

Paper On "Ideal Physician" Is Read By Dr. J. T. Denton At Orange Medical Meeting

Members of the Orange County Medical Association listened with much interest at their meeting in Orlando Wednesday night to papers read by Dr. C. J. Marshall and Dr. J. T. Denton of Sanford, both of whom are members of the organization.

Dr. Marshall's paper was confined to ultra-violet rays and the affections of the light upon disease. He pointed out the position taken in medical science by electrical apparatus and its importance in the cure of obstinate diseases.

Dr. Denton's paper was on the "Ideal Physician" and the effect that Christ has upon the physician should have upon the present time. He urged men of medical science not to get away from the "Golden Rule," which is so often brought out in the teachings of Christ. His paper follows:

"The Ideal Physician has only been manifested in one personage—Jesus of Nazareth.

"After thirty years of preparation he began his life work, consisting of Preaching, Teaching and Healing. It is this third phase of His life's work that I wish set forward as our ideal as Physicians, and hence our relations, First, to God—Second, to Brother Physicians, and Third, to the Public.

"Our ideal's relation to God in healing was by the Divine power through command, laying on of hand, applying clay and spittle, accompanied by faith in the recipient, or their representative—this divine power was also given to the Apostles and Elders of the early church, as recorded in the book of Acts of the Apostles. The power of healing has all through the ages, been of a divine nature, but not termed as miraculous.

"Today we have the power of healing performed by the skill of the surgeon's knife, with the assistance of our modern hospitals and trained nurses. Also we have it in the internist with the assistance of the various laboritories, in preparing our pharmaceuticals and gland remedies which supply the lack in nature to care for herself. I believe that all healing whether by knife, needle or by oral administration is all of a divine origin—manifesting a love of God for suffering humanity.

"We know not the origin of many of our communicable diseases, or self-producing diseases. We know that many are self-inflicted by direct violation of the laws of God, and some are transmitted by our ancestors. We feel that God has a hand in this to remind us of the frailty of man and that there must be an end to all beginning.

"If you and I have chosen one of the professions of our Jesus, why not emulate Him in our walk of life? If we believe that God made man, and is the author and finisher of all life and in the science of healing that he has only lead us up to the threshold of the understanding of the human system and its relation to life, would it not behoove us as physicians to seek to know of God and His relations to mankind? Did you and I choosing the practice of medicine and the science of healing do so because we had our impelling force within us to be of service to our fellow being, and to emulate our Lord in this? Or was it because we hoped to gain wealth, social standing, or may I stoop to mention, that we hoped to gratify a passion that God instilled in every noble human being for a more noble purpose, the propagation of the human race?

"The ideal is found in the first and this only will I discuss. If then, service to my neighbor, my relation to God, my Maker, is of what nature? We are commanded by Jesus our Ideal, in His ser-

vice rendered, a pay day for those able to pay, but money should not be our first consideration in rendering service to humanity.

"In all Health Crusades for the betterment of living and raising our standard of sanitation, hygiene, communicable diseases, and preventive care of mothers, correcting determinants of indigent children and other public interests for the betterment of mankind, the physician should be a leader in the community and should co-operate with every society, church and municipality in lifting up the unfortunate poor and relieving suffering.

"Every one with intelligence and appreciation honors and respects the man who is giving his very life for the betterment of mankind and relieving suffering humanity. Is not the standard of the old family physician who was considered the leader of his community and whose advice not only on health topics, was sought in every public interest—fast passing away? Why is it so?

"Are we failing to measure up to this standard in the public eye? I fear that we are because we fail to show a lack of interest our selves—money is fast becoming pre-eminent in every profession and walk of life and the medical man is losing his hold on the ideal."

Naturalist Predicts Final Extermination Migratory Birds In Next Few Years

NEW YORK, June 20.—The Florida, where wild fowl usually congregate in great numbers for winter feed, bear out the prediction we made a few months ago that our migratory game birds are doomed. The last shooting season in California is described as 'often the lawmakers do not even seem inclined to save them,' said Dr. Hornaday.

"Here in the east, apathy and opposition to killing reductions are barring all progress. The commercial interests have the upper hand. They have millions of dollars of capital to back them, and millions more at stake. They are able to block the passage of legislation that they do not like. The defenders of wild life who stand for reforms are without large funds, they are unorganized, and they are utterly unable to have personal representation in legislatures to introduce and back up laws for the better protection of the birds."

