Vietnam Fighting Continues

By GEORGE ESPER Associated Press Writer SAIGON (AP) — Two Americans and nearly 400 North and South Vietnamese were reported killed today and Thursday in a storm of attacks across South Vietnam matched by the heaviest American air strikes in eight months. "The war's still on," the commander of a U.S. Marine air wing commented after the death of one of his young security guards during a rocket attack on the Bien Hoa Air Base 15 miles northeast of Saigon. Seven and a half hours after the predawn attack at Bien Hoa, a second American serviceman was killed when his observation helicopter crashed in flames near Phan Thiet, on the coast 100 miles east of Saigon. U.S. officials said the helicopter apparently was shot down. A second crewman rescued suffered slight wounds, the U.S. Command said.

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Bill Would Force Finances To Public

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert Byrd today introduced a bill to require everyone on the federal payroll making more than \$24,000 a year to detail their finances for the public. The West Virginia Democrat said the bill is necessary "to eliminate the public climate of skepticism surrounding the integrity and performance of our national leaders."

Byrd cosponsored a similar measure last year. But his attempt to get the measure out of the Senate Rules Committee to the full Senate was defeated. Byrd's bill would require a detailed, public disclosure for everyone in government paid at the comparable level of GS16 or higher. This would apply to some 66,000 employees from the Supreme Court to the Congress to the military.

Nixon To Abolish 3 Offices

By FRANK CORMIER Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon proposed to Congress today that he abolish three organizations in his executive office.

In a message to the Congress, he said the action would pare 399 jobs from the executive office, with an estimated savings of \$2 million in the budget.

Proposed for abolition were the Office of Emergency Preparedness, the Office of Science and Technology and the National Aeronautics and Space Council.

The space council is not to be confused with NASA, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The White House said necessary continuing functions of the three agencies should be transferred "to line departments and agencies where they can be better performed."

Most Churches Are Opposing Abortion

Despite the U.S. Supreme Court decision and the relaxation of restrictions on early abortions, the question of their morality still remains dynamic in American religious convictions. It is not simply a difference between religious groups, but runs explosively through all of them, Protestant, Jewish and Roman Catholic. The official position of many Protestant denominations, along with that of the Roman Catholic Church, is strongly anti-abortion, despite exceptions of some theologians in both groups and some Protestant bodies. Eastern Orthodox churches and orthodox Judaism also sharply oppose abortion, while Judaism have favored seeing laws against it. So sharp and sensitive are the differences over the matter that a cooperating organization of some major Protestant and Orthodox bodies, the National Council of Churches, has been unable — in four years of trying — to formulate a modern stand on it.

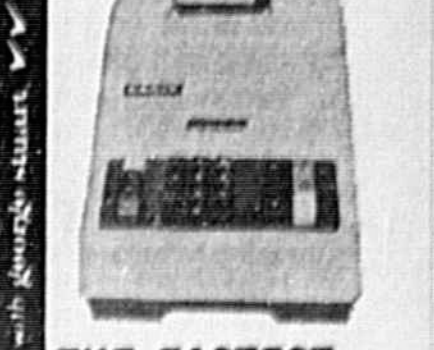
Address Required For Refund

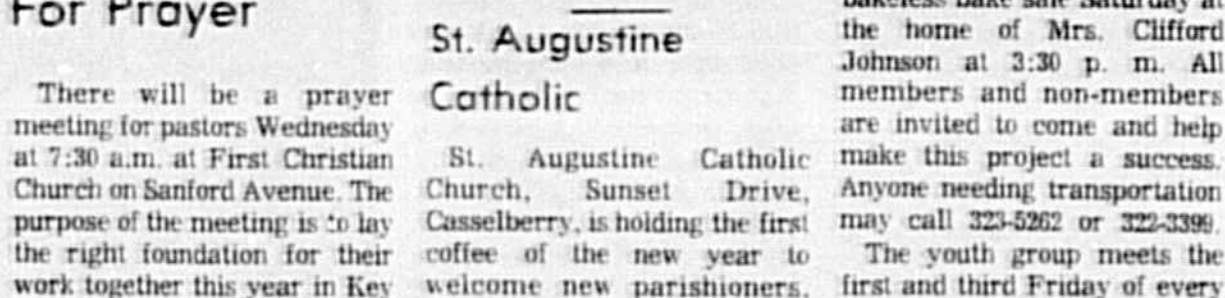

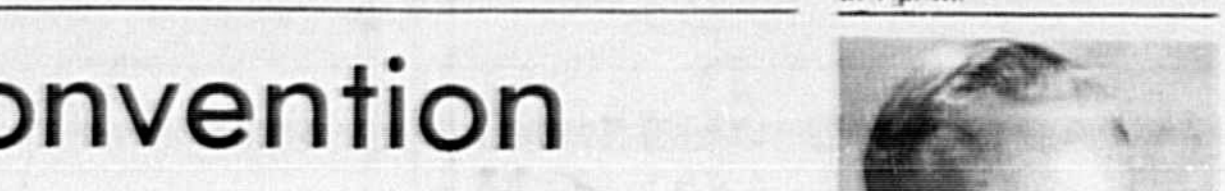

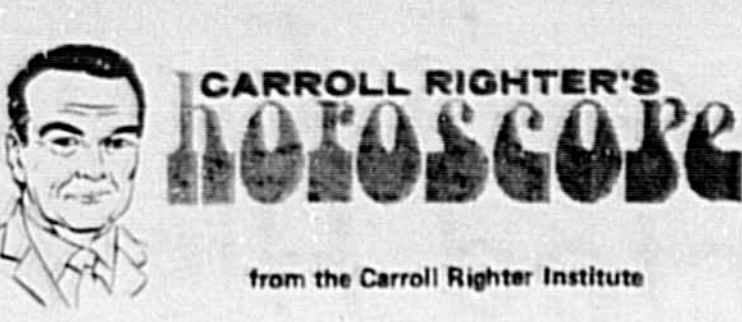

By HOWARD BENEDICT, AP Aerospace Writer. CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Navy is considering a scenic wildlife refuge near here as a site for America's largest submarine base — but environmentalists vow strong opposition, claiming it would destroy one of Florida's last wilderness areas.

