Two hurt in hunting mishap

CHULUOTA - Two hunters were shot and wounded while hunting at a ranch near Chuluota.

The shooting occurred Saturday afternoon as a group of 15 hunters gathered at a large cattle ranch near Chuluota, authorities said.

The party split into two groups, standing an estimated 70 feet apart in an area filled with palmetto bushes. When a deer ran in between the two groups, Beverly Yarborough, one of the ranch owners, fired a shotgun in the direction of the animal, authorities said.

She missed the deer, and pellets from the blast struck the two men, according to the incident report of the Seminole County Sheriff's

One of the shooting victims, Robert Steven Harrell, 53, of Orlando, was released in stable condition on Sunday, Danny Courtney, 55, remains hospitalized in stable condition. Both men suffered wounds to the stomach, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Ordinance 3502 passes first test

SANFORD — The proposed city-wide ordinance requiring new social service programs and other businesses to get permits to operate within certain zoning districts appears likely to pass.

In front of a crowd of nearly 50 people. with divided opinions on the matter, The Sanford City Commission on Monday unanimously passed the first reading of controversial Ordinance 3502, which has stirred heated debate in the city since

Commission will hear second reading of zoning rule on Feb. 14

August when it was proposed. The ordinance will come before the City Commission for final approval Feb. 14.

In response to concerns many residents have regarding the ordinance, the city on Monday issued a position state-

The city of Sanford is committed to meeting the needs of all our residents, regardless of race, gender or incomelevel," the statement said, "With 16.3 percent of our residents living at or below the poverty level, the city recognizes the need to provide a balance of social services to meet the current needs of our residents."

If passed, the ordinance would require new social service type programs to receive approval by both the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Commission, similar to the way the city approves on-site sales of alcoholic bever-

In addition to social services, other programs affected by the ordinance would include new churches within the See Ordinance, Page 5A

Oviedo High selected to host first state-level naval training contest

OVIEDO - The first sanctioned Naval Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, (NJROTC) field meet at the highschool level in the state of Florida will be conducted at Oviedo High School on March 4. The field meet will be a competition among 15 high schools from Florida, each fielding a 45 cadet team representing their individual units.

At latest word, schools signing up to participate include Lake Mary High School and

Lake Howell High School. Authorities say they are presently waiting for others

expected to enter. Competition will be in written exams as well as physical demonstrations and athletic competition. They include; 5cadet academic exams, 45-cadet personnel inspection, armed and unarmed drill basics, armed and unarmed exhibition drills, color guard demonstrations, individual drill competition, and athletic competition.

Included in the athletic competition are push-ups, sit-ups,

2000 yard shuttle run and a 2 1/2 mile relay. In order to compete in the track and field events, the cadets must be fully eligible for interscholastic competition in accordance with all applicable school, district and

state regulations. The meet will last from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. and approximately 900 to 1000 cadets, teachers and coaches are expected to attend. The events will be held at Oviedo High School football field and track. Concession stands by the Oviedo High See Contest, Page 5A

Police have lead in store shooting

Armed robbery long sleeves, possibly a dark and shooting captured on video tape

SANFORD — Police have released a description of a suspect wanted for shooting a woman while robbing a Sanford neighborhood grocery store.

Chae Ok Kim, 43, who owned Poplar Market in Sanford with her husband, Sae Song Kim, 42, was struck by at least two bullets, one in the shoulder and another in the lower back, on Saturday in an armed robbery at the grocery store, located at 315 S. Poplar Ave.

Police describe the suspect as a black male, between 5 feet 7 inches and 5 feet 10 inches in height and 200 pounds, wearing colored sweat shirt, and dark

"We have a video surveillance tape of him as he entered the store," said Cleo Cohen, a spokeswoman for the Sanford Police Department. "To our knowledge, only one suspect was involved."

Police say the suspect walked into the store just before 8 p.m., demanded money, and fired several shots with a semi-automatic pistol before he fled with an unknown amount of cash. "He got hold of the cash register and dropped it on the

floor," said Cohen. Kim and another employee were the only two people in the store when it was robbed.

On Tuesday morning, Kim remained at Orlando Regional Medical Center in stable condition, recovering from surgery that was performed this weekend, according to a hospital spokeswoman.

City says cats must go

Woman with 21 cats told to keep only three

SANFORD — The owner of six adult cats will have to find new homes for three of them, following a ruling Monday by the Sanford City Commission.

