





Weeds Away!

Our esteemed contemporary was levelling its editorial thunder at something as prosaic as the weeds which grow and grow and grow! Let us assure Jacksonville that this is a war which we heartily endorse. And we do so without drawing the lines at the proper use of the draft to get uncooperating property owners into the "war."

Of course we expect that our municipal and county and state forces, who have any responsibility along these lines - will see to their departments performing their duties. But we would address these few comments to our fellow-householders and link the war on


