Ehrlichman Implicated

WASHINGTON (AP) — A source close to the Senate Watergate probe says investigators believe they can establish that former presidential counselor John D. Ehrlichman authorized repeat offers of executive clemency made to James McCord.
McCord stands convicted of wrongdoing, burglary and conspiracy in the case. He testified in televised hearings Friday that former White House aide John Caulfield repeatedly pressured him, and once threatened him, in an attempt to get him to go to jail without talking.

'Bug Prosecutor Is Harvard Prof

WASHINGTON (AP) — The appointment of a Democrat and Harvard law professor as government prosecutor of the Watergate case has drawn favorable comment from key senators.
Archibald Cox, 61, accepted the assignment from Atty. Gen.-designate Elliot L. Richardson Friday and told a Boston news conference he would conduct a wide-ranging investigation. If the evidence leads to President Nixon, it will be referred to a grand jury.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here, at a glance, are Friday's highlights at the special Senate Watergate committee hearings:
WITNESSES — Karl Schaffer, a Washington, D.C., policeman who took part in the arrest of burglars at the Democratic National Committee headquarters last June, and James W. McCord, one of the convicted burglars, for four hours.
TESTIMONY — Schaffer answered questions about the facts of the arrest and of evidence that was collected. McCord, a star witness of the committee, testified for the first time publicly that he received repeated offers of executive clemency from John Caulfield, a former White House aide and that he told President Nixon he was told of these offers. Caulfield now is a Treasury Department official on leave.

By GEORGE ESPER Associated Press Writer SAIGON (AP) — The start of an investigation today into U.S. air attacks in South Vietnam was called off today, and the Communists boycotted a meeting of the four-party Joint Military Commission called to make arrangements to return the remains of American dead.

The Communists charged there had been new U.S. air strikes in South Vietnam this week in violation of the cease-fire and implied that the remains of scores of Americans who died in air crashes may never be returned because the United States was not meeting its commitments.

