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Congress Rushing LBJ's Expanding War Chest

Combat Gls On Scene

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House appropriations committee, acting with unusual speed, today unanimously approved President Johnson's request for an extra \$700 million to finance the expanding war in South Viet Nam.

The House, setting aside customary parliamentary procedures that might have caused brief delay, planned to vote on the emergency money bill early this afternoon.

Senate ratification was set for later today or Thursday.

Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara detailed the President's request at a closed joint meeting of the Senate armed services and appropriations committees.

Congress rushed to start the money measure through the legislative mill Tuesday even before Johnson's formal request had been transmitted to Capitol Hill. He had outlined it orally to key members at the White House Tuesday morning.

The House appropriations committee approved the money request at a closed session on recommendation of two defense subcommittees which cleared the bill swiftly late Tuesday.

MORE Gls

SAIGON (UPI) — More than 1,200 U.S. Army paratroopers landed near Saigon today—the first Army units committed to an acknowledged combat role in Viet Nam.

In the Da Nang area U.S. Marines avenged weeks of harassment with two successful combat patrols.

In the air war U.S. Navy and Vietnamese Air Force planes destroyed or damaged boxcars, radar stations, military buildings and three small bridges in Communist North Viet Nam.

All planes returned safely to base, a military spokesman reported.

The Marine combat patrol from Da Nang killed seven Viet Cong and captured a wounded guerrilla in perhaps their most successful strike of the war.

KILL GUERRILLAS

One Marine patrol killed seven guerrillas in a thrust at the village of Thap Binh, six miles west of Da Nang.

In this operation two companies caught the guerrillas between them and called down an artillery barrage in a classic "hammer and anvil" maneuver.

The other patrol revisited the village of Lo My where four Leathernecks were wounded Tuesday. It encountered some fire but made no serious contact. The patrol captured a guerrilla wounded Tuesday and heard reports from villagers the Viet Cong carried off two dead and three wounded Tuesday.

An American military spokesman reported that Viet Cong guerrillas have sharply increased their activities with the coming of the first monsoon rains. He reported 25 "incidents" including one attack, seven cases of sabotage and 17 incidents of terrorism in the past 24 hours.

\$1 Billion Bill Prepared For Quick Approval

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The hefty \$1,091,541,048 general appropriations bill to support the many facets of state government in the next biennium, was put in the Senate today and made a special and continuing order of business for Friday.

The bill, that would give Florida its very first billion-dollar general spending authorization, was hammered out by the appropriations committee after weeks of study and amid pleas to keep it within anticipated income of \$1.1 billion.

The House measure, calling for a two-year outlay of \$5.1 billion less than the more generous Senate version, is also to be voted on this week. This represents the earliest a Florida Legislature has ever gotten the bulky money bill to a vote.

Kenneth Ireland, chief consultant to the Senate committee, got special permission to throw the bill into the hopper shortly before the Senate went to work on another dull but heavy calendar of so-called non-controversial bills.

House money chairman J. J. Griffin of Osceola expects to bring his appropriations bill to a vote in the House Thursday.

'Firm Truce' Signed In Civil War

Both Factions In Agreement To Cease Fire

SANTO DOMINGO (UPI) — The Organization of American States (OAS) announced today that both sides had signed a "firm truce" in the civil war that cost more than 1,000 dead and brought U. S. armed intervention.

Several hundred more American troops landed today as the OAS officials met at the loyalist stronghold of San Isidro airbase. Junta leaders and rebel provisional "president" Francisco Caamaño Deno signed the truce.

The agreement called the "Act of Santo Domingo" had four provisions:

- It formalized the cease-fire already shaky in effect.
- It demarcates an enlargement of the security zone carved out by U. S. Marines and paratroopers to include all foreign embassies.
- It provides for evacuation of persons who have taken asylum in various embassies and of refugees caught up in the fighting.
- It provides for distribution of food, medicine and medical equipment to both sides regardless of political beliefs.

TRAWLER SUNK

SANTO DOMINGO (UPI) — U. S. paratroopers opened fire on a 350-foot rebel trawler in the Ozama River today, touching off an explosion heard throughout the city. The trawler apparently was carrying ammunition.

The trawler (of unknown nationality) first opened fire on the paratroopers of the 82nd Airborne Division, who have carved out an international refuge zone and a supply line through rebel-held territory. The paratroopers returned the fire and the explosion followed.

The ship did not sink but was lying disabled in the river which bisects Santo Domingo. Fate of its crew was not known. Observers believed it was bringing in arms and ammunition from a foreign country for use by the rebels.

