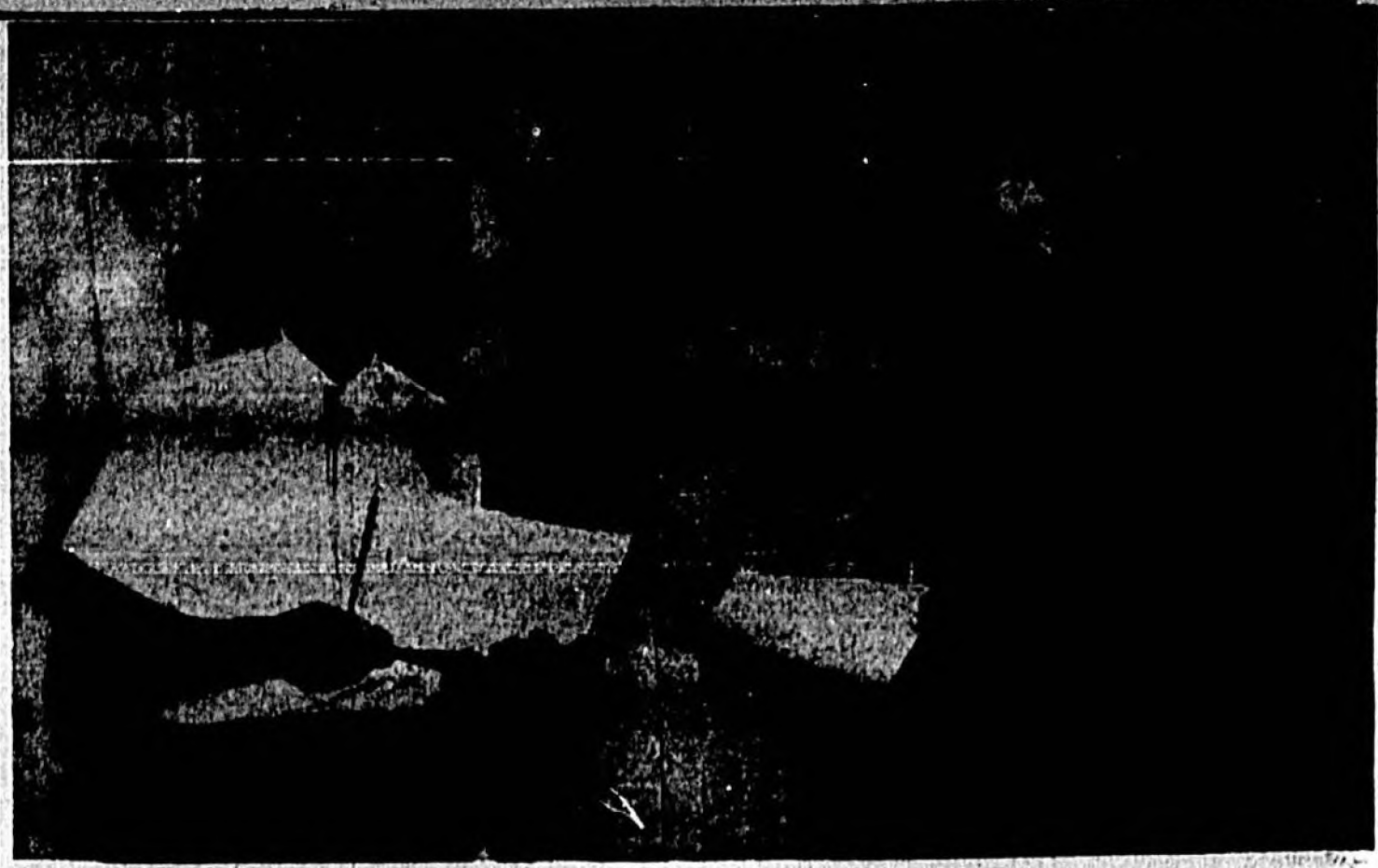

Peptic Ulcers

NEW YORK—A medical statistician who had a prominent part in building a statistical connection between cigarette smoking and cancer, now concludes that smoking is neither an important nor a direct cause of peptic ulcer.

Dr. Richard Doll proceeded statistically with peptic ulcer much as he had with lung cancer. That is, there were statistical comparisons of the smoking habits of persons with the disease against the smoking habits of persons who didn't have it.

But as regards peptic ulcer, these comparisons "may be interpreted in several ways," Doll said. One way is that the egg came before the chicken—"The presence of an ulcer stimulated the desire to smoke," since some ulcer patients report their symptoms are relieved by a cigarette.