The refuge in North Brevard County is one of three places being considered for the East Coast home port of the missile-firing Trident submarine fleet. The sites under study are Charleston, S.C., and St. Mary's, Ga.

The nuclear-powered Trident submarines, scheduled to be operational late in this decade, will be the largest in the world, more than twice the size of the Polaris and Poseidon submarines.

expects to make a decision within a month or two. A West Coast port also will be selected. Port Canaveral, adjacent to Cape Kennedy, already has been chosen as the staging area for Trident submarine test-launchings of the new missile, but is too small to be the home base for the fleet.

The site being considered in Brevard County is the Merritt Island Wild Life Refuge at the north end of the Kennedy Space Center and the adjacent Mosquito Lagoon, a large, picturesque body of water that is part of the Intercoastal Waterway.

The refuge already is owned by the federal government and is under jurisdiction of the Interior Department's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. Extensive dredging and land clearing would be necessary if the Florida site were picked by the Navy.

Many political and business leaders and chamber of commerce officials have pitched in to help in the Trident port for the area. Environmentalists and some politicians are opposed.

Karl Echhorn, president of the Indian River Audubon Society, said Mosquito Lagoon is the winter home to "tens of thousands" of waterfowl, and a part would "destroy the entire biosystem of the area."

Allan Cruickshank, a nationally known environmental expert, said "it would be a disaster if one of the few remaining rich wilderness areas of Florida were destroyed."

Brevard Concerned Democrats, a liberal political organization, said on Feb. 24 that it would "oppose the entire project" for permitting the demonstration to take place near the scene of the signing.

Police Recover Car Used For Getaway

Car used by three bandits in the armed robbery of the Publix Super Market in Seminole Plaza Shopping Center Friday afternoon, in which an undetermined amount of cash was taken, was recovered by Casselberry police officers shortly after the hold-up, according to Police Chief George Karcher.

The chief said the man who did the stickup is described as a white male, 25 to 30 years old, about five feet, seven inches tall and weighed about 160 pounds with medium build. He had dark, shaggy hair, possibly a wig, a moustache, a band-aid on his chin and wore sunglasses. He wore dark-colored trousers.

The second man is described as a white male, 45 to 50 years old, five feet, 11 inches tall, about 160 pounds with a thin build. His hair is gray and shaggy and he also was possibly wearing a wig.

The third man stayed in the car. He was described as about 30 with black straight hair, wearing a light blue windbreaker and sunglasses.

Karcher said a K-9 dog of the Orlando Police Department was brought to the scene to sniff the first car. The dog indicated the car or cars left the plaza.

Joint investigation of the hold-up was continuing today by the Casselberry Police Department and Det. William Hogan of the Seminole Sheriff's Department. Estimates of the amount of cash taken are expected to be available later this week.

Cong Makes Final 'Grab'

SAIGON (AP) — Communist forces stormed into the major city of Tay Ninh and its Cao Dai temple today, and attacked smaller towns across South Vietnam in what U.S. officials said was a grab for land before the cease-fire.

It has been widely presumed by allied officials that the Viet Cong would like to claim Tay Ninh City, a provincial capital 55 miles northwest of Saigon, as a political base.

They believe it is important to the Communists because the city is near Viet Cong and North Vietnamese military bases and supply depots along the Cambodian border.

The South Vietnamese military command said the Communist troops had been driven out of several hamlets around Tay Ninh. But they acknowledged enemy troops still held two edges of the city.

U.S. officials said the attacks might prove of some success to the Communists in giving them control in new areas before the cease-fire goes into effect at 8 a.m. Sunday — 7 p.m. EST today.

One U.S. soldier who watched a buddy die in a pre-dawn rocket attack on Da Nang Air Base said: "The only irony of it is that a good friend of mine from the same hometown as I'm from was killed this morning. He was supposed to start initial out-processing this morning to leave. He just got killed."

He was the third American serviceman to die since the cease-fire was announced Wednesday, 2,288,000, with some further minor reductions next year.

At the peak of the Vietnam war, there were 3.5 million Americans in service. In announcing the end of the draft, Laird urged support for legislation in Congress providing special pay legislation and other incentives to encourage young men to volunteer for the armed services and the draft has been progressively reduced from 383,626 in 1966 to the Vietnam peak year of 1966.

By KENNETH J. FREED Associated Press Writer PARIS (AP) — Agreements ending the fighting in Vietnam and calling for the withdrawal of all U.S. forces were signed in two sessions in the ballroom of an old hotel near the Arc de Triomphe.

The main agreement signed by all four parties calls for the end of the fighting in Vietnam at midnight Greenwich Mean Time — 7 p.m. EST.

In the first session this morning, the United States, South Vietnam, North Vietnam and the Viet Cong signed the overall agreement that for the United States means the end of the longest war in its history and a conflict paid for in the lives of nearly 400 men and billions of dollars.

This signing took 18 minutes and ended with champagne toasts. But outside, demonstrators were waving Viet Cong and North Vietnamese flags and boomed the Americans and the South Vietnamese.
