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# Gov. Burns Reluctant

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Haydon Burns thinks capital punishment is a necessary deterrent for murder but doubts the justice of invoking the death penalty for rape.

The Miami Herald said the Governor will refuse to sign a death warrant for the execution of anyone convicted of rape as long as there is any chance that the U.S. Supreme Court might outlaw the death penalty for rape.

There are 12 men on death row at Raiford now awaiting the carrying out of the death penalty for rape.

But Burns won't set an execution date, the paper said, until the U.S. Court rules or disposes of an appeal in the case of one of them, William Benjamin Craig, of Tallahassee.

His case is pending in the State Supreme Court and his attorney said he'll go to the U.S. Supreme Court. His argument is that the death penalty exceeds the enormity of the crime of rape and amounts to cruel and unusual punishment in violation of the federal Constitution. Craig also contends it is used in a discriminatory way.

Burns was quoted as saying that rape is a heinous crime but he has doubts as to whether it justifies the supreme penalty.

Governor Burns, who has not signed a death warrant since he took office, said his legal staff will study each case to make sure all legal procedures have been carried

out and the individual has had all consideration under the law before he'll sign a death warrant in the cases of 33 men on death row for murder.

He said he does not oppose capital punishment for murder but is "reluctant as any other religious man would be to take a part in taking life."

But as Governor, he said, he will carry out the law.

A legislative committee studying the death penalty recommended at its final meeting Saturday that it be retained for rape as well as murder.

But the committee suggested that punishment should be

separated from the question of guilt and recommended the two-state trial procedure.

It voted 10-3 to retain capital punishment for all crimes for which it is now invoked, including kidnaping for ransom, bombing, machine-gunning in a public place, rape and murder.

## Voters Support Mayor, Boost Marina Project

LAKE WORTH — (Sp1) — An \$8 million marina project on the intracoastal waterway here received a boost Tuesday when Mayor Richard A. Carpenter won re-election over former mayor James Spafford.

In a bitter campaign which centered around which developer would be awarded a design for the project, Carpenter won out over Spafford 1,928 votes to 1,662. Carpenter backed Developer Andrew Gould of Hollywood, who already has spent approximately \$30,000 on studies of the marina project. Gould represents one of five groups that have been competing for the 99-year lease on the marina which will be built on a 12-acre waterway site.

Officials here viewed Carpenter's re-election as an indication that work on the marina project would begin this summer. Incumbent City Commissioner George Ingersoll, who had opposed the marina, came out top man in a four-way race but must face a run off. Ingersoll led the voting with 1,610 votes compared to 1,785 total for his three opponents. Martin V. Campbell, who backed the marina project, came in a distant second to Ingersoll with 612 votes. Ingersoll and Campbell face each other in a runoff election.

## Seminole Sales Up 23 Per Cent

Seminole County posted a whopping 23.8 per cent gain in retail sales in January, according to the Florida Retail Federation report, released today. The county had sales of \$7.79 million this year as compared to \$6.2 million in January, 1964. Seminole led most of the other counties in the area in percentage of gain. Orange County had a gain of 13.5 per cent and Volusia had a 11.8 per cent advance.

## Fire Damages 9th St. Home

A fire caused minor damage to a frame house at 509 East Ninth Street today, the Sanford fire department reported. Firemen saved the kitchen and utility porch of the dwelling was damaged extensively. Cause of the fire was not determined. The property is owned by Hanson Jackson.

## Won't Be 'Second Fiddle'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The cabinet told the federal government Florida won't approve any matching funds for economic opportunities programs as long as the state is forced to continue playing second fiddle to local governments. In a strong resolution, the Cabinet said Florida is being by-passed and ignored in negotiations involving the federal Economic Opportunity Act. The resolution said the Office of Economic Opportunity has been dealing directly with communities despite the fact that many programs require the governor's approval as well as matching funds from the state. Copies of the resolution were sent to both Florida senators, Spgaard Holland and George Smathers. Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Anthony J. Celebrezze and OEO Director Sargent Shriver. During its regular meeting, the Cabinet learned that in one instance federal officials asked the Florida prison director if he wished to start a federally-financed program for under-age school children—a type of program not even remotely connected with state prisons.