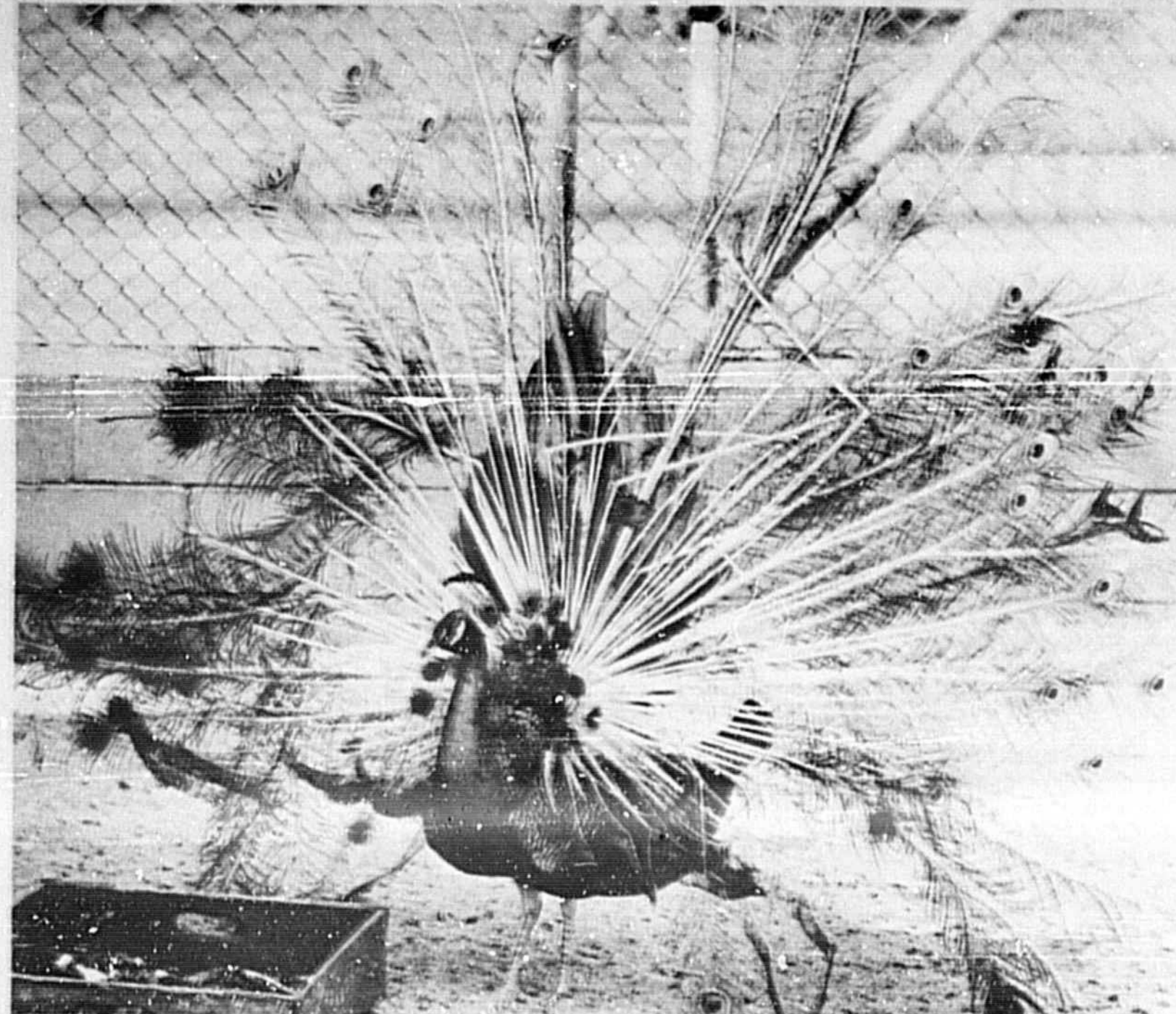

Americans On Binge Of Power

Americans have been on an energy binge ever since the Model T replaced the horse and the electric light snuffed out the kerosene lamp. Consumption of energy-producing materials has skyrocketed in recent years thanks to expanding industry, more cars, more fun-time vehicles, and a vast proliferation of power-consuming conveniences and gadgets of all kinds.

The fuss and fury about an energy crisis, fuel shortages, power crunch and what have you would be laughable if it did not reflect the state of mind of a people who assume they should have a "mindless search" of the abundant life regardless of what is done with it.

Is there really an energy crisis? Or is it, more realistically, a matter of waste versus actual need?

Drive around any American city late at night and make your own energy survey.

You'll see scores of office buildings lit up like Christmas trees hours after closing time because an executive would rather leave fluorescent lights than to turn them off. Cheaper by what criteria? Certainly not by considering wise husbandry of natural resources. Lights that burn all night use three times as much of an oil energy source as those which burn only during business hours.

In a span of five miles along a metropolitan thoroughfare, the writer saw a dozen new and used car parking lots lit up as bright as day with powerful flood lighting. It was 11 o'clock at night. Another flagrant waste of energy. Plus two huge shopping centers with acres of asphalt parking space illuminated with hundreds of lights still burning after the stores had closed.

The interiors of closed stores still lit up almost as brightly as during business hours. Their advertising signs blazing away, timed to burn all night.

Add to this hundreds of billboards, pushing everything from beer to breakfast foods, all of them brightly lit throughout the nighttime hours. And neon signs by the thousands, flashing merrily away to the delight of a local utility company joining the clamor over "energy crisis."

Multiply this small cross-section of nighttime Americans by hundreds, or even thousands, and you get some idea of the fantastic energy waste which self-serving propaganda has built into an energy "crisis."

The most ridiculous aspect of the nation's energy waste is in automobile commuting in metropolitan areas which have allowed mass transit systems to die by default. Look at the morning crawl-by on any freeway and you'll see 7 to 8 out of ten cars carrying one occupant.

A modern bus allowed to move cityward at its potential speed could displace 30 or more of these gas-gobbling cars. A commuter train could displace hundreds. Mass transit could cut down tremendously on the nation's daily fuel appetite and energy requirements.