Predisposition May Be Involved
Another way is that psychologically a given person is predisposed both for peptic ulcer formation and cigarette smoking. The third possibility, he continued, is that smoking directly contributes to "the production or maintenance of some of the ulcers."

But if the latter were so, you would expect the statistics to reveal a greater proportion of heavy smokers among ulcer patients than among those who had no ulcers. Doll's statistics did not bear out the expectation.

However, an unknown factor was involved here, he said. Had heavy smokers with ulcers cut down on their smoking or stopped altogether as part of the medical treatment of their ulcers? Physicians often give such advice to ulcer patients, he pointed out.

His statistics were derived from questionnaires; there was no chance of getting this question answered. So he took smokers with ulcers one by one as they were admitted to a hospital for treatment. One was advised to stop smoking, the next was not. This went on until there were 40 who had been told to stop and 40 who hadn't.

All 80 were given the same medical treatment, which included four weeks in bed. After treatment, the ulcers of 75 per cent of those who were told to stop smoking, were at least two-thirds healed and the average reduction in the size of their ulcer cavities was 78.1 per cent.

Two-Thirds Healed
The ulcers of 85 per cent of those who had been told nothing and so had continued to smoke at the same rate were at least two-thirds healed, and the average reduction in the size of ulcer cavities was 88.8 per cent.

Nineteen of the 80 who stopped showed two-thirds or more healing, while only 11 of the 80 who merely "cut down," showed that much healing.

His statistical study, published by the technical journal, "The Lancet," was of much medical interest because it dramatized the difficulties involved in statistical interpretation.

RECOMMEND RESTRICTION
LONDON—A special subcommittee of the International Laws Tennis Federation has suggested that amateur tennis players should be restricted to 150 days traveling abroad in any one year as part of a plan to solve the expenses problem. The subcommittee further suggested that expenses be limited to \$11 per day at a maximum. The proposal will be submitted for approval before the federation at its July meeting.

Tests Must Be Used To Continue Striking Cancer Cure Progress

Striking progress in the early detection of cancer has been made in recent years. The chances of avoiding cancer are better now than they have ever been. These facts mean little to the individual except when considered in the light of another fact: Cancer cannot be detected early enough for effective treatment except through careful examination by a competent physician.

It is another version of the general truth that advances in medical science do no good unless applied to the individual. The fact that cancer-detection tests have been improved means nothing to the man who won't go in to have a doctor make the tests on him.

Actually, those who have studied the medical report, the problem is twofold. In the first place, not enough people see their doctors regularly for checkups. In the second place, authorities say, not enough doctors

give the recognized screening tests as a regular thing.

A list of cancer's seven most common danger signals has been published and publicized widely during the past several years. Statistics show that when cancer is detected after one of these danger signals appears, the rate of cures is forty-five per cent. But when cancer is detected before the appearance of such danger signals—usually during a regular examination—the cure rate is sixty-five per cent.

The only intelligent conclusion is that reasonably frequent regular medical examination may pay handsome dividends in terms of better health and even longer life. Such examinations are fairly expensive, but if they forestall cancer or some other serious disease the cost may be saved many times over.

There are new locomotives—the modern diesel ones—modern steel cars with every facility provided for the comfort of passengers. Steel freight cars, express cars and other rail carrier methods. Then there are signal systems, rail yards, offices and other additions to make rail transportation safe and fast.

But in the process of operating the Atlantic Coast Line, it has been found that the cost of maintaining a local passenger train between Jacksonville and Tampa—one that

serves Sanford—exceeds the income from this one schedule by nearly \$200,000 a year. No passengers, very little express, a minor amount of mail—all accounts for little income. But operations are just as expensive as the big "through" trains. It takes a crew of men, engineers, conductors, flagmen and brakemen to move the "local"—and that costs money, day in and day out.

So, the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad has requested the discontinuance of this one "local" run so that they can eliminate the high cost of operating a train for the benefit of a few people, little express, and very little mail.

The request is based on the same action that any sound business man would do if a certain operation in his private enterprise cost more than was taken in. That's the way American business is conducted.

