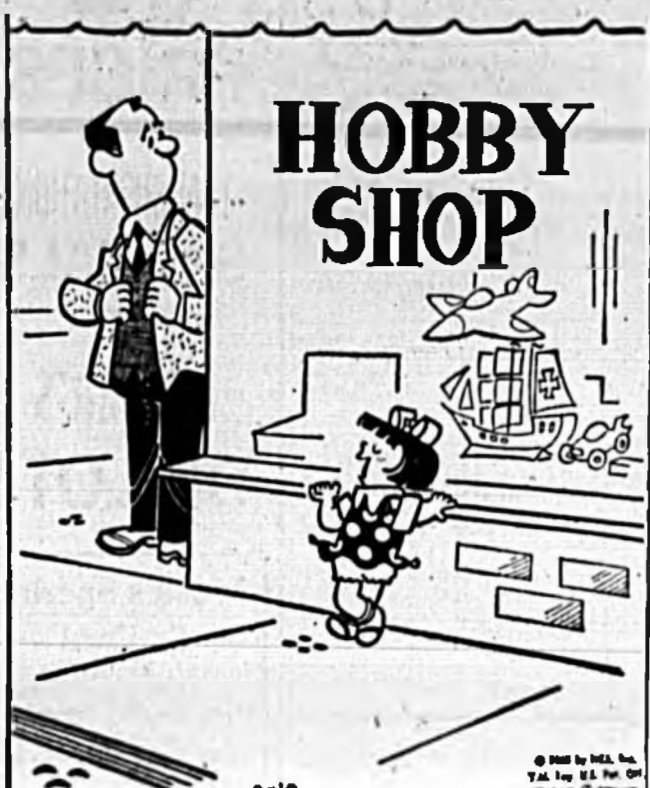

New Charter Hearing Slated At Casselberry

Dates for public hearings on the proposed new charter for the Town of Casselberry have been set by the charter committee for 7:30 p.m. Feb. 23-24-25. Meetings will be held at the Town Hall.

Members of the committee, Art Lego, R. F. Tucker and L. E. Woodhams, will be present to answer questions concerning the document and they urge all interested citizens to attend so there will be no misunderstanding as to meaning of proposed changes.

Beginning this Thursday, copies of the charter will be available from the town clerk, Mrs. Mary Hawthorne, for examination at town hall. Residents will not be able to take these copies home as only a limited number were printed due to costs.

After the public has opportunity for open discussion at the hearings, changes or amendments will be incorporated into the proposal before it is sent to the State Legislature prior to the March 6 deadline. If it is approved, it will be returned to the town for a referendum vote of the people.

An effort to obtain a new charter was stymied two years ago for lack of voter support.

Among main points provided in the new charter, as reported by Woodhams, are improved methods of controlling taxation, power of condemnation to allow for city growth, salaries for mayor and council-

men and changing of Casselberry's status from "town" to "city."
The new charter also will give more power to the voting public in contrast to the present charter which gives the council almost unlimited power, Woodhams said.

Captain Mayo Awaits Orders Of Transfer

Capt. James O. Mayo, who probably more than any one person locally kept "afloat" the Sanford Naval Air Station when it was almost "sunk" a year ago in an economy wave, is expecting momentarily orders of transfer from his present post as commanding officer of Reconnaissance Attack Wing One.

The future Wing commander, Capt. Richard Edward Fowler Jr., has arrived at the station where he is taking a Vigilante familiarization course. Captain Mayo, although in Navy consideration on sea duty at SNAS, is expecting orders transferring him to a surface craft some time in May or June.

It was a year ago, a week before the 10th annual Bomb Derby at the base, that it was rumored Sanford Naval Air Station would be closed and its personnel and activities transferred elsewhere.

However, top Navy officials from throughout the world converged on Sanford during Bomb Derby week to observe activities of Wing One and its reconnaissance-attack squadrons. It was during that week when Captain Mayo led local Navy and civilian officials in convincing the visiting high Navy officers that Sanford Naval Air Station should not only be continued but its facilities expanded.

Wednesday's announcement from Washington that Congress has been asked by President Johnson to include \$67 million in the military budget for expansion of the local base bears out the results of Captain Mayo's and the local Navy and civilian officials' "message" to those visiting Navy officers.

