Presbyterians OK \$300,000 Plans

A \$300,000 building program was authorized by the congregation of First Presbyterian Church of Sanford at the Sunday morning services. The church owns the area bounded by Third and Fourth Streets and Oak and Park Avenues excepting the Woman's Club property.

A church committee headed by B. C. Conklin had worked with an architect and a professional fund raiser in drafting tentative plans for the construction program.

Conklin explained to the congregation that a new Christian education building will be constructed in the center of the church property at the rear of the Fellowship Building, which faces Third Street. A new addition to the Fellowship Building will be constructed on the east side of that structure (where the Pure Oil service station is now).

Refurbishing and heavy maintenance work will be recommended for the sanctuary building at Third and Oak. Landscaping will be carried out also.

The congregation, in a business session at the close of the worship session, approved the program and authorized a building fund campaign in the fall. Actual construction will be started with funds derived from the campaign and subsequent loan from a financial institution.

The long range program, Conklin stated, includes a new sanctuary in about 4-10 years fronting on Fourth Street.

Crops Saved By 'Alma's' Rain



Rainfall Sunday and this morning, reaching 1.83 inches, saved many unirrigated lawns, citrus groves, vegetables and pastures, in the opinion of David DeVoll, county extension agent. "Since March 27 we had had only 1.87 inches of rain through Monday, said DeVoll.

The rain this weekend, he continued, came down mainly as a single precipitation and soaked into the parched soil. Lawns, DeVoll, county extension agent, are beginning to look green and alive again and soon will need mowing.

Citrus groves that were beginning to show leaf curling and were dropping leaves and young fruit," DeVoll opined, "should recover since the rain soaked into the root zone. Much of the high salt accumulations on the surface of subirrigated vegetable fields has been leached to the root zone. This high salt accumulation is particularly bad with sensitive crops, such as celery and beans, in the celery fields, in the Zellwood muck.

Several hundred tons were washed out, 117 tobacco curing houses destroyed, and 16 sugar mills forced to close, the broadcast said.

But, except for a West Florida area where a big truck crop is in the final stages of harvest and rain was unwelcome, the storm brought nothing but good to Florida. Up to six inches was reported there.

"The citrus groves were at a critical point, but are out of danger now," said a spokesman at the Federal State Frost Warning Service at Lakeland.

"The drought is broken. This will carry us into the normal June rains without any problem."

Over the entire Florida peninsula, no rain of any consequence had fallen in two months.

Highest rainfall reported by official Weather Bureau stations — 3.75 inches at Fort Myers, where the depression passed offshore Sunday night. Precipitation ranged from two to three inches in the Miami area; Tampa reported 2.17, West Palm Beach 2.06, and Gainesville 2.13. Alma blew up in the south-central Florida area, and at a rate time reached a wind force of 80 miles an hour.

Police Probe 2 Reports Of Child Molestations

At least two reports of attempted child molestation occurred during the weekend, according to Sanford police department and Seminole sheriff's office reports.

Pesticide Storage

As more pesticides are banned from use by homeowners, a new problem becomes evident — how to dispose of these pesticides safely. In order to supply a solution, the Institute of Food and Agricultural Services, University of Florida and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services have launched a joint collection effort.

Starting this week, the County Agricultural Department will serve as a collection point for the banned pesticides. Any homeowners who would like to dispose of their pesticides can bring them by the County Agent's office at 4520 South Orlando Drive during the normal working hours 8 to 5 Monday through Friday.

These materials will be stored in a safe place until they can be picked up by the State Department of Agriculture trucks. These materials will be held until adequate incineration or other methods become available to break them down to harmless products.

Since the County Agricultural facilities are not adequate to handle large amounts of pesticides, anyone with large quantities seeking a method of disposal can call the county Agricultural office and arrangement will be made to have them picked up when the State trucks make their collection.

It is hoped that this effort will reduce the amount of presently illegal pesticides in the homeowner, garage or utility shelves.

