Influences Blamed

LONDON (UPI) — Lenin Prize-winner industrialist Cyrus Eaton, on his way home from a red carpet tour of the Iron Curtain countries, blamed "powerful government influences in the United States" today for failure of the summit.

VFW Conclave

ORLANDO (UPI) — Florida Veterans of Foreign Wars and their wives register today for the three-day VFW state convention. Three to four thousand veterans are expected. T. C. Connell of Killeen, Texas, VFW National Senior Vice Commander, will address them at a banquet Saturday night.

Top Speller

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Henry Friedman, 13, of Oak Ridge, Tenn., a previous two-time loser, today won the 33rd National Spelling Contest.

Henry won over Betty Jean Allschul, 12, of Norfolk, Va., by correctly spelling the Greek-derived word "vallety." He then went on to spell "vexatious," correctly spelling the 1960 champions' word.

Revamping Need

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Harold Cole, executive vice president of the State Chamber of Commerce, said Wednesday Florida may need to revamp its advertising and promotion in order to retain its tourist trade. Cole called for a detailed study to determine if "our tourist programs have become antiquated and should be updated and modernized."

Quake Aid

VALDIVIA, Chile (UPI) — Ships, planes and helicopters had joined the race today to clear residents out of low-lying areas of this earthquake-wrecked city before potentially-disastrous floods strike. By nightfall Wednesday, an estimated 24,500 persons had left Valdivia to seek safety on higher ground. Hundreds more were preparing to leave.

Aid To Aged

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fla.) today introduced a program of medical care for the aged designed to give low income families full deductions for medical expenses. Smathers said under his bill persons over 65 would get health insurance policies through private insurance firms on a voluntary basis with a maximum premium of six dollars per month.

Voter Approval

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Approval by voters is needed before \$1,400,000 worth of New Smyrna Beach waterworks and electric revenue bonds can be validated, the Supreme Court ruled Wednesday. The court refused to validate the bonds. The city called the bonds "certificates" and contended that a city law requiring a freeholders election for bonds did not apply to them.

Threat To Castro

MIAMI (UPI) — A call for armed uprising against Premier Fidel Castro brought into the open today an underground organization which may be the strongest seeking to overthrow the Cuban revolutionary government. The movement of Revolutionary Recovery (MRR) charged Castro with betraying the revolution he led and with attempting "to convert democratic, Christian Cuba into a cog in the Sino-Soviet machinery for world domination."

Rockefeller's Rap Of Nixon Challenged

WASHINGTON (UPI) — GOP congressional leaders said after a White House conference today that President Eisenhower joined with them in challenging Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's charge that national defenses are inadequate.

Eisenhower and his leaders in the House and Senate devoted part of their weekly legislative conference to the New York governor's statement and his demand that Vice President Richard M. Nixon discuss national issues prior to the Republican national convention.

Nixon will answer Rockefeller's attack at a news conference in Camden, N. J. late today, his office announced.

Nixon's press secretary, Herbert G. Klein, declined to comment directly on Rockefeller's challenge of Nixon and other GOP leaders—criticism which started many Republicans and angered some here.

Argentina Demands Eichmann's Return

BUEENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI) — An Argentine demand that Israel return ex-Nazi Adolf Eichmann within one week placed the two nations on the verge of a complete break in diplomatic relations today.

Argentina already had recalled its ambassador in Israel and warned it would take the case to the United Nations if the Israelis rejected the ultimatum.

A sternly worded note handed to Israeli Ambassador Arie Levati Wednesday night demanded not only that Eichmann be brought back here but that the "Jewish volunteers" who spirited him out of Argentina be punished.

The Argentine note was sharply critical of Israel's explanation of the incident, rejecting particularly its "gratuitous affirmation that numerous Nazis live in Argentina voluntarily with a group of Jewish volunteers who tracked him down without telling Israel's government."

Argentina said Israel in effect was "guaranteeing Eichmann's captivity by applying for his return but making no offer of reparations which are the inevitable consequence of such a recognition of responsibility."

Once Eichmann has been returned to Argentina, the note said, Israel would be free to seek his extradition in accordance with the regular procedures of international law.

