Although he made the comparison between medicine and the moon solely for purposes of illustration, many will feel that a natural next question is, "How much sooner could we have a cancer cure if all the money going into space were directed into medical research?"

It is a question which only medical experts can answer, and the fact that Dr. Gershon-Cohen neither raises it nor answers it suggests that it is not money but continued slow, hard work in the laboratory which will accomplish the breakthrough he foresees.

The same question has been asked about other multimillion-dollar programs being carried out by this country. A columnist recently expressed a New Year's wish that all the billions we will spend on defense and space exploration in 1965 could be diverted to benefit man-tearing down slums and solving the traffic problem and so on.

She will not get her wish in 1965. She couldn't get it, even if we decided to try. The billions that will be spent on guns and missiles and rocketships and other things do not exist in some vast pile sitting in Washington waiting for us to divert part of it here, part of it there.

These billions are an expression of

We will have both human footprints on the moon and a cure for cancer in the 1970s-plus a lot of other things. We may still have doubts about the wisdom of the one and regrets about the slowness of achieving the other, but it's not a bad future to contemplate.



By Paul Brookshire Despite a general shortage of labor, harvesting of Seminole County's celery crop appears to be in "fair shape." Harvesting of the county's 800-to 900-acre celery crop is at its peak now with the end expected about June 1, growers said today.

The Seminole County crop's value was estimated at approximately \$350,000 by County Agent Cecil Tucker. However, two Seminole growers have joined a suit to force secretary of Labor Willard Wirtz to allow "offshore" labor to harvest the state's largest crop in the Belle Glade area.


