Mr. Touchton recently received a pharmacist degree at the University of Florida and is employed at the Touchton Drug Store here. Miss Machen was said to be one of the most popular co-eds on the Stetson campus and took an active part in the social activities of the school. Miss Mercer was a senior at the DeLand High School.

One of the boys left the sinking car through an opened door, witnesses said, while the other escaped after breaking out a glass. Futile attempts to reach the girls were made by the two boys after they left the car, it was reported.

Mr. Weathered sustained a broken shoulder, while Mr. Touchton was lacerated about the face and sustained several painful bruises. Both were taken to the hospital for treatment but were released shortly afterward.

Mr. Stafford reported that apparently the driver did not notice the open drawbridge since it appeared that no effort was made to halt the speeding auto. He said that it was a distance of 210 feet between the guard rail and the point where the auto left the causeway.

The automobile was a 1938 model Chevrolet sedan which was owned by Mr. Weathered. Bridge attendants stated that they were drenched as the water splashed more than 60 feet into the air.

The bodies of the girls were not removed from the auto until about 6:00 A.M. They were taken out through the rear window of the car after it had been raised to the surface.

The boat which was enroute to Jacksonville was entering the channel on the same side as the approaching car but the captain said he averted the tug into the other channel when he saw that the car would plunge into the river.

(Continued from Page One) he must and will fully develop her water transportation and harbor possibilities, not only for commercial advantage but also for national defense. The Florida Canal fits in this picture and will be completed.

"It is my belief also that another canal will be constructed in the not very distant future across Mexico or the Central American region. Of particular interest to Florida is the full development of these waterways and general coastal facilities. Transportation of all kinds is facilitated and made more profitable through full development of our waterway possibilities," to co-operate with him.

"With more than 1300 miles of coastline, Florida holds more strategic position in our waterways development and national defense program; and by digression, may I say that it is only fair and honest that Florida should, by law, if necessary, be given at least double the present sugar quota and that our winter vegetable and fruit crops be protected and aided rather than hindered and smothered by reciprocal trade agreements."

"In Florida we are able to supply a large portion of the demand of our country's requirements for sugar, fruits and winter vegetables. This trade is now going to countries other than our own. I cannot believe that the Congress can long permit this traversal of justice."

"It is also my hope and belief that a comprehensive marketing system can be worked out for internal United States to the end that commodities, particularly perishable commodities, are delivered where needed and when needed, at reasonable price."

Germany marked the
"Xmas incident" diplomatically closed today while two great armies fought a crucial battle in Spain and Pope Pius XI expressed his "bitter sadness" over the relations between the Vatican and the Italian government.

Although regretting that Sumner Welles, acting United States Secretary of State, had "left a sting behind" in rejecting the German protest against the attacks by Interior Secretary Harold L. Ickes, the German propaganda ministry spokesman said there would be no further official "reaction."

The Pope, in a Christmas message to the cardinals, lamented vexations which he said were a "mis-treatment" of Catholic action, organization of laymen, and the "wounding of the Concordia" between Italy and the Holy See by Premier Mussolini's promulgation of a law forbidding marriages between Aryans and non-Aryans.

Two of the greatest armies assembled on a single battlefield in the Spanish war were locked in combat in northern Spain's snow-covered mountains. Both Government and Insurgent sources agreed that this was the beginning of Insurgent Generalissimo Francisco Franco's long-awaited offensive and that its success or failure may decide the outcome of the war now in its 8th month.

Half a million men were said to be engaged on a 100 mile battle line from Trenz to Girona mountains.

Advices reaching the French frontier said insurgents appeared to have been halted, at least in the center of the front. Earlier dispatches said the insurgents had advanced on both ends of the line.

The proposed Pan-American conference declaration for a continental solidarity today depended on Brazil, the only one of the 21 American republics which had not signed it.

Italy and France remained at loggerheads over Fascist demands for French possessions, made acute by a defiant Italian note calling off the 1935 French-Italian agreement concerning Tunisian.

In China neither Japanese nor Chinese claimed any great gains in the war dragged on.

One of the most desperate strategies of the Spanish civil war was being fought early today along the snow-piled western boundary of Loyalist Catalonia as Generalissimo Francisco Franco personally drove Italian and Spanish legions into his long-bounced Christmas offensive.

Both Loyalist and insurgent communists at midnight said that the battle, which began at dawn Friday along a 50-mile front in sub-zero temperatures, continued unabated but verisons of the outcome of the fighting were contradictory.

Government communists from Valencia said the offensive had been halted back at all points with a sternest sort of Franco's Italian black-shirts who were driven down when they attempted to cross the Ebro River. Franco was temporarily gains yesterday. Franco said, but his troops were driven back to their original positions by swift Loyalist counter-attacks.

