## COOLIDGE GETS FARM AID BILL FROM SOLOME

House Passes Measure Last Night By A 215-178 Vote After Spectacular Fight Lasing Over Nine Hours

### Washington Awaits President's Action

Political Observer Sees In  
Coolidge's View An Answer  
To Third Term Candidacy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Congress laid a swaddling infant—the \$250,000,000 McNary-Haugen farm relief bill—on the doorstep of President Coolidge today.

The young man was clasped with political dynamite and yelled long for a chance in life. Mr. Coolidge was given the task of untangling the child or turning it back to Congress.

Administration supporters were sharply divided in their predictions. The majority opinion is that he will veto the bill. Those who believe in its veto pronounce the bill as a dangerous experiment which would put the government in the farming business.

Sponsors of the bill, on the other hand, declare that Mr. Coolidge has left the problem to Congress and thereby was virtually pledged to sign it.

Political observers saw in Mr. Coolidge's action an answer to the riddle of 1928. Adoption of the bill they asserted would be tantamount to a declaration of his candidacy for the next Republican presidential nomination.

With the middle west aroused over the farm relief problem it is to be expected that the stock of other presidential aspirants, Gov. Frank O. Lowden of Illinois and Vice-President Charles G. Dawes, will be predicted.

An alternative course open to the President is to permit the bill to become a law without his signature but few believe he will adopt so negative a course.

The bill was passed last night by the House, 214 to 179, after a spectacular fight of nine hours in which the farm blue road won all.

800 Visit Sanford

**Davis Files Briefs In Florida Fight Against Increase In Freight Rates**

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Feb. 18.—(INS)—Florida's state railroad commissioners fight against any increase in class rates covering the transportation of goods from Florida to other points in the United States after it is decided before the United States Interstate Commerce Commission, commission by Fred H. Davis, attorney for the railroads, he announced today.

Earlier this year, the Atlantic Coast Line and the Standard Air Line, East Coast railway company, filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission, seeking reversion of the previous decision of the commission which materially reduced the class rates south of the state line.

In these petitions, the carriers contend that owing to conditions prevailing in Florida, they should be allowed 51 per cent higher rates in that state on classified commodities than those paid by the other states owing to the fact that Florida was a terminal state and the railroads had to bear extensive increases in their railroads.

The railroad commissioners answer, this contention by showing that Florida's revenue had materially increased during the past year while those received from other portions of the carriers' line do not show any increase or growth of any increase in rates which were used today by Waddell Catchings of New York, a tanker agent of the U.S. Board of Tax Appeals, which has been held up \$3,000,000 since same-judge tax suit.