Highest Labor Force Reported; Unemployment Climbs To 5.9%

Seminole County now has the highest labor force ever recorded. Latest figures released by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce revealed that in April this year, the county's total labor force climbed to 20,460 persons, an increase of 600 persons over a year ago.

At the same time the total labor force was on the increase, the number of persons unemployed in the county went up from 4.6 per cent in April, 1969 to 5.9 per cent, an increase of 1.3 per cent in a year.

The number of county persons employed was placed at 19,300 persons as of April, 1970, an increase of 400 more jobs in a year's time. Figures for 1969 during the same period were placed at 18,600, according to chamber figures.

All types of employment showed an increase over 1969, but most number of new jobs were in the farm type industries.

Agriculture workers increased by 200 persons from 1,300 to 1,400 in a year's time, while non-farm or establishment jobs climbed upward to 14,300 from its 14,200 a year ago.

Other miscellaneous type employment moved to 3,500 in 1970 as compared to 3,600 a year ago.

"The county is presently littered with a moderate labor surplus market area, according to the Chamber report."

All but six of the injured were released from area hospitals after treatment. A tornado two weeks ago killed 25 people in Lubbock, at the opposite end of Texas. The same number died in a series of tornadoes five weeks ago in the northwest part of the state. Robert Skank, whose house trailer was destroyed in the storm, told how it felt at 12:20 a.m. "The trailer sure danced around before the wind tore it apart. Solons Voice State Road Needs

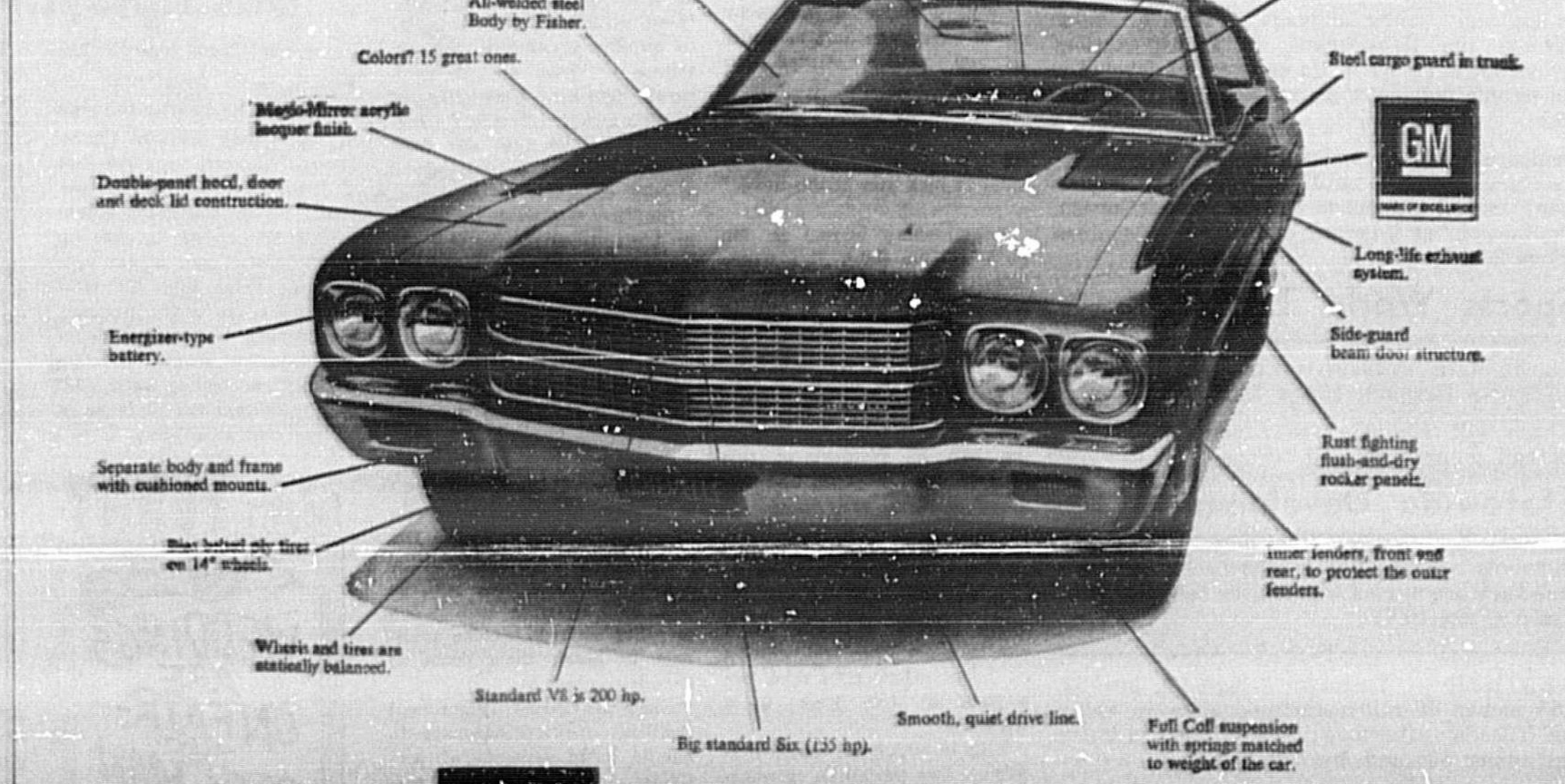
TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Sen. Ralph Poston and Rep. Vernon Holloway's optimism over the world has them pessimistic over the chances of Florida road handling the increased tourist travel. 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Demos Watch Convention Change