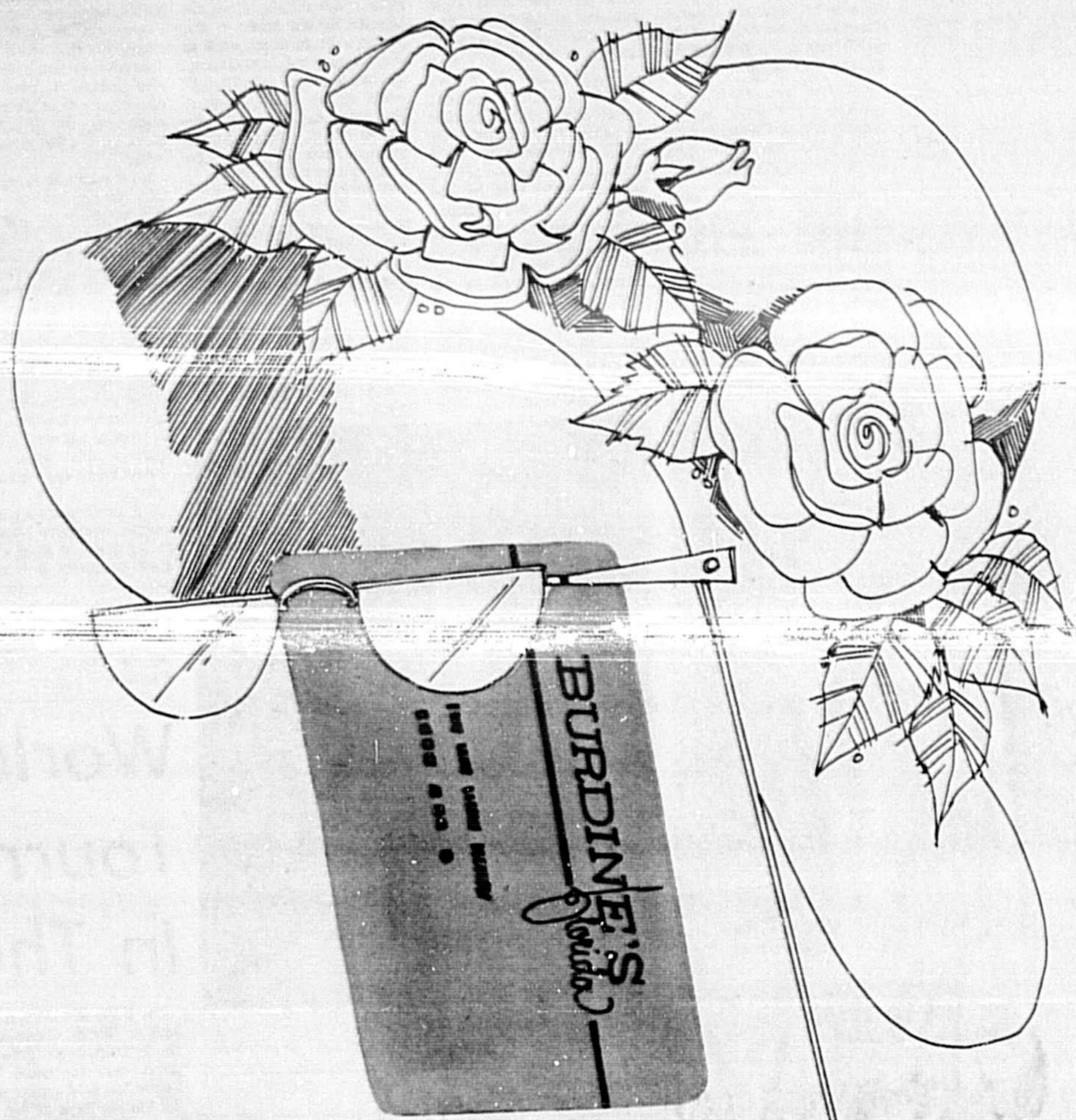
There are other examples. Consider the average neighborhood street on a Saturday afternoon. A family camper heading to the mountains for the weekend, with a pair of trail bikes strapped on behind, another weekend off to the nearest lake with an outboard motorboat. Several youngsters putting up and down the street on mini-bikes. Gas-powered lawn mowers add to the racket.

The nation's energy expenditure for fun vehicles and pure convenience machines—using a motor instead of a muscle—is climbing at a terrific rate, too.

Instead of considering wiser use of energy-producing natural resources, the push is on for faster and greater exploitation of coal deposits and offshore oil reserves, which many conservationists believe should be held as an "ace-in-the-hole" reserve for future emergencies—or fuel-short future generations.

The time has come to reassess the real need and tone down the demand, instead of putting more and more pressure on natural resources to satisfy a greedy energy appetite.

The 14 garden circles comprising the club will be led by the new president, Mrs. Ewald A. Korth.

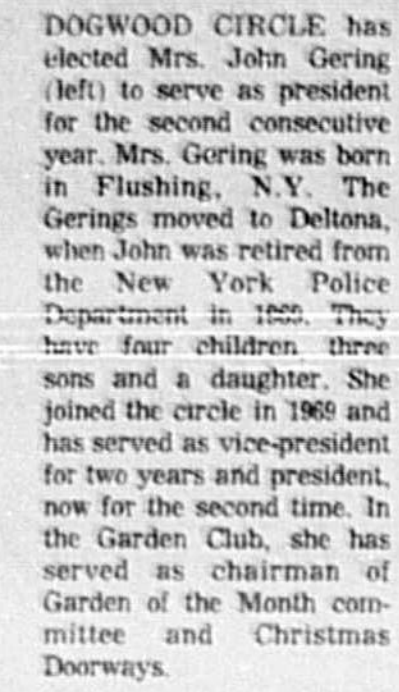

She received a citation from the FFGC for growing more than 200 Parkmansia (Jerusalem thorn trees) and a Certificate of Merit from the American Forestry Association.

