If All Of Us Were **Farmers**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - M all of us were farmers and we all shared alike in U.S. agriculture, we'd each live on a 27.5 acre farm caring for 6 acres of crops and four-tenths of a sheep.

Those statistics were turned out by Agriculture Department economists who figured out what would happen if all farmland, crops and livestock were divided equally among all American families.

On the resulting fictional "everybody's farm," a department publication said, most of your 27.5 acres would be in woodland, fallow ground or land held idle to qualify for federal subsidies. You'd grow only 6 acres of crops including 3.5 acres of grains, an acre of hay and 0.8 acres of sovbeans.

Also, the report added, you'd have 1.8 head of beef cattle producing three quarters of a ealf annually; one hog producing two pigs; 6.4 hens giving you 118 dozen eggs; and 58 Your "statistical farm"

would be worth \$4,086, plus \$671 for equipment and \$871 in crop and livestock inventories, but you wouldn't be getting rich.

Florida's Climate Ideal For Growing Prize Roses

Florida's climate is ideal for growing roses, but the state's humid climate also favors the development of ruinous fungus diseases. The two worst offenders are powdery mildew and black spot. Left unchecked, these two diseases can spell almost certain doom for your bushes.

Black spot requires a yearround vigfl, especially during warm humid weather. Powdery mildew thrives during the spring and fall when rainfall is at a minimum, and it's seldom a problem during the rainy season because frequent rain inhibits the development of the disease.

Unlike black apot whose spores are spread by water, mildew spores are windborn. Mildew will cause a lasting distortion of the leaves, but it

Portunately, the right fungicide will control black spot and other fungus diseases. Daconfl 2787 is one of the best for black spot control, although Dithane M-45, Maneb. and Phaltan are also effective. These fungicides should be applied once a week for affective control of black spot.

To control powdery mildew, plant pathologists recommend the use of Actidione PM which is an eradicant fungicide. Two or three applications at weekly intervals will kill



Pistol Packing By ISABELLE HALL

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Several lady sky marshals, packing pistols and trained in karate and judo, soon will be taking their places beside the men assigned to guard against airplane hijackings in the United States, it was learned

today. U.S. Customs Bureau sources confirmed that "several ladies" had been accepted for the program and will soon start the arduous four-week training course at Ft. Belvoir, Va. They will learn expert marksmanship and agility in hand - to - hand combat.

Whether they actually will be used aboard planes has yet to be determined, the sources said. Some of the present sky marshals are deployed on the ground at major airports while others are used for examination of baggage belonging to passengers about to leave the country.


The sky marshal force is almost at its authorized strength of 2,000. Lt. Gen. Benjamin O. Davis Jr., director of civil aviation security at the Federal Aviation Administration, said recently there would be 1.400 marshals in the air at all times once the program is completed.

Officials said the effectiveness of the entire sky marshal program lies, in great part, in the anonymity of the guards.

Seminole Shows \$\$\$ Reluctance

Officials from Seminole, Orange, and Osceola Counties gathered this morning in Winter Park to discuss the proposed Short Range Water, Sewer, and Drainage Study for the tri-county area.

Michael Szunyog of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council stated the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the require-

ments of HUD and to show the need for cooperation and coordination among the various public bodies involved. All cities and counties will be involved throughout the study, he stressed.

Attending the session from Seminole were County Commission Chairman Greg Drummond, and Mayor Lawrence Swofford and City Clerk Rodney Layer of Altamonte Springs.

Philip Inglis, speaking for VTN, proposed engineers for the project, stated it would cost \$180,000 to do the study instead of the \$100,000 originally estimated. Seminole officials have expressed reluctance to go that high.

Total cost of the study will be \$243,000 with federal financing covering two-thirds of the cost. \$63,000 would go for Planning Council expenses.

Breakdown of the cost to each county, based on population census over a 32-month period, would be Seminole, \$14,586; Orange, \$60,703; and Osceola, Guide - 1971." . . . Just loaded \$5,672.

Defense Attorney Roger Berry questioned the witness as to why four months had elapsed since the incident before the warrant was sworn and further queried as to who swore out the warrant, since the witness admitted that Mrs. Powers did not. No answer was

Powers' bond was raised from \$10,000 to

\$50,000 by Judge Richard Muldrew. During arguments, sheriff's deputies George Abbegy and Tony Calangelo testified that neighbors of the Powers' had refused to testify in the case for fear of their lives. Judge Muldrew said that this fact as well as "the apparent fear of witnesses on the stand" was a factor in his granting the bond ele-

Berry protested the fact that he was given only an hour's notice on the hearing and did not have time to locate defense witnesses. Judge Muldrew set a hearing on the matter tentatively for this Thursday at 9 a.m., although he said it could be earlier at the defense's convenience,
