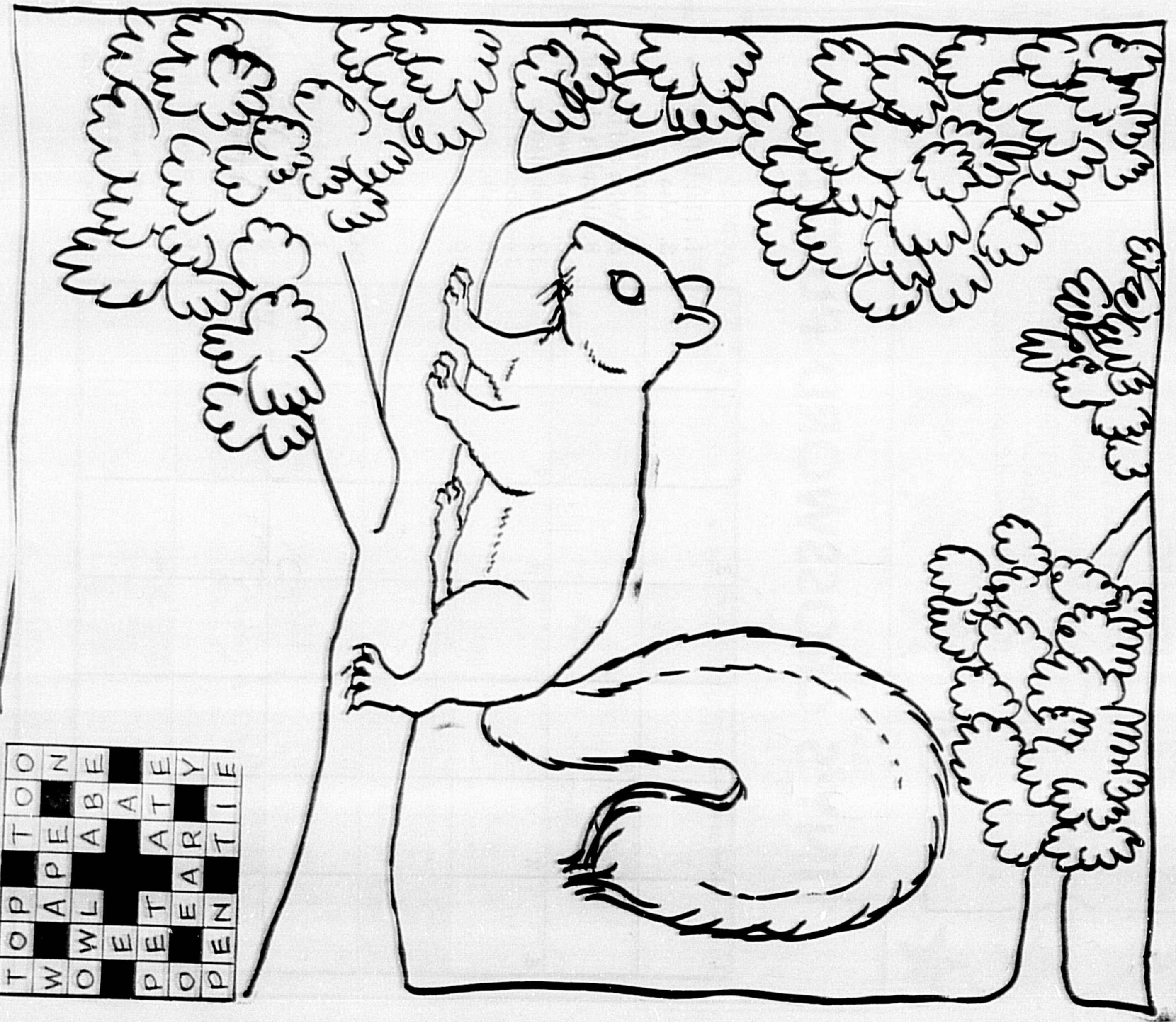

City, State Parley On Polluted Lake

Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore, City Manager W. E. Knowles and City Attorney William Hutchison are in Tallahassee today conferring with officials of State Water and Air Pollution Board over this city's lack of a secondary sewage treatment plant.

