





Improvement Plans Point To Permanent NAS

Optimism was high in Washington today from congressional leaders and members of the Chamber of Commerce that Congress will do everything in its power to appropriate a multimillion dollar improvement program at the Sanford Naval Air Station.

At the same time Admiral Robert Pirie, deputy Chief of Naval Operation, said that the local

station will be in existance as "long as there is a Navy."

Congressman Syd Herlong, Andrew Carraway, chairman of the Armed Forces Committee of the Chamber as well as Chamber Manager John Krider met with Pirie and other Pentagon officials this morning at a special conference to discuss a master shore station plan for the sta-

The plan calls for massive improvements including relieving overcrowded barracks and the station, more personnel and additional aircraft. Appropriations for the plan will depend on the forthcoming budget hearings for military

However both Herlong and Carraway told the Herald they were optimistic over the outcome of their talk with Pirie.

Pirie told them that "there is no longer any uncertainty about the future of the Naval Air Station and it will be there as long as there is a Navy and as long as we need manned aircraft."





In appearing before a Chamber of Commerce group in Daytona Beach recently Gov. Bryant made what can be considered as his "first pitch" for ratification of the new reapportionment plan adopted by the 1961 Legislature, and which will be submitted to the voters in November for ratification.

Although the governor discussed such other topics as the question of new taxes, the trimester plan for operating the universities yearround, the economy at the state level. he devoted a considerable portion of his address to reapportionment and the benefits that he sees if the amendment is approved.

He made a point in favor of the amendment when he said that sectional feelings were holding back the state's development in the months before his inauguration but now there are no strong emotional feelings between North and South Florida. In this connection he said:

"The energies we formerly dissipated fighting among ourselves are now largely concentrated upon achieving common goals in road building, education and in the many fields of importance in every area of our state."

The governor said he recognized that the compromise plan will not suit every one but that it "is easily recognizable as a means whereby the scales of battle will be tipped whenever the large and significant interests of the state are the issue.

Although there has been some grumblings over the way seats in the Legislature were reapportioned, as the governor pointed out, we will not have the same degrees of sectionalism with the reapportionment issue

resolved. Certainly the scales of representation in the state assembly will be better balanced with adoption of the 45-Senator and 104-House plan, and emotional feelings over what is a dead Issue will grow less and less through the years.

The Senate committee inquiry into alleged muzzling of the U.S. military is producing a tangle of confusing and often conflicting notions which the average citizen may find hard to unscramble.

Besides the question of censorship of speeches by military men, there are involved such matters as the responsibility of our military leaders for indoctrinating our service personnel and the advisability of military spokesmen participating in public forums on communism and other ma-

In the nature of things, many who testify will not make wholly clear which of these matters they have in mind. Nor will they draw necessary sharp distinctions to aid the citizens' judgment of this problem.

To begin with, it should be made plain that no one, not even Sen. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, favors unrestricted talking by military officers on issues of public policy.

Agreement is general that these men should not inject themselves into partisan politics, nor make statements which run strongly against official government policy in the for-

ign field. The next big thing to remember is that underlying the "muzzling" charge made by Thurmond and others is the powerful conviction that military men are remarkably and peculiarly equipped to inform not merely U. S. troops but the general

To have any real validity, therefore, the critics' case must establish more than capricious, careless or foolish censorship of military officers' comments on communism.

The case must show that military men are trying to say things of great fundamental importance on this subject - things of which they have special and intimate knowledge. If this is not shown, then the

argument on censorship moves onto a totally different plane. We do not need generals and ad-

mirals to announce to us that communism is a conspiracy bent on world conquest. Public figures of all kinds tell us that almost daily.

Eliminating such generalities from military speeches may in some circumstances be silly and unwise. But it hardly deprives the American people of information they can get nowhere else.

It should be remembered, too. that military men are not generally political specialists or economists, They have no more than average competence, by and large, in detecting domestic trends that might lead toward communism. More often than not, making auch judgments aimply involves them in United States partisan politics.

The whole subject of "military expression" deserves full airing. But those concerned owe it to the citizenry to provide such guideposts as are here suggested.