OTHERWISE QUIET

Otherwise the military situation was comparatively quiet with only scattered firing heard throughout the city. The political situation appeared static with diplomats, including representatives of the Organization of American States (OAS), making little progress toward permanent peace.

2 Youths Face Death Sentence In Rape Case

Israel Gilley and Jimmy Lee Drumright were found guilty Tuesday of the Feb. 8 rape of a 12-year-old girl.

The Circuit Court jury deliberated approximately 2 1/2 hours before returning its verdict. It did not recommend mercy.

Albert N. Fitts, attorney for the two boys, this morning said he will file a motion for a new trial. Sentencing has been delayed until the motion is acted upon. Fitts has until May 10 to file.

If the motion is refused, the automatic death sentences will be appealed to the state Supreme Court. This is an automatic move when any death sentence is passed in the state of Florida.

The two-day trial ended rather speedily after a first day of jury selection, which lasted late into the night Monday.

Witnesses heard Tuesday included the little girl who was raped.

Sam Sheppard Freedom Bid Gets Setback

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI) — The 6th District U. S. Court of Appeals today reversed the decision of a federal judge freeing Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard from prison.

Sheppard, a suburban Cleveland osteopath, was freed from Ohio Penitentiary last July after serving nearly 10 years for the bludgeon slaying of his pregnant wife, Marilyn.

Sheppard was ordered released by Federal Judge Carl Weinman of U. S. District Court in Dayton, Ohio. The state appealed the release, demanding that Sheppard be sent back to prison for the remainder of his second degree murder life sentence.

After serving almost 10 years for the slaying, Sheppard was freed following many legal maneuvers by his attorneys to win freedom.

Weinman granted a habeas corpus writ on grounds that overwhelming newspaper publicity caused an unfair trial.

Following his release, Sheppard married his blonde German pen-pal, Ariane Tebben-Johanns, a divorcee. The couple has been living in the Cleveland suburb of Rocky River since last summer.

The appeals court ordered Sheppard "remanded to the custody of the warden of the Ohio Penitentiary."

Burns' Road Plan Questioned

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A million highway construction bond program.

"Yep, and it felt good." Yogi Berra smiled after making his National League catching debut Tuesday night by slapping two singles and scoring the winning run in the New York Mets 2-1 triumph over Philadelphia.

"But we'll have to see how much I can do," the former Yankee star and manager cautioned.

Yogi will be 40-years-old a week from Wednesday and had not played in a regular season game since Sept. 21, 1962. He went hitless in eight spring training appearances this year and grounded out in his first pinchhitting role last Saturday in Cincinnati.

"I wasn't in shape in spring training. When you've been out a year you gotta come back slowly. But I've been taking a lotta batting practice and catching in workouts and feel strong," Berra said. "Getting to play again is like a shot in the arm."

And Yogi was like a shot in the arm to 17,321 Met fans at Shea Stadium who gave him a thunderous standing ovation when he came to bat in the first inning. He rifled a single which apparently scored Ed Kranepool from second base, but Joe Christopher, who had walked, was cut down trying to reach third before Kranepool could score.

