I recently trimmed all the limbs from a grapefruit tree in my front yard. In a very short time little branches began to appear and now three short months later the grapefruit tree is well on the road to recovery. Merely trimming the branches from the tree did not kill the tree. To kill the tree I would have had to sever the roots of the tree.

The senseless shooting of George Wallace has taken us a giant step forward to the day when the leaders of our nation may well be decided by a bullet rather than a ballot. The bullets that struck down John F. Kennedy, his brother Robert Kennedy and now George Wallace may well have changed the course of human history. Regardless of party affiliation all decent and feedom loving Americans deplore such acts of violence. Life which should be a gay coat of many colors in our society has now become a tattered sweat shirt with a meaningless peace symbol scrawled across its front.

I listened with interest to Mayor Daley of Chicago and his reaction to the shooting of George Wallace. He said that we must have stronger gun laws which would curtail the sale of guns and pistols in particular. Prohibition did not solve the drinking problem. The man who wanted a drink managed to get a drink. He may have had to buy boot-leg liquor or he may have had to make his booze in his bathtub but wanting a drink he managed to get a drink. The same holds true with a gun; the man who wants a gun will get a gun even if he has to make the gun himself. It is time that we dealt with the root of the problem. The church which should be dealing with this problem has been asleep much too long. She reminds me of a Jonah asleep during the storm while the lives of others are in danger.

The promises of the word of God assure us that there is still hope for our troubled society. Let me share one of these promises with you with the firm hope that we will sense our need of repentence.

"If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and forgive their sin and heal their land."

Until we as a nation are willing to walk in God's way according to His word then we can expect to have more senseless, useless tragedies such as the shooting of Governor

National repentance can only occur by individual repentance. Have you as an individual repented of your sin and received Jesus Christ God's Son as your Saviour? You are just one but you are one and Jesus said "except ye repent ye shall likewise all perish."

May God impress us with the fact that it is time that we started dealing with the root of the problem rather than just trimming branches

Editorial Comment

'Due Process Of Law' Is In A Mess

Implementation of Article V hopefully will bring some surcease to the turbulence facing the courts today. However, in many areas within the legal system, further redress is indicated. The court system as it exists today is the

target of much public criticism and declining confidence. Much of this stems from the overemphasis of the rights of the accused in a crime, with little consideration given to a clause in the United States Constitution which sets forth that no man shall be "deprived of life, liberty, or property" except by lawful means.

The plight of the poor is another inequity, with the affluent released on bail, and the man less blessed with wordly riches languishing in the bastille. This situation is more intolerable if an innocent man is falsely accused.

Probably one of the bitterest objects of public consternation is the trial, itself, with the frivolity of attorneys in capricious motions sending the jury yo-yoing in and out.

In one particular capital case, the motions previously had been argued and settled in chambers, and still the taxpayers' money was wasted with a further argument, which could only be interpeted as a grandstand play.

With the crowded court dockets, it would seem that attorneys, who obviously must spend many weeks in proparation of a case, could eliminate some of the inane questions often asked.

Another area in need of reform is that of the jury system. There has been the observation that this amounts to involuntary servitude, with the \$5 stipend a pittance. Pity the blue collar man, with a family to support, who may be called for several days. Who today, can exist on \$25 weekly? (Editor's Note: Employers are not bound legally to pay salaries to employes who are absent from their work because of serving on

a jury.)
Several weeks ago, a county jail prisoner contended he was subjected to cruel and unusual punishment in being kept in a creech cell for several days, a situation amounting to solitary confinement.

The adverse conditions he described were reminiscent of "Cool Hand Luke" in the regrettable days of the chain gang. Whether the prisoner was unruly enough to warrant punishment, in our opinion some other form of punishment could be devised. Again, what if a man or youth, thus confined, were innocent?

Nixon Has Muscle For Moscow

By BRUCE BIOSSAT

What President Nixon is doing currently about the Vietnam war underscores again his supreme interest in the foreign affairs field, and his conviction that his great-

Anyone who reads him as acting primarily from domestic political considerations probably will be off the mark. He began working for the diplomatic history books as soon as he was elected and before he was inaugurated. Political associates complained almost immediately of his neglect of strictly political problems.

The President is consumed by thoughts about America's world power relationships—and most particularly those with China and the Soviet Union. That's why, obviously, he opened talks with Peking, and that's why he has been willing to widen the power bargaining with Moscow on nuclear weapons, Berlin, East-West ties, and other matters.

But a strong tenet of his philosophy in this field is that this country must always bargain from strength. That may be an old-fashioned idea in some quarters, but not in Mr. Nixon's White House.

