Gurney Claims Ignorance Of Secret Funds

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Sen. Edward J. Gurney, R-Fla., says he was "careless...unobservant and too trusting" to know that a large scale fund raising campaign was operated illegally in his name.

Gurney faced 59 newsmen in a one-hour television broadcast Thursday night to answer allegations that he knew about "any wrongdoing" in connection with the fund raising.

Conceding that his account was "an incredible story," Gurney denied any knowledgeable connection with funds that he admitted were collected illegally.

He blamed Larry Williams, 29, whom he said he first met in mid-1971 when Williams was introduced to him as a volunteer campaign worker.

The Miami Herald and other Florida newspapers have reported that Williams, of Orlando, collected at least \$300,000 from builders seeking Gurney's influence with the Federal Housing Administration.

Gurney, a member of the Senate Watergate committee, said an aide told him in June 1972 that Williams had collected \$100,000 for his next campaign.

He said he told Williams, "You put me in an extremely embarrassing position" and insisted that the fund raising stop immediately. "I did not authorize this fund raising," Gurney said. "I did not know it was going on. I did not see any of this money."

Gurney said the money raised by Williams was not reported to the Florida secretary of state because he was not a candidate in 1972.

Senator's Records Gone

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Correspondence files have disappeared from the office of Sen. Edward J. Gurney, R-Fla., and some telephone logs partially destroyed, The Orlando Sentinel Star said today.

A story by the newspaper's Washington correspondent, Michael McLaughlin, said four former and present Gurney aides had been subpoenaed by a federal grand jury in Miami to tell what they know about the missing and destroyed material.

The Sentinel Star identified the four as James Allison, Gurney's administrative assistant; Mrs. Alfie Michal, a secretary; George Beal, an aide; and James Groot, a former administrative assistant.

New Officials Lauded City Annexation Veto Out?

County Commissioner Dick Williams today said south county municipal elections have brought in new people with development philosophies more in tune with the county mission, and that the board's controversial city annexation veto idea may no longer be necessary.

However, Williams also said that another proposal, which would have been controversial prior to the election may be

"even easier" to push through the commission.

Williams referred to his "self-imposed county planning" proposal which would give the municipalities one year to come up with a complete set of land use policies, zoning regulations, and ordinances, to mesh with the city's laws and policies.

"I feel that now, we both (county and city government officials) have the same aims," Williams said. "I now intend to go to them with my plan, and say let's do it together."

Prior to the election, Williams said, there was "no special legislative act and provoke a bitter jurisdictional squabble between the cities and the county may not be necessary."

Williams said while the annexation veto proposal can be seen purely as an institutional or legal matter, "people really do make the difference in how institutions are used."

"With the new people now in municipal government, it may mean we won't need the annexation veto proposal because they won't use annexation as it has been used in the past."

The period now and the final enactment by Congress of emergency energy legislation presents a challenge to the American people.

The Michigan congressman himself reportedly does not plan to run for President in 1976. In politics, such disclaimers often prove fragile as election time approaches.

