brake.

If the vehicle stops and attains a good reading on the test, this indicates that the mechanical portion of the brakes system is functioning properly and is most likely adjusted correctly.

Kaiser said the new light-weight cars with X-brake braking systems were failing the tests that were developed before such cars were manufactured.

But the state announced a new procedure to be used in the event such cars fail the regular braking test.

## Abduction Victim Suffers Trauma

Sanford and Seminole county detectives today are continuing their investigation into the abduction and possible rape of a Sanford woman Wednesday morning.

But the victim, who may hold the key to their investigation, has been unable to give them any help.

Deputies said the 35-year-old woman is still suffering from the trauma of the incident. Doctors said deputies today she will not be able to be interviewed until Friday at the earliest.

The victim is listed in fair condition today at Seminole Memorial Hospital, suffering from the shock of her ordeal but not from physical injuries, a spokeswoman said.

Police said the woman was abducted Wednesday at 6 a.m., when she left her home, apparently by two men who had hidden in her car.

About 10 minutes after she went out the door of her home, a woman who shares the house received a call from her.

The victim said only that she had been kidnapped by the two men, police said, adding they have no idea why she was allowed to make the call, or from where the call was made.

Shortly after 10 a.m. a woman living on Emmett Road in Paola, about four miles west of Sanford south of State Road 46, reported a woman lying on the road in front of her home.

Deputies found the kidnap victim, dazed and in a state of shock, about 300 yards from her car.

The keys to the car and a small handgun were found inside on the floor, and both the driver's and passenger's doors were ajar, deputies reported.

Assistant Medical Examiner Sam Irrigang said Wednesday afternoon the woman probably was sexually assaulted before she was left lying in Paola.

The victim is listed in satisfactory condition today at Seminole Memorial Hospital, suffering from the shock of her ordeal but not from physical injuries, a spokeswoman said.

## Iran Raises Hope For Hostages

LONDON (UPI) — Iran's prime minister says the United States is ready to accept Ayatollah Khomeini's conditions for the release of the American hostages, raising hopes that the 52 captives may be released as early as Monday after nearly a year under guard.

In Washington, the State Department would neither confirm nor deny the reports.

The sign of a possible break in the year-long crisis came from Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai in a Tehran news conference Wednesday. Rajai said he believes the United States is ready to accept Khomeini's four conditions for the release of the hostages held 30 days, but stressed their fate ultimately must be decided by Iran's parliament. A parliament debate on the hostages is scheduled for Sunday.

Khomeini's conditions were return of the late shah's wealth, freeing more than \$8 billion of Iranian assets frozen in American-owned banks, a pledge not to interfere in Iranian affairs, and an American promise not to make any claims against Iran as a result of the hostage issue.

## 60 Dead At School

ORTUELLA, Spain (UPI) — A powerful explosion apparently triggered by gas ripped through a grade school in Spain's Basque country today and authorities said more than 60 people were killed, most of them young school children.

At least 150 other children and teachers were injured, officials said.

Authorities said 2 1/2 hours after the blast the death toll was 62, mostly children between the ages of 6 and 12, in the blast that virtually destroyed the Colegio Marjaret Ugaldes, west of the Vizcaya Province capital of Bilbao, just before the noon recess.

Frenzied parents dug through the wreckage with their bare hands while rescue crews shifted chunks of walls and ceiling, weighing hundreds of pounds to try to reach the victims.

Authorities said almost every family in the town had a child in the school, a group of three three-story buildings constructed about 10 years ago.

Witnesses said the scene looked like something out of Dante's "Inferno."

The force of the explosion, apparently located directly under the main classroom, lifted the building from its foundations and hurled some of the victims yards away.

Parents who lived nearby ran to the school. Those who found the lifeless bodies of their children carried them home.

Witnesses said they could hear the cries of the trapped as they worked to reach them.

Authorities said it appeared a tank of propane gas exploded, possibly touching off a boiler explosion. They said they had discounted any possibility of a bomb.

It is impossible that anyone could have been capable of something so brutal, a provincial spokesman said.

Munoz and the nearby town of Santurce make up a municipality of 8,897 people.

## School Board Looks For Help Against Feds

The Seminole County School Board will be sending a letter to U.S. congressmen, senators, the president and the Florida School Board Association to protest the bilingual education program.

At its meeting at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Superintendent William Layer said scores from the Florida State Wide Assessment Test showing foreign students do well in the district will be reported.

A letter received by Layer Monday from Lamar Clements, director of elementary and secondary division in the office of Civil Rights, stated the district must adhere to the recommendations by Friday or "we will initiate appropriate administrative enforcement action."

District member Pat Telson made the motion to write a letter to Washington and "tell them what is happening at the local level with the program."

District member Robert Feather agreed to say, "The federal government goes overboard to subsidize anyone that isn't normal. What's happening to the American student?"

The motion was passed on a 4 to 1 vote with Roland Williams dissenting. Williams said more evidence should be sent besides the test scores.

In other business the board: — voted to advertise for bids for an architect who would be designing a new addition to the county office to house computer equipment.

## 3 Agencies Investigating Auto-Train

SANFORD, Fla. (UPI) — The financial activities of Auto-Train Corp. under the management of its former chairman are being investigated by three federal agencies, a company spokesman said Wednesday.

The FBI, the Securities and Exchange Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission began a probe into possible federal law violations shortly after the company entered bankruptcy proceedings in early September.

In papers filed in bankruptcy court this week, Auto-Train said the violations "may have occurred under the management" of former chairman, Eugene Garfield.

Company spokesman Tom Tucker could not say whether federal agencies were investigating Garfield's activities as chairman.

Federal officials would not comment on the investigation.

A court order Monday ousted Garfield, Auto-Train's founder, from his position as chairman when the court-appointed trustee asked a bankruptcy judge to fire him.

Murray Drabkin, the trustee, said unless Garfield's employment contract was terminated, Auto-Train would be liable for any legal fees Garfield incurred stemming from the investigations.

Nine years ago, Garfield, 44, parlayed a \$65 bank account and an idea into the multimillion dollar Auto-Train Corp.
