

Senator Accuses President Of Planning EBI Gestapo In South

MONTGOMERT, Als., Feb. 6, (47)- Governor James E. Folsom declared today the states themselves should handle radial problems without federal interference, and charged both major parties have used them as a "political football."

In an address prepared for broadcast over a statewide radio network, the avowed presidential candidate said he is "sworg to uphold the Constitution of the United States, but I am also sworn to uphold the Constitution of the State of Alabama."

Folsom relierated his intention to see the Democratic presidential nomination an Alabama's favorite son.

WASHINGTON Feb. 6 (/P)-The bitter Democratic feud over civil rights hit a new pitch today. Senator Russell (D.Ga) contended that President Truman is planning an FBI "Gestapo" to break down race segregation in the South.