Eichmann's capture by Israeli agents in Argentina was announced Wednesday.

Kishi Guarantees Safety Of Ike

TOKYO (UPI) — Premier Nobusuke Kishi said tonight he would guarantee the personal safety of President Eisenhower during his June 15-22 visit despite threats of physical violence by leftwing, anti-American extremists.

Kishi stressed before a nationwide television audience to "welcome foreign heads of state like gentlemen" and to answer growing suggestions that the visit be postponed until Japan solves its constitutional crisis.

"We guarantee President Eisenhower's personal safety during his visit here, but I am ashamed that there will be some unpatriotic demonstrators who will be waving flags other than the Stars and Stripes and the Rising Sun," Kishi said.

Kishi denied that Eisenhower's visit had any connection with Japanese domestic political affairs.

Kishi's opponents have charged he wants to use the visit to boost his political prestige but Kishi said the visit was connected only with the centennial celebrations of U.S.-Japanese relations.

Reds To Return Glider Pilot

COLOGNE, Germany (UPI) — The East German Communist Party admitted an American team to pick up glider pilot Richard E. Schreder, who landed in the Soviet zone by accident Wednesday while competing in the world gliding championships.

It appeared the Communists were preparing to release Schreder, of Toledo, Ohio, in record time. His wife was waiting near a border post in expectation he would cross the Iron Curtain this afternoon.

An East German radio station reported that Schreder had landed his home-made glider near Grevenmuhlen, just outside the Iron Curtain and only a few miles from the spot where nine Americans were forced down recently in a C-47 transport.

Pershing Missile Fired By Army

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — The Army fired its new Pershing ballistic missile on a short hop over the Atlantic today in a "leaver" test of the rocket's systems.

The 28-foot Pershing, which had racked up three successes in as many tries earlier this year, apparently stood up well under the stress and strain.

Missile Strike Spreads

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—The machinists union, already on strike against Convair, broke off negotiations with another missile-making firm, Lockheed, and threatened to give five-day notice Friday of contract termination.

An estimated 3,000 Convair machinists remained off their jobs for the fourth straight day today at Convair installations at four key Atlas Air Force bases at Vandenberg, Calif.; Cape Canaveral, Fla.; Offutt, Neb., and Warren, Wyo.

Selected small groups of about 22,000 other Convair machinists conducted "hit-run" strikes at Convair's three plants here and at Pantano, Calif. The "hit-run" strike strategy was aimed at slowing down production at Convair

plants, yet still allowing most union members to remain on the job to help finance the strike of fellow union members.

Convair and IAM representatives went to court today for a hearing on Convair's request for a permanent injunction against mass or violent picketing at its astronautics plant here.

Military Junta Builds Up Case Against Menderes

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI)—Turkey's ruling military junta built up its case against former Premier Adnan Menderes today with charges that the regime had planned before it was ousted to kill 1,500 military college students.

AF Says Sergeant Who Touched Off CD Alert Lacked Proper Training

McGUIRE AIR FORCE BASE, N. J. (UPI)—The sergeant who touched off a civil alert in the fire and explosion in a bunker housing a nuclear-tipped Bomarc missile lacked technical training to evaluate the danger, an Air Force general said Wednesday night. Brig. Gen. Gilbert L. Pritchard also said civil defense officials had to be contacted through the state police because there were no provisions for direct military-CD liaison. Pritchard, commanding general of the New York Air Defense Sector, confirmed at a news conference a state police report that Sgt. Clarence Baldwin, security non-commissioned officer at the missile base, telephoned them Tuesday afternoon to report the Bomarc mishap. Police claimed that Baldwin told them a nuclear warhead had exploded and spread radiation throughout the area. The fire that lasted 45 minutes, heavily damaged the Bomarc in its closed concrete shelter and spread a "slight" amount of radiation in a limited area of the missile site. Pritchard said there were two explosions during the fire and a small part of the nuclear warhead burned. No injuries were reported. The general said that he talked to Baldwin for an hour Wednesday and the sergeant still was not sure what he told state police. "I don't know what he said," Pritchard said. "He was fully aware that there were nuclear elements in the shelter and he also knew the place was on fire." Pritchard said he didn't know if Baldwin had the technical knowledge to evaluate the situation properly, but he added the sergeant had received no technical training along this line. But, the general added, "you have to hand it to this man" for sticking to his post while he thought a serious explosion might be coming.