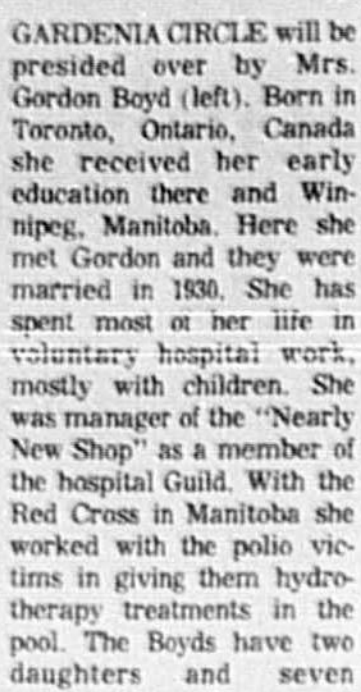

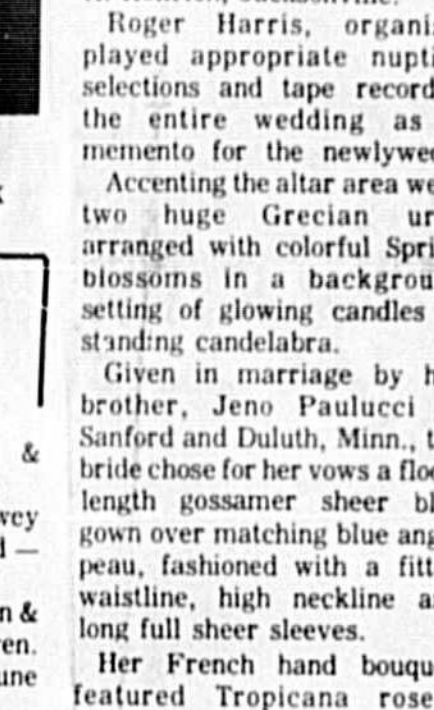

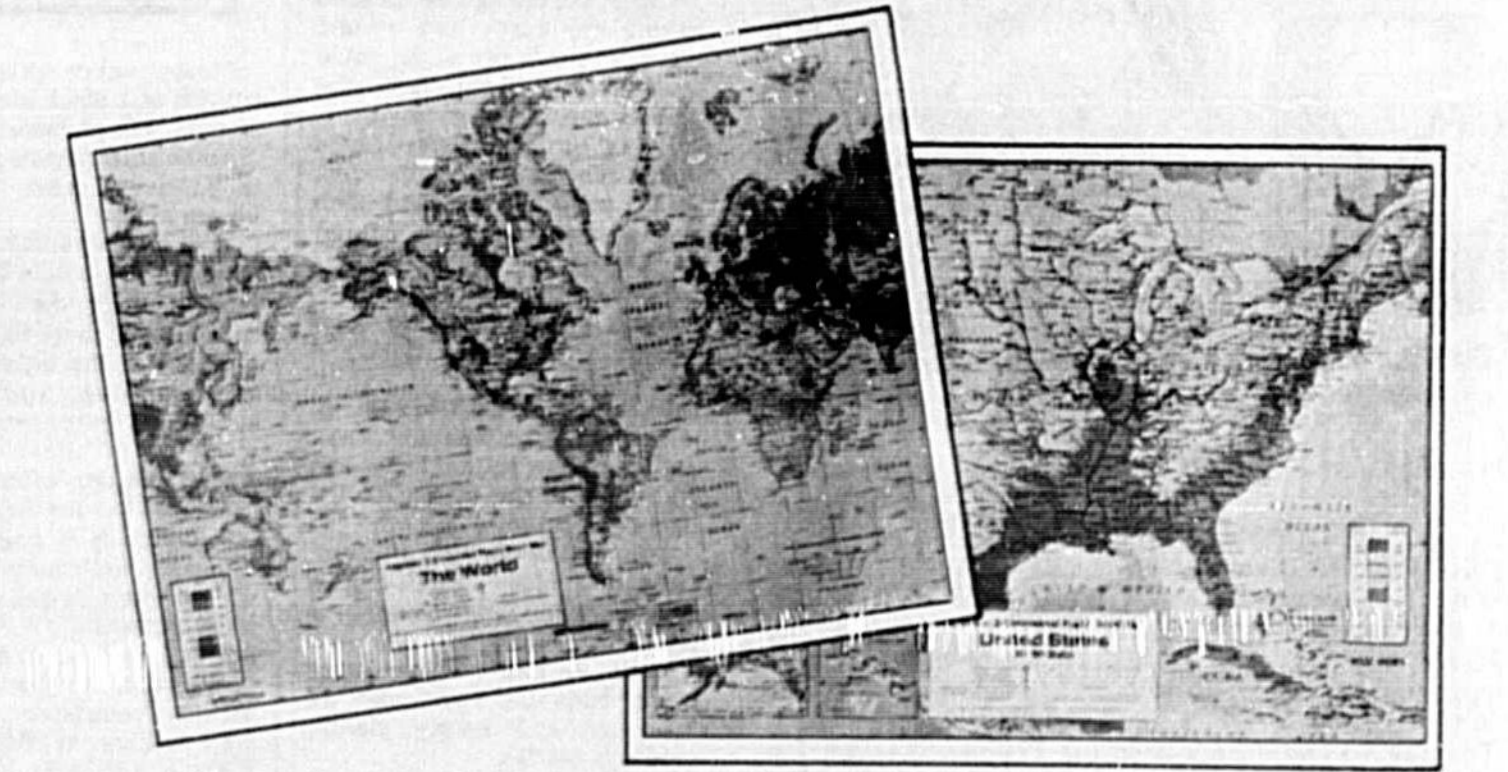

Sanding O.K. Calls for Care

By MR. FIXE

There's many a home or apartment that's been furnished with secondhand furniture or unfinished furniture that was turned into a finished piece by the owner.

