

Congress Asked To Proceed Slowly On Anti-Commie Bills

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21. — (AP) — The Justice Department today advised Congress to go slow in enacting anti-Communist bills until constitutional questions have been settled.

Payton Ford, assistant to the Attorney General, told the House Un-American Activities Committee that important constitutional questions are involved in the passage of the 11 Communist Party leasers convicted in New York some time ago.

"The decision in that case will be a most important one and attention which may prove to be important in the light of its outcome should be carefully weighed," Ford said in a letter to the committee.

Ford's letter was read as the committee opened hearings on anti-Communist bills sponsored by two of its members.

One, sponsored by Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.), provides among other things a 10-year prison term and \$10,000 fine to anyone who sets up a Communist dictatorship in this country.

The other, by Chairman Wood (D-Ga.), would make it unlawful for federal employees and for persons employed under national defense contracts to be members of the Communist Party or any other organization branded as subversive.

Dr. Emerson P. Schmidt of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce urged quick approval of the proposed legislation to "expose Communist organizations."

Schmidt, who is director of economic research for the chamber, also called for extension of the legislation to "Fascists, Nazis or any other agents of any foreign powers engaged in activities closely similar" to those outlined in the bills.

Truman Tour

The signing of a bill (S-3159) granting congressional consent to a water compact between Idaho and Wyoming, involving the Snake River.

The May trip will be followed in October by another, even more intensive, cross-country stumping tour by the President in which he will speak in behalf of Democratic candidates for Congress.

That trip will carry him into Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania, California and dozens of other states.

Mr. Truman's new move to get congressional passage of the "middle income" housing bill was aimed at restoration of Senate-eliminated provisions providing for loans to co-operators.

The President signed the commission of Richard F. Mitchell of Iowa for his new term as Interstate Commerce Commissioner for a term ending Dec. 31, 1948. Mitchell's nomination recently was confirmed by the Senate.

He also signed a proclamation of national emergency with Costa Rica of Jan. 12, 1948.

Meanwhile, Senator Williams (R-Del.) called on the Senate today to reject legislation which would increase the cotton and peanut acreage allowed under this year's government farm program.

Williams said in a statement prepared for the Senate that "less farm price supports are required within a year the government may have to 'inaugurate the greatest mass destruction of food the world has ever seen."

The Delaware Senator said that in the 18 months ending Jan. 31, Commodore Credit Corporation holding of commodities under the price support program had lost about \$285,000,000 to about \$4,000,000,000. CCC buys farm products to hold up the market price.

"During the past 18 months we have produced in this country approximately \$2,500,000,000 worth of agricultural commodities more than we have consumed, all of which have been purchased with the taxpayers' money," Williams said.

"Of that amount, nearly \$3,500,000,000 worth of agricultural commodities have been given away at home and abroad while the remaining \$4,000,000,000 worth are at the present time deteriorating in our hulking warehouses and caves."

Williams urged repeal of rigid flexible system. Such a system would permit lower support prices than are set under present law.

He said the cotton-peanut bill, which the Senate may act later in the week, would make it necessary for the government to store additional quantities of cotton and peanuts.

Ind. man who identified himself as "an average American citizen of average intelligence."

He was Neil E. Alterkruse, an artist, who told the Senate Finance Committee the entire Social Security program ought to be junked.

The committee is holding hearings on a bill the House passed last year for a bigger Social Security system covering more people, paying bigger benefits and costing more taxes.

Artist Alterkruse, who had prepared charts to emphasize his argument contended that the Social Security act is "a crazy law."

And he added that the House bill "is just to raise more money so it can be spent for more wretched schemes and enlarge government bureaus and departments."

The committee also heard W. D. Robbins of Birmingham, Ala., suggest that Congress turn its attention to an old-age assistance bill instead of pursuing the Social Security program.

Robbins argued: "What we need is a sales tax paid by all the people collected monthly and distributed back, monthly to all people over 65."

George R. Nelson, speaking for the International Association of Machinists, endorsed the House bill, but made two suggestions.

His Social Security tax should be collected on the first \$5,000 of annual income (instead of the present \$3,000). The House bill would levy them on the first \$5,000.

Nelson also recommended that women be allowed old age benefits at age 60 instead of 65.

He said his organization is convinced that the establishment of private pension plans in industry will not accomplish "desirable results" and urged that the problem of income in old age be solved by the federal government.

given enforcement authority.

Sponsors of the law fought for it during three legislative sessions but it finally was enacted.

