buy the building and lease it back to the county. buy the building and lease if back to the counts.
In the proposed deal. the firm would have paid the nunly, ni.5 milllion in cash. In return the county would have sifged a
cuaranteed fiviv-year lease, paid for the rennvaton of the building, paldd operaration and plaumenance costs and the insurance on the building.
The firm also would have paid taxes only on
base value. not for any of the tmprovenients.