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic party reformers will be watching a special committee's efforts to implement the 1972 guidelines set by the McGovern Commission for selecting convention delegates. The ad hoc group with the states is an effort to avoid repetition in 1972 of the wide spread charges in the Chicago convention two years ago that delegate selections often were unrepresentative and unresponsive to the views of many party members. Neither major party has ever undertaken such a widespread reform effort, one made more difficult by the complexities of applying basic principles to widely differing procedures in the 50 states. National Democratic Chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien has gone out of his way to assure reformers the new committee is designed to further, not dilute, the reform effort. The first reaction of Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., the commission chairman, is to agree. But the commission is reworking specifically in two areas: —Possible conflict between the committee and the commission in interpreting how the guidelines would apply in a given state. —The possibility the ad hoc group would recommend against applying some or all of the guidelines to the 1972 convention. Although O'Brien stressed the committee was created "solely for the purpose of speeding the implementation of the guidelines," an internal party memorandum prepared for him said the National Committee which tends to represent the party establishment in many states antagonistic or indifferent to the reform effort. It could thus become the center for those elements in the party who feel the McGovern group went too far and wish to slow or reverse the reform drive. McGovern promptly called upon the committee to recommend "the commission guidelines be added intact to the call to the 1972 convention, while recognizing that, by doing so, no new legal sanctions would be added." A third problem could result from the making of the ad hoc group, all members of the National Committee which tends to represent the party establishment in many states antagonistic or indifferent to the reform effort. O'Brien also said in his week end letter to McGovern the ad hoc group has "no power to alter or dilute or in any way veto more after performing a detailed autopsy. Editorial Comment

More Than Visual Honor Due Our National Flag

More and more the Stars and Stripes of Old Glory are floating in the breezes of Central Florida as the national standard symbolizes both the recently aroused patriotism of some and the deep and reverent respect which has been its due since officially created on June 14, 1777 by the Continental Congress.

With this increased visibility it would be well that some of the history, some of the meaning and some of the glorious events which must always be connected with the colors be kept in mind.

Present dimensions of the flag itself were set by executive order by President Wilson in 1916, just one year before the American Expeditionary Force carried the Stars and Stripes to Europe and the bitter, desperate year-long fighting that ended with the Armistice on Nov. 11, 1918 at 11 o'clock in the morning.

