

POOL PLANNED TO STABILIZE BOND MARKET

Big Interests Organize Corporation To Begin With Initial Fund Of 100 Million

ALBANY, June 4.—(A.P.)—Plans for the formation of a 100,000,000-dollar corporation to stabilize the bond market were laid before the Secretary of State today by a representative of the Morgan, Rockefeller and other large Wall Street banking interests. Articles of incorporation likely will be filed Monday.

The corporation, to be known as "The American Securities Stabilizing Corporation," is expected to be ready to begin operations next week with initial funds of \$100,000,000 subscribed by the 15 leading New York banks, and 20 leading private banks.

This is the "bond pool" which has been rumored for several days in Wall Street. The rumors were so definite yesterday that the bond market enjoyed its swiftest upturn of 1932, many issues advancing \$20 to \$30 per bond of \$1,000 face value. Stock also recovered briskly, many of the principal issues closing up \$1 to \$3.

Organizers of the corporation explained that its fund would not necessarily be limited to \$100,000,000, and insisted that "bond pool" or "stabilization corporation" were "institutional" and not "retail" in character. It was planned as a temporary measure, and may stay in operation for some time.

It was also asserted that the corporation was strictly an investing organization formed for the purpose of making profits.

Mr. Lamont, who heads the organization as its president, declined to state when it would begin operations. The formal announcement said, "The policy in acquiring investments and in making loans is based in large measure upon its confidence in financial institutions in Congress, in effecting the budget, and in maintaining its determination to maintain intact the government's credit."

Thinkers widely expressed their satisfaction over the rapid progress of Congress in whipping the tax measure into shape for a final vote, and pointed to the prompt agreement of the House and Senate conferences as an important factor in yesterday's rise in security prices.

In addition to Mr. Lamont as president of the corporation, another Morgan partner, George Whitney, will serve as chairman of the executive committee. Lansing P. Reed, prominent lawyer, will serve as secretary, and Langstaff Hinton, a member of the Morgan firm's staff, as treasurer.

60 PERSONS ARE KNOWN DEAD IN MEXICAN QUAKE

Scores Are Hurt And Much Damage Done In Violent Tremors

MEXICO CITY, June 4.—(A.P.)—More than three score persons were known dead today and upwards of 100 injured as a result of a series of destructive earthquakes. Great damage was done over a wide area and a number of small towns were entirely wiped out, including Acapulco, San Bartolome and Ciudad Trujillo.

In the city of Guadalajara, capital of the State of Jalisco, and second largest city in Mexico, 22 quakes were recorded during the day.

In the vicinity of Guadalajara 16 persons were known to be dead in 1.50 minutes. The population was estimated at 150,000.

The State of Colima reported seven known dead and at least 25 injured. It was feared the earthquake there would be much higher than the quake there. In fact, seven men, women and children were killed and many were injured.

Mexico City itself suffered considerable damage, several small buildings being toppled over. In downtown streets numerous cracks were caused.

Reports of the casualties, which were not officially confirmed, are chiefly from the north and west, including Mexico, Colima, Jalisco, and San Luis Potosi.

Mexico City police were jaded by three distinct shocks beginning about 4:45 A. M. Several small buildings were toppled over here, and cracks appeared in downtown thoroughfares. Manzanillo, among the larger ports, reported considerable damage.

Communication lines were down in all directions to the southwest. News from that section was delayed. A heavy death toll may have occurred in some isolated areas.

Growers Union Of Farmers Has Special Session

(Continued From Page One)

As a legislator there, achieved the right representation. "Many times questions would arise in the Legislature that would materially affect the farmers," he said. "Sometimes these bills would be turned over to the wrong committee on purpose so that they would be killed before being presented to the Legislature. Then the representatives of the farmers would step into play. They would demand that the bill, in question, be submitted to the right committee."

At the opening of his talk Mr. Anderson made it clear that he is personally interested in the citrus industry. He recalled the organization of a citrus group in 1913 which, he said, "blew up in seven months" because it had too many activities. "In 1919 a Growers and Shippers League was formed in Florida. It is now nine years old and is considered a strong organization." Mr. Anderson said that he believed this particular body remained intact mainly because it had only one purpose. "That purpose is shipping," he said.

The speaker then read from several issues of the Florida Grower, printed in the early part of 1931, which indicated his position as favorable to truck hauling. He said the people of this state should be allowed to use the roads, which they paid for, in the way they wish.

Nick Zernovean, well known Sanford farmer, then addressed the meeting on the importance of truck transportation to the farmers and stressed the importance of the farmers sticking together in order to secure proper truck legislation.

After the meeting the Executive Committee of the Florida Growers' Union, met at the Court House and decided that Senate Bill No. 2793 entitled, "A bill to regulate the transportation of persons and property in Interstate and Foreign Commerce by

Motor Carriers operating on the public highways, and for other purposes," is of vital importance to their interests as growers of this state.

They decided to communicate at once with all of Florida representatives and senators, asking that these office-holders instruct the Union as to their position as to the merits of the bill, and whether or not they are willing to support the said measure in substance as it is now before Congress.

Believing that some of the members of Congress from this state may not be familiar with the bill, they will be asked to instruct the Union in reference to placing the motor carriers mentioned in the bill under the same or familiar restrictions and commissions as are now in effect in reference to transportation by rail.

The Union further decided that the bill is not of any benefit to the growers of Florida, and that it is in fact detrimental to their interests and should not be passed. They agreed that in the event of it being necessary to pass legislation placing any restrictions upon the said motor carriers that they be not such restrictions as are contained in this bill.

Members of the committee who were present and assisted in drawing up a resolution which embodies the opinion of the group were: Randall Chase, B. F. Haines, Henry Nickel, J. St. Clair, White, W. C. Hutchison, Gus Schmah, Nick Zernovean, Henry Schumacher, George E. Balmer, and Martin Stanko.