Foreign News Commentary

Last week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet: The United States, Britain and France agreed last week to start negotiations with Russia for a summit meeting on world tensions.
In joint notes, the Western allies accepted a Soviet proposal that the negotiations be started in Moscow at once by the ambassadors of the four countries.
It was the first positive step toward a meeting of heads of government, including President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, which now appears to be almost inevitable.
But the Allied and Soviet governments were still far apart on even the preliminary negotiations. Russia had proposed that the ambassadors discuss merely the physical arrangements—time, place and composition—for a meeting first of the foreign ministers of the four countries, then for the summit conference.
The Allies insisted that the ambassadors must discuss the problems which would be taken up at the summit meeting, in order to insure that it would not turn into a mere stage for propaganda speeches.
France was plunged into another cabinet crisis, demonstrating once again that it is fundamentally impossible to find a majority in the French National Assembly for any policy—good or bad—in North Af-

rica. Premier Felix Gaillard resigned after five months and nine days in office. The Assembly voted 311 to 289 against his proposals for re-opening negotiations with Tunisia on the status of French forces in the country, airfields and Bizerte naval base.
Gaillard had left the way open for taking the question of control of the Tunisian-Algerian border to the United Nations. Right-wing elements in the Assembly, led by Gaullist Jacques Soustelle, stood firm in their refusal to allow further internationalization of the Tunisian dispute, which is inextricably linked with the war in Algeria.
The 100-seat Communist bloc, which echoes the Algerian rebels' demands for independence, also voted against Gaillard.
Indonesian government forces landed in rebel-held Sumatra in a land and sea operation.
Infantry and paratroopers, covered by warships and planes, made their landing on the west coast and attacked the rebel stronghold of Padang, hoping to crush the army elements who had rebelled against the central government.
In Cuba, the rebel forces of Di-ago Castro failed miserably in their bid to overthrow President Fulgencio Batista by organized uprisings and a nationwide general strike.
The rebel movement suffered from lack of central control. Ba-

Veterans Corner
Here are authoritative answers from the Veterans Administration to questions of interest from former servicemen and their families:
Q. I am a Korea veteran with a service-connected disability not severe enough to warrant compensation payments. Would that qualify me for special GI insurance for disabled Korea veterans?
A. Yes. A noncompensable service-connected disability would qualify you for the special insurance, so long as it isn't a dental condition rated for purposes of treatment only.
Q. I understand a war veteran needs at least 90 days military service to qualify for a pension. If he was absent without leave, would that time count toward his 90 days?
A. If his pay was forfeited for his period of absence without leave, that time would not count toward the 90-day minimum requirement.
Q. I served in the WAVES during World War II and am the widow of a World War II veteran and have not remarried. Can I get two GI loans?
A. No. You are entitled to only one GI loan under the law.
Q. If I go to school under the Korean GI Bill will my monthly allowance be based on the amount of tuition I will have to pay?
A. No. Your GI allowance will be a flat monthly sum set by law.

Home Of Future

NEW YORK—Will the home of the future be underground? Will you be able to sit in your living room and dial the kind of home atmosphere that will keep mama and papa from quarreling? Will we have furniture that is charged to repel dust?
These are not idle speculations. They are solid thoughts from a man whose job is to try to peer into the scientific future. He's Dr. Finn Larsen, research director for Minneapolis-Honeywell, who has 140 scientists and engineers on his staff.
In his long-range projections, he underlines the assertion that the sun's energy must come into use.
"The entire U. S. supply of gas and oil will be exhausted in 25 to 30 years if the use keeps increasing at the present rate," he said. The world supply probably will last 10 years longer than that. With all and out of the picture, solar energy must become important at an increasing rate and we do know how to apply it."
About one-third of the total energy used in the United States is for heating, Larsen said. He believes the sun's energy will be most broadly used for home heating. The U. S. coal supply, incidentally, is expected to last for another 100 years.
As for home atmosphere: "The time ought to come when you can control the moods and attitudes of a family-dial the kind of atmosphere that makes people feel well enough so that they don't quarrel. We want to control completely the indoor climate."
"If a housewife wanted to whiz through a morning's work, she could get the proper get-up-and-go climate—maybe cool mountain air with pine scents. For a drowsy afternoon, she could have warm and salty seashore breezes, with ultra-violet rays for a sun-tan," he said.
As for dustless furniture, he feels the dust in the air and the coating of furniture both could be negatively charged. The furniture would repel the dust, which he disposed of in an electronic air cleaner.