Then came the lack of exposure, the almost popular sophistication which discounted the flying of the flag as something which had been outgrown. True shock registered as desecration of the flag became a rule of conduct for the rebellious, violent and anti-American forces. This must end. Violence is not, however, the kind of action which digs out the roots.

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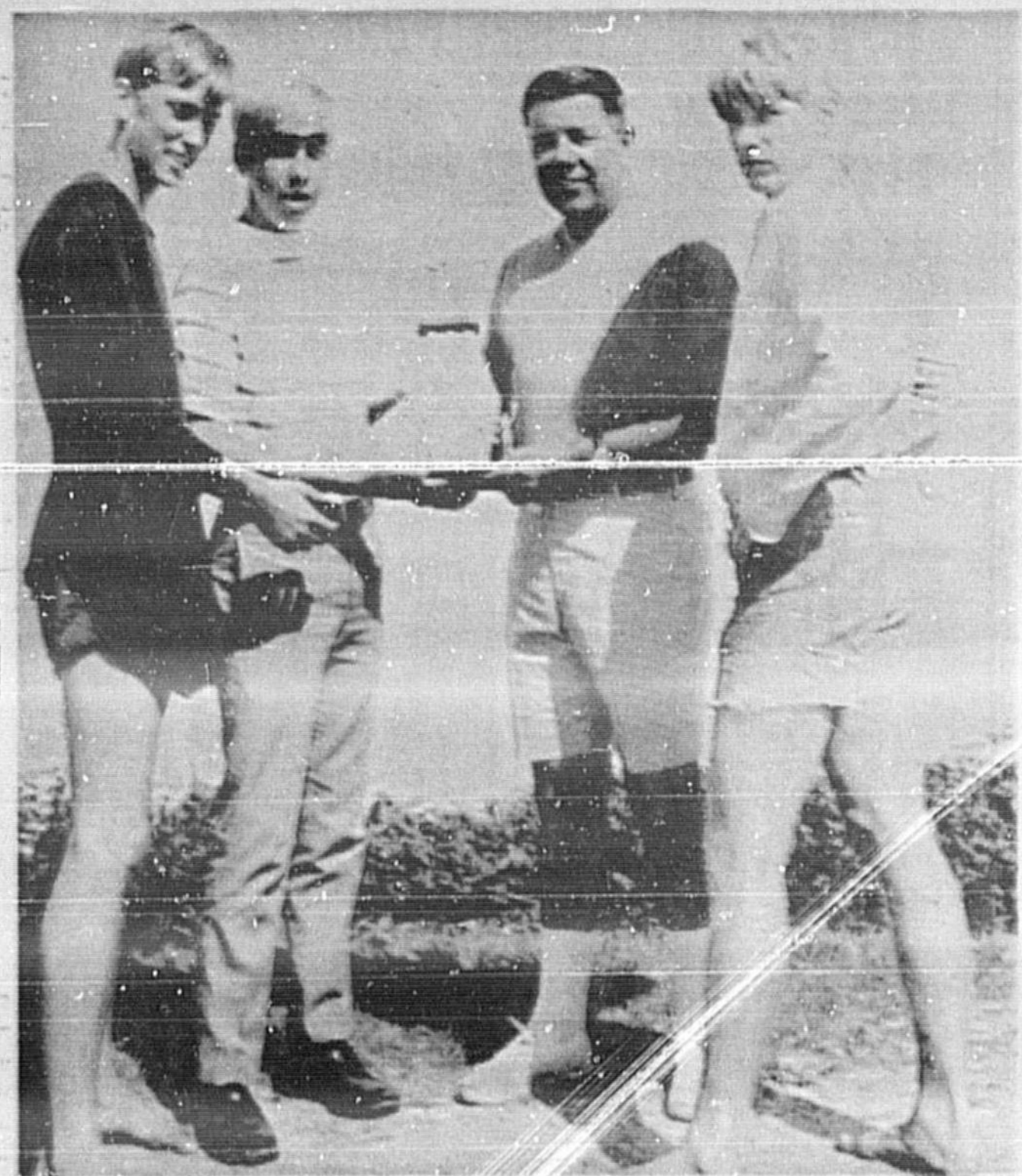

