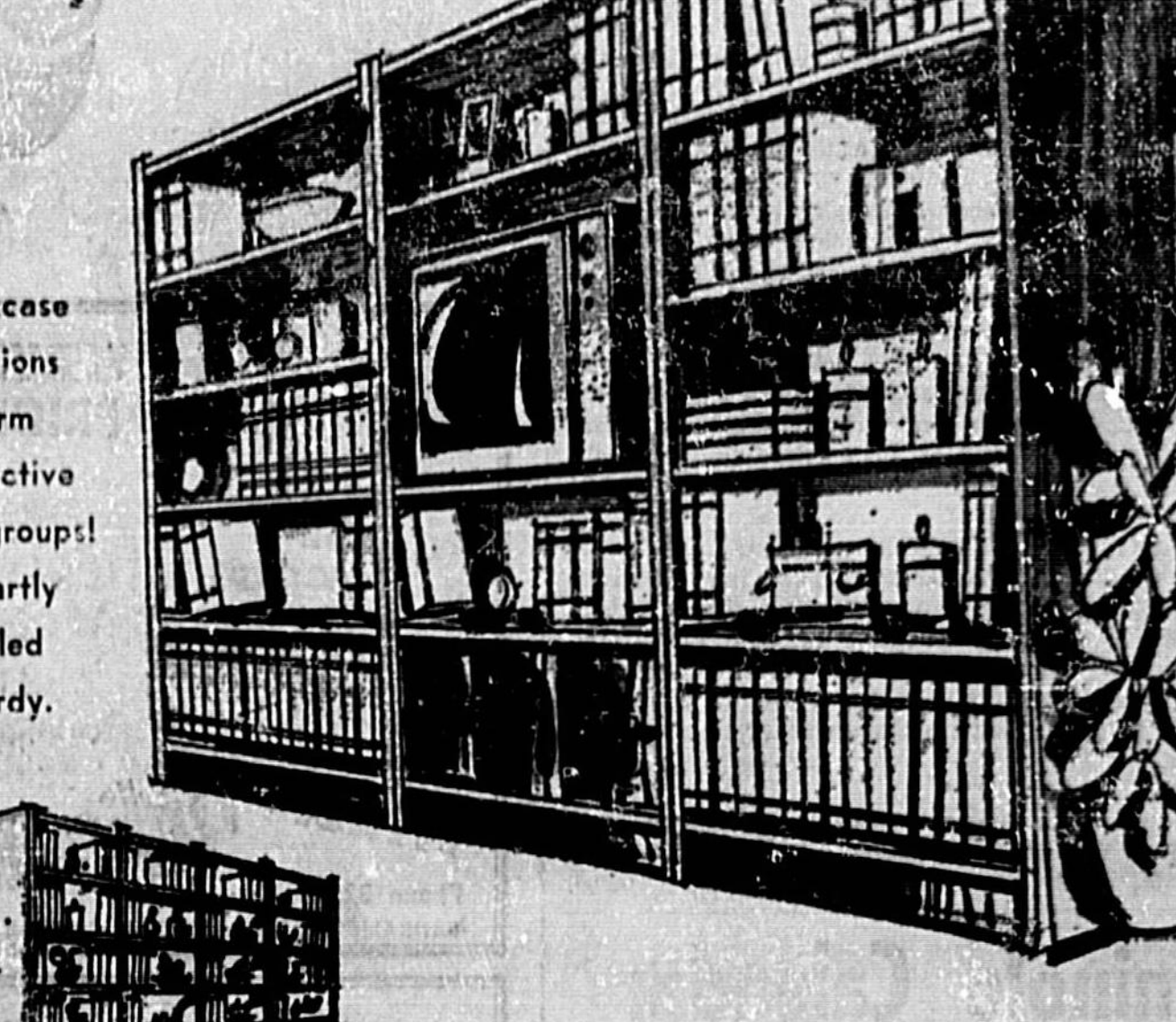

"They (the people) need faith and communication," he said. "Seven thousand guns don't mean a thing without dialogue."

"Nobody accepts justice," he added, "the time is far from ripe for being aggressive."