Whether it's an old piece of furniture that has been stripped clean of the old finish or a brand new, smooth but unfinished piece of furniture, it still needs sanding before you apply anything to it.

The way you use sandpaper determines how successful that finishing project turns out. This is especially true with the clear finishes—varnish, shellac, lacquer.

In fact, any of them will gleam on a properly sanded surface. But you can buy the most expensive finish available and if you sanding is done carelessly it will magnify every flaw, scratch and rough spot. Any rough spot will magnify it through a microscope.

Power sanding has become popular, but power sanders can be tricky and if not used properly can ruin a job. Nothing really beats hand-sanding. When you sand by hand you are always in control of the job. It isn't going to get away from you.

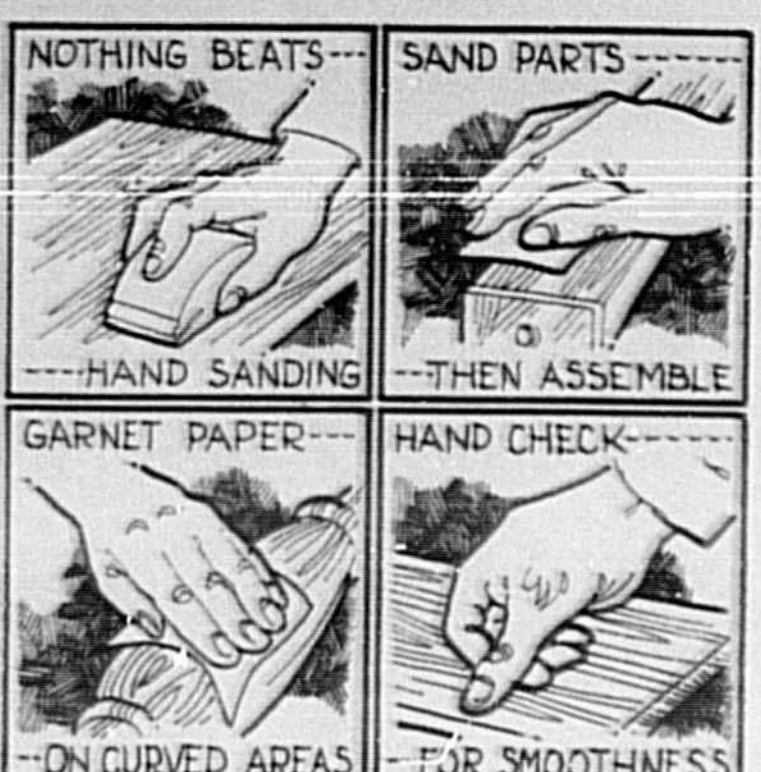
The sanding disc mounted on an electric drill is out so far as fine furniture finishes are concerned. The circular motion of the sanding disc across the grain and the pressure in pushing it to sand "with the grain" is too rough.

The power sander that sands in a straight line is the only thing to use, but it needs a light touch. Keep one place too long or apply too much pressure and it will take off more than necessary.

In hand-sanding, wrap a piece of sandpaper partially around a block of wood. Make a block that will fit the hand comfortably.

The general rule is to start with the coarsest sandpaper and work up to the fine. Actually, on most projects you will start with a medium grit.

If you are building the furniture or assembling the unfinished furniture, sand individual wood parts before



assembling. If you wait until you have put everything together you may find some spots too hard to reach.

Garnet or aluminum oxide paper is generally used. Grades may vary with some manufacturers but general grades is medium, 1 or 2 coarse or very coarse, 3/0 is a fine paper.

Remember to stay with the grain. If you find yourself sanding an area where two pieces come together but the grain runs differently in each, then carefully sand so that you don't cross over onto the other piece.

When you have covered or finished an area, check the work. If you have a "wavy" surface, sand it with the grain. If you have a "rough" surface, sand it across the grain.

POLY'S DOINGS

DEAR POLLY—If you are stuck with a late-night job of typing, set the typewriter on a sheet of foam rubber. It will absorb the noise and no one else will be disturbed.—ELEANOR

(Polly's Note)—Cut one inch squares of foam and place them under the edges of my typewriter so it does not slide or shift on the desk.

DEAR POLLY—It is so easy to make a baby bib that is larger and more practical than those you buy. Fold a washcloth in half, cut a half circle out of the center for the neck, leaving ends on each side long enough to tie. The piece cut out of the center can be used to make a decorative pocket.—WANDA

(Polly's Note)—To be even more economical, the washcloth could be cut along the fold line to make two bibs. After the hole for the neck is cut out, bind the bias tape, leaving enough tape at each end for the ties.

DEAR POLLY—Use an ice cube to relieve the itch of mosquito bites. Hold it on the bite for about half a minute or until the itch has subsided. You will find the pain relieved.—LAURA, age 11

DEAR POLLY—In order to recall just which pattern I used to make a garment, I staple a small swatch of the material to the pattern. When I want to use that pattern again and wonder if it is still the right size or if it needs alterations, I simply try on the finished garment. Just for my own information I make note of the cut of making the garment and any necessary laundry instructions.—MRS. R. A. K.