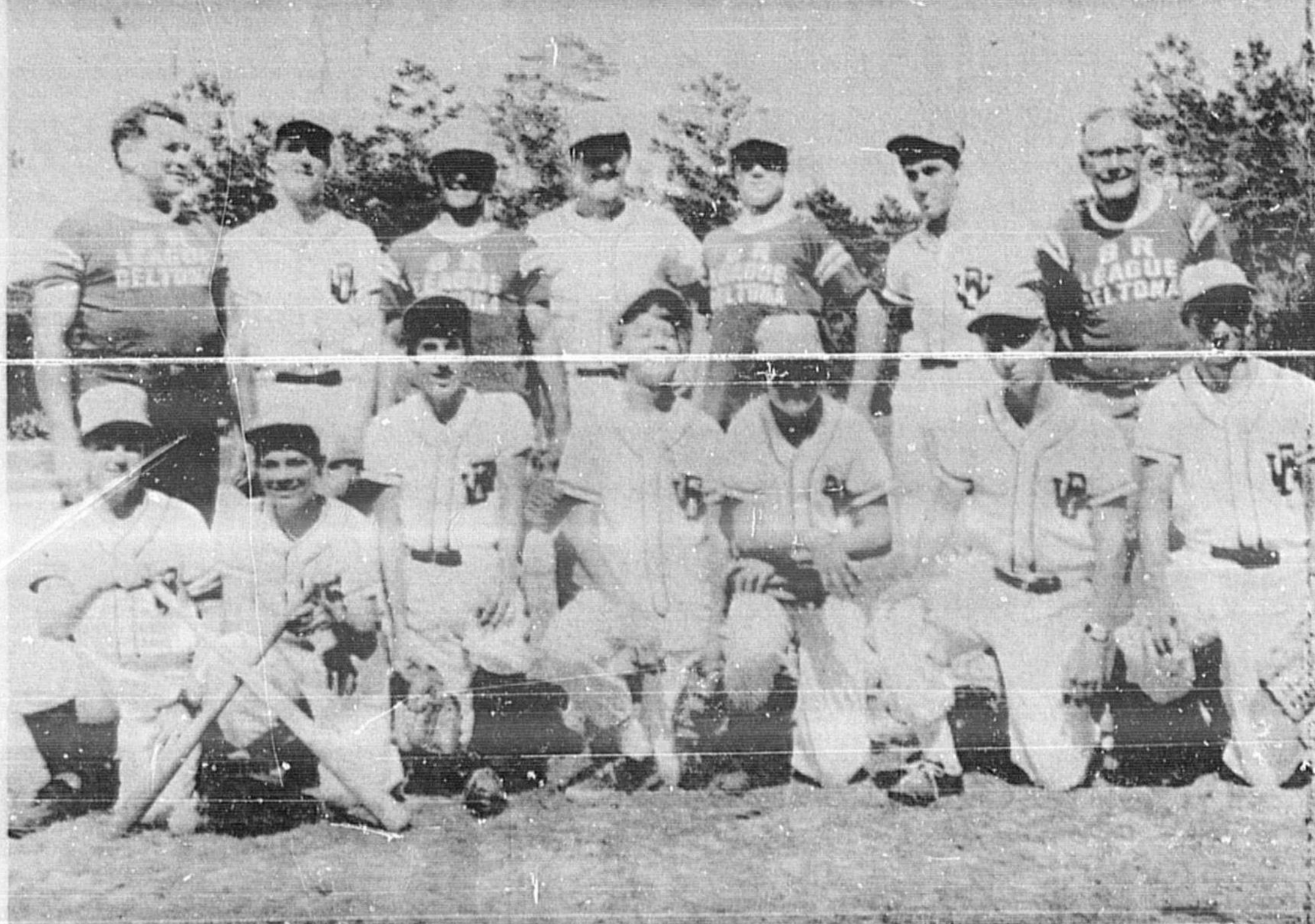

