Our Nation Mourns A Political Giant

Lyndon Baines Johnson, the 36th president of the United States of America, is dead at 64. For the second time in less than a month, we are confronted with the loss of a former president and towering fugure of our political past. Just as the passing of the late Harry S.

Truman brought into new perspective the stature of a president whose full measure had not been taken when he left the White House, so must America now seek to sort out the plusses and minuses of another who stood at the pinnacle

Few statesmen ever possessed the credentials which Mr. Johnson brought to the presidency on that dark day in Dallas in 1963. He had been a representative, a senator, majority leader and vice president. He was buoyed by an outpouring of support for the task before him.

Yet there can be little doubt that Mr. Johnson surrendered the White House to Richard Nixon in 1969 with a sense of personal frustration and disappointment. He had tried to establish new rapport, confidence and empathy between the Executive and the people, but instead had created a "credibility gap." He had sought peace in the world, but was forced to turn

Can Collectors Canny

Your typical scrap aluminum can collector is probably a youthful, civic-minded type doing it in the interests of ecology. Right? Not according to a study by two University

of Dallas graduate students. The students, Charles Johnson and R. J. Wheelock, say the typical collector is a male between 36 and 55 who drinks beer, works at a nonprofessional occupation at less than \$10,000 a year and collects cans as a family project. His primary motivation is money, which "substantially outweighs" his concern for the en-

Johnson and Wheelock questioned can collectors at Alco "Yes We Can" redemption centers in the Dallas and Fort Worth area, where collectors are paid 10 cents a pound for scrap cans. The reclamation study was undertaken to meet part of the requirements for their master of business administration degrees.

They found that the majority of scavengers. /2 per cent, collect cans on a fairly regular basis and, surprisingly, only 3 per cent do so to raise funds for Scout, civic or church-related efforts.

Since the "Yes We Can" program started two years ago in Dallas, Fort Worth and San Diego, some 300 million cans have been reclaimed and more than \$1.5 million paid to the

the Vietnam problem over to his successor farther from solution than when he had found it. He sought to build a "great society" in America. but left office with that term in disrepute.

It can be hoped that these factors on the scale do not cheat Lyndon Johnson of the place in our history which his achievements so clearly earned him.

He left a nation more aware than ever before of America's role of leadership in the world. He put a new emphasis on the meaning of education in our society. He made Americans acutely aware of poverty and injustice in their midst. and his administration saw the adoption of the most far-reaching civil rights legislation of our

Mr. Johnson's approach to politics was both a weakness and a strength. He was an acknowledged master of the subtle mechanism

of pressure and persuasion which makes the wheels of government go round. That his sense of power was coupled with a sense of responsibility was evident in the constructive role he played as Senate majority leader when a Republican president, Dwight Eisenhower, was dealing with a Congress under Democrat control.

Lyndon Johnson bore the burden of the presidency on shoulders that had been broadened in the rough and tumble school of politics. This, tall, impressive Texan was at once ebullient and sober, confident and insecure. boastful and humble, brash and cautious. Yet he was always, for all men everywhere, a classic portrait of the American dream - a man born in humble circumstances who, by his energy, initiative, resourcefulness and persistence rose to the most important position his country can offer and left an indelible imprint on his times.

Anytime there is a close race in prospect, pundits always probe the possibility of the contest "winding up in the House of Representatives." This is a provision in case certain rules of deadlock are met but under our present system of resolving things, only Hayes and Tilden met the qualifications. The Kennedy-Nixon contest in 1960 and the Nixon-Humphrey race in 1968 were close enough to raise the possibility, but it didn't develop. The 1968 had a thirdparty complication which can be potent, and was, but this was absent in 1876.

In 1876, Gen. Ulysses S. Eye On Cuba

Kremlin Tightens Reins On Castro

MIAMI, Fla. - Premier Fidel Castro and the Cuban Communists now consider themselves more "obligated" than ever to the Soviet Union.

Moscow's agreements to refinance the debt Cuba owes Russia and to grant Cuba some \$333 million in credits for economic and technical assistance "imply an obligation with the brotherly Soviet people, with socialism and with history." according to Granma, the official newspaper of the Cuban Communist Party central committee.

Castro himself stated that the accords constituted "an unprecedented contribution" to the Cuban economy and praised the Soviet Union as "a friend, a true friend, who has acted toward us with a high degree of generosity, unselfishness and fraternity."

No authorized Cuban spokesman has said what price the Soviet Union exacted in return for the assistance. But, observers here say, there is little doubt that Cuba was drawn tighter into the Soviet sphere and that, in the field of foreign affairs, Castro will have to hew closely to the Soviet line. Cuban official comment on the five economic

agreements with the Soviet that Castro announced in a speech Jan. 3 has been sparse. But the agreements do seem to underline both Cuba's dependence on the Soviet Union for survival and Castro's inability to get the Cuban economy to function properly.