"Reports made during the past hunting season covering much of the United States reveal an alarming diminution in our supply of migratory game birds. I am convinced the present limited volume of it will follow the elong list of native American mammalia and birds already locally extinct over wide areas. Nature lovers will not be able to prevail, unorganized as they are, against the powerful, thoroughly organized and wealthy minority that puts lawmakers to sleep with optimistic talk, and at the same time fools the public."

United States Is Leading Other Nations In Mileage Of Electric Railroad Lines

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—Railroad electrification in America comprises between 20 and 25 per cent of the world's total railroad electrification of steam railroads. Committee presented to the National Electric Light Association convention here today.

The total mileage of electrified railroads in all other countries of the world is 4,504 miles, Sweden leading with 744, France second with 659, Switzerland third with 636 miles. Germany's mileage is only one mile less than that of Switzerland. Then in succession come Italy with 563 miles, Australia with 543 miles, South Africa with 171 miles, Chile with 148 miles, Norway with 125 miles, Spain with 80 miles, Japan with 48 miles, Canada with 38 miles, with 31 miles, Mexico with 20 miles, England with 28 miles and New Zealand with 8 miles. In the United States there is a little more than 900 miles of electrified railroad, exclusive of terminals.

Persons Afflicted With Tuberculosis More Liable To Die

MINNEAPOLIS, June 20.—Persons afflicted with tuberculosis are 15 times more liable to die than persons who do not have the disease, according to a statement made before the National Tuberculosis Association this morning by Dr. Louis Dublin, statistician of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. Dr. Dublin pointed out that at least 800,000 persons have passed through the tuberculosis sanatoria of the United States in the last ten years, of whom close to 600,000 are still alive and showing the benefits of reduced mortality in their respective communities.

"The conclusion to be drawn, therefore," said Dr. Dublin, "is that there are 6,000 less deaths a year from tuberculosis in this group of patients who have had treatment in sanatoria than if no sanatoria beds were available. The chances of longer life for patients who have been to tuberculosis sanatoria and received proper treatment are considerably greater than for those who do not receive such treatment.

"A tuberculosis death rate of 50 for each 100,000 population by 1930, approximately one-half of that at the present time will, I believe, be found to be not far from the actual figure in that year.

CHINESE STRIKERS KIDNAP KINSMEN IN JAP EMPLOY

(Continued from Page 1.) damage to Japanese trade along the Yangtze river a couple of weeks ago, also is to be employed in the anti-foreign agitation now becoming general throughout the country.

The latest port affected by this agitation is Chungking, an important treaty port in the province of Szechwan, and some 1,400 miles from the mouth of the Yangtze. Most of the foreign powers have consulates at Chungking, which is also an important missionary center.

Latest dispatches indicate the strikers are in control there, and Swedish, Polish, and British nationals have been beaten, and the foreign residents have been forced to take refuge on foreign warships.

Student agitators also are reported to have arrived at Hankow, another treaty port on the Yangtze, to agitate for a boycott for foreigners. A similar agitation at Peking has not met with

much success. At Shanghai the situation has so improved that some of the foreign defense units are to be demobilized, but guards are to be retained at the power stations, waterworks, and other essential institutions.

Meanwhile the representatives of the powers at Peking have suggested to the Chinese government that an effort be made by negotiation to settle present situations, leaving the broader questions at issue, such as the administration of justice and government of the foreign settlements, for later discussion.

"Then all went together to the home of the director of the coal company where the national anthem was sung by the crowd.

Children Pray As Hosts Of Scorpions Invade Their Homes

DURANGO, Mex., June 20.—Five thousand children attended a special mass in the cathedral here recently when prayers were offered for a cessation of the plague of scorpions which has invaded this district.

From the thousands of dead insects which have been brought to the municipal authorities attempts are being made to produce a serum against the poisonous sting of the hairy creature. Ten thousand live scorpions have been shipped to the federal department of health.

The fact that a majority of the poorer class houses in Durango and nearby villages are constructed of adobe bricks and unplastered is believed to account for the plague, as the cracks between the bricks offer ideal breeding places.

Another theory is that myriads of scorpions have been driven from the nearby hills by the recent earthquakes.

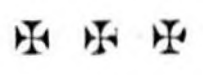

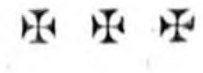