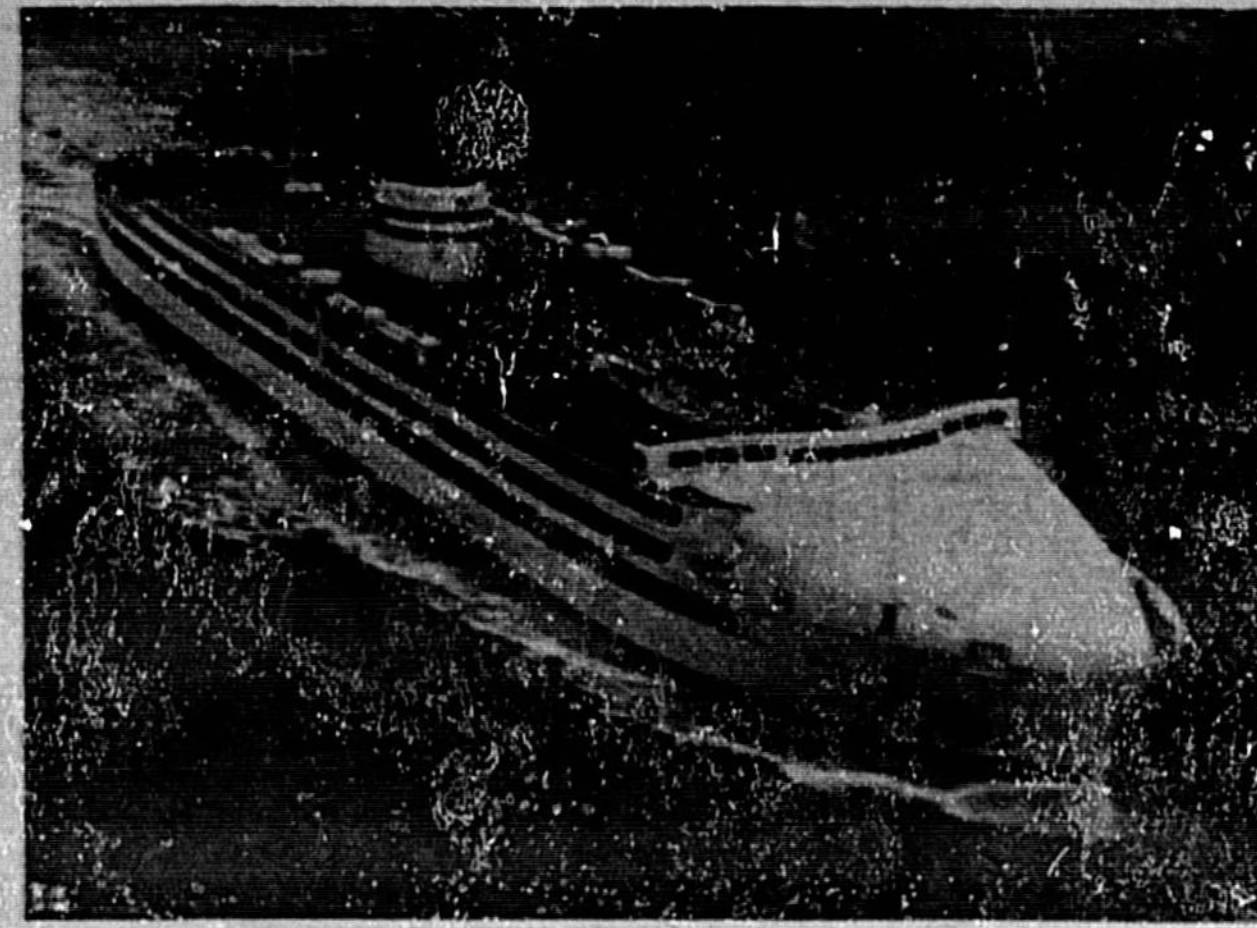

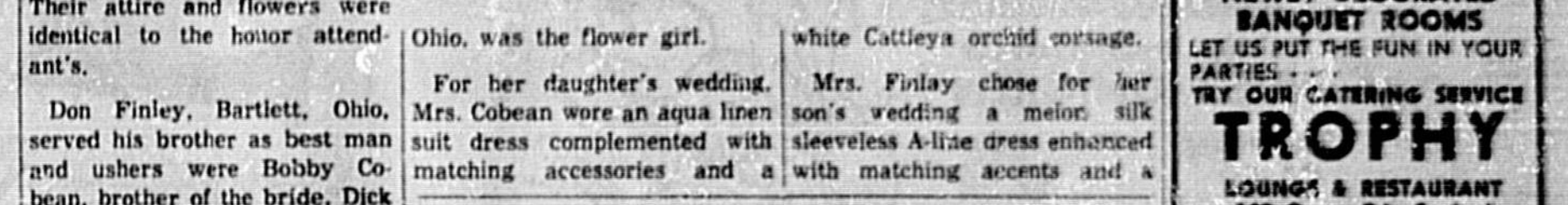
Fashions Go International

Mammoth Pancake Excellent

A mammoth oven pancake can be made with pancake mix with excellent results.

Up to now we've made this Dutch Baby, as it's sometimes called, from scratch. But recently we tried the following short cut recipe and our taste-testers were enthusiastic.

This pancake comes out of the oven in a shallow, shallow, round, to look a fluff. And because a pancake of this sort has an air-filled, fluffy texture, it is ideal for apple, honey or other fillings.

As with any recipe, have all the ingredients for the pancake and the filling measured before you begin preparation. The recipe is for a 12-inch skillet, but you need to be prepared for each size.

A nine-inch black cast-iron skillet bakes the pancake well because the skillet is heavy enough to hold the heat and has an ovenproof handle.

Be sure to heat the pancake butter for about 2 minutes as directed; this extra heating gives maximum volume.

APPLE PANCAKE PUFF

1 large egg
1/2 cup pancake mix
1/4 cup milk
1 tablespoon butter

Honey Apple Filling, see recipe

In a medium mixing bowl with rotary beater—electric or hand—beat eggs until yolk and whites are combined.

Gradually beat in pancake mix, alternately with milk, until smoothly blended.

Pre-heat in a 9-inch black iron skillet or similar skillet with an ovenproof handle, place in preheated 450-degree oven. Then vigorously beat egg mixture for about 2 minutes; swirl butter in skillet and pour batter into it.

Bake in the preheated 450-degree oven until golden-brown—15 minutes. During baking, batter will rise along sides of skillet and form a shell.