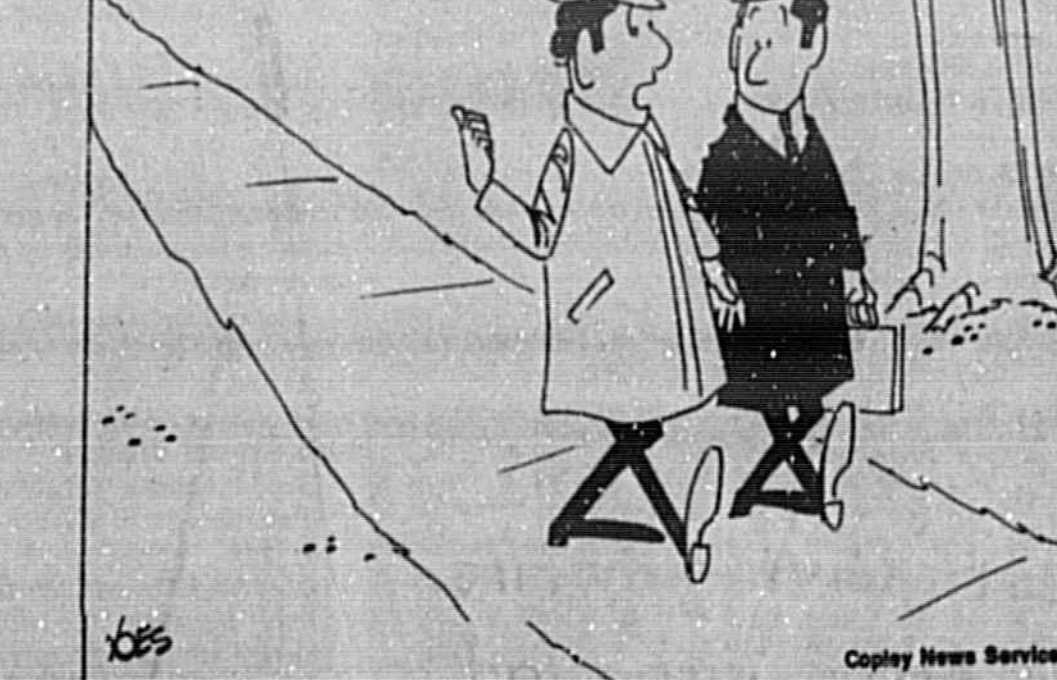

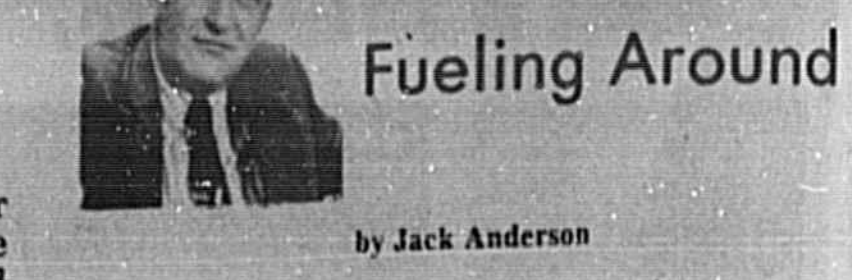
Since Jimmy's at-home conversation is limited solely to earned room averages, you are surprised and pleased to see how his horizons are being extended.

Pentagon Brass Fueling Around

WASHINGTON — With an explosion of grim directives, the Pentagon has cut military readiness to conserve precious fuel.

Navy steaming time has been reduced 20 per cent, military flying time 18 per cent. Training flights have been restricted in Thailand. U.S. military activities in Europe have been curtailed.

Even in the tense Mediterranean, ships are spending more time in port, and planes are flying fewer exercises.

As evidence that the brass hats are sacrificing, too, the Pentagon has announced that room temperatures have been reduced, Christmas lighting cancelled and limousine abandoned.

All this has been accomplished with great fanfare, presumably as justification for seizing 19.7 million barrels of oil from civilian stocks in November and December.

The order was issued by the Interior Department, which has authority over fuel allocation. But Secretary Rogers Morton entrusted this crucial power to a retired armchair admiral, Eli Reich, whose first major move was to direct 22 oil companies to give top priority to the armed forces.

At the same time that the brass hats have reduced combat readiness and cooled off the Pentagon, however, they haven't let the stringent fuel economies interfere seriously with their own lifestyles.

Gas Guardians — Both Defense Secretary James Schlesinger and Joint Chiefs Chairman Thomas Moorer, for example, have warned gravely that the fuel shortage could cripple the armed forces.

Asked about this, Schlesinger declared petulantly that "if there are souls in torment," he would be "quite happy to abandon" his big limousine.

The free entertainment was officially regarded as a "public display." However, it was scarcely advertised, and hardly at Hengen's gate routinely stopped drivers to make inquiries.

Other Pentagon pashas, according to the official word, have turned in their limousines for mere Chrysler's Lesser lights have been consigned to "economy sedans."

More than a dozen light sedans were also standing by. Several of the military drivers were running their motors to keep the vehicles

Regents Consider Campus Wine Shops

BOCA RATON, Fla. (AP) — The Board of Regents was to meet at Florida Atlantic University today to consider opening campus wine shops and closing personal records.

Regents have been asked by the Council of University Presidents to allow the sale and drinking of wine on Florida campuses.

They've also been asked to consider making some personal records confidential.

Universities may now sell beer and many schools feature beer halls but, says Hendrix Chandler, regents corporate secretary, "some students who don't like beer wanted to be able to buy wine."

Chandler said the proposed revision in personnel-record policy closely follows the law adopted by the 1972 legislature to end public access to some records of faculty members.

The law says confidential records will be limited "to information reflecting evaluations of employee performance."