Colic May Be The Cause When Baby Raises Roof

By HERMAN N. SUNDSTEIN, M.D.
THE recuperative power of babies sometimes is amazing. A colicky baby can raise the roof for most of the night, then promptly fall asleep and be up and about in the next morning. His parents, however, generally are exhausted.
Common Cause
Intestinal colic is a common cause of fretfulness among infants. Generally, it is limited to the first three or four months of life and seldom bothers a child after that age.
Most colic is caused by swallowing air. Any form of intestinal indigestion, therefore, results in an accumulation of gas. Until the infant can expel this accumulation, he will let you know in no uncertain terms that he has a pain in his stomach.
You can usually distinguish a cry caused by colic from one caused by hunger.
Sharper Cry
The colicky cry is sharper, more violent and more paroxysmal. If the infant is hungry his cry will be more fretful and more persistent.
Temping the baby with food is another way of determining whether he is hungry or is suffering from colic. If he has colic, he probably will refuse food.
If the pain isn't too severe, he may eat a little and be relieved. Temporarily, it won't be long, however, before the cry returns with full force.
Prevent An Attack
I'm sure most of you are familiar with the time-honored measures of preventing colic: holding the baby to your shoulder and patting him on the back until he burps. This is by far the best and easiest way of preventing trouble.
The bowls of a colicky baby should be more once a day alone constipation is likely. It might be a good idea to see that this occurs, either by use of an enema or suppository, shortly before the colic is expected to be most troublesome.
During an attack of colic, you may help relieve the pain by placing a hot water bag on the baby's abdomen. Even rubbing the abdomen with a warm hand might be beneficial.
QUESTION AND ANSWER
Q. I had virus pneumonia one year ago. I took antibiotics drugs by mouth. Since that time, I have had an itching and burning sensation when I move my bowels.
Answer: Newer antibiotic drugs have had a tendency to promote the growth of molds or yeast organisms which could produce the symptoms mentioned.

Republic of Korea officials are trying to hush a spectacular six-plane accident so as not to affect expected delivery of more American jet planes for the ROK Air Force. Sources report six U. S. F-96 Sabrejets turned over to the ROK Air Force were destroyed when a ROK pilot took off at Suwon Air Base and plunged right back to the ground, smashing five other Sabrejets parked on the runway. Cost of a Sabrejet: \$250,000.
Atomic Embassy
The Atomic Energy Commission's embattled chairman, Adm. Lewis L. Strauss, would like to retire when his term runs out June 30. But he's no man to run from a fight, and one is shaping up. If the President nominates Strauss for another term, Democratic congressional opponents will make his life miserable. If the President gives Strauss a recess appointment, the Democrats will have another chance to air their dislike next year.
Red Sails
The Soviet, Polish and East German navies will maneuver in the eastern Baltic within the next few weeks. That's the gist of West Berlin intelligence reports. Western naval officials will be watching. The Poles and East Germans have small navies, but they are no slouches.
Red Face
Indonesia is getting anxious about Western opinion. The Indonesian ambassador to Moscow was highly embarrassed when he was told to ask Russia for the loan of 50 MIG jet pilots as Indonesian air force instructors. At the last moment, the Jakarta regime reconsidered and canceled the idea. It anger the West. Moscow's feelings apparently were not considered.
More Plans

Dulles is supposed to have hinted to Garcia at the Manila SEATO meeting last month that his optimism is strictly one-sided.

State Clothing Specialist Gives Workshop Here

Miss Elizabeth Dickenson, Clothing Specialist, Tallahassee, Florida gave a workshop on the "Basic Pattern" at the Home Demonstration Community Center, April 17-18.

Miss Dickenson stated that a "good fit" begins with your choice of pattern. Choose the style and also best for you. To determine the pattern size needed measure around the largest size of the bust using a tape measure that will not stretch. (Don't tape in heat! Full tape measure light — but have one finger underneath tape when measure is taken. Pattern companies have allowed 4" of ease through the bust. If you measure 34" and buy a size 14 pattern it will measure about 38" through the bust.

All other alterations may be made easier than the alterations through the bust. Pattern companies have revised their measurement charts. The same chart is supposed to be used by all companies. Any variations of the same size pattern made by different companies should be due to the amount of ease allowed.