## Aerial Opposition Cited

SAIGON (UPI) — The Saigon government reported today that unidentified enemy aircraft attempted to intercept South Vietnamese fighter bombers during Tuesday's massive air strike against Communist North Viet Nam. It was the first report of any aerial opposition over North Vietnamese territory. A dispatch distributed by Viet Nam Press, the official South Vietnamese news agency, said Vietnamese Skyraider pilots reported they saw "three strange planes coming from the north." The report stated the pilots saw the planes "obviously intended to head off" the Vietnamese aircraft after they had bombed a big North Vietnamese naval installation at Quang Khe on the coast of the South China Sea. Our fighter bombers apparently did not detect them off," the report said. The Vietnamese planes were escorted by U. S. F-100 jets. South Viet Nam is known to have an air force of at least 25 Soviet-built MiG jet fighters. The government report did not indicate whether the planes seen Tuesday were jets or propeller-powered. At a briefing Tuesday night a U. S. Air Force spokesman said there was no indication of North Vietnamese aircraft during the raid on Quang Khe or the American strike of an ammunition dump at Xom Bang just north of the border between the two Viet Nams.

The \$2 bills will be valid only on the banks on Friday from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. and from 3:30 to 8 p. m. Hand made the report before a six-state conference and community development workshop at Florida A&M University. Hand said a total of \$5.6 million was pending for the state under the opportunity act, the big gun in the President's "war on poverty." Hand said his office works under the governor to coordinate federal-state action.

## Bulletin

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — All nine members of the State Board of Regents named by former Gov. Farris Bryant resigned this afternoon, saying their usefulness was "relatively short-lived" because of Gov. Haydon Burns' promise to replace them. The resignations were made effective immediately. The board said it felt that the interest of higher education in the state would be better better by stepping aside, so that Burns may name his own board without delay.

## Oviedo Chief Faces Probe In Shooting

By Paul Brookshire Suspension of Oviedo Police Chief George Kelsey was urged today by the Florida NAACP pending an investigation into the shooting of an Oviedo youth. The youth, Thomas Wilson Jr. was listed in "satisfactory condition at Winter Park Memorial Hospital this morning. Wilson, 17, an end on the Oviedo High School football team this last season was shot in the stomach Friday as he was being arrested outside of an Oviedo store on a traffic charge. Kelsey said the shooting was accidental. He said Wilson grabbed his nightstick hit him with it and then attempted to take his pistol away from him. In the tussle, Kelsey said, the pistol went off and the bullet struck Wilson. Deputy J. Q. Shind Galloway, investigating the shooting for the Seminole Sheriff's Department, said today that witnesses to the shooting verified Kelsey's account of the fracas. Galloway said his investigation indicated Wilson was resisting arrest. The NAACP contends that Wilson had offered no resistance to an officer who was taking him into custody on a traffic charge. The civil rights group said the shooting occurred after Kelsey stepped between the youth and the officer and allegedly hit Wilson with a nightstick. Robert W. Saunders, Tampa Florida field director of the NAACP, said he sent a telegram to Gov. Haydon Burns, U. S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katz and the Civil Rights Commission at Washington asking a probe into what he called an "unwarranted beating and shooting" of the Wilson youth. According to Kelsey, Wilson was stopped Feb. 3 for operating a car without a driver's license. He failed to appear in court and later was charged with affray and fined \$100 bond. Kelsey said the youth was stopped again Friday and still did not have a driver's license.

## Storms Batter Great Plains

United Press International One of the most prolonged storms of the winter battered parts of the Great Plains with non-lizzard intensity again today. Rising rivers forced hundreds of families from their homes. Snow was falling from Texas to Minnesota. Heavy rain fell from Michigan to the Carolinas while a blizzard of thunderstorms dumped more than two inches of rain on sections of Florida. The upper Midwest and Plains bore the brunt of the storm, with blizzard warnings posted again for the northern Dakota and western Minnesota.