With a small spatula loosen pancake edges; tilt skillet and with the help of a wide metal spatula or pancake turner gently slide pancake shell onto serving plate. Turn hot Honey Apple Topping into center of pancake shell; cut in 4 wedges and serve at once. Or cut pancake shell into 4 wedges in skillet and lift wedges onto individual dessert plates; then spoon the Honey Apple Topping onto each portion.

Makes 4 servings but it's so good you'll people can eat it up.

HONEY APPLE FILLING

1/4 cup honey
1 large tart green apple (pared, sliced and very thinly sliced to make about 2 cups)
1 teaspoon lemon juice
2 tablespoons sliced pecans
2 tablespoons butter

Into a 1 1/2-quart saucepan pour the honey; bring to a boil. Add apple and lemon juice; simmer about 2 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in pecans and butter until butter melts. Serve hot, reheating if necessary, as directed in Apple Pancake Puff recipe.

For a nutritious sandwich: filling mix together creamed cottage cheese, grated raw carrot, dried pimiento; add salt to taste.

Pigs, Dogs Root Out Truffles

The famed gourmet, Brill Savarin, once called them "the diamonds of the kitchen," and it seems a fitting title for the truffle which has delighted educated palates since the days of an ancient Rome.

For centuries, an aura of romance and glamor has surrounded this fabulous fungus which defies scientific analysis. The truffle is still a mystery, and attempts to cultivate it have failed so far.

The fungus grows fruitfully on the sides of a certain variety of oak tree, and it usually nestles about a foot-and-a-half underground. Pigs or specially trained dogs are employed to root it out.

This may all be changed by Pierre Cagniard, president of France's certain variety of truffle, who is guardian of the famed black Périgord truffle.

Cagniard came to the United States not long ago, singing the praises of France's gastronomic truffle; foie gras and champagne. France produces at least 80 per cent of the world's truffle output, and Cagniard has made the fungus his business for more than 30 years.