Gator Coach Star Of Radio-TV Show

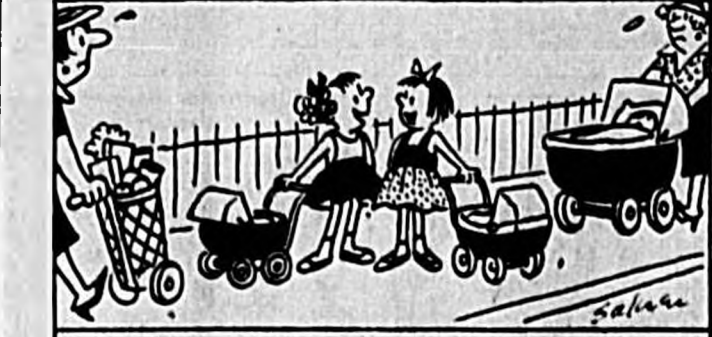
JACKSONVILLE— A series of radio and television sports shows featuring University of Florida football coach Ray Graves will be broadcast over statewide hook-ups this fall.

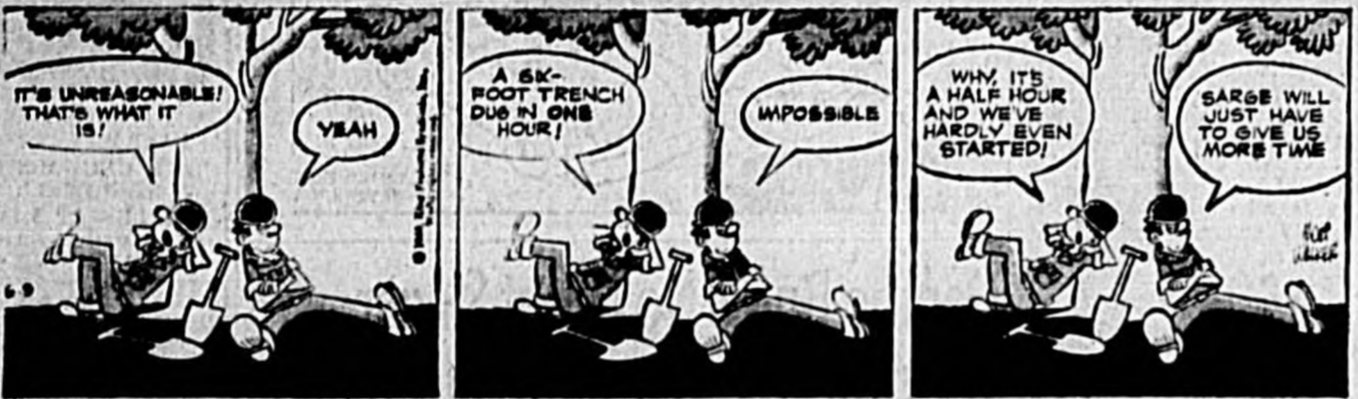

BOSTON (UPI) — Billy Jorges, completely exhausted from trying to cope with the "fruitless task" of managing the last-place Boston Red Sox, was in seclusion today after being ordered by his physicians to take a rest.

And the 32-year-old Jorges may have given a hint himself recently that he may never be back as manager. Jorges was quoted as telling two friends, a baseball writer and Red Sox publicist Jack Maloney several weeks ago that "no job is worth it if it's going to ruin your health. My health is more important than the job."

Jorges, in his first full year of managing a major league club, made the statement in separate talks while the Red Sox were in the midst of a 10-game losing streak.

Comiskey Quits As Chisox VP

CHICAGO (UPI) — The name Comiskey was absent from the Chicago White Sox today and still another era in sports had ended.

Charles Comiskey resigned as White Sox vice president Wednesday, thus moving his family name from the club for the first time since it was founded by his grandfather in 1901 at the creation of the American League.