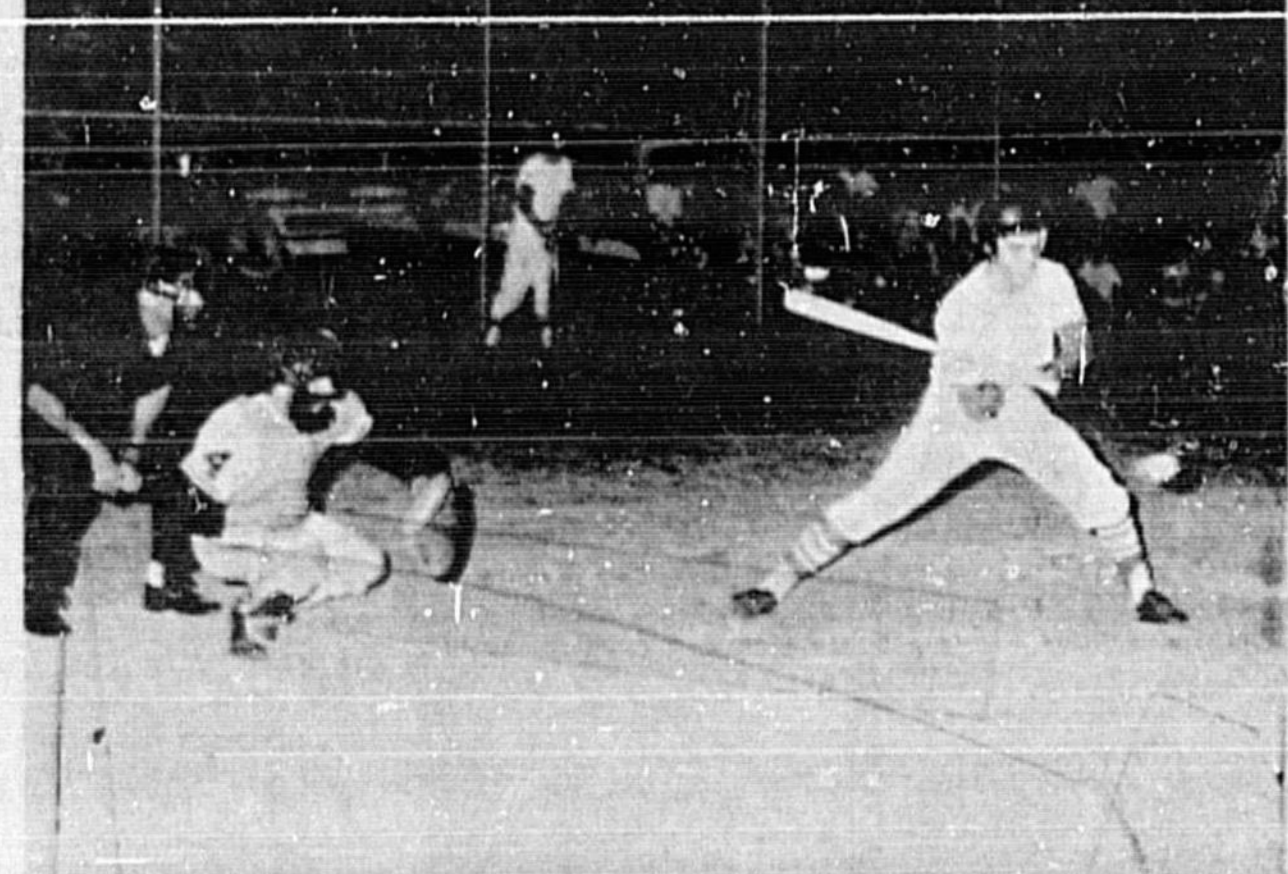