In 1947 Rep. Harold C. Papy of New West was accused of offering fellow house members bribes to vote against it. In 1949, State Senator C. L. Alford of Grand Florida citrus fruit growers, was offered \$2,000 by John A. Scruggs, a Democratic party leader and lobbyist, to vote against it. Both Papy and Scruggs were tried on bribery charges, but acquitted.

Cited the authority of the state to protect the public, the court said "it is hardly necessary to point out that the legislature has power to single out, condemn and punish such acts as it deems injurious to public morals."

"If furnishing information about horse racing or bookmaking fall in that category, it may be just as reasonable and reasonable as to prohibit such acts as it deems injurious to public morals."

The legislature may, the court said, adopt any means necessary to "subdue any moral evil."

"Human ingenuity to outwit and suppress crime should certainly keep pace with the ingenuity of those who devise and commit it," Justice Terrell said.

The court said the law giving the federal government control over interstate commerce was not intended to prevent the state from enforcing police regulations "even though such acts may incidentally or indirectly affect interstate commerce."

Racing program press and Hagerly contended they were engaged in disseminating "harmless information" on athletic contests through interstate commerce and had no interest in or control over the use of the information.

The court said such message may be of interstate character, but when they are used to bet on a horse race they lose their interstate nature and are subject to state regulations.

He also took issue with McCarthy's charges that the committee was not exerting its best efforts to obtain loyalty files on persons whom McCarthy has labeled as "bad security risks."

"I'm trying to get all the files and Senator McCarthy knows it," Tydings said. "I'm trying to pursue a course calculated to get the files, not one that won't."

An attack by Senator Wherry (R-Nebr.) spearheaded an apparent Republican drive to make a political campaign issue of Secretary of State Acheson and his policies.

In the face of Republican suggestions that Acheson resign, President Truman made it clear through an aide he is sticking by his Secretary of State and approves the Cabinet member's conduct and policies.

Wherry, long-time critic of Acheson, said in a speech prepared for a Founders' Day celebration in Lincoln, Neb., that Acheson is "undermining our national economy and losing the peace."

He said the most powerful man in the government today, Wherry declared, "The voice is the voice of President Truman, but the hand is the hand of Dean Acheson."

Apparently he has become so powerful as the hub of left-wing activities, Wherry said, that President Truman is fearful should he fire Acheson, he will lose the support of this radical, socialist pressure group in the coming election and by 1952.

Mr. McKibbin complied with that in studying the piping and water-pumping facilities, preparatory to a complete survey of City water supplies by R. E. and A. P. This means, he said, that in the time of extremely dry weather, water could be pumped into the reservoir at the airport into the city water distribution main.

At the airport, he pointed out, four electric pumps can put out 750 gallons of water per minute, while a gasoline engine-driven centrifugal pump will handle 1,000 gallons a minute. The latter was installed by the Navy as a standby unit in case of electric power failure.

Two Million Women Listed As Surplus In French Nation

PARIS, Mar. 20. — (AP) — France has a surplus of 2,000,000 women, but the French male is carefree before he takes a nutritional test.

France has 20 magazines that carry nothing but marriage advertisements. In addition, numerous other weekly and monthly publications include such ads.

Curiously, 70 per cent of the ads are placed by men.

There is a "Club of the Timid," founded by a man, devoted to "sponsoring honest marriages between people with a healthy body and a healthy mind."

Divorce is hard to obtain in Catholic France, "and you've made a mistake at the altar, you've had it."

The publisher of a lonely hearts magazine called "marriage for all" says "lack of money compels people to go more and more rarely to entertainment places where acquaintances leading to marriage can be made."

"Marriage magazines are placed, in a sense, battles, and prints 200 ads a month and gets from 4,000 to 6,000 answers."

"We're convinced that 100 per cent of the ads produce a marriage," he said.

The "Club of the Timid" was founded three months ago by a 30-year-old office clerk named George Armand, and Georges Krasovsky, 34, a Russian-born taxi driver.

The club holds weekly meetings off the Champs Elysees. The first got together were sad affairs. "But we fixed that by ruling that the girls had to invite the men to dance," said Armand.

The "Club of the Green Border" was founded in 1922 by Charles Fontaine-Beneger, a newspaperman. Members are supposed to wear a green ribbon.

The club, which now has 600 members, holds weekly dances. It claims credit for 4,000 marriages.

"Love at first sight is as common here as elsewhere," says Fontaine-Beneger. "A girl of 25, who'd liked to travel and come looking for a husband who could take her around the world, fell in love with a divorced father of three children. They married, and she is now caring for the children. She's never left home."
