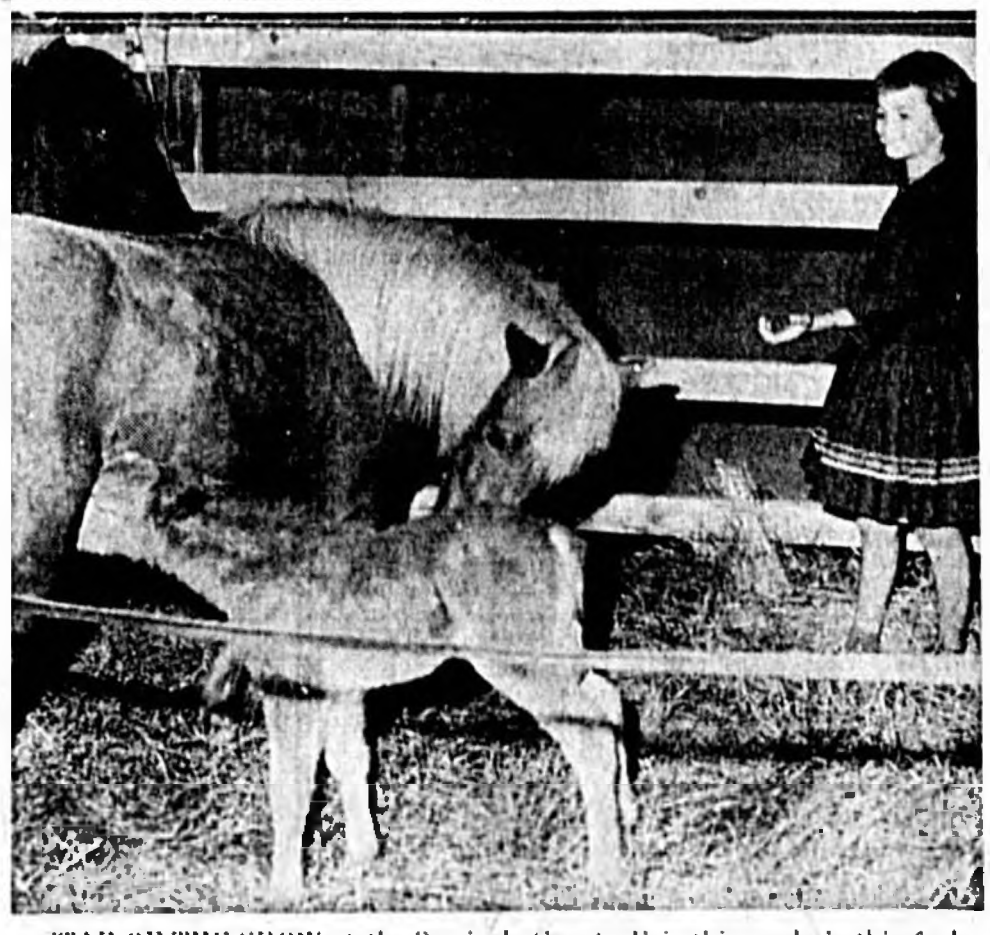

## Storm Threat Holds Up Glenn

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—Bad weather in the "splash-down" area at sea forced postponement of John Glenn's orbital flight into space today and a new storm made it appear unlikely he could take off before Friday.

It was the eighth postponement of the 40-year-old astronaut's round-the-world flight since it was first scheduled in December. The latest delay was caused by high waves in the western Atlantic where Glenn's Friendship-7 spacecraft would come down.

A new storm center moving off Cape Hatteras, N. C., was expected to whip up rough seas in the Bermuda area Thursday morning.

The space agency said at 9:30 a. m. that no new launch time had been determined. It promised another statement at 5 p. m.

## Bombs Rip Downtown Oran

ALGIEERS, Algeria (UPI)—A barrage of 40 plastic bombs ripped through the big port city of Oran today touching off a riot by angry Algerian Arabs.