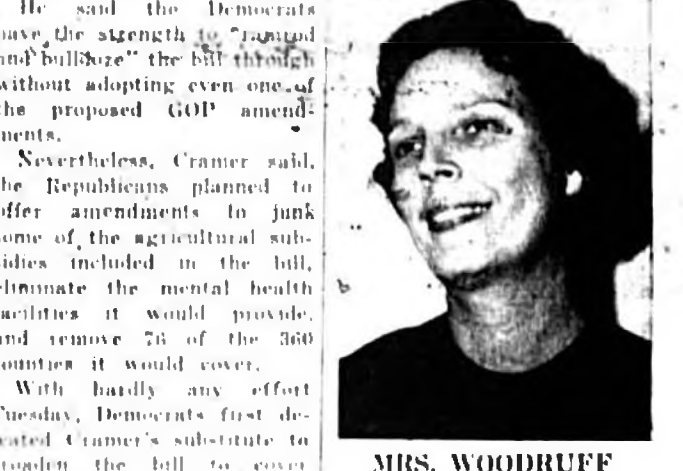
## Rusk, Red Envoy In Asia Parley

WASHINGTON (UPI) — While the war went on in Viet Nam one possibly important element in that conflict was quietly being played out in a mahogany-paneled office here in Washington. Secretary of State Dean Rusk summoned Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin to his office for a talk lasting more than an hour, mostly on Southeast Asia.

## Appalachia OK Likely

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Democratic leaders confidently expected to send to President Johnson today the first big bill of his "Great Society" program — the \$1.1 billion Appalachian aid measure. The bill, aimed at rejuvenating the sagging economy of the mountainous 11-state region, already has been approved by the Senate.

Its supporters predicted it would pass the House today unchanged, thus avoiding a time-consuming conference to resolve differences. Rep. Robert E. Jones Jr. (D-Ala.), who has been shepherding the measure through the House, said he had the votes to turn back any of a number of Republican-sponsored amendments to the bill. Rep. William C. Cramer (R-Fla.), who sponsored a GOP alternative to the bill which went down to defeat Tuesday, agreed with Jones. He said the Democrats have the strength to "pass and pullsize" the bill through without adopting even one of the proposed GOP amendments. Nevertheless, Cramer said, the Republicans planned to offer amendments to junk some of the agricultural subsidies included in the bill, eliminate the mental health facilities it would provide, and remove 25 of the 300 counties it would cover. With hardly any effort Tuesday, Democrats first defeated Cramer's substitute to broaden the bill to cover other poverty areas, then quickly rejected four other GOP efforts to limit its scope in Appalachia. Primary emphasis in the administration bill is on an \$800 million, five-year program to build or develop ponds into the isolated valleys of the picturesque but poor mountain area stretching from northern Pennsylvania to northern Alabama. Other funds would go for vocational education, health facilities, agricultural improvement subsidies, soil erosion and timber development projects. 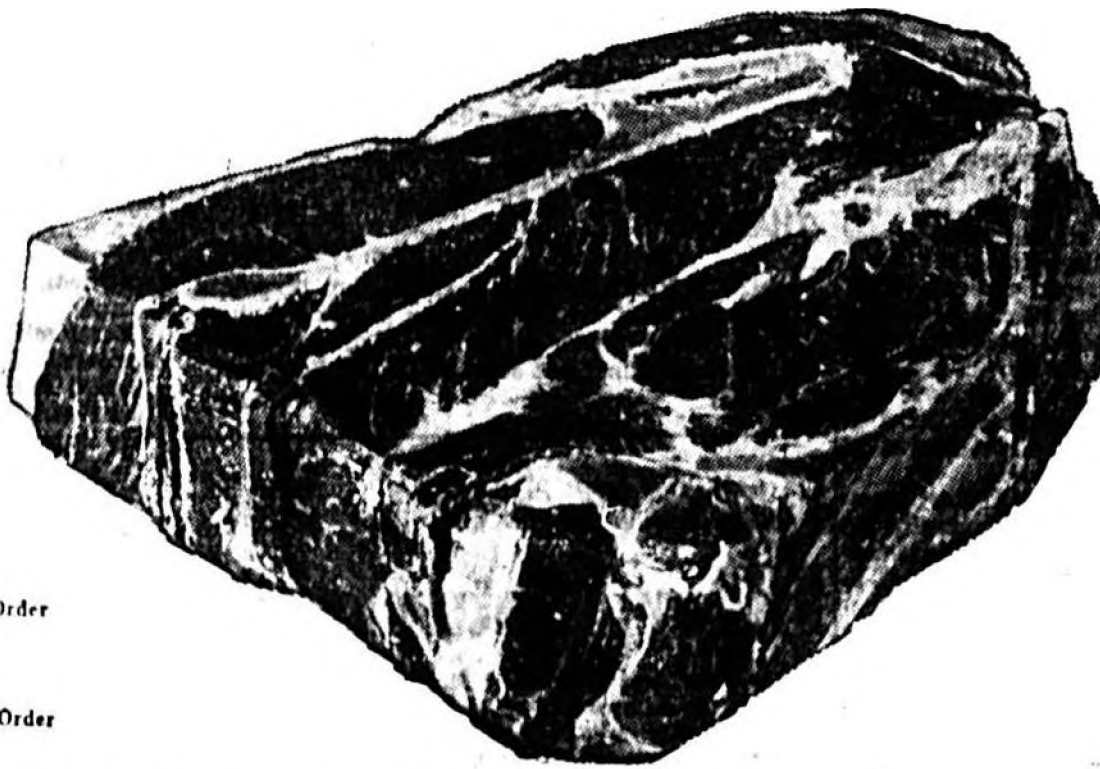

