

Legislation On Housing Seen By Taft

23 States Are Represented In "Fight For Homes" Rally In Senate Office:

WASHINGTON, June 25, (P)-Senator Taft (R-Ohio) told a 'Fight for Housing" rally here today that he believes long-range housing legislation can be put through the Senate before Congress adjourns next month.

He said that when House and Senate leaders meet next week to ay out a program for the remainder of the session he is "hopeful" an agreement that will mean enactment of "some sort of ousing program.

He implied, however, that the togram he is backing, embodied in the so-called Wagner-Ellenderalt bill, might have to be modifield considerably to win House acceptance. A similar bill passed the Senate in the 79th Congress but was buttled up in the House. Some 400 housing advocates from 23 states attended the rally in the Senate office building.