Comiskey, who long had been at odds with the club's current president, Bill Veck, gave up a five-figure annual salary by resigning.

Machen Nears Shot At Title

CHICAGO (UPI) — Heavyweight Eddie Machen and his manager, Sid Fishery, figured today they were "two or three fights" away from a shot at the world championship.

Machen decided to fight Alonzo Johnson in 10 rounds Wednesday night, outspending his foe for an unpopular and loudly booed unanimous decision.

But it was his 34th win in 37 pro bouts, and it left him with a potential elimination match against Sonny Liston, rated the No. 1 heavyweight contender.

Boxer Dies

NEW YORK (UPI) — Tommy Pacheco, young Puerto Rican lightweight boxer injured in his 12th professional bout Monday night, died early today of brain damage.

Lane Comes Up With Sleeper In Klippstein

United Press International Could be that trader Frank Lane got the bargain basement buy of the season in Johnny Klippstein.

For "slightly more than" the \$30,000 waiver price, Lane bought the Cleveland Indians the type of relief pitcher who is indispensable to a pennant drive.

Compared to some of Frankie's more flamboyant big-name player trades, the Klippstein deal didn't attract much notice this spring. But the way he's been pitching, the 32-year-old right-hander has done a lot to maintain Lane's reputation as a shrewd flesh-peddler.

Klippstein, who knocked around the National League for 10 years before Lane bought him from the Los Angeles Dodgers, turned in another glittering relief job Wednesday as the Indians swept a double-header from the Boston Red Sox, 8-7 and 5-2, and took over first place in the American League.

Summoned from the bullpen for the 12th time this season when young Jim Perry faltered in the first game, Klippstein retired nine men in a row to protect the one-run lead. He now has allowed only two earned runs in his last 19 1/2 relief innings.

The double triumph which ruined Del Baker's fill-in managerial debut for the Red Sox, put the Indians in first place by 10 percentage points ahead of the Baltimore Orioles, who lost to the Detroit Tigers, 7-6, in their American League night games. The New York Yankees defeated the Chicago White Sox, 6-0, and the Washington Senators beat the Kansas City Athletics, 9-8.

In the National League, the Pittsburgh Pirates maintained a one-game lead with a 5-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs while the second-place San Francisco Giants edged the Cincinnati Reds, 2-1, on Eddie Bressoud's ninth-inning two-run single. Both were day games.

At night, Duke Snider hit the 361st home run of his career to help the Dodgers rally for a 4-1 victory over the Milwaukee Braves and the Philadelphia Phillies topped the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-4, on rookie Tony Curry's pinch eighth-inning, bases-loaded double.

Charley Maxwell's two-run ninth-inning single broke up what had been a scoreless pitching duel between Frank Lary of Detroit and Jack Fisher of Baltimore. Each pitcher allowed only three hits.

Mickey Mantle hit two home runs and Bob Turley yielded only three hits in the Yankee's victory over the White Sox.

Julio Becquer's two-run single was the key hit in Washington's three-run eighth-inning rally. Bob Allison drove in three Senators' runs with a homer and a double.

In the National, Elroy Face strolled in from the bullpen and retired Ernie Banks and Ed Bouchee with the bases loaded to help Pittsburgh break a three-

game losing streak and remain first place. Bob Skinner and Dick Stuart hit home runs to stake Bressoud's Bend Mizell to an early 5-0 lead.

Bressoud's game-winning hit for San Francisco with two out in the ninth ruined a three-hitter by young Jim O'Toole of the Reds.

Giants starter Mike McCormick pitched a no-hitter for 7 1/2 innings. Sam Jones was the winner in relief.

Snider's homer tied him with Joe DiMaggio for eighth place on the all-time homer-hitting list. Wally Moon had hit a two-run homer off reliever Don McMahon earlier in that same eighth inning to put the Dodgers ahead. Stan Williams, who pitched a three-hitter before he was lifted in the eighth, boosted his record to 4-0.

Curry's double off the Cardinals' Lindy McDaniel followed single by Ken Walters and Al Dark and an intentional walk that loaded the bases. John Buschardt pitched a seven-hitter for the win.

