President proposes bonds for school construction funding President Bill Clinton is proposing that Congress pass \$1.3 billion in bonds for Florida to build and modernize schools as part of his school construction proposal. Under the plan outlines in the President's Fiscal Year 2000 budget request to Congress, the federal govemment would provide nearly \$25 billion in interest free bonds to build or renovate up to 6,000 public schools nationwide.

Initial estimates for Florida include a State Allocation of \$2.39 million, qualified Zone Academy Bonds of 110.5 million, plus funding to a number of school districts. School Districts to receive funding include Brevard County, 33.7 million; Broward County, 107.1 million; Dade County, 314.2 million; Duval County, 78.9 million; Escambla County, 40,4 million; Hillsborough County, 101.7 million; Marion County, 8.3 million; Orange County, 66.6 million; Palm Beach County, 67.7 million; Pinellas 2.6 million; Poll 8.9 In 1995, the General Accounting Office (GAO) found that 60 percent of schools nationwide needed at least one major building repair. The GAO also reported that 85 percent of the schools in Florida are in need of upgrades or repairs. Last year, the American Society of Civil Engineers graded schools an "F" on their report card of national infrastructure needs. In addition, the enrollment of children in elementary and secondary schools nationwide, currently a record 52.7 million, is expected to continue climbing. Under the President's initiative, the federal government would subsidize the issuance of \$22 billion in special 15-year school modemization bonds over the next two years, with \$11 billion in 2000 and \$11 billion in 2001.

LONGWOOD - Longwood city commissioners got their first formal look at the city's spending plan for fiscal year 1999-2000 at the conclusion of Monday's special meeting dealing with amendments to the city charter.

City administrator John Drag presented a budget figure of \$10.7 million that will hold the city's current tax millage

Longwood commission considers budget No tax rate increase planned

rate at 5.0601, marking the seventh year city taxpayers will face no increase. The millage rate means Longwood property owners would pay \$5.06 for each \$1,000 of assessed property value after Florida's \$25,000 homestead exemption is factored

Drago indicated the city expects revenues of \$10.9 million leaving a total of \$131,650 to be placed back in the city's general fund reserve. The proposed budget reflects an increase of 9.5 percent in revenues received and a 7.9 percent decrease in expenditures without touching the city's general reserve fund. Last fiscal year Longwood drew

\$1,738,250 from its general fund reserve to pay the city's operating expenses and

debt service. After allocations of \$3 million for current street paving projects and another \$1,334,823 for the construction of a new community building, the city's general fund reserve will total \$3.9 million or 21 percent of the general fund revenues.

"This is a well prepared document," said Drago. "It tells the commissioners exactly what each department is responsible for and exactly what each depart-See Longwood, Page 2A

Commission candidates begin amassing campaign dollars

Van Der Weide leads pack; Nicholas, West run against incumbent McLain

SANFORD - Daryl McLain's seat on the Board of Seminole County Commisisoners has attracted two challengers - Don Nicholas and Bob West.

Finishing his second term representing District 5, McLain said Thursday that he was ready for two, three as many as five contenders.

"There were three last time I ran," McLain said. "It's no big deal how many there are. What it does mean is that more than likely there will be a runoff."

McLain has just begun his campaign, raising \$4,600 and spending \$615 through June 30. He has fun raisers planned on July 27 (a women's lunch at the Altamonte Hilton) and an Aug. 6 golf tournament at Heathrow County Club.

Nicholas, who ran against McLain four years ago took a \$2,000 loan to get started in Campaign 2000.

West lost in the most recent election to District 2 Commissioner Randy Morris. Less than 15 percent of the eligible voters particapated in the 1998 county election. West decised to try again as a District 5 challenger.

Next year, the radio stations will again choreograph music simultaneously with the fireworks.



Drago said normally a municipality of Longwood's size would hold approximately 10 percent of its general fund in reserve. He said Longwood's reserve is double that because the city dipped into the reserve a year ago and he felt more comfortable is estimated outside revenues on the conservative side. The city receives approximately \$5 million or roughly 50 percent of its revenue from sources including State Revenue Sharing funds. "We would rather estimate on the conservative side as far as budget stability goes," said Drago.

"I think its a good spending plan and a good foundation for for better planning and better budget forecasting."

Highlights of the general fund budget include a variety of master planning in order to better budget city resources for future improvements. Areas for master planning in the 1999-2000 budget include The Historic District, Parks and Recreational Facilities, and Public Works Facilities.

Other budget provisions call for:

• Fund allocations for retaining a consultant to rewrite the

Land Development Code. • Utilization of a private contractor to mow and maintain a variety of rights of way.

Under a new budget format approved in March by the city commission, this year's document reflects several changes in presentation and consolidation. The budgets for Longwood's utility billing and general services have been combined and placed in the general fund under the Financial Services Department. The city's **Recreational programs have** been separated from property maintenance and placed under the Community Services depart-ment. Public Works Administration, Streets and Fleet budgets have been combined into one program budget. **General Services budget reflects** all expenses relative to the

been budgeted to continue the City's computer replacement program and \$1,334,823 from the sale of the Longwood Health Care Center has been budgeted to construct the new Community Building.