This dedicated person and her staff have developed happy and socially adjusted young boys who come to them for help and comfort in the whole world.

Yes, this is the creation of the faith and hard work of Mrs. Ruby (Mother) Wilson and her church, and the faith and many friends in Sanford.

The 11 a. m. service was spiritually conducted by the Young People's department of St. James AME Church last Sunday.

Many presentations from visitors, visiting clubs and representatives of organizations from Groves High School, Hooper Elementary and the Girl Scout unit of Sanford were skillfully shared. Each presentation a spiritual uplift was in keeping with the theme, "Starting All Good Things."

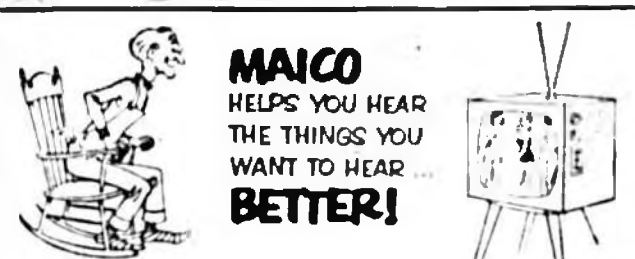

The total cost of the Miami project will be \$310,000; the federal share will be \$229,200.

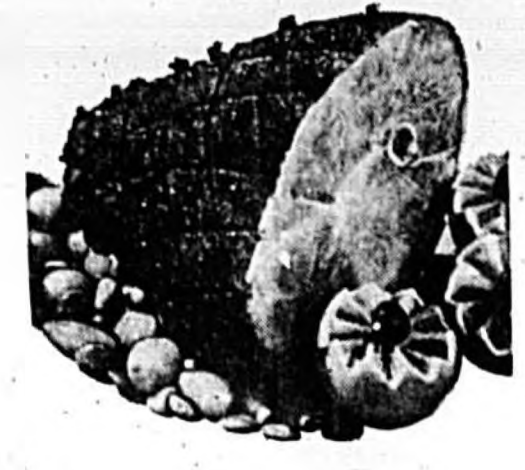

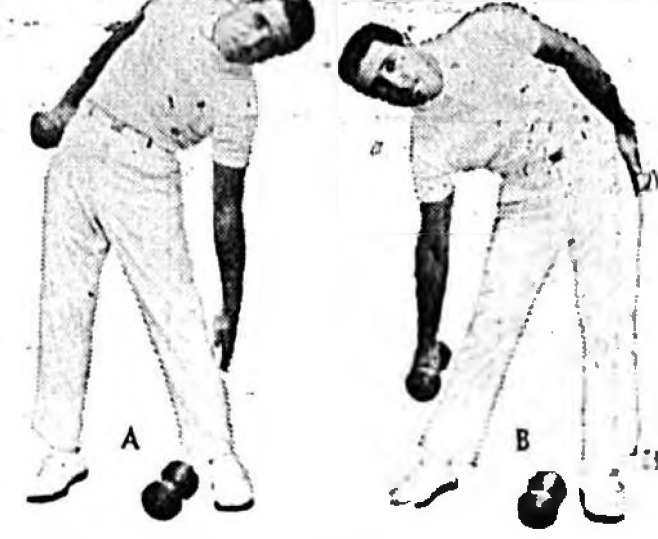

Hence, he plays dummy's ace of trumps followed by three rounds of diamonds. He ruffs the third diamond with dummy's three of trumps and is faced with the problem of getting back to his own hand to play some more trumps.

### We The Women:

Parents can't always prevent the teen-age marriage of a son or daughter. But many such marriages would be prevented if parents would start in early to discourage the idea.

The first step in the long campaign is for parents not to rush their children into boy-girl parties, or to think that a little girl's talking about her "boy friend" is just too cute for words.