Venetia Kelly, who resides at 2610 Iroquois Avenue with her mother Miami Kelly, on Monday asked the City

Commission for a waiver to keep six cats. The city limits private homes to no more than three pets.

The Sanford Code **Enforcement Department** received a complaint from a Sanford police officer about 24 cats being kept at the residence. Venetia Kelly said that the actual number at one time was 21 cats. Code Enforcement reviewed the complaint from the police department.

Venetia Kelly said she found the cats as kittens, nursed them to health and gave them shelter, then found homes for 14 of the cats through the aid of friends.


She asked the City Commission to keep six adult cats, ranging in age from five to eight years old.

"My cats mean a lot to me," Venetia Kelly said. "I found 21 cats, raised them since they were babies, and found homes for 14.1 am asking to keep the six oldest ones. They are inside, and they are well taken care of."

She said she is making arrangements to ensure that they will have proper shots and licensing, and that the male cats are spayed.

Venetia Kelly said she believes that someone with a vendetta against her made the See Cats, Page 5A





The work requires individuals to be available for duty mornings and afternoons when school is in session. It pays \$8 per hour. It also requires the Sheriff's Office to perform a background check.




The top five contestants included Abbott, first runnerup Meredith Whigham, a junior sponsored by Marionettes, second runner-up Angela Baragona, a junior



The information about Geneva, Osceola and Slavia was edited from Mary Leffler Strong's "The Story of Sanford" and the Casselberry information came from a 1947 Florida guidebook.

Geneva and Osceola

Geneva was originally named Lake Harney because several of its early settlers lived on the lake. It was a scattered community, reaching from Coffee's Point up by the old Williams grove and the Culpepper Place on through the town proper and up the road toward Oviedo to the

northwest of Lake Geneva to the east.

The first settlers raised cattle and planted groves. The inhabitants either traveled across the flat woods to White's or Brantley's Wharves on Lake Jessup to do their trading or rowed their boats through the crooked river to Sanford. Coming to Sanford this way took about 24 hours.

There was also a little settlement called Osceola nearby, but when the cypress mill ceased operation, the vil-

..... lage became almost deserted. The mill was owned by the Wilson Cypress Co. of Palatka. The Wilson family spent much of their time on a palatial houseboat anchored offshore. On their honeymoon trip to New York,

Mrs. Wilson had fallen in love with this Stinecipher boat so Mr. Wilson presented it to her. Later, it became the

property of the H.B. Popes who anchored it at the foot of their home in Indian Mound Village. The boat was later sold to a party in Jacksonville.

Disappointed with city life, a number of Slovaks living in Cleveland, Ohio, sent a committee to locate land in an agriculture community in 1910.

They selected and bought 122 acres in Seminole County near Oviedo and formed the Slavia Colony Co. They expected to bring colonist from their homeland as well as those already in

this country. Many of those abroad couldn't gain admittance to the United States, so land reserved for them was divided among those already here. These colonists built homes, planted orange trees and named the community Slavia.

In 1919, Andrew Duda experimented with celery, planting one-half acre. He found this to be a profitable endeavor, but lacked funds to cultivate on a large scale. Mr. Duda and his three sons returned to Cleveland in 1916 where they remained for 10 years. They returned with several thousands of dollars to invest. In the interim, the colonization company had been discontinued. The Dudas took over when they returned, and

the land was cleared, ponds drained, a wash house and warehouse were built and a crop planted.

Each succeeding year, the community grew and became more prosperous. They were a religious people, and Sunday services were held from the first. On May 30, 1948, Lutheran Haven, a home for the elderly and homeless children, was dedicated.

The Dudas went on to plant large acreage, not only around Slavia and Oviedo, but also in Belle Glade, Bradenton and Zellwood.

For the first 24 years of the settlement, there was not a police record among the inhabitants nor a divorce or a death.

