

Cards Nose Out Pirates To Keep Lead In Pennant Race

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 22. (AP)—The Cardinals pushed a run across to the ninth inning Monday to nose out the Pittsburgh Pirates 3 to 1 and remain 2 1/2 games in front of the Brooklyn Dodgers in the hot National league pennant race. The Dodgers beat the Phillies, 3 to 1.

After taking a one-run lead at the expense of Hank Gornicki in the fifth and losing it as the Bucks came back with a tally off Ernie White to tie it up in the seventh, the Cards broke up the ball game in the ninth on a walk to Eda Marion, a stolen base, an infield out and Jimmy Brown's single through the infield with two out.

It was White's sixth victory of the year. He allowed six hits, Gornicki was tagged for 10 by the Cards.

The victory marked the return home of the Cards after their long road trip during which they overhauled the Dodgers and went out in front in the pennant race. It was their 30th win in their last 43 games.

Both the Cards' runs yesterday were knocked in by Brown and scored by Marion. After four scoreless innings, Marion reached base in the fifth by beating out a slow roller to second. He went to second on White's sacrifice and scored as Frank Gustine knocked down Brown's whistler but was unable to field it.

In the ninth, Marion drew a pass and stole second. White advanced him to third with an infield out. The Pirates' infield went into a huddle on the mound, apparently trying to decide what to do about Brown. They elected to pitch to him and he shot a single between second and first to break up the game.

The Bucks had scored their lone run when Bob Elliott singled off the seventh, went to third on a one-base shot Fletcher hit against the screen and came home on Vince DiMaggio's long fly.

Important United Nations Convoy Gets To Russia

German Infantry, Led By Tanks Captures Several Streets In City Of Stalingrad

LONDON, Sept. 22. — An important United Nations convoy carrying large quantities of war material for the Red army has arrived, it was announced here today. Although heavily attacked by German planes and submarines a "great majority" of the ships reached their destinations. It was acknowledged that some of the ships were lost. The convoy included American, British and Russian ships. No securing warships were lost.

(By Associated Press) Russian troops slipping westward across the Volga River at night were reported to have driven the Germans from houses, buildings and streets amid savage hand-to-hand fighting in one section of Stalingrad as the siege entered its 30th day with the invaders still held at arm's length.

At mid-day, the Russians acknowledged that German infantry led by 100 tanks had captured several streets but the counter-attack also declared in other sectors, all enemy attacks were repulsed.

More than 1,400 Nazis were listed as killed, and 17 tanks knocked out in the action in the last 24 hours. Nazi field headquarters said German troops captured further ground in the "center of Stalingrad" despite the defenders' obstinate resistance and declared Soviet counter-attacks had collapsed.

The German command also noted "severe defensive fighting" in the Voroshilov area 300 miles northwest of Stalingrad where the Russians have launched a series of attacks on the Nazi "it" flank.

While the gravest danger prevailed inside Stalingrad, Soviet dispatches said the Germans now are actually losing ground in the northwest and southwest of the battle-ridden Volga metropolis. Stockholm reported that Hitler had dismissed Field Marshal Fedor von Bock, the gaudy Prussian commander of the Stalingrad assault, as a result of a campaign strategy. Von Bock favored a single concentrated thrust into the Caucasus, while Hitler wanted both that and the Stalingrad assault. Von Bock was said to have returned to Berlin two weeks ago.

Bloody, indecisive fighting continued to rage in the Mordok sector of the central Caucasus, 50 miles above the Grosny oil fields, along the Black Sea coast. German assault forces captured two more towns in Stalingrad. (Continued on Page Three)

War Casualties Include Numerous Correspondents

NEW YORK, Sept. 22. (AP) — Official casualty lists do not show it, but war correspondents, too, are falling in battle. Being wounded, captured, bayoneted to death and falling to return from naval and land engagements are a part of the enemy.

The latest newspaperman casualty was announced Tuesday when the International News Service was informed that Jack Singer, a correspondent for the U. S. Pacific fleet, had failed to return from a task force sortie in the Pacific. In Washington, Secretary of the Navy Knox took cognizance of the intrepidly slain war correspondent in the gathering of war news where he had, upon learning, Singer was missing.

The long chances war correspondents take fills me with a great sense of pride. Their work is very arduous and creditable to the profession.

