

Some of the counties having the larger cities already have well perfected organizations for Beautification but none have chosen as their direct purpose within a definite time the prompt planting and beautification of every school ground in their county.

The first six months of 1932 will be allocated to this Lodge particular purpose and job. A letter from Surgeon General lief for difficulties imposed by Hugh S. 