For that reason, say some of his friends, he had no wish to go to the "summit" in Moscow this spring in a weakened position, as leader of a nation whose ally, South Vietnam, was being pummeled by an adversary heavily dependent upon Russian arms.

The President could not forget that, nearly every time ne announced new U.S. troop withdrawals, he had warned Hanoi not to back him into a corner by taking advantage of our moves and perhaps threatening remaining American forces in Vietnam.

It is clear enough that Hanoi's major invasion with regular forces across the Demilitarized Zone fits his definition of "taking advantage."

Yet friends insist, his larger concern is not the im-mediate war scene itself, but its effect upon the dealing with Russia. The military experts have made it plain that a sea blockade and other disruptive measures can't have serious impact upon North Vietnam's offensive capabilities for weeks or even months.

What Nixon's actions have done is, for a time at least, to put Moscow on the diplomatic defensive. Even though the Soviet Union is Hanoi's chief arms supplier, we don't know that the Kremlin leaders were happy over the big spring offensive. But if they did have any tendency to smirk over our discomfort as we watched the faltering of Vietnamization plans, the smiles should now be gone.

If Hanoi embarrassed the President, we have now placed Russia in a position where it must decide how, if at all, it can avoid embarrassment. The slowness of its first reaction to our blockade suggests some agonizing debate inside the Kremlin. And Soviet delay has told the President part of what he wanted to know: the Russians want that summit more than we do.

It is Mr. Nixon who took the risk it might be canceled. and by so doing he threw upon Moscow the burden of deciding. And now Mr. Nixon believes that once again he can talk from strength.

Still, the risks are huge. Popular support, gauged by quick polling, is evidently good. But it might vanish fast Russia's responses greatly enlarged the military

Tax Reform Means Shift Elsewhere

Tax reform is in the air again in this election year of continuing inflation, at least in the air being set in motion by the small army of Democratic senators stumping the presidential primaries. "We must demand an end to tax breaks for special

privilege," says Edmund Muskie of Maine. "The federal tax system . . . has been riddled with special privileges for the rich," echoes South Dakota's

"The time has come for a tax system that says to the wealthy . . . 'You must pay your fair share,' " proclaims Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota. "Tax reform is an issue whose time is a lot closer to coming than many professional politicians admit, or even recognize," warns Democratic Chairman Lawrence

O'Brien, to which George Wallace would certainly add Never mind that Congress passed a major tax reform bill in 1969 and has made significant changes every year since then. The tax system can always stand reform, and most especially right after a so-called reform has

For the reason is this: The tax system (and speaking of air) is like nothing so much as a big, misshapen balloon. Push against one part of it and it sticks out somewhere else. Try to round out one protuberance and another one pops out on the other side.

For instance, there's a bill in the House to remove the tax exemption for income from municipal bonds, a loophole which enables many a fat cat to escape federal tax. But a companion part of the bill calls for an offsetting federal subsidy to state and local governments to help them keep their bond offerings attractive to investors. Where would this subsidy come from if not from tax dollars from other sources?

Likewise, there are bills to end the notorious oil and minerals depletion allowances. But again, some other incentive-paid for with tax revenue-would have to be offered to encourage exploration. Every single American who files a tax return has at least one "loophole"-a personal exemption, and an exemption for every dependent he may have. Homeowners

by being able to deduct their mortgage interest and prop-A loophole big enough to drive a truck through '95 passed last year. This one subsidizes the babysitter and maid expenses of working mothers-mothers who work outside the home, that is.

are subsidized by other taxpayers to the tune of billions

In fact, so extensive are the loopholes for individuals that Tom Stanton director of the Tax Reform Research Group, a Naderite organization, estimates that if they were all eliminated, tax rates could be reduced across the board by 43 per cent, with the added bonus of vastly simplifying tax returns.

Yet the federal income tax started out as a fairly simple and straightforward thing back in 1913. Then along came this loophole and that loophole, with pressure groups and compelling logic behind every one of

Spawned along the way was a whole industry specializing in interpreting the increasingly complex tax laws.

Not only that. Over the years, the federal income tax became much more than a source of income to run the country. It was transformed into an instrument for promoting certain generally agreed-upon social goods--the

Soviet Needs U.S. For Its Economy

Regardless of U.S. mining of North Vietnam ports, there are compelling reasons why Russian party boss Leonid Brezhnev must reach some sort of an accord with Wash-

If he calls off the summit meeting with President Nixon. he must find some other road to agreement. Brezhnev is deeply concerned over China and the United States relationship with Peking. He cannot allow a United States-China tie so strong that Russia's interests are endangered; thus he must keep a door opened to

• The pressure of the Russian people for meat can no longer be denied. The pressure is strongest in that middle and upper class essential to the working of the Russian economy, bureaucracy and military. This means heavy, continued, increased imports of feed grains and the ma-terial required for fertilizer plants and other agriculture and meat development programs.