Knox is publisher of the Chicago Daily News, which has been a correspondent on many world battle fronts.

Singer was the third recent newspaperman casualty. Only last week, Associated Press writer Joe Louis, prize-winning correspondent with the British Mediterranean fleet, failed to return from a mission to Tobruk and is presumed to be a prisoner of the Italian army.

About the same time the United Press received reports that a correspondent, who had been seriously wounded in action near the Solomon Islands, his left eye was missing. His operations have been performed in Queens hospital, Honolulu, in an effort to save his sight.

BROOKLYN, Sept. 23. (AP)—Dolf Camilli, first batter up for Brooklyn in the 12th inning, belted his 25th home run of the year over the scoreboard to give the Dodgers a 9-8 victory over the Giants Tuesday and keep their pennant hopes still fluttering.

Up to the time of Camilli's feebly smothered off Bob Carpenner, the crowd of 26,842 had witnessed about as wild and woolly an exhibition as ever took place on any field, with 10 pitchers, five for each side, doing their best to snuff out the blow of base hits.

After the game, the inhabitants of the press box were further entertained by a terrific row between Bill Klem, umpire-in-chief of the National league, and President Larry MacPhail of the Dodgers. About the foulest thing the old arbitrator called MacPhail at the top of his lungs was a "counterfeit."

Their debate went back several games to a strike called on Camilli by Umpire Al Harbeck last week.

The Giants twice appeared to have yesterday's tussle sewed up, once when they led 10 in the fourth, and again when they went into the last of the ninth with an 8-7 advantage. But each time the Dodgers came back punching and stayed off the defeat that would have cut their mathematical chance of overtaking the Cardinals to two games.

As it was, it will still take at least three St. Louis victories, three Brooklyn defeats or a combination of both to give the Cards the flag.

With the Giants a run ahead in the ninth, the scoreboard attendant took pity on the crowd and did not tack up the fact that the Cards had scored six runs in the fifth frame of their game with Pittsburgh.

Then, pinch hitter Lew Riggs saved the game for Brooklyn in the ninth, delivering a clean

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 23. (AP)—The amazing St. Louis Cardinals, trailing and starting for his, exploded a 6-run blast against the Pittsburgh Pirates in the fifth inning Tuesday and colared three more in the sixth to triumph, 9 to 2, and retain their precious 1-2 game lead over the Pittsburgh Pirates in the drive for the National league championship.

Stanley Musial, the Cardinals' left-fielder, smashed a home run with the bases loaded to climax the dramatic fifth in which three Pirates errors figured. It was Musial's 10th homer of the year and it set the crowd of 48,610 loyal Cardinal fans in a frenzy.

The cherished victory was the Cardinals' 30th in 47 games and leaves them with only four more games to go, while the beautiful bums, in first place with a 10-game lead on Aug. 10, have five on their remaining schedule. The triumph was the 102nd of the season for the Red Birds, the most victories for a National league club since 1912, when the New York Giants won 103.

U. S. Jarvis, Destroyer, Is Reported Lost

Transport, "Little", Sunk In Solomons; Total Of 250 Men Are Believed Lost

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24. (AP)—The Navy announced today that the United States destroyer Jarvis had disappeared in the southwest Pacific without leaving a trace, presumably sunk by enemy submarines or aircraft, and an auxiliary transport, the "Little", was sunk during recent operations in the Solomon Islands. The possible loss of lives on the two ships is estimated at 250 men. The Jarvis was en route from the Solomons to a repair base at Guadalcanal during previous enemy air attacks off Guadalcanal.

Detachment Of French Aviators To Train In U.S.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24. (AP)—The Navy announced Wednesday that through agreement with fighting French naval authorities a detachment of French naval aviators would be trained in this country.

The step is being undertaken as an announcement of the Navy's intention to constitute in the future a French unit which with planes furnished by the United States will cooperate with United States Navy and Air Force.

This agreement, the Navy said, "furnished an additional example of the eminent collaboration between the American and fighting French armed services which further shows their resolve to unite closely their efforts in the conflict against common enemies."

From the working of the state, the Navy said, it is believed that the French pilots would require only advanced training which would qualify them to fly directly for service with United States Navy and Air Force.

It was stated that these were the forces with which they would serve.

The Navy did not disclose the number of French fliers to be given instruction in this country nor the school and base at which they would be stationed.