Knowles drove up Sunday and Moore and Hutchison on Monday morning for the confrontation with the state agency over whether the city is pouring polluted effluent into Lake Monroe.

City officials were requested to advise the state on plans to construct a secondary plant in a letter received by the city a year ago but did not do so due to the lack of \$1,770,000 needed to construct the secondary stage.

Several months ago, Moore, Knowles and Hutchison were informed by letter to appear at Tallahassee today, for a hearing on what plans city has for installing the secondary stage.

The state board is required under the new federal guidelines to enforce anti-pollution of lakes, streams and air, and is under the State Board of Health.

A city hall spokesman said the officials are expected back in Sanford late today or tonight but could give no information on what might be required of the city to install the secondary treatment.

City has no money allotted in the new budget, approved for fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, for adding another stage.

Touhy: Seminole Needs Attraction
Area Tourist Impact Pictured

Tourist expenditures will total \$700 million annually in East Central Florida by 1975, as compared to the current level of \$277 million. These figures were expressed by Austin Anderson, project leader for the consulting firm of Economics Research Associates, of Los Angeles, before the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council.

By 1983, according to Anderson, the tourist expenditure figure will have increased to \$1.15 billion per year, more than four times the level in 1968.

Anderson described the existing situation in East Central Florida, with data compiled on tourist visitation and length of stay to various levels of spending, construction of new facilities and employment generated by tourism in this area.

ERA's projections for hotel, motel expenses, gasoline sales, food and beverage sales, increased construction and amusement expenses reveal an increase in tourism that will most

Brevard and Osceola Counties.

The report places Seminole County at the bottom of the East Central Florida counties as far as distribution of impact in 1983 is concerned. For example, needed hotel-motel rooms, Seminole 407 and Volusia 14,080; food beverage seating, 928 and 24,000; total employment, 2,082 and 22,808; and total facility investment, \$8.7 million in Seminole and \$22.4 million in Volusia.

George Touhy, president of Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, said today that Sanford and Seminole County should consider any tourist attraction competing with Disney World must be of a quality nature, enough to entice tourists to leave Interstate 4, or else they would quickly lose interest.

Promotion is being stressed, Touhy added, upon the natural resources which abound in the East Central Florida area, especially the Lake Monroe Park greatly affect Orange, Volusia, and Seminole counties.

The growth in facilities necessary to handle the 17.2 million visitors expected in East Central Florida by 1983 will create an increase in local employment over 1968 levels of 101,730 new jobs.

The population supported by this increase (at 27 persons per job) will be 274,000 — the total employment at Disney World alone is expected to reach 41,330 by 1983. An example of the impact on hotels and motels is shown below.

New hotel and motel rooms supported by growth in tourism to East Central Florida by 1983 show a total of 41,109. At Disney World 8,730; Brevard 4,129; Indian River 2,120; Lake 1,214; Orange 6,492; Osceola 1,145; Seminole 503; and Volusia 8,885.

Details on such additional facilities as restaurants, night clubs which can be supported by the growth include an additional seating capacity of over 10,000 in an estimated 880 new establishments. With Walt Disney World setting the standards, an increase of tourist expenditures of over \$60 million is expected at attractions alone between 1970 and 1983.

Factors of interest to local governments, which will be sharing sales and other tax revenues, include over 50 million gallons more gasoline to be pumped in the area and an increase of over 300 million in other retail sales.

Within each county, it must be emphasized that the ultimate distribution of tourist activity within the region will to a large extent be determined by each locality's success in developing facilities that enhance, rather than destroy, the natural environment.

Schools Eye Policy On Insurance

Civic clubs, Boy Scouts and other groups will have to provide insurance if they plan to use Seminole County school facilities for meetings after regular school hours.