Captain Mayo has had a wide and varied career, in and out of the Navy. He entered naval flight training during World War II, winning his wings at Pensacola. He was a torpedo plane pilot aboard several aircraft carriers during the war.

Washington (UPI) — Dock union leaders and ship-owners, under pressure from President Johnson to end a "totally unjustified" strike, launch make-or-break settlement talks today with a presidential board.

Representatives of shippers and the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) from Galveston, Tex., and Miami, Fla. — the two big holdout ports in the strike — were to meet with the board for the urgent talks.

Johnston Wednesday night called on Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, Commerce Secretary John T. Connor, and Sen. Wayne L. Morse (D-Ore.), to get to the bottom of the month-old walkout at East and Gulf coast ports. The strike is costing \$67 million a day.

The panel was to hear the arguments of both sides in separate meetings and was under orders from the President to report back to him by noon (EST) Friday with its recommendations.

Capt. Swanson Tells Of Plan

The booming noise of Navy jets taking off and landing at Sanford Naval Air Station soon will be a thing of the past for Sanford area residents . . . if the U. S. Congress approves.

"For a long time," said Captain Swanson, "these people have been most understanding despite the increasing tempo of training operations at this base. The RA-3C, with its two J79 engines, is a wonderful weapons system but it does make a lot of noise. Our neighbors warrant encouragement in this connection."

Included in the military budget sent by President Johnson to the Congress is an item of \$6.2 million for SNAS . . . and this figure includes funds for land acquisition and construction of a 6,000-foot extension of the north-south runway.

This extension will double the length of the present runway and will permit Navy aircraft coming in to circle to the east of the base in a southerly direction, turn over Lake Jessup and head north for a landing. The pattern would be reversed should the prevailing wind be in the opposite direction.

"In view of the recent release of information from Washington," it was stated this morning by Capt. C. W. Swanson, commanding officer of Sanford Naval Air Station, "it appears appropriate to provide additional information to the people of Sanford, both civilian and military, on what it means to this area."

He continued: "Congressman (A. S.) Herlong released information to The Herald which, in effect, describes improvements and construction at NAS Sanford with a dollar amount of \$6.7 million. One of the items in the budget which he mentions is 'runway extension and land acquisition.'"

"I would especially like to address myself to the runway picture. It is this aspect which most concerns the people living near the Naval Air Station."

"Assuming that Congress will approve this budget for NAS Sanford, and I am confident that it will, the north-south runway will be extended and thereby allow most of the traffic to assume a new pattern."

The present main east-west runway . . . use of which brings about the noise . . . is 10,000 feet long, extending eastward from the south end of Mellonville Avenue at 25th Street.

The north-south runway presently is 6,000 feet long and is used only for emergency purposes. It extends southward from SR 46 (25th Street). The 6,000-foot extension will continue southward through present (mostly swampland) toward Lake Jessup.

Upon completion (and again subject to congressional approval) the northern 2,000 feet of the north-south runway will not be used, except in emergency, to provide noise relief for business and residents along Highway 44.

This runway would have been under construction now except for the economy "scare" a year ago, when the Navy deleted the item from its budget request. The present budget request is for the fiscal year 1966.

Maneuvers Seen

Longwood Youth Dies In Crash
Vail Lewis Lambert, 17-year-old Longwood High School student, was killed shortly before 7 p. m. Wednesday at the intersection of SR 434 and Interstate 4, when his scooter hit a truck.

Woodrow Strickland, 33, of Winter Garden, driver of the truck, told Florida Highway Patrolmen L. D. Harrell and John McConnell that the motor scooter had no lights and he did not see the boy until he crashed into the truck. Lambert, who lived at Rt. 1, Box 880, apparently died of head and body injuries when he was thrown to the pavement by the collision.

'Heavy' Dock Talks Pushed To Hunt End Of Long Feud

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Dock union leaders and ship-owners, under pressure from President Johnson to end a "totally unjustified" strike, launch make-or-break settlement talks today with a presidential board.

The panel named Wednesday will be similar in function to the special board, headed by Morse, which negotiated a settlement in a 34-day dock strike in January, 1963.

