Explains Stand In Regard To Party And Problems Of State

MIAMI, Oct. 22 (INS)—Ruth Owen, Miami daughter of the late William Jennings Bryan, and Democratic nominee for congress from the fourth Florida district pledged here today her support to the Democratic party in an address here last night, which was broadcast over station WQAM.

Her complete statement follows: "As the Democratic congressmen and senators from the fourth district, I am grateful for this opportunity to address the people of the district, and I am glad to have been given this privilege by the Miami daily Democratic committee."

"I am proud to be a member of the Democratic party. My first political memories are of those days when my father was elected to congress from Nebraska, and when I was so small I could scarcely see above the top of his desk in congress. I stood beside him in that assembly and listened to his defense of Democratic principles.

"Thirty-two years ago my father became national standard bearer of the Democratic party. From that time until the time of his death he served democracy with unwavering loyalty. As his secretary in the campaign of 1908, I stood close to the national organization and in the years that followed I have seen, not as an observer, but as a participant, the political struggles of my party. I am a democrat both by heredity and conviction, with a reverence for the honor which the party has given to my father in 19 years past, with a humble gratitude for the confidence which the Democratic voters of the fourth congressional district have shown in me, I pledge both now and in the future my wholehearted loyalty to my party.

"During the past few weeks a number of speeches have been delivered in our county presenting the claims of the national candidates and discussing the issues before the country at large. But I believe that, in the heat of this national contest, it is not amiss to remind the voters of Florida that there is a state ticket offered by the Democratic party whose election alone hangs in the balance on the sixth of November.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 25.—

RACKETEERING IS CHICAGO ACTIVITY THAT IS BOOMING

System Compels Business To Pay Tribute To Evil Organizers

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—(INS)—

Racketeering—that Chicago system which compels a business man to pay tribute to organizers—has been perfected to such an extent it is bound to be universal this winter, according to the Employers' Association of Chicago.

The Employers' association, including the leading business men and merchants of Chicago, has charged in a formal statement that the crooked politician is one of the main cogs in the racket game.

More than 50 bombs have been thrown in the racketeers' spring and summer campaign, according to the association, which declares the bomb is the most powerful agent of the racket men.

According to the association more than 20 business associations and various activities in business have been terrorized by the

lossers of bombs. In all activities these include the apartment house and hotel association, bakery workers' union, master barbers, toothbrush, Jewish butchers' association, candy jobbers, cleaners and dyers, floor covering association, excavating contractors, fish dealers association, retail food and fruit stores, garages, glass dealers, leaded glass workers, laundry owners, bridge workers, iron workers, junk dealers, peddlers, photo finishers, painters, plasterers, roofers, electric sign makers, cinder and cinder block makers, tire makers, hollow tile association, tire workers, soda jerkers and Hebrew chicken killers association.

According to the employers' association, individual firms and associations refusing to pay tribute to the racket organizations, which control each business and trade, find their pieces of business bombed. Some variety in the campaign of the racketeers is given by the throwing of stones through laundry windows and retail stores with large glass fronts. Acid is used to destroy awnings made by persons not belonging to the awning makers' association.

Stenot bombs are also frequently employed, often being thrown into business houses after bricks and stones have smashed windows and doors.

Heads of the racketeer game are reaping enormous money according to the employers' association. For instance, it is claimed, the Chicago electric streetcar racketeers association are charged \$1,500 as a membership initiation fee and \$50 monthly dues are collected from tile makers.

The tribute from the hollow tile racketeers' association is estimated by the employers' association at \$30,000 monthly.

In the glass dealers' racketeers' association of as high as \$1,500 have been assessed for offenses, the employers' association has charged the racketeers in a statement declared racketeering is growing more vicious every day and carried the racket with the following:

1. Camouflages itself as a protector of the weak, although actually it exploits and terrorizes them.
2. Pretends to stabilize business while actually shutting and victimizing it.
3. Openly destroys personal freedom.
4. Is a constant threat to life and security because of its hoodlum tactics.
5. Substitutes profits for the few in place of equality of opportunity for all.