A spokesman in the office of State Insurance Commissioner Broward Williams today warned school boards to require all clubs and groups meeting on school property to have insurance to cover the problems that might come up under a new act passed by the Legislature that did away with the sovereign immunity against personal law suits.

The spokesman said the effect on school buildings after class activity got little attention when users paying the cost of liability insurance.

Robert Booker, director of field services for Boy Scouts, said, "Unless we can work something out, we're going to be in real trouble trying to find new meeting halls for the 12,000 Scouts in the South Florida Council."

"If a carnival or field day on school property was insured, it would cost at least \$1,000 a day," an insurance spokesman advised.

Seminole Board is expected to make some form of permanent policy after hearing Stenstrom's report during the next board meeting.

Board has on the advice of Douglas Stenstrom, school attorney, not allowed use of property without proper insurance coverage since July, 1969, effective date for removal of the immunity law.

Stenstrom will report on a special meeting of state school board attorneys held last week, end at the next board meeting, and is expected to make recommendations to permanently handle the situation.

Stenstrom said today, "It is clearly in the public interest not to allow the school boards to be sued."

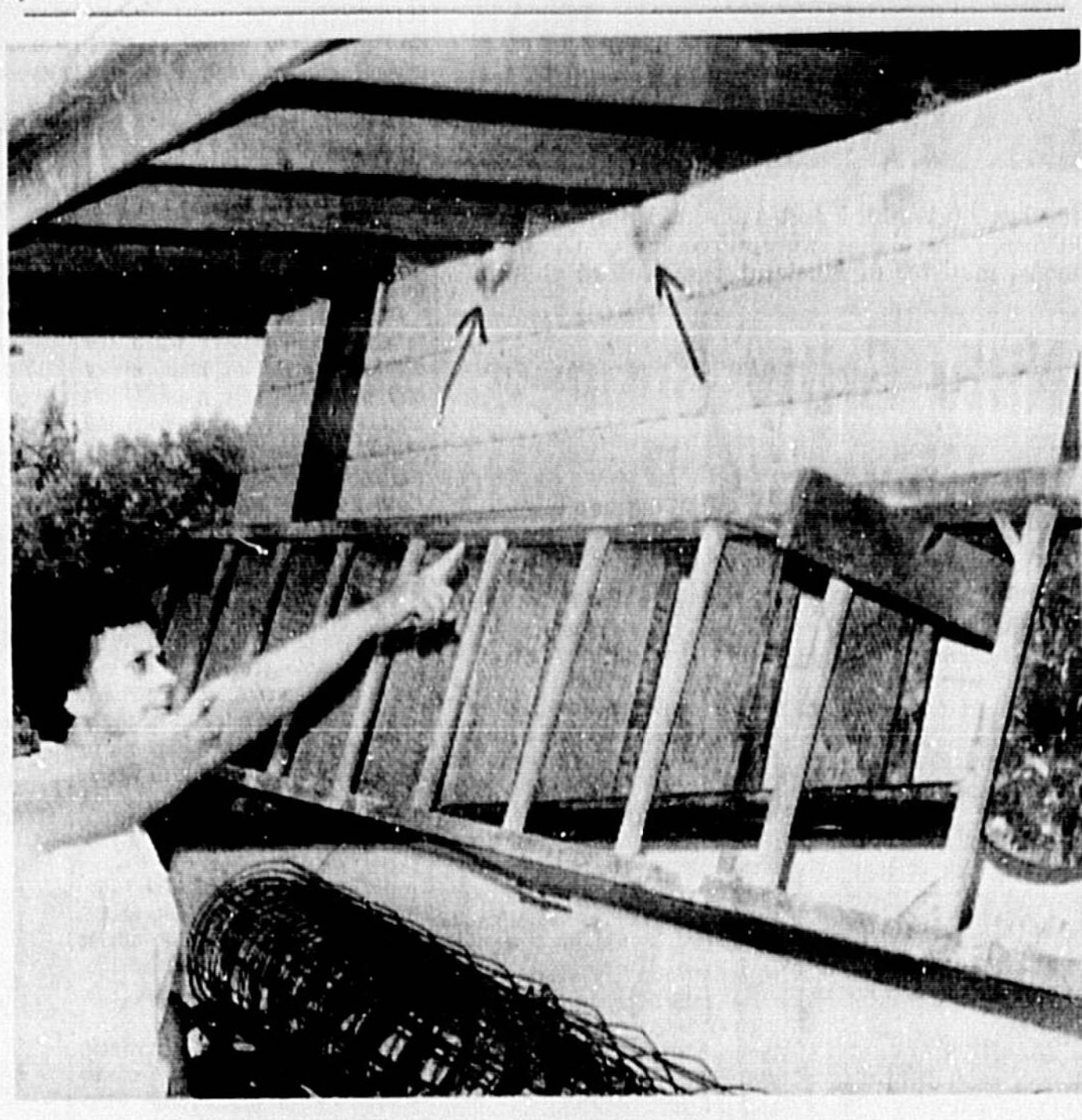
In requesting a comprehensive land management policy adopted by the Seminole County Commission, George Huffman, planner, predicted this morning that population growth will be 100 per cent in Orange, Seminole and Ocala counties by 1990. Huffman, a planner with the Orange - Seminole - Ocala Joint Planning Committee, said that anticipated population will be 1,000,000 by 1990. He added that if 32 building proposals are added to the already anticipated growth, the population will be 2,185,000 in the three counties by 1990. He pointed out that financing 32 of these building proposals will develop. The planner estimated that with the 100 per cent increase, new highways will cost \$1 billion; new water lines, \$50 million; and new sewer lines, \$100 million.