As in the present case, that board was named after other legal remedies had been exhausted. The 1963 strike ended when both sides accepted the panel's recommended 37-cent-an-hour pay increase.

"Moving Day" Expected Soon

"One of the outstanding features is the attached auto center which will have four-car service bays and provide full, front-to-rear auto service and repair work," he pointed out.

"Preparations are now under way for our planned move to the new store. However, due to circumstances beyond Penney's control, we have not been able to move ahead as quickly as we would have liked. Nevertheless, we want to assure our customers that we will be open later this year," Robinson emphasized.

"We feel that this new department store, which will be the largest in Seminole County, is well worth waiting for and will be a tremendous modern, convenient, one-stop merchandising center for area shoppers," Robinson declared.

Higher Return Seen For Valencia Crops

LAKELAND (UPI) — Florida growers should get a better return for their valencia orange crop if the U.S. Department of Agriculture's latest crop forecast holds.

The department in its monthly estimate released Wednesday knocked 3 million boxes of valencias off the predicted Florida crop. Citrus officials said this should insure a better market price for the late season crop.

The government estimated the total orange crop at 80.6 million boxes, a net change of only one million boxes from the January prediction.

Almost balancing the drop in the valencia prediction was an increase of two million boxes in the forecast for early and mid-season varieties, which will have been harvested by next week.

Valencias go primarily for imping orange concentrate and Citrus Mutual Executive Vice President Robert W. Rutledge said orange concentrate sales already are excellent and that in the past two weeks consumer spending topped \$11 million.

The government broke its orange crop estimate into 36 million boxes of valencias and 44.6 million boxes of early and mid-season oranges. The California estimate was 28.5 million boxes overall.

Herchig was driving toward Sanford on 17-92 when he collided with a truck driven by William Edward Klinefelter of 813 Escambia Drive.

Highway Patrol Trooper Jerry Hawthorne and Constable Bob Carroll, investigating officers, said "Klinefelter had stopped prior to making a left turn into the Inn's parking lot. After approaching traffic had gone, the truck driver made his left turn and into the path of the motorbike."

Soviet Boss Seeks North Korean Unity

TOKYO (UPI)—Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin flew from Peking to North Korea today, possibly to line up a united Communist front against the United States in Viet Nam.

The official Soviet news agency Tass reported from Moscow that Kosygin and a delegation of top Russian officials concluded a one-day visit to Peking and flew to Pyongyang, the capital of Communist North Korea.

Kosygin's decision to visit North Korea was not announced until Wednesday and came as a surprise. Radio Pyongyang said Kosygin was greeted at the airport by Premier Kim Il Sung of North Korea, reviewed an honor guard and then was driven to the government's guest house. The radio report said the leaders of both countries exchanged greetings at a brief welcome ceremony, but there was no immediate indication how long the visit would last.

North Korea, like Red China and North Viet Nam, has been the scene of massive public demonstrations protesting South Vietnamese and U.

'Outsider' Prods Sanfordites - Kiwanians Accept Challenge

Tom Gilchrist, the keen-eyed, plain-spoken "outsider" from WESH-TV Ch. 2, who startled Seminole Countians into almost instant action 13 weeks ago came back to Sanford Wednesday and gave the county a pat on the back and a prod in the ribs.

"You have recognized your greatest problem — Orlando is taking your customers away from you. You've faced this and you are in the process of overcoming it," he told members of the Kiwanis Club at the Civic Center.

"You can annex Orlando — because you have got something Orlandoans, Orange Countians and all of Central Florida and the state wants — the most beautiful natural asset in the state — five miles of waterfront," he pointed out.

"It's easy for me to come over here and tell you how to solve your problems — I don't have to worry about the money and you do. Your waterfront development plan is a mighty undertaking. But any part of it you can afford to build in a great improvement, when you build into Sanford what your competitors want and haven't got," he declared.

"You've simply got to be louder, stronger and more determined than any larger city or county — you can be the most beautiful, desirable and attractive community in the state, cause millions of people to set a visit to Sanford as their destination. If they enjoy themselves, they'll stay

here and spend their money," he predicted.