The new policy says records reflecting evaluation of employee performance will be open only to the employer or officials who need to see them in their official duties.

State Speed Limit Cut, Energy Savings Urged

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Reubin Askew prepared to cut speed limits on state highways today and seek support for belt tightening throughout Florida during the energy shortage.

Askew called a news conference to announce speed limits of 55 miles an hour for both automobiles and trucks as one part of the state's energy conservation program.

When you ask people to change their lifestyle, some are not going to like it," Askew told the first meeting of the State Fuel Allocation and Conservation Council Thursday.

He said the energy crisis would touch every facet of life in Florida, but told the council to draw up plans resulting in minimum disruption of the state's economy, employment and the environment.

The 28-member panel was divided into subcommittees to meet Askew's request for a plan to cut Florida's energy use by 25 per cent and prepare to give advice on future federal regulations.

The council includes representatives of the private sector and state government.

Askew said contingency plans also should be prepared for use if the energy shortage worsens.

"In the end, the success of this type program depends on the spirit in which it is accepted," he said.

"I'm not signaling an emergency in Florida but we can now move together to avert a serious situation."

Askew met earlier this week with merchants to request store hour reductions of 10 per cent after Jan. 1 and cutbacks in energy use by 25 per cent as soon as possible.

After meeting with the conservation council, Askew conferred with the co-chairman of the state's energy committee, Rep. Kenneth McKay, D-Ocala, and Sen. George Firestone, D-Miami.

Mackay said he told the governor the committee would be in a better position to make recommendations on a special legislative session after it meets with legislative committees Monday and Tuesday.

Askew also conferred with transportation secretary Walter Revall and Florida Highway Patrol representatives to discuss implementing the reduced speed limits.

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PSC To Rule On Utility Ads

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The State Public Service Commission may decide whether utilities can pass promotional advertising costs on to consumers before February's cold winds blow.

PSC chairman Bill Bevis said the commission, which concluded three days of hearings Thursday, may be ready to issue a ruling before February, when heaviest use of fuels is expected.

Bevis said consumers were not organized to present their views on technical issues but that the PSC staff would represent them.

"If the rule is good for the consumers, it will stay; if it is only good for the companies, it will be changed," Bevis said.

You Need A Permit
Storing Fuel At Home Is Against The Law

Planning on beating the gas shortage by filling up the 'ole' utility can with a few gallons.

Additionally, you will have caught the attention of County Fire Chief Gary Kaiser, who will be sure to issue a permit for storing anything more than one gallon at home.

You will also have incurred the wrath of Commissioner Greg Drummond, who not only will point out that insurance-approved storage tanks are in place, or that you have built a concrete-lined, underground storage facility, for example, you may be eligible for a permit, free of charge.

Which brings us back to the law. According to the county fire protection ordinance, you will be violating the law if you attempt, without a permit, any of the following—storing, handling or using more than one gallon of gas (except for a proper vehicle, boat or lawn-mower gas tank) in any home, apartment or dwelling place.

As Drummond points out, "we are talking about the lives of you and your family—not to mention your neighbors—this isn't simply a matter of saving a few bucks or some inconvenience on weekends."

Not only does gasoline eat away the unsafe plastic, thus leading to fire hazards, but almost any gas container becomes a hazard if left in the sunlight or a hot place. So just keeping the can in the garage isn't a good idea.

Obviously, any glass container can be broken, and thus is a foolish way to store fuel. But many people think they are being safe buying plastic "utility" cans, often shaped like Army jeep gas cans, and other non-approved plastic containers. But one or two clearly stamped exceptions, the plastic cans are both illegal and dangerous, Kaiser warns.

One last thing—Kaiser is going to be checking on sales of dangerous and possibly illegal home heating devices in the future too, so no matter how short the gas gets, or how cold your home gets—remember, you are talking about the life of yourself, your family, and your neighbors.

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Former Nixon Aide Gets 'Poor' Loan
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Small Business Administration has certified two firms owned in part by a former White House aide as eligible for government contracts— earmarked for "socially and economically disadvantaged."

Robert J. Brown, a former \$36,000-a-year special assistant to President Nixon, owns a substantial part of each of the firms.

About three weeks ago, the Atlanta regional office of the SBA approved Brown's second firm, B&C Associates, as being eligible for the noncompetitive bid contracts. The contracts are negotiated by the SBA from the rest of the government for the "advantaged and minorities."

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