Fanatics Mob Ike's Press Secretary In Tokyo

Helicopter Rescues Hagerty, Ambassador

TOKYO (UPI)—Thousands of screaming, fanatical leftists mobbed Presidential Secretary James C. Hagerty today in a violent protest against President Eisenhower's forthcoming visit, but Hagerty said the trip would be carried out as planned.

The mobs trapped Hagerty, U. S. Ambassador Douglas MacArthur (I and White House appointments secretary Thomas F. Stephens in a limousine for 70 minutes until they were rescued by a Marine helicopter. The mobs stoned the car and helicopter, broke windows and slashed the car's tires but did not hurt the Americans.

The frenzied mob of 3,000 overwhelmed the 2,000 police who rushed to the scene. An additional 11,000 demonstrators milled outside the airport trying to get to Hagerty, and additional thousands besieged the heavily guarded U. S. embassy.

Missile Strike Spread Threatens Douglas Plant

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—The Machinists Union strike against Convair today threatened to spread to two more large aircraft-making firms, Douglas and Lockheed.

An attempt to head off Lockheed's involvement in the growing labor unrest with International Association of Machinists members caused both sides to schedule renewed negotiations today in San Francisco.

Lockheed was reported ready to make a new offer after talks between the groups had broken down Wednesday. The union had threatened to give Lockheed's space and missile division plants formal five-day notice today of contract termination.

Such notification would allow the IAM's estimated 10,000 members to employ main at Lockheed plants at Sunnyvale and Van Nuys, Calif., to go on strike any time after Tuesday. Membership meetings of Lockheed workers were scheduled for the weekend to take a strike vote.

The 4,000 IAM members employed at Douglas Santa Monica Calif. plant Thursday authorized a strike by a 95 percent majority. The union negotiating committee did not set a strike date.

Machinists remained off the job at Convair Atlas installations at four key missile bases across the country. The union also was striking against Convair plants here and in Pomona, Calif., where the Atlas is made.

Lockheed makes the Polaris missile and missiles for the Samos, M and Discoverer projects. It makes the "work-horse" Thor, an intermediate range ballistic missile.

Hagerty and MacArthur sat in the car puffing cigarettes while the mob shrieked outside and cursed the United States and eight helicopters circled overhead until at least one pilot by Marine Maj. Don Egan of Marine Falls, N. C., a cousin of Marine Air Force, was shot in the back by Joe Foss, made a daring landing nearby.

Newsmen later asked what would happen if the president found himself in the same situation Hagerty faced today.

"I don't think Japan would permit the president to be caught in a similar bind as we were caught in today," the press secretary said.

"Was not this a risky gamble?" "I would not think so," Hagerty said. He's a guest and will be a guest of Japan and I would assume that security measures for protection of the president would be adequate."

"We are sure that the demonstration in no way reflects the feeling and attitude of the great majority of the Japanese people for whom the American people have the greatest feeling of friendship."

Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi repeated his assurance that Eisenhower would be protected from mob violence. Similar assurance came from Foreign Minister Aichihiro Fujiyama who called today's event "the greatest disgrace that can happen to this country."

Runaway Balloon
SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—The Navy's runaway research balloon drifted over the Pacific today although 50 rounds of cannon fire was sent into it by a fighter jet which sought to bring it down. The balloon, 40 stores tall, was 250 miles off shore at an altitude of 70,000 feet. It was drifting north and west.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller met without shaking hands in public today but buried their political feud long enough to welcome Britain's Prince Philip to an America of "great unity."