Casselberry

Hubbard Casselberry left a profitable business in Chicago in 1926 and came to Seminole County to raise ferns and azaleas. He had been impressed with Florida's year-round sunshine and the opportunity of

being in the open all the time. The section where he settled was halfway between Sanford and Orlando; it was wild and desolate at the time. The highway had not yet been built and Mr. Casselberry had to carve

himself a place in the woods. His plan was to build a town where northerners could join him in raising ferns and azaleas and also enjoy Florida's

balmy climate. Although Casselberry in 1947 was an incorporated town, there were no municipal taxes. Even without these, the city had its own water supply, electricity, a community center, garbage collection and a volunteer fire department. When funds were needed for new city projects, they were collect-

ed by popular subscriptions. The principal industry of Casselberry continued to be the raising of ferns and azaleas, during the previous, \$35,000 was paid in express charges alone for shipments out of the area. About 60 acres were devoted to ferns and approximately 3 million azalea plants were set out. The azaleas were shipped to all 48 states and every Canadian province.

Jules J. Colle, a native of Belgium, grew the azaleas; he was a partner in Belgian Azaleas Inc., which supervised this work.

Mr. Colle encouraged new residents to plant the flowers; he and his family would help them financially and also in securing acreage of their own. There was plenty of room for expansion in Casselberry and the town's found emphasized this advantage in advertising his town.

The business center of the town had followed the Williamsburg style of architecture while many of the residences were Normandy in design.

Continued from Page 1A downtown commercial district, temporary labor services, day care facilities for six or more people, residential care facilities. for 15 or more residents, outdoor non-commercial amusement facilities, retail sales and services, pawn shops and bail-

bond companies. Agencies, churches and businesses already in operation. would not be affected by the proposed ordinance, unless their functions significantly change

The City Commission on Monday passed revisions to the ordinance requiring several. additional types of businesses to seek permitting to operate in the downtown commercial district. The businesses include: hospitals and medical clinics, hotels and motels, and funeral

Other revisions to the ordinance include a provision to exclude community resource. agencies, such as the Center for Affordable Housing, from the definition as social service. agency. These entities would not be required to seek permits.

In addition, churches are not included in the same regulations applying to social service. agencies. The City Commission. also would have the authority. to grant a waiver regarding a required 1,500 foot separation between social service type. agencies

The programs would be separated by at least 1,500 feet from similar businesses or agencies and would have to be at least 300 feet from any residential

One additional change that may be put in the final ordinance is a definition of the difference between "permanent" and "occasional" use of a church premises in serving meals or distributing food for non-profit purposes.

Several commissioners on Monday recommended that more than one day per week may constitute permanent use of the facility for food distribution purposes.

"We've worked on this for a long time and I think we've come up with a heck of an ordinance," said City Commissioner Brady Lessard

Supporters of the ordinance say it represents long-needed planning that will prevent the clustering of agencies in areas such as Goldsboro and the downtown commercial district.

"I think when this is enacted, years down the road the city. will be better for it," said Stephen Myers, who lives on Oak Avenue in the historic district. "I think the entire city will benefit from it."

Leaders of churches and social service agencies cautioned the City Commission to maintain an ability within the city to serve the needy, and to ease tensions resulting from debate over the ordinance.

"I'm in favor of zoning," said Al Cole, a priest at Holy Cross Episcopal Church in Sanford. "Everyone benefits from good zoning, including churches."

Opponents of the proposed ordinance said the city is trying to limit the number of social service agencies serving the

needy. Sanford Tenants Organized for Reform of Management (STORM), an organization of public housing residents, said in a press release that it will file complaints with the U.S. Departments of Justice and Housing and Urban Development asking the federal agencies to open an investigation and to obtain relief from the city's efforts to enact the ordinance.

"You know that 3502 means that the city of Sanford cannot progress if you have too many low income people," said Penny James of Sanford, who is a member of STORM. "(The ordinance) wants to deprive us of our social service agencies and wants to get rid of the poor folks."

Several residents expressed

concern about the 1,500 foot distancing requirement.

"The 1,500 foot requirement can lead to the perception that it's an attempt to keep social. service agencies out of the downtown area," said Sanford. resident Millard Hunt. "It seems CACCOSTA

"I think there is some healing in this ordinance because it does allow the City Commission to be the final arbiter," said City. Commissioner Whitev Lekstein

The 1990 U.S. Census lists 16.3 percent of Sanford residents. as living below the poverty line.

Much of the debate concerning the ordinance has centered. upon a proposed program to provide meals to the needy within Santord's historic dis-

Sanford officials are hoping to schedule baseball and softball. tournaments and concerts at the stadium. But first, the city will need to raise the necessary funds. for stadium renovations.

