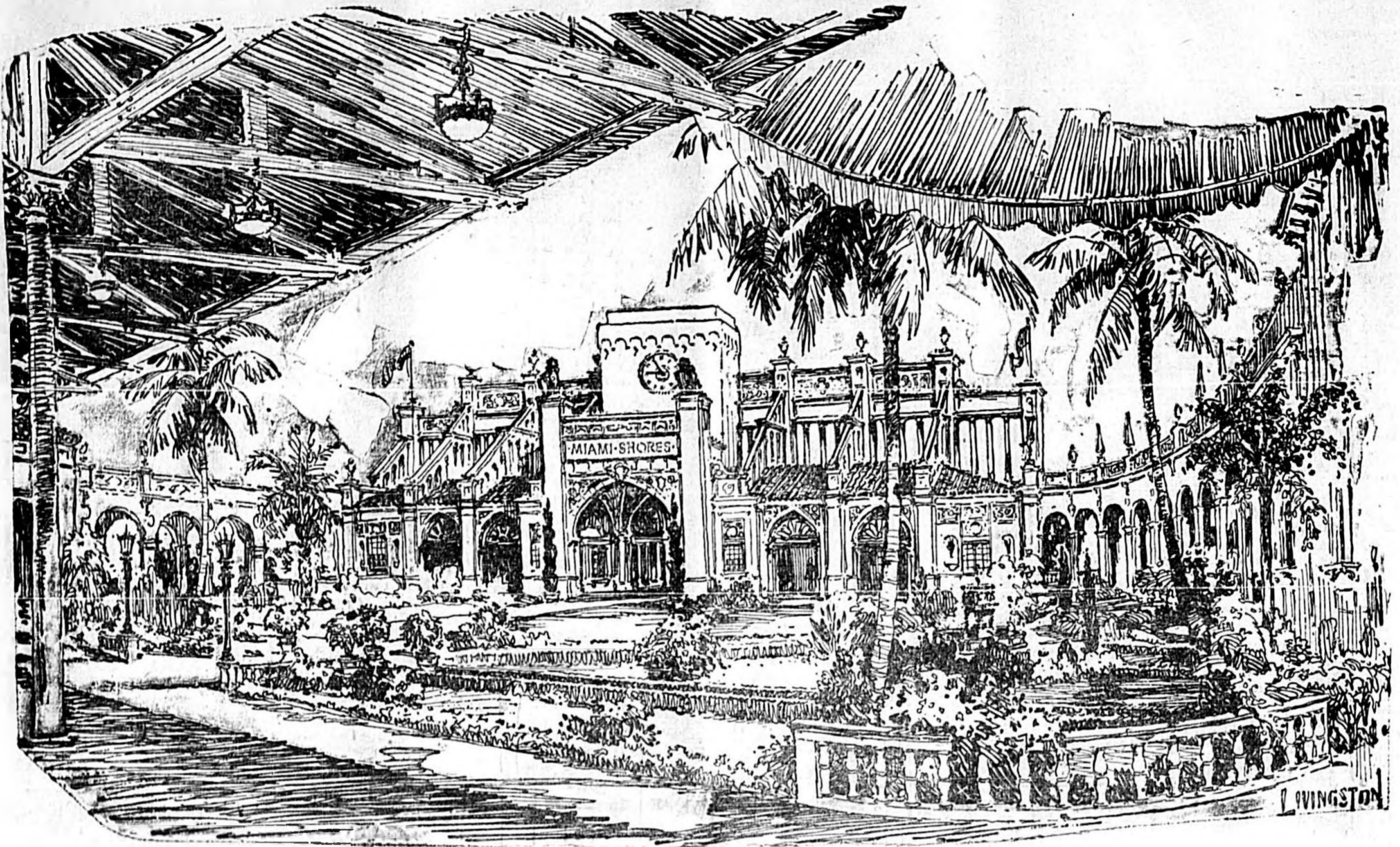

### TRAFFIC LAWS NUMBERING 40, ARE GIVEN OUT

(Continued from Page 1.)  
except on First Street from Sanford Avenue to Oak Avenue; and on Sanford Avenue from First Street; and all traffic on said portion of First Street and Sanford Avenue shall have the right of way over traffic leading into or across said portion of First Street and Sanford Avenue.

34. All heavy traffic from Clyde Line Depot for points east or south shall be confined to Seminole Boulevard to Sanford Avenue, thence south or east.

35. All heavy traffic bound west from Clyde Line Depot shall be confined to Commercial Street, west to Railroad Avenue, thence south to First Street, thence west.

36. Speed limit 20 miles per hour; and on First Street at a rate of speed consistent with the safety of all persons using said street, in no case exceeding 20 miles per hour.