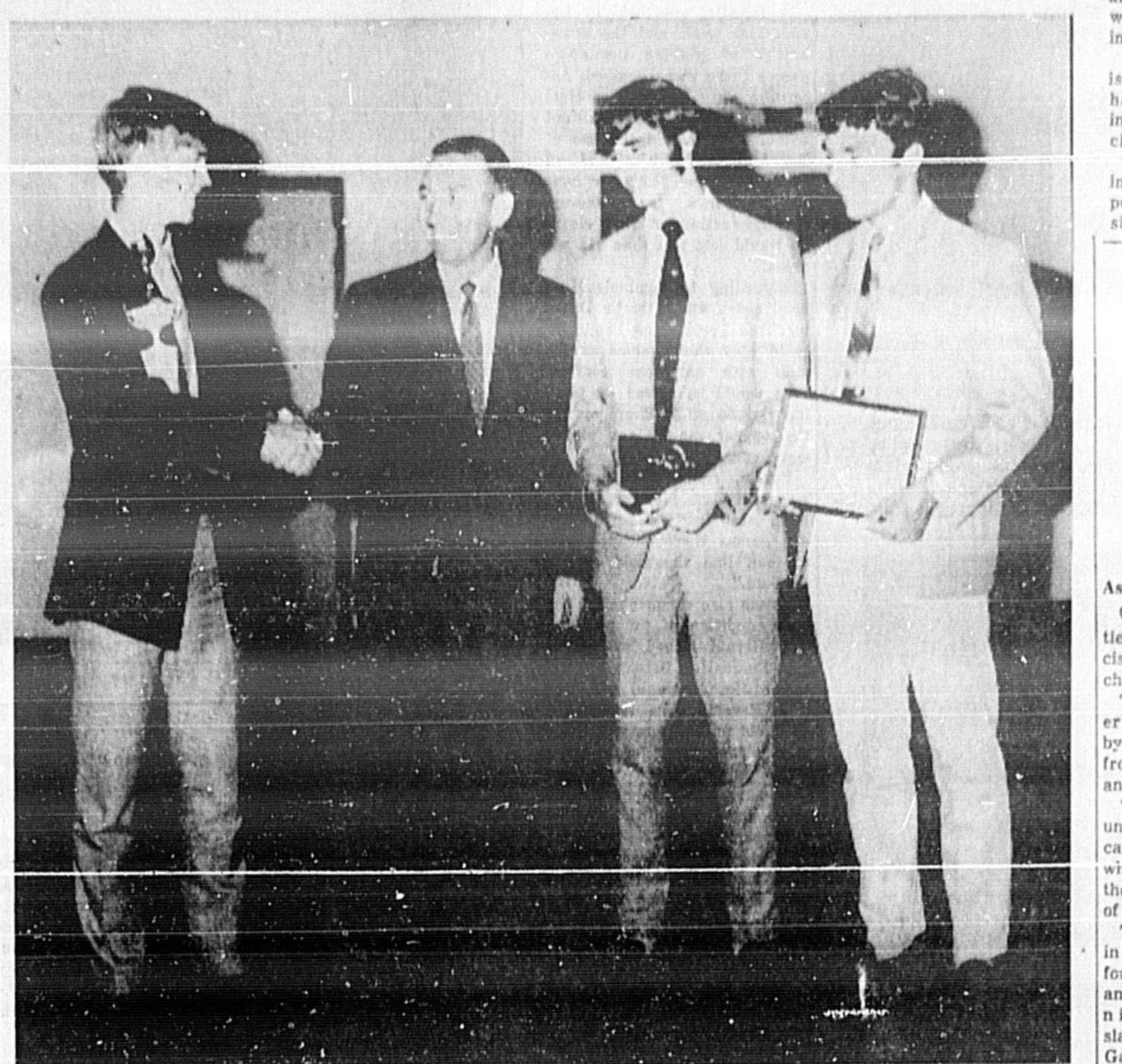