Difficulty Seen In Ryan's Succession

It now appears that James Ryan, appointed new Seminole County administrator in an August action of the authority's Board of Directors, may not be able to assume his new duties effective Oct. 1 as had been thought. Problem is wording of the bill creating the authority which states that a member may resign, but must remain until his resignation has been accepted and a successor appointed by the governor. The matter was discussed during regular monthly authority meeting last night and resulted in the amending of an original motion by Harold Rasmussen, board member, to specify Ryan succeeding Francis Roumilat III, resigning post administrator, as soon as possible after Sept. 15, contingent upon Ryan's availability. Elizabeth Bassett, port chairman, stated this would be the best way to handle the situation until a clarification is forthcoming. Roumilat, Sanford business man, has indicated his willingness to remain on as administrator until the situation is resolved. Responding to Ryan, the chairman asked Roumilat and Ryan to get together and appraise furnishings now being used in the port office located in the Roumilat Building and belonging to the administrator. The two men will arrive at some figure on the worth of the furniture and Roumilat will be remunerated accordingly. Reporting on the port construction now underway and expected to be completed by May 3, 1970, Roumilat said the engineer at 60 foot depth to determine foundation and "it looked good, but must wait for the report."

Sanford Must Come Up With \$1,770,000

In a news release from Tallahassee pollution board's office, it was established that Sanford agreed to submit a plan for sewage treatment within the specified time. The agreement came at the conclusion of a formal hearing, which was called by the state after Sanford was cited as one of the 35 municipal and industrial waste depositors along the St. Johns River. The city was cited by the pollution board earlier in the year for improper waste treatment. Included in the plan agreed to by the city will be an engineering report, a timetable for acquiring construction funds and a construction schedule to meet the state's treatment deadlines of Jan. 1, 1973. The agreement was part of the state's plan to upgrade the water quality of the St. Johns River.

My keen interest and close association with both the First Sierra Corporation and the First Sierra Fund must necessarily come first in the best interests of personal and family investment portfolios." Forbes Magazine for August 1969 rated the First Sierra Fund among the U.S. top four performers for 1969.

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