To complete the fund raising efforts, the Sanford City Commission is considering tak ing a loan of up to \$1.75 million from first Union

The City Commission discussed the possibility of taking a foan during a work session on Monday The Commission will resume discussing the loan during a Feb. 14 work session.

So faz \$1 million in public and private funds have been raised. for stadium improvements Sanford is trying to raise \$1.75

million for improvements needed at the stadium, located on-Mellonville Avenue

Seminole County is spending \$400,000 over 10 years toward. renovating the stadium, and Sinford is pitching in \$500,000. over 10 years. The state of Florida. is adding another \$50,000, while private funds of \$50,000 have also been raised.

"I think we definitely should do this," said Sanford Mayor. Larry Dale. "Why wait 10 years for the funding from the county and other sources when you can take out a loan and start the work DOW "

The city has applied for \$200,000 through the Florida Recreation Development Assistant Program Grants will also be written for Florida Community Trust and Historic Preservation funds



'Golf Course Syndrome' may mean tree's demise

Pine trees in our urban landscapes can be affected by yellowing (chlorosis) of the foliage and a progressive decline that many times ends up with the death of the tree. This problem is found more often in golf courses and intensively cared landscapes.

The condition is sometimes described as the "Golf Course Syndrome." Wood-boring beetles often attack trees showing this problem, accelerating the decline and death of the tree.

Symptoms

Yellowing of the pine needles is a gradual process. Initially, the color of the needles changes from their normal green color to a faint off-color and to a pale green. Then, the color changes to a yellow-green color and eventually to a more brilliant yellow color.

The level of yellowing depends on the factors causing the problem. As the symptoms become more severe, the tree

may lose foliage and the upper branches may die. Sometimes pitch canker infections or insects

boring into the wood will result in death of the upper branches

Causes Pine chlorosis is a physiological problem related to mineral deficiencies of iron and manganese. Plants and trees can develop deficiencies of these nutrients when grown in soils naturally low in these nutrients or when the availability of these elements is restricted by high pH

conditions (alkalinity). Pines, like azaleas, blueberries, and camellias, prefer acid soils. As soil pH raises, the solubility of iron and manganese decrease and their uptake by the plant roots is limited. The deficiency of these elements in the plant pro-

duces the yellowing of the leaves and declining of the tree vigor. High soil pH values also affect

the function of the mycorrhizal fungi associated with the roots of pines. These fungi play a very important role in the absorption of these nutrients from the soil, and any conditions that affect the relationship between these fungi and the roots of the pine trees, will affect the absorption of

nutrients by the roots.

Fertilization And Watering

The addition of plant fertilizers is usually unnecessary and often excessive, resulting in nutritional imbalances. Excess fertilization pre-dispose pines to pitch canker and other fungal infections.

Irrigation of established pines is unnecessary and often detrimental. Water used in irrigation usually contains large amounts of minerals such as calcium that, over time, can increase the pH of the soil to a value well above the value at which iron and man-

ganese are soluble in the soil.

Prevention And Control

Prevention of pine chlorosis is more effective and less expensive that trying to correct the problem once it develops.

Prevention can be accomplished by avoiding or minimizing site disturbance and tree injury during construction and landscape activities. Avoiding the accumulation of lime materials in the root zone of pines, minimizing or eliminating the fertilization and irrigation of established

Also, applying and maintaining a 3 inch to 4 inch layer of natural, acid-forming mulches composed of materials such as pine bark or pine needles above the

root zone of the pines. Planting pines in areas such as lawns, where their root system will be influenced by high levels of water and fertilizers, will be detrimental to the life of pine

Once the symptoms of chlorosis appear it is very hard to reverse the trend of tree decline. Some of the treatments to correct the problem include soil acidification, foliar feeding or tree injections, removal of ground covers or mulches above the root zone, and re-designing of the irrigation

Pine trees affected with chlorosis are difficult to save and the cost and effort associated with their rehabilitation is often pro-

They knew they would be faced with asking that question again and again, and wanted to know if she could give them a word of encouragement or correction to make

them better equipped to help the next family. How could she refuse?

In the days to follow she wrestled with the thought of standing in front of a group of strangers and pouring out the horrible story. She decided she needed to jot down something that could be read for her in case she fell apart. In the space of an hour, the enclosed poem is what God's grace allowed her to express. Perhaps you will feel it's worth sharing with your readers.