The United States is the only regular major source for these feed increases on which Russia can depend with certainty over the next decade. More immediately, Russia has suffered most serious

crop losses this past winter. · The Soviet Union is not progressing economically at a rate which would, over the next several decades, enable it to maintain its position as one of the world's two great super powers. Brezhnev and his associates recog-

They know there must be enough of an accord with the United States to persuade Mr. Nixon to allow the export of high-technology equipment and the sending of highly skilled engineers to Russia to push their flagging computer, petro-chemical, agri-business and other essential industries.

The Russians are chronically short of capital for their expansion programs. They must have long-term loans and a heavy long-term investment of dollars, equipment and know-how. They must have an American market to pay for their growing import needs.

Brezhnev has become convinced that to achieve the economic development he desires, Russia must also cut back in military spending and shift chunks of its own technical talent, scarce materials and funds from military programs to high technology and resource development But the only way the Russians can afford to reduce the prohibitively costly nuclear program is to sign a strategic arms limitation agreement which gives them parity with

· Emotionally, the Soviet leaders are obsessed with legitimacy-of their government, of their role in East Europe and of their position in India, the Arab world and

The Russians believe Mr. Nixon can exert the influence they require to achieve a greater measure of legitimacy through changes in American laws and regulations and through pressure on West Germany and other allies.

Airport Chapels Proving Popular

One dictionary that we use defines "chapel" as "a place of worship subordinate to a church, especially in a college or hospital." While hospitals and colleges may head the ist in number, military and prison chapels are every-

As the religious community becomes more and more institutionalized, chapels are bound to flourish as an extension of the church.

The newest chapels, rather the newest outposts where chapels have been established, are at the major airports. In New York, Boston and Chicago's O'Hare, there is a regular program of worship service and full-time counsel offered by clergymen. In each setting, the approach does vary, but the activity and ministry is definitely on the

In New York, the Protestant-Catholic-Jewish houses of worship form a dramatic cluster in the outer reaches of Kennedy. The architecture of the buildings and the central location is most appealing.

But Kennedy has traffic problems and one can hardly walk from any of the air terminals to the chapels without dashing across four-lane target areas. One must take bus or cab to reach the location, discouraging to those who have less than half an hour for such a visit.

At Logan Field in Boston, the chapel can be reached by five- or 10-minute walk from almost any direction. Our last visit was during a Sunday afternoon in July-and the chapel was crowded, with a wedding in progress. Some 70 or 80 people had gathered for a Roman Catholic service and the priest and chapel was just what they wanted. It appears that the airport chapels (there are only three fully staffed centers that we know of in the United States and none overseas) serve a resident community of airline personnel and staff as much as they assist the travelers. At O'Hare, the chapel is four levels down in the basement, surrounded by steam pipes and air-conditioning vents. Yet a lively, attractive worship center has been created and attendance is good.

At O'Hare, the ecumenical touch is what counts. Protestants and Catholics share fully the same facilities, with the Community of Our Lady of Loreto served full-time by Father John J. Keough.

Our last Sunday attendance was during the winter. The services were given good publicity over the public address system of the airport and at least 100 showed up for the 1:10 p.m. mass. Here again, it seemed that baggage handlers, car rental clerks and air line staffers were the majority of those present.

One does not recall railroad stations having chapelsalthough Traveler's Aid was always ready and waiting The airports see thousands of people an hour at the larger terminals and many of these are families and individuals in great trouble. Some are hurrying to a loved one close to death. Others are returning from a funeral or family

Often the chaplain at Kennedy or O'Hare is the first clergyman to give immediate and personal comfort to someone in trouble. It is not a bad slogan: Support Your Local Airport Chaplain. They are establishing an essential and creative ministry to traveling mankind.

One Man's 'Patriotism

Can we really be surprised at some of the intellectual excesses of student war protesters when they have such good models among their elders? Harvard biochemist and Nobel Prize-winner Dr. George Wald was the first guest lecturer at the Center for Peaceful Change at Kent State University, established to memorialize the May 4, 1970, tragedy.

"More and more Americans are happy when the North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong advance and reoccupy their country," he said. "Is that unpatriotic? No, it's patriotic. How can Americans choose, but for independence and freedom?"

Now there may be good reasons why many Americans who are not Communists are happy about North Vietnamese and Viet Cong successes, if only because they promise an early end to the killing, or at least an end to U.S. participation in the killing.

But let us not confuse a victory in Vietnam for Hanoi as a victory for independence and freedom, not as these words are understood in a democracy.
