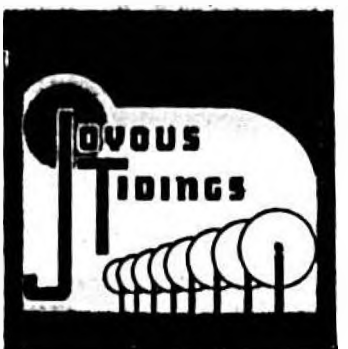

Longwood Track Furnishes Jobs To Sixty Local Men

Management Plans To Buy Most Of Supplies In Sanford

When the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club opens next Tuesday night, Dec. 27, for its annual 90-day racing season, it will mean jobs for more than 60 Seminole County men.

Already the county is beginning to feel the yearly influx of new money, for the track is having all its printing done in Sanford, purchases all its paint, lumber and other supplies in the City, and many of the track have rented Sanford homes and apartments and hotel accommodations.

Lee Pratt, general manager of the plant said yesterday "most of our big weekly payroll will go directly into the tills of Seminole County merchants."

Longwood has been a beehive of activity for the past month. The track is reported in great shape, after a summer of musing by Johnny Riley, superintendent of the grounds.

Mr. Pratt said that 750 permanent residents of Seminole County are on our payroll, seven or eight employees of the track from the North have established their residence in the county for the winter. Thirty dog owners and 33 trainers are living in Seminole.

Features of the first night will be two races—the Inaugural and the Junior Welfare Handicap. The opening night's program of races is sponsored by the Junior Welfare Association of Orlando, a group of society girls who support a home for underprivileged children called Fair Oaks.

Top race of the night will be the Inaugural, the winner of which has always been one of the top dogs for the season at Longwood.

Three years ago Wild Penny crossed the line first. Then came the ill-fated Waltz King, a youngster who promised to be a national champion. He won the Inaugural in 1936, went on thru eight consecutive races winning top money but then contracted distemper and died.

Last year's winner was Speedy Karl, out of Gus Males' kennel. Speedy, the son of Speedy Event and Al's Baby, came from behind to win and his schooling tries thus far this season indicate that he is again in superb form and a dangerous contender to repeat.

Racing Secretary Bob Sherlock will name eight starters from the event and eight of the best youngsters for the Junior Welfare handicap. He has over 400 dogs from 33 kennels to choose from.

The photo finish system will again be used to decide close races and help Chief Judge Bob Kelly name the first three greyhounds.

Several innovations have been planned for this season. They include the quinnella system of betting, a \$3 "across-the-board" combination ticket and hurdle races several times weekly.

There will also be a daily double every night of the week. Races will be run this year out of the 3-10th of a mile box, the futurity box and the 1-16th box.

World Trade War Enters New Phase With U. S. In Lead

(Continued From Page One) change. They won't have to make any old deal for exchange of goods.

In effect, you have in these credit arrangements the latest American answer to the German system of controlled trade. They are a logical sequel to the Hull program of reciprocal trade: an effort to lower tariff barriers all along the line in all nations to revive world trade.

The root of the problem, financially, is the gold standard. About 10 years ago gold began flying from capital to capital in flight, upsetting balances in the banks of the world. Until then the gold standard had been sufficient measure of value for international trade. But it fell under the strain of unpaid international debts and post-war confusion. Gold is no longer an absolute necessity in international trade.

The trade war would be a comparatively polite affair without serious casualties, if governments had not intervened to alter the free flow of trade.

All Tangled Up One control called for another. Now it would be quite impossible for any government to extricate itself. The countries of the world are like kittens all tangled up in skeins of yarn.

Then there is the all important item of military and political advantage. Germany, Italy—even Japan are deficient in certain raw materials, particularly oil, wheat and cotton. In the event of war, and blockade, they would have to depend on stored supplies.

Therefore, they are trying to extend their domination of nearby states in order to guarantee those supplies. Germany is looking toward oil-filled Roumania, and the wheat-laden Ukraine. Italy is glancing toward Africa and Japan is conquering China.

This is economic warfare turning into military war and threats of war. The question is: How long can the world stand the strain?

Italy Reported Massing Troops Near Somaliland

Fears Of Campaign On Djibouti Expressed By French Colonial Officials

Re-Inforcements Sent By France

Daladier Leaves Next Move In Issue Up To Premier Mussolini

PARIS, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Dispatches from North Africa today reported that Italy is massing troops on the frontiers of French Somaliland.

French officials expressed fears that this might be the start of a campaign to threaten Djibouti, the French Somali port on the Red Sea which is the only rail outlet for Italy's Ethiopian empire.

Travelers reaching Djibouti from the east reported that the French press reported that the Governor of Djibouti had demanded and obtained reinforcements from France.