FWC to hold public workshops on spotted seatrout rules

OCALA - The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has sched uled a series of public work shops to receive comment on proposals for statewide rec reational rules for spotted scatrout to establish a 15 mintunum/20-inch maximum size limit and erther a five-fish daily bag limit with a February closed season, or a four-fish limit with no closure (the allowance for one fish larger than the maximum size limit to be retained would still apply).

The FWC is also seeking comment on proposals to change the commercial harvest season to occur from May through July each year (instead of the current June through August open seasont, and to allow commer ctal harvesters to retain one spotted scatrout larger than 24 mehes.

Indy Racing League ready for new start

LAKE BUENA VISTA - It's a preseason motorsports litany that borders on cliché: Regardless of the series, drivers always talk about fresh starts as the new season approaches.

It's no different in the ludy Racing League, but this year the words have real meaning. The 2000 season truly is one of new beginnings for the Indy Racing League, its teams and competitors, in more ways than one.

The season starts this Saturday, January 29th, with the Delphi Indy 200 at Walt Disney

World Speedway, located just outside the gates of the famed Magic Kingdom. The 200-lap, 200-mile race is the first of 10 stops on route to the Indy Racing League championship.

Orlando resident Eddle Cheever Jr. is the defending Eddle champion of the race, while Greg Ray is defending series champton.

One new aspect of Indy Racing affects all teams this season - the new chassts and engine package.

All competitors will be powered by a 3.5-liter engine, reduced from the 4-liter configuration used since the start of the 1997 season. The new engine also will have a much sweeter, more traditional Indy Racing sound thanks to new crankshafts that change the engine firing order and alter the pitch and tone of the engine significantly. Oldsmobile Aurora and Nissan Infiniti will continue to produce V8 engines for the series.

The new chassis produced by manufacturers Dallara, G Force and Riley & Scott have a number of aerodynamic and safety enhancements.

New safety features on the 2000 model chassis include: a wider cockpit to allow more produce a consistent, durable

headrest padding, additional anti-intrusion barriers chassis sides to improve side-Impact performance, an Improved SWEMS wheel-retention system, higher and longer sidepods for safety, a lighter transmission with a new sequential shift pattern are an improved rear attenuator attachment.



Doctor Gott

Left chest pain usually heart related

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 58-year-old woman who smokes and is slightly chubby. For the past three weeks, I have experienced left-sided chest pain (behind my breast) that radiates down my left arm

and causes shortnessof breath. This usually accompanies physical exertion. My doctor says it's gas.

Another doctor believes it's gallstones. What can I take for this? **DEAR READER: You** should take an immediate trip to your local emergency room when you next experience discomfort. Better yet, make an appointment with a cardiologist.

Doctor Gott Here's why: Exercise-induced left

chest pain that radiates down the left arm is caused by heart disease until proved otherwise. While men generally are more prone to heart problems than are women, you could still have a heart condition. You desperately need a diagnosis because your symptoms could well reflect angina, a condition that could easily progress to a heart attack. Moreover, you have at least two risk factors for coronary artery disease: overweight and use of cigarettes.

Frankly, I'm surprised that your doctor failed to obtain appropriate testing during one of your attacks. At the very least, you should have had a cardiogram and a blood test for troponin, a substance that is released into the bloodstream when heart damage occurs. Certainly, you need a stress test, even if you are painfree at present. While you

may have gas as a cause of your symptoms, left-sided chest pain is an exceedingly rare presentation for gallstones. The doctor's first responsibility is to check you thoroughly for coronary disease, because if this is your problem, you are sitting on a time-bomb. If you heart is healthy, more testing would be necessary,

but there is plenty of time for that.

First, make sure that you heart is

taking 1,500 milligrams of calcium supplements a day will help ward off osteoporosis. However, I have two female friends who say they do not need extra calcium because their homeopathic doctors took blood tests that showed normal calcium levels. Who is correct? DEAR READER: You are. Most authorities recommend 1,000 to 1,500 milligrams of dietary calcium — from either calcium-rich foods or from supplements -- to help protect against osteoporosis. A blood test for calcium usually bears no relation to the amount of calcium in the bones. Thus, you could have a normal blood level and still be losing enormous amounts of the mineral from your bones. This lost calcium is excreted into the urine, while the blood level remains more or less constant. Continue your calcium supplements and follow your doctor's advice about further follow-up and treatment.