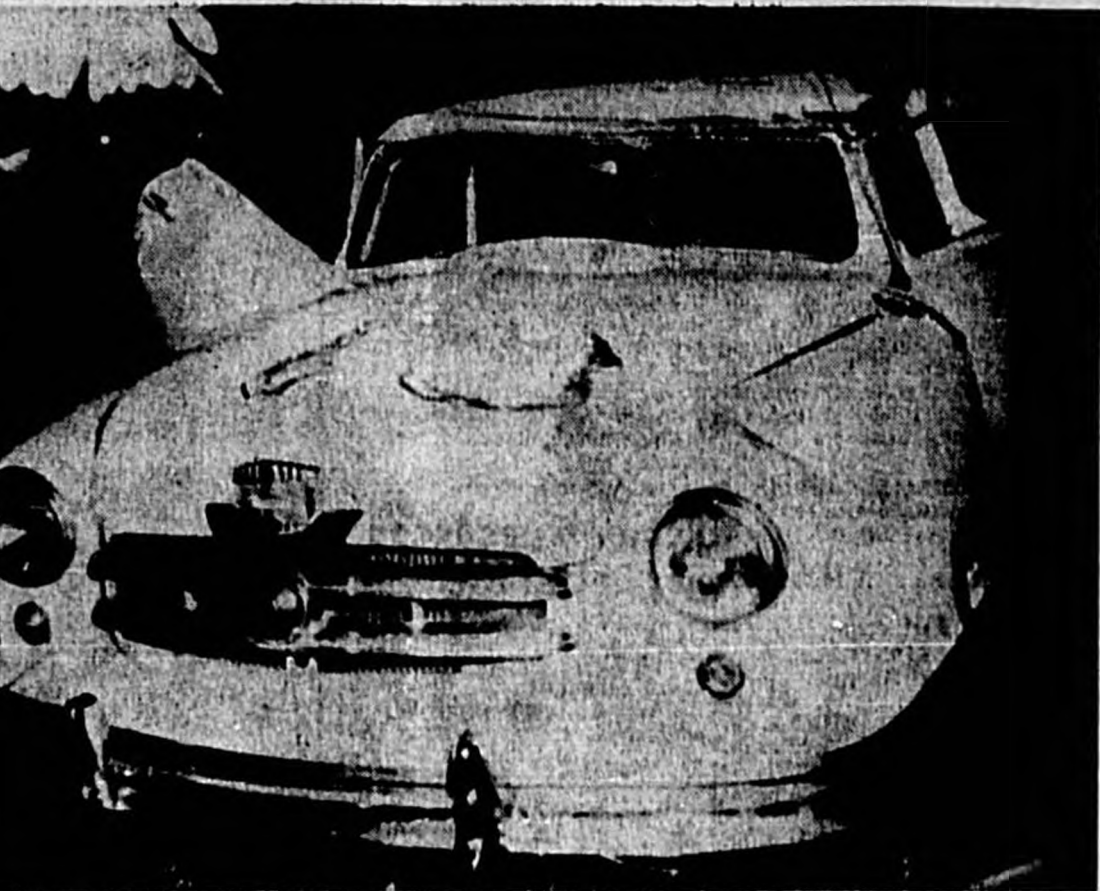

In a blistering statement Thursday night, Rockefeller had rejected the vice president's invitation to discuss their differences on TV. Rockefeller's declaration all but confirmed he will challenge Nixon for the GOP presidential nomination.

Senate Group OK's Defense Money Bill
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Appropriations Committee approved a \$6,344,897,000 defense money bill today with a last-minute addition to speed the Air Force "spy-in-the-sky" Samos Satellite. The bill carried \$1,047,030,000 more than the House had voted and was \$1,048,997,000 above President Eisenhower's original defense budget from which the administration later trimmed about 130 million.

Public Sewer System Need Cited In Longwood

Longwood residents learned Thursday they would be eligible for federal aid if they support a move for the planning of a public sewerage system in their metropolitan area.

Val Robbins, county sanitarian, speaking before the Longwood Chamber of Commerce meeting, said the town's growth now warrants public sewerage facilities.

According to a recent census report, Longwood has jumped from 700 population; a decade ago, to a count of more than 1,500 persons in 1960.

Robbins urged the residents to support the town officials in a move to promote public sewerage in the metropolitan Longwood area.

The county sanitarian said Longwood's water system is adequate and praised the operations of the Longwood medical clinic.

Robbins was substituting for Dr. Clyde Brothers, county health officer, who was forced to cancel his speaking engagement at the chamber meeting because of illness.

Robbins said he was encouraging all municipalities to make a survey toward the feasibility of getting a public sewerage system.