An economic report on Cuba prepared in Miami stated: "Even a cursory analysis of the Cuban situation brings forth evidence that the country's economy in 1972 did not improve. "On the contrary, it appears certain that, taken as a whole, the Castro regime's constant amateurish im-

provisations continued to produce waste and inefficiency

and, consequently, declining production." For the first time since coming to power in 1959 the Cuban regime has not published sugar harvest statisticsand the Cuban economy is based primarily on the annual sugar harvest. International sugar experts figure the 1972 crop amounted to under four million tons, which would mean it was the second worst harvest since Castro took over.

It is estimated that 85 per cent of Cuba's exports are made up of raw sugar, and thus a poor harvest is a severe blow to the economy. It also means a greater dependence on the Soviet Union for aid.

Havana has given only one reason for the poor crop: allegedly it was affected by a severe drought. Experts feel, however, that additional factors were widespread managerial disorganization and a decline in labor productivity, manifested in inadequate planting, weeding and cutting of cane. A Communist Party official in Las Villas Provice admitted: "During the 1973 harvest we must find a solution to the organizational difficulties which have forced us into long harvests that tend to create problems. In some sugar mills the situation is critical in view of the magnitude of the repairs they require."

Fire the No-Good, Save \$2B a Year

There is a way to save \$1 billion a year in defense

without decreasing our military strength. Similar cuts percentagewise could be made in the budgets of most other major departments in the federal government with no decrease in efficiency. The savings would add up to more than \$2 billion a

Administrators say these results could be achieved by selectively cutting civilian employes by 10 per cent Some administrators would put the figure much higher. Every key administrator in the government surveyed

by this reporter agrees there is this much deadwood. In most instances the experts estimate that with this 10 per cent gone the efficiency of the offices involved would actually increase substantially - without the remaining 90 per cent having more work to do. In some cases, the 90 per cent remaining would have less to do. This paradox is simple to explain. The 10 per cent are bottlenecks. They slow the work. They delight in red tape. They snafu projects. And they hold down good men and

This is not to suggest most government employes are deadheads. The number of able, efficient government workers is extraordinarily large. The problem is that it is next to impossible to remove inefficient, mediocre workers in the numbers necessary for efficient operation. Outgoing Defense Secretary Melvin Laird explained the problem vividly in a talk with this reporter. As things are now, he says, when you cut a tenth of your civilian personnel, you don't remove the bureaucrats you want to eliminate. What results is that you fire too many of the

in order to beef up your department for the future. It is The problem in defense (and in most other agencies of the federal government) is the system called bumping. In most cases, when you remove a man from his job (for incompetence or whatever), he then usually has the right to bump (take over the job of) someone with less seni-

ority in his line of work. The bumped man then has the right to bump the next level down, and so on through the system. Thus the man ou want to fire isn't fired. Someone somewhere down below him loses his job instead.

The men and women leaving, therefor, may be some of the ablest workers in your shop. Thus, under present regulations, a 10 per cent cut in civilians could result in a serious decline in efficiency. This need not be if Congress will change the laws.

the book. "I personally think Twin Oaks could survive under a variety of government systems . . . as long as the managerial system remained intact." (Why didn't anybody invent bureaucracy before this? Instead of money, workers are issued labor credits.

These vary with the desirability or undesirability of a The more people who want to do a particular job, the less it "pays," and vice versa.

(Oppressive capitalist exploiters, take note.) Each labor credit is worth an hour of free time. Vacations are paid for with surplus credits, which are accumulated by working more hours than are assigned. Most members bog down in their work from time to time, but perk up after a vacation or a fresh approach or a change of job, writes Ms. Kinkade.



Final 'Grab'

SAIGON (AP) - Communist forces stormed into the major city of Tay Ninh and its Cao Dai temple today and attacked smaller towns across South Vietnam in what U.S. officials said was a grab for land before the cease-fire.

It has been widely presumed by allied officials that the Viet Cong would like to claim Tay Ninh City, a provincial capital 55 miles northwest of Saigon, as a political base.

They believe it is important to the Communists because the city is near Viet Cong and North Vietnamese military bases and supply depots along the Cambodian border.

The South Vietnamese military command said the Communist troops had been driven out of several hamlets around Tay Ninh. But they acknowledged enemy troops still held two edges Military Draft Ended

U.S. officials said the attacks might prove of some success to the Communists in giving them control in new areas before the cease-fire goes into effect at 8 a.m. Sunday — 7 p.m. EST today.