37. No motor vehicle shall be operated in a careless or negligent manner.

38. All motor vehicles operated in the City of Sanford shall be equipped with pneumatic tires.

39. No person under age of 16 years shall operate a motor vehicle.

40. All traffic accidents shall be immediately reported to Police Headquarters.

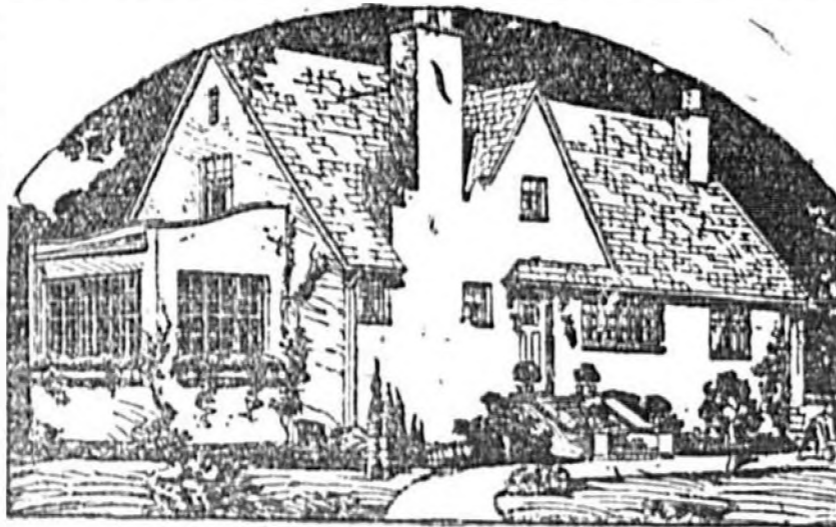

Pointers For The Game of Life

The Herald has been fortunate enough to come across that famous list of pointers Coach Yost once put together for the players on his team. He intended them to be used in the winning of football games, but they are the same rules that make winners in every game including that greatest game of all, Life itself.

Perhaps The Herald's readers will see the list as something worth posting where it may be read every day. It would pay most of us to always remember that:

- What you get out of the game depends on how much you put into it. You can't win today on what you did last Saturday. Make the game a personal proposition. The spirit of "Let George do it" will never win. The plays are planned for eleven men to execute—not ten. Be aggressive. You can't win the game on your own side of the scrimmage line. The field is a place to play the game—not to view it. The grand-stands were built for spectators. If the game is going against you, keep your head up, set your jaw, and dig in. This is what tests the stuff you are made of. Use your head. Someone has said that 75 per cent of football is above the neck. Never lose confidence in yourself. Never lose your self-control. Learn to face opposition without flinching. Not how little you can give but how much should be your motto. You have two good arms and hands—use them. Use your eyes. They are your searchlights. Turn them on the enemy. Know the rules of the game. Study your opponent—his tactics, his points of strength, and his points of weakness. Keep everlastingly on the job. Be alert. Never let an opponent get the jump on you. Always treat your opponent with respect. Play fair—make no foul tackles. Be the first to line up. Never stop fighting.

IT COSTS MORE to carry a sack of potatoes from the train to a store in New York City than it does to ship the sack 1,100 miles by railroad.

A farmer raises the calf, weans it, feeds it, feeds and milks the grown cow, and gets for the milk a quarter of the money paid by the person that drinks the milk. You can bring freight across the Atlantic or Pacific Ocean for less than it costs to take it across the North River in New York City.

SAMUEL RUBEL came from Russia a few years ago. He had a dollar, but did have a distinct idea that a dollar was worth having; also he realized that the only way to have many dollars is to save the first few. A little while ago he was peddling coal for a living, today he is head of his own \$50,000,000 ice and coal concern.

LORD ALBERT MILNER, once Secretary of War for Britain, is dead of sleeping sickness. An epidemic has struck Great Britain; many are prostrated. The germ, entirely unlike the African sleeping sickness caused by the tsetse fly, is similar to the Spanish influenza germ. It finds its way from the nose into the brain, and there is slight hope of recovery.

While disease stays in the slums, it doesn't worry power very much. When it climbs to the palace on the hill, the powerful pay attention.

Here in America there is an outbreak of rabies in one place and the usual spasmodic shooting and muzzling of dogs, which means nothing. Britain has stamped out rabies completely.

In various cities there are disturbing outbreaks of smallpox. They will do good by curing the foolish theory that vaccination is not necessary.

A real doctor, member of a health board, was the only man vaccinated on the board. The others thought vaccination foolish. But when he said, "Let us have our next meeting in the pest house; there are three smallpox patients there," nobody seconded the motion.

A CONSERVATIVE in the Protestant Episcopal Church congratulates Bishop Manning of New York on his stand against the domination of the church by liberal doctrines, and all the Protestant Episcopalians congratulate him on his efforts to raise \$15,000,000 to build a new cathedral. He deserves congratulations.

After the \$15,000,000 are secured, there will come, presumably, an effort to save 15,000,000 souls. That sounds and is old-fashioned, but it is part of the plan.

THE UNITED STATES government investigates what happened to wheat, when the price suddenly dropped from \$2 to \$1.40, making millions in profits for "shorts." They are gentlemen that never dug in the ground, ran a harvester or a tractor, but that know enough to rig the market.