DEAR POLLY—When at the beach or on a trip with the kids who want to sleep, use small beach balls if you do not have inflatable pillows. Blow the balls up only halfway. They make very good pillows.—T. Y.

DEAR POLLY—Use masking tape over any hole that needs mending. This makes these garments easier to find when mending day arrives. Also, when on a trip, masking tape can be used to hold baby's disposable diapers together if they do not have a tape tab.—MAR. JEAN

DEAR POLLY—Most of us are box-savers, but even then having one the right size can pose a problem. Recently I found among my hoard a couple that were just the right size, but both were soiled. 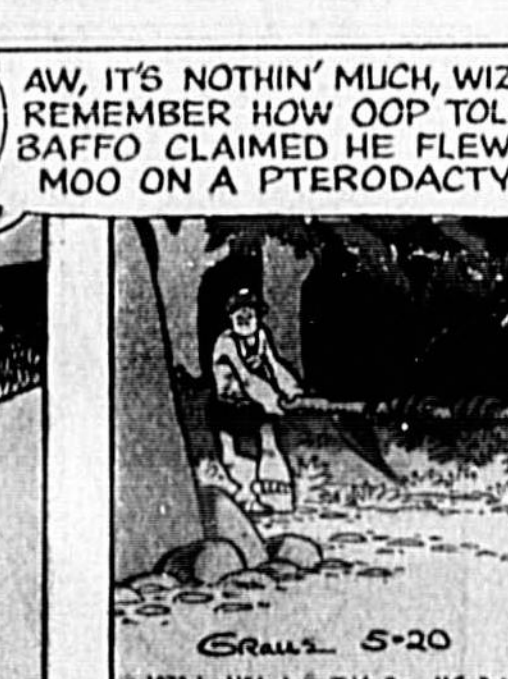