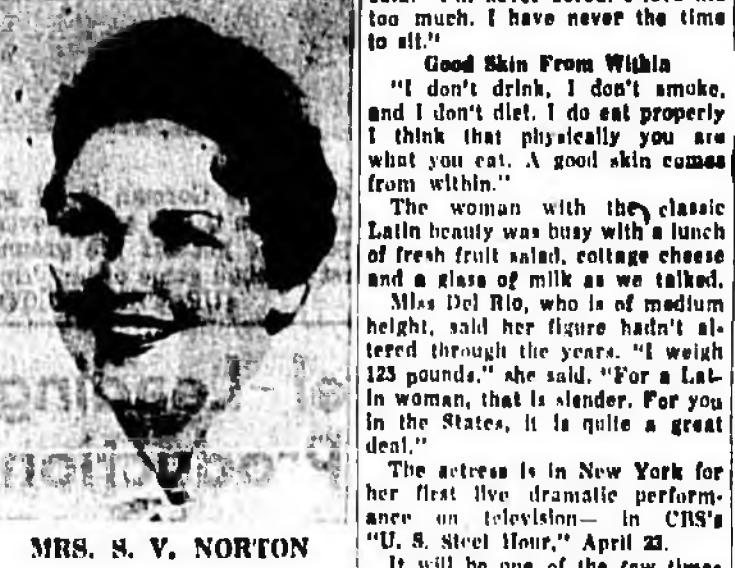

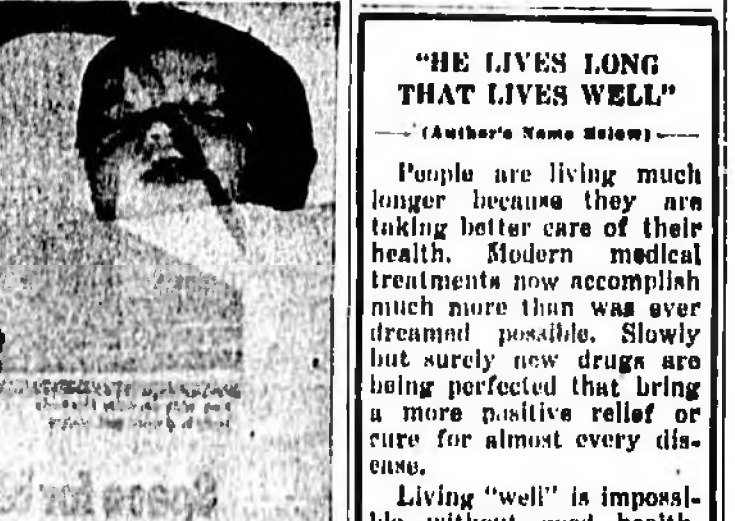

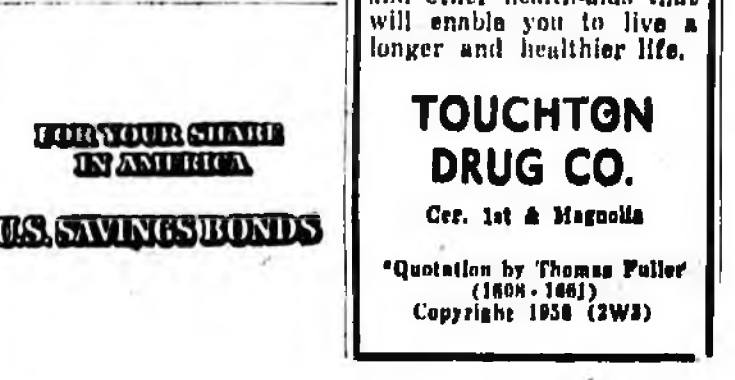

McCarron Heads FSU Baseball Statistics

TALLAHASSEE (Special) Off to his best start ever, Florida State's fleet centerfielder Owen McCarron heads the latest Seminole baseball statistics.

Currently carrying a team-leading .300 batting average, the speedy senior from Nutley, N. J. seems to be headed for a third straight .300 season at the plate. He hit .323 and .320 the last two years for State.

Three Seminole regulars are hitting over .300 after the first 10 games. Besides McCarron, left-fielder Jerry Philip is hitting .333, while all-American shortstop Dick Howser boasts a .330 mark.

Philip holds the RBI lead with nine, thanks to two grand-slam home runs. McCarron has the most runs (11), the most hits (18), and the most stolen bases (8), while Howser leads in doubles with three. Five players have one triple apiece.

Senior right-hander Frank Slusser heads the pitching staff with a 2-0 mark and a fine earned-run average of 1.23. His two victories came in the recent FSU invitational tournament over Notre Dame, 5-2, and Wisconsin, 3-1. Southpaw Jack Bristol has a 2-1 mark and an ERA of 2.45.

State now has a 7-4 mark, including a 2-3 exhibition victory over Knoxville of the Class A South Atlantic League, which does not count in individual statistics.

TALLAHASSEE — If Florida State's track team fares well in the coming Penn Relays, look for a super-human effort on the part of sophomore Jim Casteel.

The 6-foot, 150-pound Avondale Estates, Ga., athlete currently leads the unbeaten Seminoles in point production with 68.

Other leading producers are distance man Mike Conley, 48%; sprinter Jack Terwilliger, 37; and middle distance runner Doyle Ruff with 27 1/2 points.