The second step is to discourage a son or daughter from "going steady" at 15 or 16 instead of shrugging it off with, "I don't approve, but what can you do about it?"

The third step is to let a child know that you EXPECT

him to complete his education before he thinks seriously about marriage.

The fourth step is to ask the same question every time your son or daughter mentions that some young couple, still in high school, has run off to get married.

That question is: "What are they going to live on?"

The fifth—and perhaps the most important—step is to make it quite clear to your sons and daughters that once they marry, they are on their own.

Parents sometimes have to back down on this, but it is surprising how much less glamorous teen-age marriage

looks to the young person who has been brought up on the idea that when he marries he is on his own, in comparison to the one who assumes that mom and dad will support him as long as necessary.

We hear a lot today about the need for marriage training for young people.

The most important marriage training young people can get is to have it impressed upon them at an early age that marriage means responsibility.

Let them know that no two young people have a right to marriage until they are able to go it alone, without assistance from their parents.

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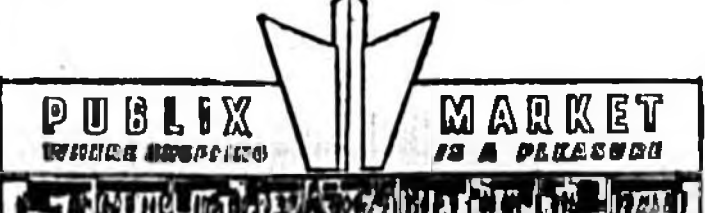

## Pros, Cons Voiced In Letters To LBJ

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Backstairs at the White House: President Johnson receives between 27,000 and 42,000 letters a week. They range from expressions of protest or approval on Viet Nam policy to requests for daughter Luci's autograph.

With a mail flood of such dimensions the correspondence section of the White House is kept hopping.

Past presidents have permitted disclosure of topics covered in these letters, of per-

centages of mail for and against a certain action, and even of random samplings of letters by newsmen.

Johnson won't permit this. He had a similar ban when he was vice president, senator and congressman, according to Press Secretary George E. Reedy.

"On subject matter," Reedy told reporters the other day, "I am still following the rule, which the President has followed for many years, which is that he considers mail to him or to the White House to be a question of communication to him or to the government which is not for public release."

Reedy has provided a few statistics about the letter inflow. He had been reluctant to give the figures in the past, but he opened the subject by reporting that Johnson had directed his cabinet to give "quicker and more responsive answers" to White House mail referred to their departments.

"There is a tendency in government with people who are handling a great volume of mail to take the path of least resistance, which is that of coming through with a rather unresponsive form," Reedy confessed, "and the President is quite anxious that this mail be handled in such a way that the people who do write will get full answers and will get them speedily."

A reporter—perhaps one of those who had been trying unsuccessfully to get information about Johnson's mail statistics for several months—asked Reedy:

"George, in view of the President's directive on the subject, would it be better, perhaps, if some of our questions were submitted by mail?"

"I'll let you decide that," Reedy replied, only half-smiling.

## Luci Johnson To Be A Nurse

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson disclosed his daughter Luci, 17, has been accepted to the Georgetown University School of Nursing.

Luci is a senior at the National Cathedral School for Girls, an Episcopal school, Georgetown, also in Washington, is a Roman Catholic institution.

It was recently disclosed that Luci has been taking instructions in the Roman Catholic faith.

## Moon Rocket Near Half-Way

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—America's Mariner 4 has traveled 153.6 million miles on its 325-million-mile voyage for its historical first close-up television photographs of the mysterious red planet.

If all continues to go well, Mariner 4 will fly past Mars July 14 at a distance of about 5,400 miles.

Television cameras aboard the spacecraft will grind away for 25 minutes, taking some 22 pictures of about 288,000 square miles of the Martian surface—an area larger than Texas.

Mariner 4 was launched on its 7½-month space trip last Nov. 28 from Cape Kennedy, Fla.

# Methodists Plan New Building



PROPOSED \$200,000 EDUCATION BUILDING OF First Methodist Church As Seen In Architect's Conception.

## New Facility To House Units Of Education

First Methodist Church of Sanford today announced plans to build a \$200,000 education building at Fifth Street and Magnolia Avenue.