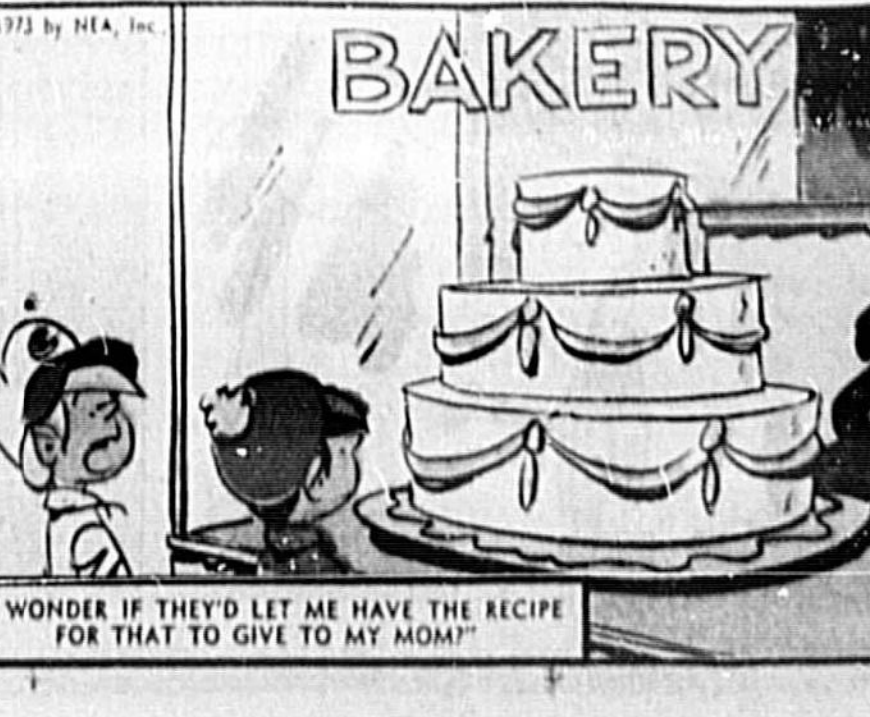

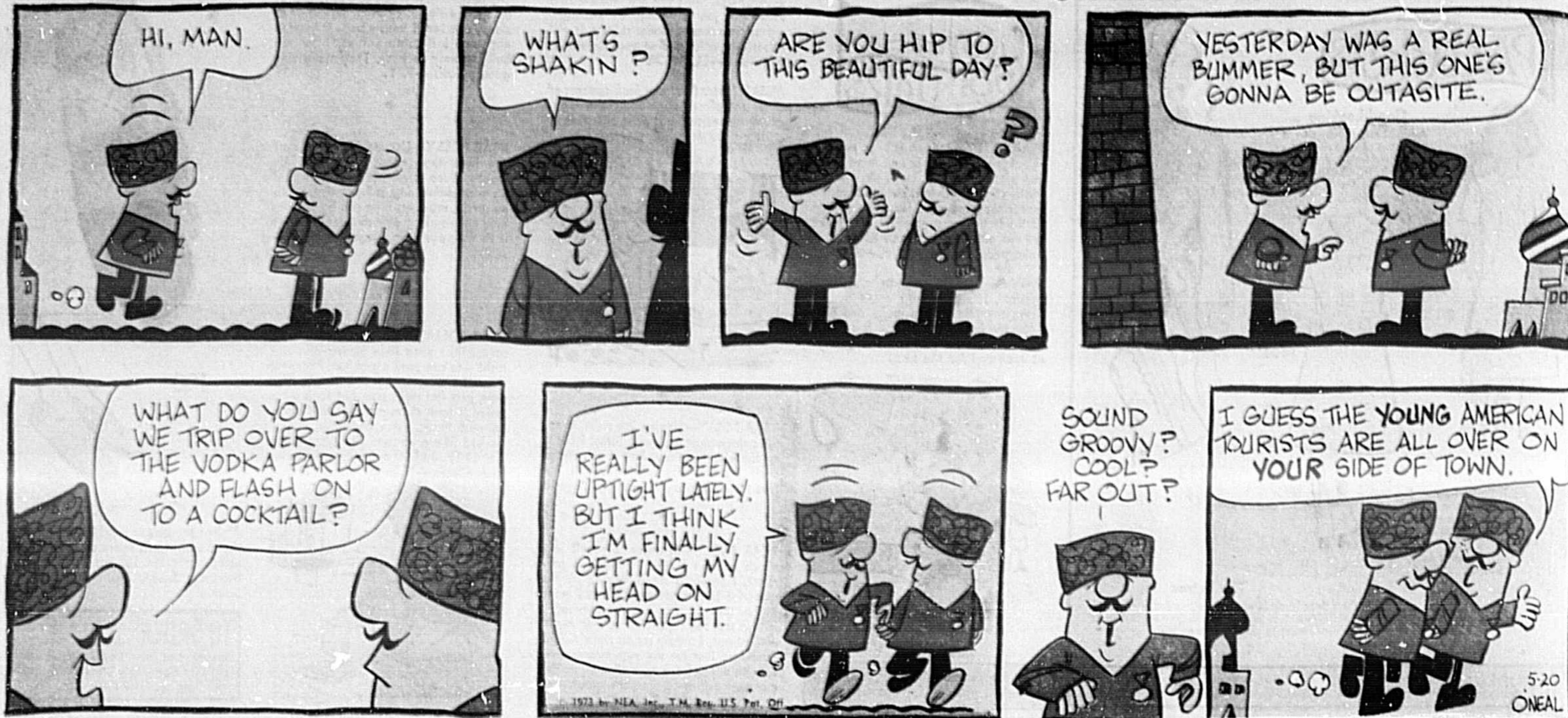

Orlando Mental Hospital Closing Urged By Doctors

MIAMI (AP) — An investigating team has "strongly recommended" closing Florida's largest mental retardation hospital, the Orlando Sunland Center, because of major uncorrected deficiencies.

Another review team member reported that inadequate medical care could endanger patient's lives at the Miami Sunland Center.

The reports, made by two special physician teams in March, have not been released by the state, but the Miami Herald reported on the doctors' findings in today's editions. The Herald said it obtained copies of the reports from an unidentified source.

The team investigating the Orlando facility found that 400 patients were still being served a cereal-like gruel

three times a day one year after another investigation team had urged the meals be upgraded.

The team also said "multiple fire hazards" existed at the Orlando center and criticized certain orders issued by doctors as "frankly hazardous."

"I think our recommendation that the facility be closed reflected our feelings of frustration the second time around," said Dr. Herbert Grossman, one of the members of the review team.

Both reports were made as follow-ups to highly critical investigations of the two institutions last year.

The report on the Miami Sunland Center said "less than adequate" medical care was being provided at the facility. One doctor on the in-

vestigation team said this "could contribute to needless loss of lives."

The Miami center was criticized for possible drug abuse by doctors who prescribed tranquilizers to control patients. The report also criticized medical records at the facility as "wholly inadequate."

The reports did cite some improvement at the institutions.

The committee studying the Orlando facility noted a sharp reduction in the number of controversial gastroenterology operations, where a tube is implanted in a patient's stomach for feeding. The committee said only three new operations were performed last year and said some of the 200 gastroenterology patients are again taking food orally.

High Court Upholds Desegregation Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP)— An equally divided Supreme Court today affirmed a lower court order that held federal district court power to cross school boundaries in pursuit of desegregation.

The decision came in a case from Maryland, No. 54, 72, with no opinion from the court and no word as to how its members voted. An equally divided court automatically affirms a lower court decision.

Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., a long-time member of the High

school board, did not take part in setting up the four-four split.

In January of 1972, U.S. District Court Judge Robert Merigie Jr. ordered the predominantly black Richmond city school system combined with the predominantly white systems in neighboring Henrico and Chesterfield Counties.

In June last year, the U.S. Circuit Court at Richmond, in a 5-1 decision, disagreed with Merigie and reversed his order.

The issue of metropolitan desegregation, has not been settled by the court's action today.