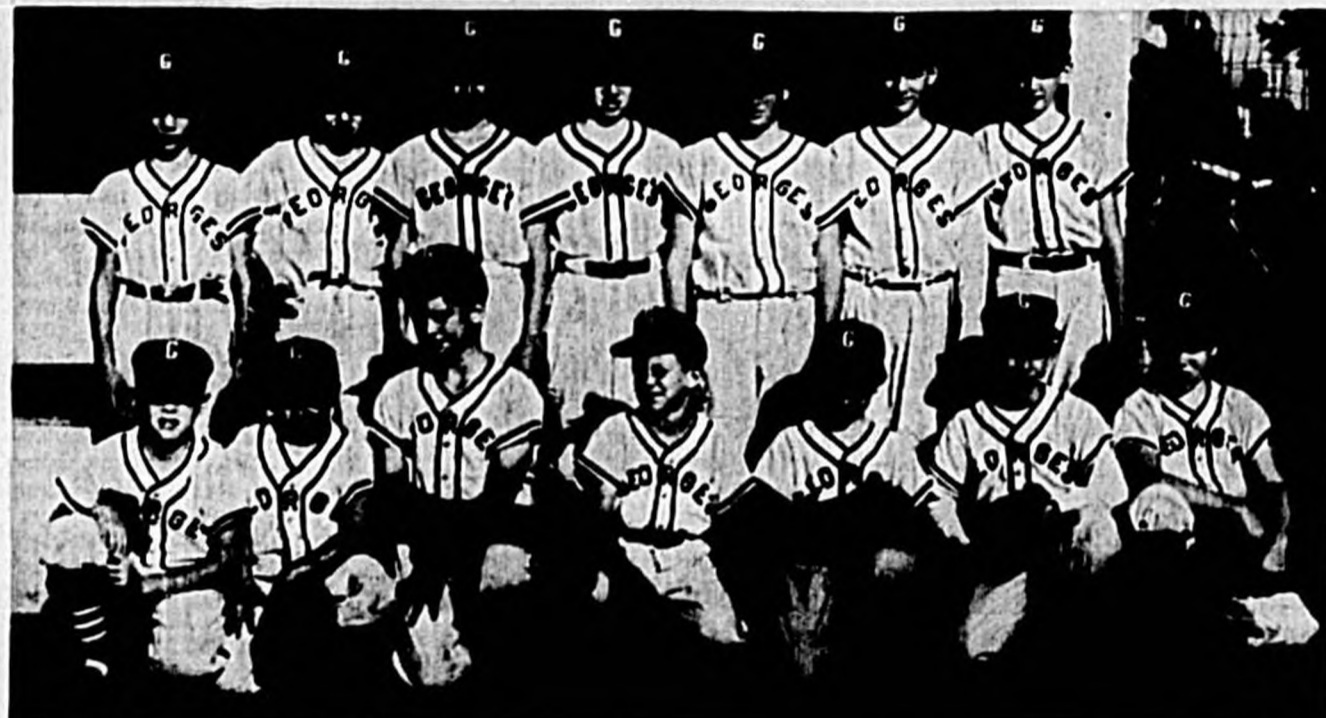
Berra singled again in the seventh, moved to second on a hit by Ron Swoboda and scored the decisive run on Roy McMillan's single.

Yogi also sparked behind the plate, catching winner Al Jackson the full nine innings. He tagged out Johnny Callison attempting to slide around him at the plate in the first inning. Jackson set a club record of 11 strikeouts and blanked the Phils until the ninth when singles by Frank Thomas and Tony Taylor, a wild pitch and Ruben Amaro's sacrifice fly produced a run.

In other games, three Wilkes-Davis, Stargell and Mays—along with Hank Aaron sup-National League where Pittsburgh beat Chicago 6-3, Milwaukee topped Houston 9-3, Los Angeles beat Cincinnati 8-6 and San Francisco bombed St. Louis 9-2.

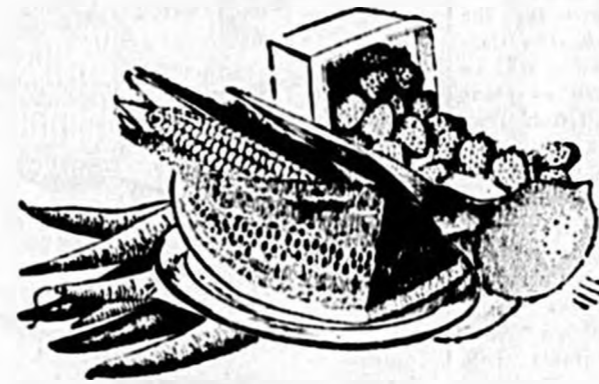

Burns, Williams At Odds (?) On Insurance Bid

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Insurance companies are trying again to raise automobile liability rates in Florida, and they may have put Gov. Haydon Burns and Insurance Commissioner Broward Williams at odds.

The National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters (NBCU) filed a request with Williams' office on behalf of some 90 companies operating in Florida. The request is for a raise in auto liability rates that would average 29 per cent for the state.

Neither Burns nor Williams could be reached.

Burns was quoted by the Miami Herald, however, as having said earlier that he would regard it as "a direct breach of our agreement" if Williams, after proper hearings on the request, approved the rate increase.

The paper quoted Williams as saying he did not feel that the new rate hike application falls under the pledge he made to Burns in January when the governor named him to the Cabinet post.

Burns named Williams, a former lobbyist for the insurance companies, to replace the late J. Edwin Larson. One of Larson's last acts before he was stricken with a fatal stroke was rejecting in January the application filed last November by some 200 companies for a rate hike.

Burns said in January Williams had pledged that during the coming two years he would not entertain again the same request for a rate increase.

Monday, Williams was quoted as saying he considered the new request "a different filing for a different rate."

"My commitment with Burns had to do with one fil-

ing—the one particular NBCU filing Mr. Larson had turned down."

Burns, however, was quoted as saying: "The commitment Commissioner Williams made to me was that during this

term of office he would not hear the request for a rate increase from the companies that had just finished their rate hearing and that Commissioner Larson had just denied.