France's headquarters at Burriana and Saragossa included a heavily-mechanized spearhead which crossed the Loyalist iron curtain of fortifications at dawn and were driving backward the Loyalist capital of Valencia, says less than 80 miles.

Christmas Tree Slayer Prefers Jail To Release

Kills Man, Wounds Another To Protect His Evergreen

ELYRIA, Ohio, Dec. 24.—(UPI)—William Case, 84-year-old white-bearded farmer whose defense of Christmas tree in his grove brought death to his neighbor, chose to remain in jail today instead of returning to his evergreen studded acres.

He pleaded innocent to manslaughter in connection with the fatal shooting of William Rousseau, 37-year-old unemployed father of two small girls. His bond was fixed at \$10,000.

Case said he could make bond without trouble but he preferred to remain in jail. Mrs. Rousseau was wounded when Case shot at her and her husband, as they plucked the Christmas tree in their car after cutting it on Case's farm.

She is reported in a serious condition. Rousseau died in the car. Case said he would have given them the tree if they had asked for it but shot at them because too many persons had been stealing his trees.



Longwood Track Furnishes Jobs To Sixty Local Men

Management Plans To Buy Most Of Supplies In Sanford

When the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club opens next Tuesday night, Dec. 27, for its annual 90-day racing season, it will mean jobs for more than 60 Seminole County men.

Already the county is beginning to feel the yearly influx of new money into mercantile channels; however, for the track is having all its printing done in Sanford, purchases all its paint, lumber and other supplies in the Celery City, and many of the officials and employees of the track have rented Sanford homes and apartments and hotel accommodations.

Lee Pratt, general manager of the plant said yesterday "most of our big weekly payroll will go directly into the till of Seminole County merchants."

Longwood has been a beehive of activity for the past month. The track is reported in great shape, after a summer of nursing by Johnny Riley, superintendent of the grounds.

Mr. Pratt said that "60 permanent residents of Seminole County are on our payroll, seven or eight employees of the track from the North have established their residence in the county for the winter. Thirty dog owners and 33 trainers are living in Seminole.

Features of the first night will be two races—the Inaugural and the Junior Welfare Handicap. The opening night's program of races is sponsored by the Junior Welfare Association of Orlando, a group of society girls who support a home for underprivileged children called Fair Oaks.

Top race of the night will be the Inaugural, the winner of which has always been one of the top dogs for the season at Longwood.

Three years ago Wild Penny crossed the line first. Then came the ill-fated Waltz King, a youngster who promised to be come a national champion. He won the Inaugural in 1936, went on thru eight consecutive races winning top money but then contracted distemper and died.

Last year's winner was Speedy Karl, out of Guy Males' kennel. Speedy, the son of Speedy Event and Al's Baby, came from behind to win and his schooling tries thus far this season indicate that he is again in shape for another dangerous contender to repeat.

Racing Secretary Bob Sherlock will name eight starters from the veterans of the track for this event and eight of the best youngsters for the Junior Welfare handicap. He has over 400 dogs from 33 kennels to choose from.

The photo finish system will again be used to decide close races and help Chief Judge Bob Kelly name the first three greyhounds.

Several innovations have been planned for this season. They include the quinelle system of betting, a \$3 "across-the-board" combination ticket and hurdle races several times weekly.

There will also be a daily double every night of the week.

Races will be run this year out of the 3-16th of a mile box, the furlong box and the 5-16th box.

change. They won't have to make any old deal for exchange of goods.

In effect, you have in these credit arrangements the latest American answer to the German system of controlled trade. They are a logical sequel to the Hull program of reciprocal trade: an effort to lower tariff barriers along the line in all nations to revive world trade.

The root of the problem, financially, is the gold standard. About 10 years ago, gold began flying from capital to capital in flight, upsetting balances in the banks of the world. Until then the gold standard had been sufficient measure of value for international trade. But it fell under the strain of unpaid international debts and post-war confusion. Gold is no longer an absolute necessity in international trade.

The trade war would be a comparatively polite affair without serious casualties, if governments had not intervened to alter the free flow of trade.

All Tangled Up

The government announcement jubilantly hailed the stemming of the long-heralded enemy offensive as a recruitment of the free flow of trade.

The trade war would be a comparatively polite affair without serious casualties, if governments had not intervened to alter the free flow of trade.

Therefore, they are trying to extend their domination of nearby states in order to guarantee those supplies. Germany is looking toward oil-filled Roumania, and the wheat-laden Ukraine. Italy is glancing toward Africa and Japan is conquering China.

This is economic warfare turning into military war and threats of war. The question is: How long can the world stand the strain?