The City will also make its last payment of \$37,272.89 in April of 2000, on an ambulance that was lease-purchased in 1997. Following that payment the City will not have any long-term debt liability.

"This is a good picture of where the city stands," added Drago.

Commissioners can now schedule another workshop on the budget if they choose, or schedule two public hearings on the proposed budget prior to September 31. The city must adopt its fiscal budget by October 1.

The Knicks rewarded Bradley



her face.

Wood told deputies he did swing at his wife with the sports section of the newspaper but did not make contact with her. He denied in the report squeezing his wife's face and told deputies she left their home with no Injuries. Neither Wood nor his wife would sign written statements.

In the Sheriff's report Mrs. Wood told deputies their has been mental abuse during her eight-year marriage and that there had been one previous incident when Wood laid his hands on his wife in anger. The deputies report indicates that Mrs. Wood had abrasions on the left side of her face and what appeared to be a very small laceration on her left cheek.

Formal charges against Wood are pending the outcome of a review of the case by the State Attorney's office.

"There was not enough information to corroborate the allegations" explained Sheriff's department spokesperson Dearna Brown. "There was no imminent danger, she was not returning to the house."

A writ of capias requires the State Attorney's office to review the case, weigh the merits of its findings, determine the likelihood of success at trial and then make a decision on whether or not to file charges. If they determine the case warrants prosecution, an arrest order would be issued and Wood would be formally charged.

Wednesday evening's incident was the third brush with trouble for judge Wood since 1994. A year ago this month the Florida Judicial Qualifications Commission recommended that Wood receive a public reprimand by the Florida State Supreme Court for comments he had made in court to attorneys and their clients. Wood received a similar admonishment in 1994 by the chairman of the Judicial Qualifications Commission, charged with investigating complaints against judges.

Do we need more than 10 commandments?

Dr. Laura Schlessinger, the radio talk show host who can be as morally uncompromising as the God of the Old Testament, added something new to her repertoire last year - a book called "The Ten Commandments: The Significance of God's Laws in Everyday Life" (Harpercollins, 1998), co-su-thored with Rabbi Stewart Vogel.

The world can probably use another book on the commandments. Not that the Ten Commandments we have now aren't good ones. But 19 may not be enough any more. As a matter of fact, if you believe the 1981 Mel Brooks movie, "History of the World Part I. there were than 10 in the original set.

As the film tells it, Moses came down Mount Sinai with 15 commandments on stone tablets. But then he tripped and fell, and five of the commandments shattered at his feet.

"Oh, well, we still have 10 left," said Moses as he proceeded down the mountain to deliver the remaining

laws to his people. But in a sinning world like ours, can we get along with only 10? Just for the fun of it, let's say the story is true. If we were to replace the five commandments Moses broke, what would we put in their place? How about, "Thou shalt not lie"?

Many people are surprised to learn that there is no commandment against lying. The one that comes closest is Thou shalt not bear false witness

against thy neighbor." But the meaning of this commandment is "You must not tell lies in court." It is a law against perjury. There is nothing in the commandments forbidding the kind of lying to each other that we do all the time.

How about a commandment against violence? As playwright Arthur Miller said, "There is violence because we have daily honored violence. Any halfeducated man in a good suit can make his fortune by concocting a TV show whose brutality is photographed in suf-

ficiently monstrous detail."

Do we need a companion commandment against vulgarity? Televi-sion and the movies have lowered our appreciation of refinement and the es-thetic side of life to near zero by get-

ting us to dwell on the gross. Behind all these sins may be the sin of moral indifference. We could do something about all these things that drag life down. But we don't.

We could do something about preserving our countryside and keeping our cities and towns in a fit state to be enjoyed. But instead we have blacktopped the green, green grass of our island home and polluted the good Earth. The cry of the environmentalist has been drowned out by the sound of the jackhammer.

Do we need a commandment on sex? We already have a commandment against adultery, but there is nothing in the Decalogue about sex outside of marriage unless it involves someone else's spour

the bedroom door open. Our most crying need may be for a commandment against rudeness, as the Rev. Donald McCullough, president of the San Francisco Theological Seminary, says in his new book on courteous behavior and civility titled "Say Please, Say Thank You" (Putnam Publishing Group, 1998).

I could go on and on. There are still enough unwritten commandments for a Dr. Laura sequel. Or two.



Changes occurring at Seminole High

SANFORD --- Summer school is ending this week at Seminole High School, and when the entire student population return in August, they will find new computers in the classrooms, face a seven-period day instead of six periods, and will need to become acquainted with a new principal.

By January, the new community swimming pool at Seminole High School is expected to be complete. Students are already registering for spring semester swimming classes at the Olympic-sized pool.