"The simple fact is, you have got to try harder than anyone else to preserve your place under the sun," he declared.

Gilchrist noted that the job is not going to be made any easier if the proposed legislative reapportionment goes through.

"Seminole County and all other small counties will be in a precarious position if you lose your proportionate representation in the state — the Dade-Broward-Palm Beach, Duval, and Pinellas-Hillsborough county areas will be able to out-vote all the rest of the state combined.

"You must face this and be prepared to overcome it," he stated.

Gilchrist again urged that everything possible be done to beautify and illuminate the exits from Interstate 4 and also the entire lakefront drive from I-4 into Sanford. He also suggested that the water towers be painted with a glowing, luminous paint that can be seen for great distances.

Gilchrist advised Kiwanians that plans are in the works at Channel 2 to give a great deal of additional publicity to Seminole County by means of special feature presentations highlighting present natural attractions such as the Sanford zoo and the Big Tree.

"You have some highly interesting, but little known

tourist attractions here. You haven't asked us, but we are going to publicize them in forthcoming feature productions," he promised.

Following Gilchrist's speech Kiwanis President Bill Fransa announced:

"Kiwanis accepts your challenge and your help. We

have long been known as 'builders of men' — now we are going to be known as 'builders of the community.'"

'Gold Cover' Approval Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate approval is expected next week of a measure to abolish the historic requirement that one-fourth of all federal reserve bank deposits be backed by a comparable value in gold. The House handed President Johnson an overwhelming victory, passing the so-called "gold cover" legislation on a roll call vote of 300 to 82. Voting for the measure were 255 Democrats and 45 Republicans; opposing it were 72 Republicans and 10 Democrats. The effect of the bill, if approved by the Senate, would be to free \$4.75 billion worth of gold to meet overseas demands on the U. S. gold supply, thus strengthening the dollar abroad and providing some extra insurance for prosperity at home.

GOP Senators Hit Transfer Of Power

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two GOP senators voiced misgiving today about a proposed constitutional amendment to set procedures for a transfer of power to the vice president if the president should become disabled.

The strongest statement came from GOP Senate Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., in comments accompanying the report of the Senate Judiciary Committee, which approved the proposal last week.

Dirksen and Sen. Roman L. Hruska, R-Neb., were the only members of the committee to express reservations about the proposed amendment, which is sponsored by Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind.

The Republican leader said it might be ill-advised to pass the amendment. He said the Bayh proposal contained too many specific details to be included in the Constitution.

The present wording would deter flexibility in the future, Dirksen said, adding that he would rather see an amendment allowing Congress to set the procedures for a take-over by the president by law.

Hruska, although he said the Bayh proposal was not to his liking, said an amendment of some sort was so urgently needed he would support it.

Other congressional news: Education: Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., was scheduled to lead off witnesses testifying on President Johnson's \$1.2 billion school aid program before a Senate education sub-committee. Others to be called included AFL-CIO representatives.

Tobacco: Undersecretary of Agriculture Charles S. Murphy was to appear for the administration at a House agriculture subcommittee hearing on proposed tobacco acreage-poundage marketing quotas for this year's crop.

The bride comes from Liverpool, the home of the "Mersey" sound the Beatles have popularized.

The parents of both the bride and the bridegroom attended the ceremony, along with Beatles George Harrison and John Lennon. Lennon's wife, Cynthia, also was present.

Rumors of marriage have been reported since last May when Maureen accompanied Ringo on a Caribbean vacation.

Wild West Lore Falls To Space

CALABASAS, Calif. (UPI) — A remnant of the Wild West yielded to a Saturn II moon rocket Wednesday when the "Hangman's Tree" was uprooted so the rocket could be trucked past it.

The problems began when North American Aviation wanted to truck the rocket — 33 feet wide and 88 feet long — from the plant in Seal Beach, Calif., where it was constructed, to a test site in the Santa Susanna Mountains at the west end of the San Fernando Valley.

The tree, which has stood for more than a century, is an historical monument and by law cannot be destroyed. The aerospace firm hired one of the country's top tree experts, who decided the tree could be uprooted and moved about 100 feet — far enough to permit the rocket to pass. A huge crane moved the tree to its new location.