"To put it another way, he said he would not reverse the decision recently made by Mr. Larson. I don't know what the law is—Williams may have to give them a hearing if they

ask for it. But he doesn't have to grant their request. "If his decision is ultimately to grant the increase, it will be a direct breach of our agreement."

Only liability insurance is involved in the new application for a rate hike. Companies which applied in November for comprehensive and collision insurance rate increases are not included in the new application.

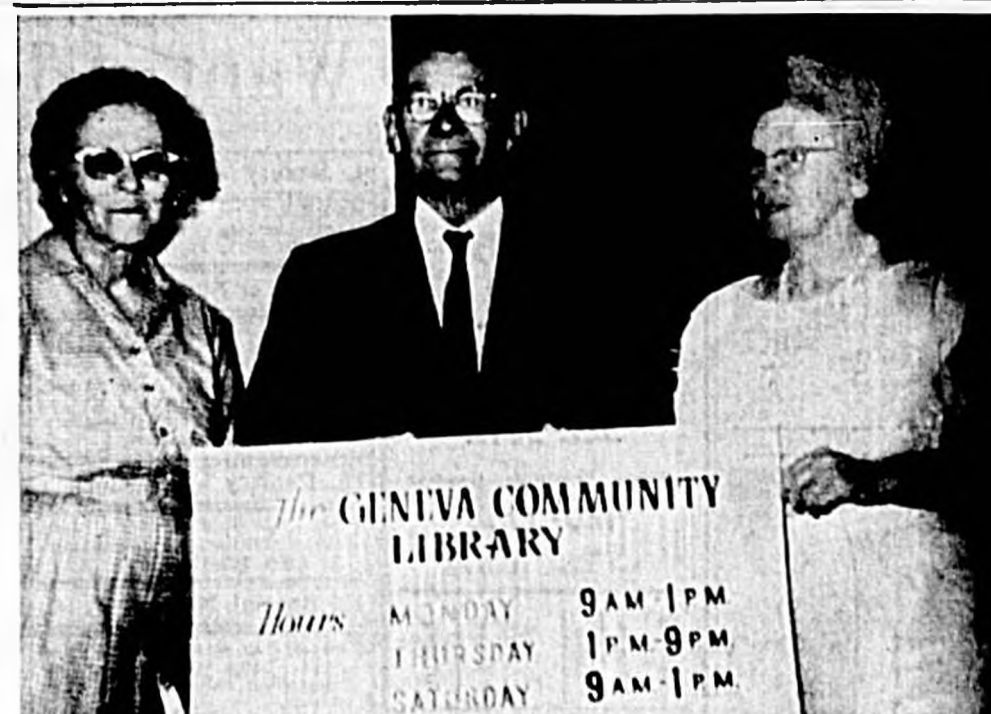

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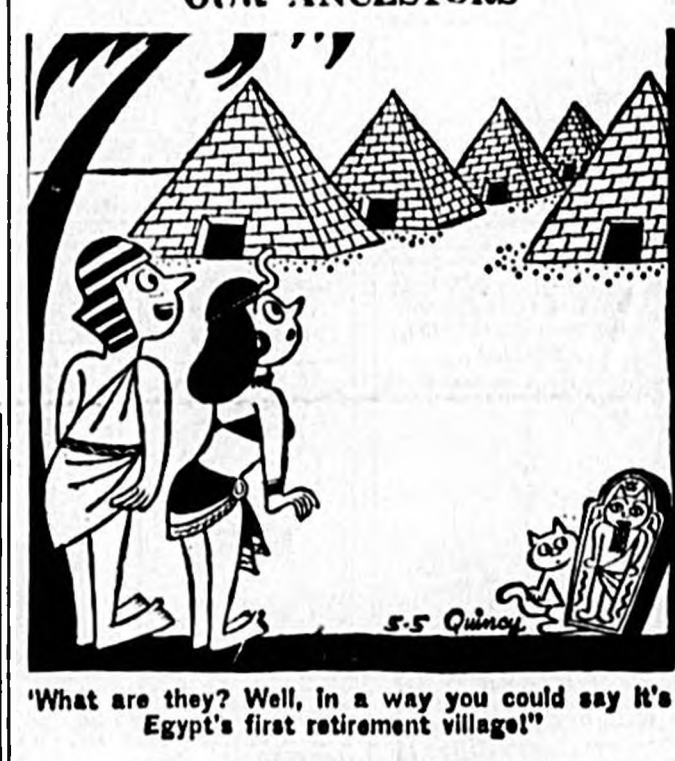