Foreign officials said they are unable to confirm or deny these reports. Italy has been demanding some French-protected territories but France has replied she will not give up any colonies.

France told Italy yesterday that she accepted the Italian note renouncing the 1935 Laval-Mussolini territorial treaty but the French note stated as the only basis for negotiations between the two powers.

This, the next move in the colonial issue was put squarely up to Italy as Premier Daladier, despite Fascist cries of "provocation," disclosed plans to make his tour of Corsica and Tunisia a mighty "hands off demonstration" to Premier Mussolini's legions.

Wheeler Takes Exception To Coughlin Ban

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Senator Wheeler, exception, Montana, took sharp exception yesterday to a recent statement by Neville Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, that radio could not tolerate "abuse" of freedom of speech.

"Who is Mr. Miller that he should set himself up to say when free speech should be denied to any citizen of the United States?" Wheeler asked.

"What special knowledge does he possess that he can judge free speech?" Wheeler asked.

"In times of hysteria which sweep this country there are always those super-patriots who believe they are destined to regulate the actions and the speech of their fellow men."

Miller had declared that broadcasts "inciting racial and religious hatred" were an "evil not to be tolerated."

Wheeler contended that opposition to broadcasts was a matter of "hysteria which, uncontrolled, is very apt to lead to a civil war with Germany and other totalitarian powers."

Symes Is Elected Chairman Of Soil Conserving Group

Seminole Farmers Get About \$35,000 For 1938, Dawson States

Roy E. Symes, Sr. was re-elected chairman of the Seminole County Soil Conservation Committee at the election of a committee to administer the 1938 soil conservation program in this county last Friday, County Agent C. R. Dawson reported today.

Other members of the committee which was named by delegates from the three community committees are C. S. Lee of Ocala, vice chairman; C. N. South of Longwood, member; with Leo Butler, first alternate, and E. J. Meyer, second alternate.

Mr. Dawson reported today that approximately \$35,000 has been paid to Seminole County fruit and vegetable growers for compliance with the requirements of the 1938 program. He declared that if other growers participate in the special celery acreage control program, disbursements to growers in this county will be more than doubled for next year.

Under the special program, a soil building allowance of approximately \$10 to \$50 an acre will be paid to celery growers for not overplanting the crop goal set for their farms.

The amount paid for planting other soil conserving cover crops has been reduced from \$2 to \$1.50 an acre for this year.

Vandals Ruin Green At Local Golf Links

The meanest man in town turned up at the municipal golf course last night. A. C. Fort, manager of the course, revealed this morning, when someone, either intoxicated, or trying to act smart before his golf friend, used the eighth green for a motorhome.

The green, freshly sodded and planted with eye grass, was badly cut by heavy automobile tires which had been driven in a circle around the green several times, and then straight across the green, breaking the flag pole.

Mr. Fort said, adding that at least \$100 worth of damage had been done.

Warning the vandals that any repetition of such an offense might result in serious consequences, Mr. Fort declared he had been promised the co-operation of the Sheriff's office where it was stated that a radio car would be available on an instant's notice.

FDR Decides Upon Largest National Defense Program

Administration Contemplates Quadrupled U. S. Air Fleet

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt was reported authoritatively yesterday to have decided on a double barreled recommendation to Congress for national defense reinforcement, of unprecedented force-measure magnitude.

Persons close to the administration said the President intended to report, in the annual message he will deliver personally to a joint senate-house on Jan. 4, that the security of the nation and its neighbors was threatened by the armed might of aggressive dictators.

A week later, under present arrangements, a special message will present detailed recommendations for an army air force of some 10,000 planes and numerous other measures.

Thus, the administration contemplates a quadrupled military air fleet of at least 13,000 aircraft, including the minimum of 3,000 congress authorized for the navy in this year's million-dollar fleet expansion act.

The magnitude of the air program has caused surprise here, especially in view of the fact that some high army officers were advocating, at least up to recently, a comparatively small air force of high quality.

Early in October Major General Arnold, new chief of the army air corps, declared the country didn't need a great many more military airplanes, but needed faster ones. Under the development program being carried on at that time, the army was to have 2,200 craft by 1940. General Arnold, in an interview, called this "a very good figure as things now stand."

These remarks were made about the time of the signing of the Munich four power accord. Whether or implications of that accord and the post-Munich events abroad have now changed Arnold's mind is not known. He could not be reached for comment last night.

There have been reports that some other high officers of the army could not see eye to eye with the administration on defense plans. These were denied 10 days ago by General Craig, chief of staff, who said: "The administration and the war department have been working in intimate accord on a program regarding which absolutely no deception has yet been finally made."