In addition to the building program, the church also announced it would launch "Operation Youth Wing" Sunday to finance the construction. The new addition designed by Arthur White, architect, of Orlando, will be a two-story structure containing 11,942 square feet. It will contain 25 classrooms, a fellowship hall and a kitchen. Three entire departments will use the building, primary, junior and youth departments which now are using temporary buildings for classrooms.

Rev. Robert M. Jenkins, pastor of First Methodist, revealed that Edwin Shindler and his building and planning committee have worked nine months on the project and have developed a plan that they feel will be appealing to the congregation and will be a credit to the community. Mrs. W. W. Tyre, George Mills, Robert Karris, Ashby Jones and Tom MacDonald all have worked with Shindler on the project.

"It is hoped that it will become a haven for the youth of the city who desire and need an environment of Christian teachings in which to learn about God and to be with one another," Rev. Jenkins said. It is hoped also that it will be available for civic functions where its facilities are needed, he added.

In addition to the new building, McKinley Hall, the present educational building, will be renovated and redesigned to use more effectively the space, to centralize the nursery and kindergarten departments, to enlarge some adult classrooms and to include an entire office complex with minister, director of Christian education and church offices.

Target date for construction of the building has been set tentatively as early 1966 but will depend upon the success of "Operation Youth Wing."

Dr. John T. Darby is general chairman of "Operation Youth Wing" and has designated Sunday's theme as "Our Plans."

The visitation phase of this program will be started April 2 and continue through April 13. Rev. Forrest J. Reynolds, of the finance and fund service, of the Methodist Church's board of national missions, will be the director of the crusade and will be with Dr. Darby's committee April 2 through 13. He will preach at services on April 4 and April 11.

Sunday at both morning worship services Shindler will speak on "Our Plans" in a short lay speech and will unveil for the first time the plans of the new building and also will outline plans for the crusade.

## U. S. Embassy Attacked

MOSCOW (UPI)—Asian student demonstrators shouting "Down with the murderer Johnson" broke through barricades and a human wall of Soviet policemen today and attacked the U. S. Embassy.

Soviet authorities had arranged the most elaborate security precautions ever, mindful of President Johnson's sharp protests that followed a Feb. 9 attack on the embassy.

But the surging mass of 3,000 or more students showed hundreds of police aside, scrambled over snow plows and iron barriers and broke embassy windows with a barrage of ink bottles and other weapons.

Today's attack — like the earlier one — was in protest against U. S. bombing attacks on military targets in Communist North Viet Nam. The march on the embassy was announced in advance.

Ambassador Fay D. Kohler learned of the call and immediately asked Soviet authorities to protect the building and its personnel.

Embassy workers boarded up windows with plywood but still the mob succeeded in breaking some of them.

Authorities rushed mounted police to the scene to beat back the mob but about 100 of the Asian and Russian students swarmed past the police lines and reached the 10-story building.

### Burns Will Wait Naming Regents

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A vacationing Gov. Haydon Burns plans to wait "two or three weeks" before naming his own men to fill the vacancies created by the mass resignation of the nine-member Board of Regents.

The regents, appointed in the closing hours of the Faris Bryant administration, quit, saying "it is apparent that the usefulness of the present Board of Regents is relatively short lived."

Hobbs said details of the report will have to come from the Governor's office.

### Terrorist Bomb Kills Four Tots

SALGON (UPI) — A bomb dropped by a fleeing terrorist exploded in downtown Saigon today, killing four children and wounding a dozen adults.

It was the first terrorist bombing here in more than a month.

The injured included two American servicemen who received minor scratches.

### Pay Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman L. Mendel Rivers and U. S. House of Representatives committee plan to push through a \$1 billion pay increase for servicemen whether the Johnson administration wants it or not.

## Lake Bottom Probe Scheduled Monday

Sanford's water and sewer department project to probe the bottom of Lake Monona is scheduled to begin Monday.

The probing will establish the exact "width" of the soil material needed to be pumped into the impoundment area.

City Manager W. L. Knowles and today Bert Lytel, engineer with Maurice H. Conwell Associates, and a representative in this type of work, will do the probing which will establish the "profile" of the bottom of the lake.

City Engineer Al Shaw and his staff have been busy this day when actual probing of the bottom of Lake Monona is scheduled to begin.

When Lytel begins probing out in the lake, the crews on shore will keep the boat in line on the transit, with the aid of city walkie-talkie radios, Knowles said.

The results of the probe will allow us to definitely fix what in this type of work, the costs of the dredging operations for the land fill areas establish the "profile" of the bottom of the lake.