Shortly after the fall semester begins, new principal Karen Coleman said every classroom in the school will have a computer. The school is receiving 100 new computers for the coming year.

The seven period day will allow students to take a wider variety of classes each semester, Coleman said.

"It gives students more choices as to the courses they want to take," Coleman said. "It's a real plus."

The classrooms will also have a fresh coat of paint. The school district recently completed a six month painting project on all the buildings in the school.

For the 2000-2001 school year, the district is considering creating a new entrance to the school. Main traffic would be routed beside the baseball and football fields, instead of at the current main entrance. The bus tamp would remain where it is, and student drop-off would be located beside the Guidance Department.

District staff is still working on the early planning stages of the project.

"This would open up the traffic flow considerably," Coleman said. "We can have terrible traffic jams when there are football games and other events."

Seminole High School received news this week that it has been accepted as an affiliated International Baccalaureate (IB) school. Seminole High School will gain full 1B status on Aug. 31, 2000.

Students entering the magnate program take a rigorous set of English, social studies, math, and foreign language courses.

"You can't get much more rigorous than this," Coleman said. "These are exceptional, capable students in the program."

The school's Health Academy magnate program is also continuing to flourish, Coleman said. More than 500 students are expected to participate in either the IB or Health Academy magnate programs, which are open to students throughout Seminole County.

"They have labs that look like hospital rooms," Coleman said of the Health Academy. "Students go into hospitals, nursing homes, and long-term care facilities for practical experience."

Seminole High School also received Advanced Placement test scores this week. Students receive college credit if they receive a score of at least three on a scale of one to five. Seminole students took AP tests in 16 different subjects. Out of 171 students taking AP tests, 63 percent passed and 17

made the top score of five. "That's a pretty good report," Coleman said. "These are very difficult tests to pass." Seminole's enrollment is

increasing, with 2,300 students

expected this year, including a freshman class of 800. More than 1,000 students were enrolled in each of the two summer school sessions.

"I'm very impressed with the young people I'm meeting." Coleman sald.

Coleman transferred to Seminole this summer following the retirement of Gretchen Schapker, who was the Seminole High School principal for eight years. Schapker was the State of Florida Region III High School Principal of the Year. Coleman was an assistant principal at Winter Springs High School.

However, this is also a homecoming for Coleman, who graduated from Seminole High School in 1964. She started her teaching career at Sanford Grammar in the 1967-68 school year.

"Everyday it is still a thrill when I drive on campus and know that it really is true that I am the next principal of Seminole High School," Coleman said. "There is so much tradition here."







Forget Big Brother, look out for the Big Banker

At a recent convention bankers were told about new software that will help them target "prof-Itable customers."

If banks decide to accept and use this software, it will change how you interact with your bank-or whether you interact at all. If you're unprofitable to the bank, it will not want you or your money. These software designers project that in the future consumers will bank almost entirely via phone and the Internet. The branch banks what remain will be staffed by "sales reps", not tellers. Bank employees will get a commission for each mortgage loan or investment portfolio landed with a "profitable customer."

The vice president of First Manhattan Consulting Group told bankers that with the new software customers will be required to supply personal data such as: salary, age, marital status, debt, number of job and residence changes, education and property owned, just to open a checking account. Anyone identified as a "loser" might get a checking account, but at a higher price. "you charge them higher fees because you don't want them-make them know they're not welcome."

Unprofitable customers would also pay a price in terms of service. Every time a customer calls or emails a bank, the sales rep need only type in the name to view the customer's profile.

"You answer the cash cows first," said the vice president. "The losers can wait 20 minutes if they call in a question."

Why are banks looking at this type of software? Fear. If banks are invested in an up and down stock market, with chaos in stock markets in other countries, they need a safety net, which is the "cash cow customers." They aren't targeting these people to gouge them with fees. They just want to make a profit through cross-selling a lot of bank products to them.

In fact, some banks are starting to evaluate college students as far as how profitable they can be as customers. These banks are particularly interested in computer and biotech majors.

Oracle Corp., which is a leading Internet consultant for bankers, suggest banks start collecting more than demographic and geographic data about customers. It recommends software that collects data such as hobbies, political opinions, maga-

zine subscriptions and clubs

joined, recent purchases, restaurants and designer boutiques frequented. This information will allow banks that own unrelated business like casinos or hotels to also market those services to their customers.

Off the record, most bankers at the convention bluntly stated that they don't want a no-frills checking account customer whose average balance is less than \$1,000 and who pays his low interest credit card debt in full each month. They are not profitable. Some may even cost the bank money.

With this type of automated system where do promoters suggest no frills customers go? Well, they suggest biometric ATMs could be an option. The machines identify users by fingerprints, facial dimensions or distinctive marks in the iris of the eye. Once a person is in the database, he/she can cash his/her paycheck at one of these ATMs for a fee of 1 to 3 percent of the check's total. If the customer doesn't want to carry all that cash around, this type of ATM is being upgraded to issue travel checks for the balance.