The government may investigate, but it won't do much to protect farmers from cutthroat manipulation until it imitates the French Government.

That nation passed a law to punish with imprisonment with hard labor for life certain kinds of grain gambling.

CHEER UP, ye very rich, and also ye harassed business men, and make a glad sound. Mr. Bacharach, Congressman from New Jersey, has a plan to cut \$100,000,000 from the national tax bill and slash the maximum surtax rate down to 20 per cent.

The best part, from the ordinary man's point of view, is the plan to cut away entirely foolish excise taxes on automobiles, jewelry, etc.

IT IS POSSIBLE to be a criminal and not be a complete fool, Harry Valkes, of Pittsburgh, makes and sells bootleg whiskey. He tells the judge: "It is all right to sell, but to drink myself, nothing doing. Only fools drink now; wise ones sell."

Contemporary Comments

A plan to widen the sixteen foot road now under construction through county contracts from Tampa bay to Disston avenue on Lakeview avenue to a forty-foot city street was approved by the city commission last night after being worked out by a commission committee, the director of public works and representatives of the South Side Improvement Association.—St. Petersburg Independent.

The county board of bond trustees are negotiating with the owners of gravel pits near Putnam Hall for a sufficient quantity of the gravel to place on the lateral roads of the county. This material has been used in other counties in improving roads, and lasts indefinitely, making a hard smooth surface. It is understood that one of the first roads to be improved in this manner, if the trustees are successful in securing the material, will be the Broker road. The lateral roads of the county are in splendid shape in most cases, though some parts are getting sandy on account of the present dry period.—Stokes Telegraph.

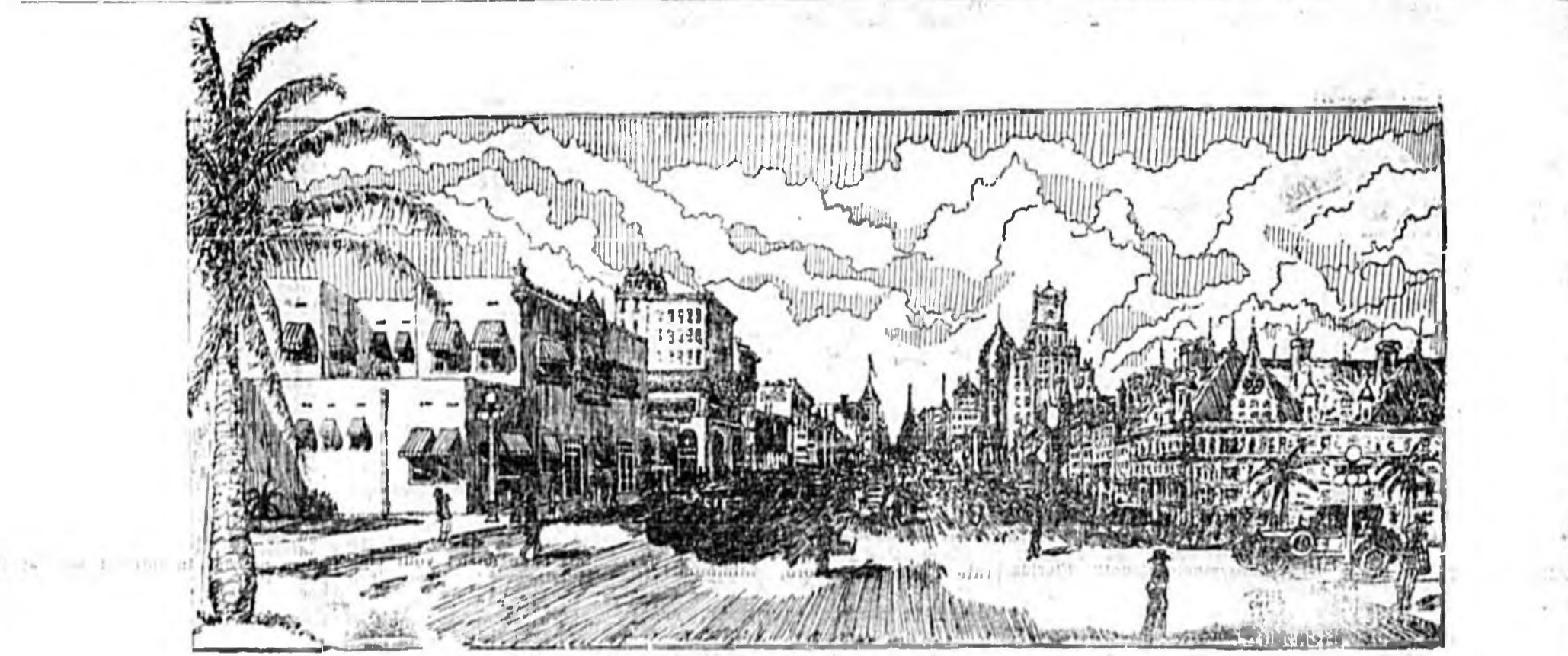