Drainage District Hearing Tuesday

A public hearing on whether to set up a drainage tax district in Loch Arbor will be held at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday.

The hearing will be held in the County Commission chambers in the courthouse. If there is no opposition at the hearing, the board is expected to set a date for a special election establishing the district.

Last month the board received a petition with the names of 81 percent of registered voters in the area asking for the district.

The district includes Loch Arbor, Little Venice and the Country Club section.

If the majority of the property owners favor the district, a plan to eliminate flooding would be put into effect before the fall.

Estimated cost of the plan is \$31,000.

Giant Workers Strike Hits France

PARIS (UPI)—An estimated 80 to 90 per cent of France's 1,300,000 government workers headed a Communist-Socialist strike call today, bringing such services as communications, air transportation and garbage collection to a virtual standstill.

Authorities here had feared that bus and subway workers might walk out as a token of "solidarity" with the 24-hour government workers' strike. However, transportation in the city was normal.

About 15,000 demonstrators protesting Gen. Charles de Gaulle's wage freezes marched past the finance ministry chanting "des sous, Charol, des sous"—give us some money, Charlie.

The strike was the biggest so far in a series of union actions to force de Gaulle's government to ease up on the wage-freeze part of his anti-inflation campaign.

The strike started at midnight when telephone switchboard operators and telegraph employees stood up from their boards and desks and walked off their jobs.

Flu Deaths Up

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The number of deaths from flu and pneumonia was about 90 percent greater during the first three months of 1960 than during the same period last year, the Public Health Service reported today.

East Germans Threaten West

BERLIN (UPI)—East German Deputy Foreign Minister Otto Winzer today threatened to take action against West Berlin's vital air traffic as the ground it is being misused to build up the West German army.

Winzer said a news conference the United States has broken four-power agreements establishing the air corridors between West Berlin and West Germany by allowing Berlin to be flown out of the West German service in the West German army.

Board Names New Teachers

The County school board today approved the appointment of 26 new teachers for the fall term, boosting the total number to 486 educators in the county.

This is an increase of more than 60 teachers added to the school payroll as compared to last year's mark, with approximately 70 more teachers still needed to fill a "vacancy gap," Supt. of schools R. T. Milwe said.

The Board also appointed W. H. DeShazo, Oviedo High School principal as Supervisor of secondary education for all the county's public schools.

DeShazo, 47, will assume his duties July 1. The school board withheld naming DeShazo's successor until further study.

Principal of Oviedo for the past four years, DeShazo came here from Humboldt, Tenn., where he was principal of all city schools for nine years.

Seminole High school will gain three new teachers, Miss Anna D. Vitaras, Ira Hindman Jr., and Leonard Irvin Roberts, while the Oviedo High School will add one teacher to their staff; Mrs. Evelyn C. Taylor.

Lyman High, with eight new teachers will show the biggest increase this fall. The teachers are Barbara L. Coffee; Walter E. Darius; Mildred J. Stewart; Miss Myra F. Champion; James Woodrow Brown; Gilbert S. Button; Millard Larch and Quille Victor Chambers.

Three teachers, Mrs. Bilda B. Stubbings; Donald Hastings Parrish; and Donald Simmons, will start at Oviedo Junior High and one Mrs. Ruth Tippins will teach at South Seminole elementary school.

Mrs. Ruth Glines; Mrs. Margaret M. Smith; Kathleen Lee; Marjorie L. Smith; Mrs. Anne Coffey and Mrs. Alice Hook will begin at Plover Elementary school.

Mrs. Virginia D. Huffman and Elizabeth E. Huffman will teach at Longwood and Mrs. Geneva C. Cochran and Ellen Mayner will go to the Lake Mary elementary school.

In other board action, the Orange Paving Company of Orlando, was given the paving and grading work bid for the Rosenwald, Lake Mary, Midway, Longwood and South Elementary schools.

Their combined bid of \$23,300 was more than \$3,000 less than their nearest competitor. Milwe said he had anticipated the cost of the paving at approximately \$25,000.