Similar suits are pending in such cities as Detroit, Atlanta and some nine other cities.

The split-court decision is not binding in those cases.

Today's one-voice action by the court read simply: "The judgment is affirmed by an equally divided court."

The Nixon administration had argued against metropolitan desegregation in a sharply worded friend of the court brief.

Poll Links Nixon To 'Bug' Planning

NEW YORK (AP) — A majority of Americans questioned by Time magazine think President Nixon knew about efforts to cover up the Watergate scandal, and 41 per cent figure Nixon approved the break-in plot.

The telephone poll of 1,027 voters last week by Crossley Surveys, Inc., for Time was almost finished before Nixon's latest denial on Friday of such participation in the political espionage case.

Asked whether the President was aware long ago of attempts to suppress Watergate information, 58 per cent replied yes, 25 per cent said no and 17 per cent had no opinion.

Asked whether Nixon knew and approved of the bugging ahead of time, 41 per cent replied yes, 41 per cent said no and 18 per cent had no opinion.

"While only one in four would approve of impeaching Nixon if he was merely aware of the cover-up," Time said, "nearly half believed that he should be removed from office if it is shown that he knew about the plot in advance."

Time added that 62 per cent of those questioned said they voted for Nixon's re-election last November.

Gallup Shows Living Costs Biggest Concern

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — Americans have become more concerned with the high cost of living than with the war in Southeast Asia, according to the Gallup Poll.

The poll also reported that the issue of corruption in government, specifically the Watergate affair, has become a matter of concern to 16 per cent of those polled, compared to one per cent in mid-February.

The 1,531 adults interviewed May 4-6 were asked to name the nation's two most important problems.

Sixty-two per cent named the high cost of living, with crime the second choice at 17 per cent. Governmental corruption and drugs followed with 16 per cent each.

Only seven per cent of those surveyed named the "Southeast Asia situation" as the major concern. According to a Gallup poll conducted in late January, the war was considered the major concern by 35 per cent of the public.

Shoe Robber Convicted

An 18-year-old Oviedo man has been convicted of an \$8.60 robbery in which an old man's money for new shoes was taken.

A circuit court jury at Sanford found Robert Lee McKeever, 18, guilty Friday. Circuit Judge Robert McGregor ordered a pre-sentence investigation and set sentencing for July 16.

An elderly Oviedo man, Lawrence Lemons, who lives in an abandoned bus, said he had been saving the \$8.60 to buy a new pair of shoes when it was taken by McKeever.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Harvard University professor Archibald Cox testified today he is satisfied he has been granted all the power anyone could ask to be an independent special prosecutor in the Watergate case and related matters.

Cox, a Democrat who served as U.S. solicitor general for five years by appointment of the late President John F. Kennedy, testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

He was accompanied by Elliot L. Richardson, whose nomination to be attorney general is pending before the committee.

Turner Firm To Court

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—Arraignment is scheduled Thursday in U.S. District Court here in the indictment of three companies founded by Orlando promoter Glenn W. Turner.

Turner and well-known Boston defense lawyer F. Lee Bailey were also named in the 28-count mail fraud indictment returned Friday in Orlando.

No date has been set for Turner and Bailey's arraignment. Bailey served as legal counsel for the Florida businessman and Koscoet Interplanetary, Inc., one of the companies under indictment.

The three firms named in the charges include Glenn W. Turner Enterprises, Inc., the parent organization headquartered here, Koscoet, a cosmetics firm and Dare To Be Great, a motivational course.

Bailey 49, noted for his defense of Dr. Sam Shephard and the Boston stranger, was accused of appearing in misleading, filmed promotions of Dare To Be Great.

The indictment charges that the defendants "to numerous fraud persons" to numerous "mention" to induce them to buy distributorships in Turner's cosmetics and motivation firms and used the mails to further the alleged scheme.

Turner is reported out of the country but his lawyer says he'll be back by Wednesday.

Bailey claims he was charged because the U.S. Postal Service wants to get back at him for criticism of postal inspectors in his book, "The Defense Never Rests."

He was formerly employed with IBM at Cape Kennedy, leaving that position to seek a masters at Rollins College.

Fireman Hurt In Explosion

Lake Mary volunteer fireman Tom Jeters was on the job as usual today—24 hours after being knocked unconscious and burned about the face and hands by an explosion while fighting a house fire.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Les Padgett, Orange Boulevard, was destroyed, firemen said, by a blaze which started by a water heater.

Jeters, treated for his burns at Seminole Memorial Hospital, said he had just crawled into the Padgett's kitchen and was reaching up to turn on a hose nozzle "when all hell broke loose."

Witnesses said Jeters, married and the father of three, was thrown from the building by the force of the explosion, believed caused by aerosol cans stored under the sink.

Jeters, conceding "I got singed-up pretty good," said the fire tragedy "was just one of those things. My wife isn't too pleased about it, but I'll stay with the department."

However, Jeters added, "from now on I'm gonna look under the sink before I stick my face in."