Hurt Will Not Be Here On Wednesday

Because of special duties, Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue, J. L. Hurt, will be unable to make his weekly visit to the Chamber of Commerce building Wednesday. Any Federal returns which are due or past due should be mailed direct to the Collector of Internal Revenue in Jacksonville, Mr. Hurt said.

All social security and unemployment insurance returns must be filed with the collector during the month of January, he said, adding that those liable for unemployment tax must pay to the state on time in order to claim credit on the Federal returns.

City's Power To Adjust Old Taxes To End

Officials Say No Further Reductions In Assessments To Be Made After Dec. 31

City officials today reminded owners of property in Sanford on which taxes and special assessments are delinquent that the authority of the City Commission as a Delinquent Tax Adjustment Board expires on Dec. 31 of this year and that all delinquent assessments of the City which have not been adjusted must be paid in full after that date.

At the last session of the Legislature, the Commission was granted the authority to act as an adjustment board in the settlement of delinquent taxes and special assessments, and since that time thousands of dollars in delinquent city taxes have been settled at the full amount permitted under the authority of the special act.

Warning property owners that the only recourse of the City will be to foreclose on all property on which taxes are delinquent if no attempt at settlement has been made, Mayor Edward Higgins stated that this authority is the last adjustment of these claims which will be granted by the City.

The City will apply any further plans to adjust delinquent assessments," Mayor Higgins stated, adding that every inducement is now being offered the taxpayer to settle these past due obligations.

City officials also pointed out that the authority permitting that the seven-year installment plan for payment of past due taxes also expires on Dec. 31 and those who wish to pay their past due assessments or taxes must make the necessary arrangements by next Saturday.

This plan provides for a down payment of one-seventh of the adjusted amount of the delinquent assessments and the remainder is divided into annual installments which will be paid in a seven year period. Payments of current taxes must be made before becoming past due during the period of payment.

As a Delinquent Tax Adjustment Board the authority of the City Commission applies only to delinquent taxes for the years of 1933 and prior, and in adjusting taxes on improved property, all penalties and 90 percent of the principal are cancelled. Full payment without penalties of taxes for subsequent years is required.

For unimproved property, the taxes and penalties for 1933 and prior are cancelled in full but payment is required on taxes for subsequent years. In adjusting special assessments, all interest is cancelled and 90 percent of the principal.

Unconscious Veteran Is Taken Off Tracks

REVERE, Mass., Dec. 27.—(AP)—Alfred Richards, 38, of Stabans, Vt., a war veteran, owed his life to two railroad men who stopped their train and snatched him, unconscious, from another track a bare three minutes before the Boston to Portland express roared past.

At the Boston hospital, Richards told doctors he had not eaten for three days, since he came to Boston to "see about" a war pension.

He had started to walk the tracks back to Vermont and apparently fainted from fatigue and cold.

Fireman Roy Christmann and Engineer Ralph P. Sawyer saw him on the track and stopped their local train in time to pull him from the path of the express.

Severe Cold Wave Sweeps Across U.S.

Sub-Freezing Temperatures Are Forecast for Florida Tonight, Wednesday

Storm Warnings Are Displayed

Snow, Sleet Follow Mild Holiday In Northern States

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 27.—(AP)—The Weather Bureau said today a cold wave which is sweeping eastward across the country from western Canada would bring freezing temperatures to North Florida and much cooler weather to all parts of the peninsula within 24 hours.

Extreme North-west Florida was warned to expect temperatures of from 21 to 28 degrees tonight.

The first warning service of the Weather Bureau at Lakeland said the temperature probably would drop to about 30 degrees in the Lake City area tomorrow morning. The Bureau forecast readings of 22 degrees for Starke, Lake City, Gainesville, Trenton and Healyville for Ocala and Homestead, New Smyrna Beach and Melbourne and upward for the Orlando and Hialeah districts of Seminole County.

The forecast said wind may keep steady from tomorrow morning but probably would not do so Thursday morning.

Small craft were warned to keep away from the Gulf coast from Mexico City, La. to Corral Bello, Fla.

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—(AP)—The first severe cold wave of the season advanced across the northern half of the nation today. Temperatures ranging down to 10 below zero were predicted from the Pacific Northwest to the Great Lakes region as the frigid blast was on board.

Temperatures fell below freezing over a wide expanse of the continent after a comparatively mild holiday.

Weather observers predicted the full force of the cold wave would reach the Atlantic seaboard tonight or tomorrow and that the bitter cold weather would stay for several days.

Now and then accompanied the cold wind into the mid-section and north. Cold dipped into the South and forecasters said it should be felt in the south by Friday.