Tornado Smacks Air Base; Floods Swamp Texas

A tornado smacked a Texas air base Thursday night while downpours, high winds and hailstones caused damage and flooding from Texas to Nebraska.

The small twister dipped into the Amarillo Air Force Base, wrecked the non-commissioned officers' club, overturned two cars in a nearby parking lot and dealt minor damage to six airplanes.

The tornado came during a thunderstorm that packed 70-mph winds, hailstones two inches in diameter and more than four inches of rain.

Water up to seven feet deep flooded U. S. 60 and 68 between Amarillo and the Airbase and city streets in East Amarillo. Highway police said 250 cars were stranded by high water in the city.

Bumper to bumper water streets in Norfolk, Neb., a nearby airport station, only two inches of rain.

Worland, Wyo., and Idaho, both received rain and showers fell from the plains and mountains to the Texas-Mexican border. A few showers sprinkled Louisiana and southern Florida.

The weather bureau predicted more thunderstorms today over the central and southern plateau and the Rockies into the western Mississippi Valley and Western Lake Superior. Locally heavy rains were predicted from Texas along the Gulf Coast and in south and east-central Florida.

U. S. Sends New Protest To Cuba

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States sent a new protest to Cuba today condemning "continued dissemination of baseless charges" against this country.

The note "strongly objected" to implications by Cuban Premier Fidel Castro at the United States had something to do with the explosion of a French military ship in Havana harbor March 4.

The note was delivered to Cyril L. Leuchter, Cuba's ambassador to the Organization of American States here.

It complained that Cuba has distributed to all OAS delegations here a pamphlet containing Castro's charges on the ship explosion incident.

Last Saturday a sharply worded U. S. note accused Castro's government of a "campaign of slander" against the United States.

Today's note said "the United States strongly objects to continued dissemination of baseless charges."

Ike's Aid Request Gets Big Chop

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower's foreign aid request has been chopped by about \$9 million dollars by a House Appropriations subcommittee.

The subcommittee voted \$3,300,000 more to aid to free world allies and underdeveloped countries in the fiscal year starting July 1. Eisenhower originally had asked for \$4,175,000,000.

The reduction was reported to have been split about evenly between military and economic assistance.

The cut was smaller than had been expected. Advance predictions were that the subcommittee would trim one billion or more.

The subcommittee gave no details of its action, taken during a closed session that ran late into the afternoon. The figures were provided by an informed source.

Art Group Sends Out Questionnaire

The Sanford Art Assn. board of directors today urged all members to send in their replies to a questionnaire mailed to them concerning the association's program.

The group will not meet again until the directors call a meeting to evaluate the replies to the questionnaire and form a basis for planning a program.

Poll Shows Smathers Tops In State

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An independent poll taken last February showed Sen. George A. Smathers (D-Fla.) would have beaten Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) easily if the front-running presidential candidate had made a bid for the state's delegates in the Florida primary.

This poll, and another one conducted a month earlier, showed that Smathers was by far the most commanding political figure in Florida.

Both polls were made by Louis Harris and Associates, one at the request of Kennedy and the other at the request of one of the candidates for the gubernatorial nomination in Florida.

One poll showed 64 per cent liked Smathers, 30 per cent liked Kennedy and 20 per cent were not sure they liked either. The overall up was caused by those who felt that both Kennedy and Smathers would be good candidates.

This Kennedy-requested poll also included a ranking of the state's three top political figures, Smathers, Gov. LeRoy Collins, and Sen. Spessard L. Holland, all Democrats.

On this question, 74 per cent said they liked Smathers, 69 per cent Collins, and 83 per cent Holland.

The other poll, ordered by the gubernatorial candidate, had almost similar results, indicating 79 per cent felt that Smathers was doing a good-to-excellent job; 13 per cent a fair-to-good job; and 8 per cent undecided.

For Holland, the percentages were 21 per cent, good-to-excellent job; 21 per cent a fair-to-good job, with only 8 per cent undecided.

After studying the results, the pollsters said both the state's senators were "moderately popular." But the state's major political figure appears to be an exceptionally commanding figure in the eyes of the rank and file of Florida Democrats today.