Disturbed by the fact that the truffle has declined all attempts at cultivation, Cagniard has come up with a possible solution in the age-old riddle. He suggests that plantations of truffle oaks be created. Then after the trees have matured, truffle dogs could sniff out and dig up the prized harvest.

If Cagniard's idea works, the crop would become more predictable, and the astronomical price of truffles might be stabilized.

Such plantations of truffle oaks which flourish in the climate and soil of southern France, should assure an increased supply of the delicacy, but how much so is uncertain. The captious fungus does not grow under the canopy of any one of these truffle oaks. That's why Cagniard suggested the plantation idea. The old safety in numbers routine.

Cagniard has amassed a vast supply of associates about his beloved truffles. One concerns Napoleon Bonaparte who confided to a young aide his hope that the Empress Marie-Louise would bear him a son. The aide recalled that his father, who sired 19 children often used to dine on truffled arial fowl and champagne. The empress tried the diet, the story goes, and soon announced the advent of a heir. In gratitude, he promoted the aide to the rank of colonel.

Aside from its other properties, real or imagined, the truffle can't be an ordinary dish into a gourmet delight. Try this recipe for chicken breasts for instance.

SUPREMES DE VOLAILE
4 individual chicken breasts boned (but not skinned)
2 oz. parmesan cheese
salt and pepper, fine
1 egg white (unbeaten)
1 cup fine bread crumbs
2 oz. butter
1 1/2 oz. can Sauce Périgoux (truffle sauce)
2 tablespoons Madeira wine
2 ounces chopped black truffles

With a flat knife, spread fine grass between skin and flesh of each chicken breast. Salt and pepper to taste, and sprinkle lightly with flour. Dip into egg white, then bread crumbs. Sauté in butter, skin side down first, until golden brown. Reduce heat and cook, covered, over low heat about 10 minutes or until chicken is tender, adding more butter, if needed. Empty sauce into pan and warm over low heat. Blend in Madeira. Do not boil. Pour sauce over chicken breasts.

Kids call this "humpy apple sauce" and gobble it up!
Roast Duck Salad Bowl
Stewed Apples with Custard Sauce

STEWED APPLES
6 medium (about 3 pounds) cooking apples
8 whole cloves
1 cup light corn syrup
Core, pare and quarter apples; slice each quarter into thirds. In a medium saucepan bring the apples, cloves and syrup up to a boil. Simmer, covered, over medium heat, until apples are tender and some cloves still hold their shape—about 15 minutes. Remove cloves. Yields about 3 cups. Serve with custard sauce. Makes 6 servings.

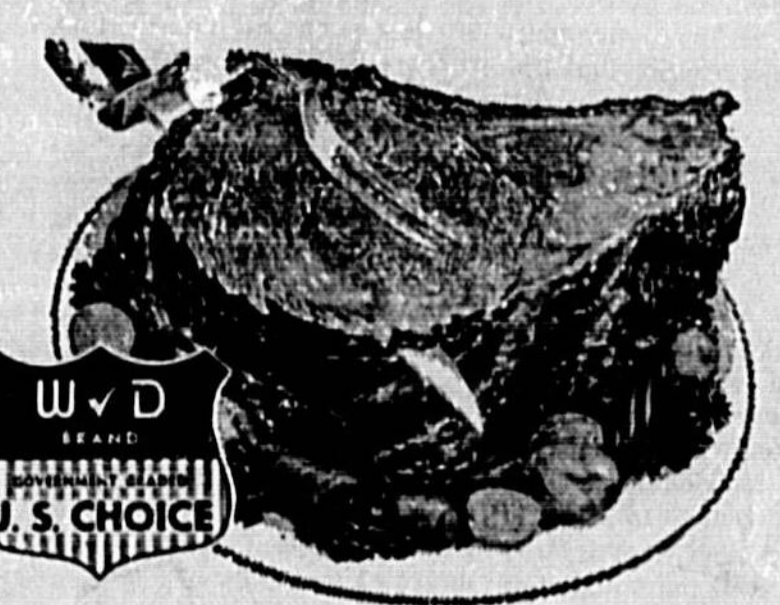