First reports said Arab demonstrators were firing on the French troops that rushed in to enforce order. They said the soldiers were using "offensive" and tear-gas grenades against the Muslim and European rioters.

# Military Projects Skyrocket

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department asked Congress Tuesday to authorize \$1,390,883,000 in military construction projects, an increase of \$766 million over the similar request last year.

The total was higher than President Kennedy's earlier \$1.318 billion spending requests for military construction next fiscal year. This is because some of the money included in the new request will not be needed for two or three years.

# Steelworkers Set Contract Talks

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—The United Steelworkers Union (USW) and the Big 11 companies of the steel industry open 1962 contract negotiations today with March 1 as the target date for basic agreement on terms covering 450,000 workers.

The current USW contract expires midnight, June 30. Negotiators have roughly 4 1/2 months to forge a settlement. The administration in Washington has urged speedy action for the sake of the national economy.

Eleven separate "sub-committee" sessions—one for each company represented in bargaining—begin at four locations in this steel capital's downtown section.

Standing ready for their initial discussions Thursday morning were the top four-man teams from union and industry, headed respectively by USW President David J. McDonald and U. S. Steel Corp. Vice President H. Conrad Cooper. This grouping constitutes the steel industry coordinating committee.

Negotiators for both sides went through separate chalk talks Tuesday.

Several favorable factors surrounded the start of collective bargaining.

First, it marked the earliest opening of contract talks in the USW's quarter-century history.

Second, the atmosphere was toned down considerably from the near belligerent union-management attitude that preceded negotiations in 1959. A 110-day strike that year was the longest ever in basic steel.

The record walkout began July 15, 1959, and was interrupted Nov. 7 when the federal government invoked provisions of the Taft-Hartley law. The union had battled the use of Taft-Hartley all the way to the U. S. Supreme Court, but the high court sided 8-1 with the government.

# Congress Mixed Up In Dispute On Work Moms

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressmen found themselves embroiled today in a dispute over working mothers.

The question was this: Would the federal government be striking a blow against juvenile delinquency or a blow against family life, if it provided funds for day care centers for children of working parents?

The issue erupted before the House Ways and Means Committee Tuesday as it concluded hearings on President Kennedy's welfare reform program.

The administration bill would provide federal grants of up to \$10 million a year to help finance day care centers for children whose parents are "working or seeking work, or otherwise absent from the home or unable for other reasons to provide parental supervision."

The Rt. Rev. Magr. Raymond J. Gallagher, secretary of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, assailed this as "un-American." He urged the committee to restrict use of federally subsidized day care centers to workers on relief who are working or seeking work as part of a rehabilitation program.

He said the administration's proposal was so broad it would "bring under government care millions of additional children."

# Economists Adopt Wait - See Policy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Government economists today adopted a wait-and-see attitude toward the business outlook following disappointing reports on jobs and incomes in January.

The reports were not terribly bad in themselves. But in comparison to the rosy developments of late 1961, they looked a little pale.

The Labor Department said the factory workweek dropped in January, for the second consecutive month, to 40 hours. It was 40.4 hours in December and 40.6 in November. The department blamed the new drop on "a sharp cutback in overtime work in the automobile industry as well as more moderate declines" elsewhere.

The experts were especially interested in factory hours because in the past they have been an advance tipoff to business recessions and upswings. "We'll be watching this one closely in February," one official commented. "Remember, two months don't make a trend."

Also disappointing was a report from the Commerce Department that personal income fell in January by \$1.5 billion to an annual rate of \$430.3 billion. Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges emphasized a \$600 million cutback in corporate dividends, at annual rates, which followed heavy dividend disbursements in December.

But there also was a decline in wages and salaries at a \$600 million yearly rate. Payroll fell most in manufacturing, especially autos and machinery, and to a lesser extent in lumber, textiles, clothing and stone-clay-glass. Payrolls rose in chemicals and primary metals.

The January slippage was not seen as a harbinger of recession. It could mean the current rate of rise is a little up to the administration's expectations.
