Public invited to meet superintendent candidates

Four finalists in the running to replace Hagerty, who retires July 31

SANFORD — Four candidates seeking the position of superintendent of Seminole County Schools will be in the area this Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, April 6, 7, and 8. They will tour the community, visit schools, and participate in interviews conducted Monday by School Board members and select staff.

The four candidates were trimmed from an initial field of 44 applicants. The remaining hopefuls for the county's next school superintendent include:

• Dr. Bill Vogel, presently superintendent of schools in St. Lucie County since 1997. Previously he has held upper level positions in Osceola County and at UCF.

• Dr. Joseph Joyner, presently area superintendent for Orange County since 1998. He previously held various positions in Orange County and Apopka.

• Jude Theriot has been superintendent of Calcasieu Parish School Board in Lake Charles, La., since 1995. He previously held positions at various schools in Louisiana.

• Christine Johns is deputy superintendent in Baltimore County, Md. Previous employment has been in California and Maryland. She will not receive her doctorate until this summer/fall period.

A search for a new superintendent began when current Schools Superintendent Paul Hagerty in November announced his plans for retirement. After working in Seminole County for 11 years, his last day as leader of the school district is July 31.

Beginning in January, the School Board began working with Wayne Blanton, Florida School Board Association director, on criteria for a national search. A list of qualifications and contract terms were developed for the candidates.

Military family picks Sanford as location for career milestone

SANFORD — When Neal and Felicia Fisher had to decide where one would commission the other as a U.S. Army officer earlier this month, it came down to a place that this brother and sister knew well.

"We're very familiar with Sanford, very comfortable there," Neal said.

So on March 3, several family members gathered down by the Memorial Park on the Sanford lakefront to watch Neal, a U.S. Marine Corps captain, officially commission Felicia as an Army second lieutenant.

Though neither spent more than a year living in Sanford, their grandmother, Elsie Fisher, has lived there for many years. Thus they've had many chances to spend a lot of time visiting the area. Their parents now live in Sanford as well. Both Neal and Felicia attended school in Seminole County for one year, though neither graduated from a local school.

Their father, Neal Sr., is a Marine Corps veteran and their mother, Rose, is a veteran of the Army. Many other family members have spent time in the armed forces as well, providing a strong military presence that pointed both Neal and Felicia in the direction that they have taken.

"It (enlisting in the military) has never been a hard decision for either of us to make," Neal said. "We we're both just drawn to it."

After graduating from the University of Maryland, Neal joined the U.S. Army, reaching the rank of sergeant until he got commissioned into the Marines in 1999. An aerially officer, he currently works at the Pentagon in a Marine Corp's public affairs branch.

Surrounded by the military lifestyle her entire life, Felicia wasted little time immersing herself within it. At the age of 17 she joined the Army reserves. She became a specialist, licensed to be a practical nurse.

"I was always interested (in the military) because it's always been around me," Felicia said. "I love it."

Yet she continued to pursue higher education. She graduated from Hampton Institute as a registered nurse, making her eligible for the rank of officer. Currently

Splash playground opens in Winter Springs

There's been a bit more splashing and splashin' lately in Winter Springs.

The water-logged fun is the result of a new splash playground that opened last month in Torcaso Park. The city's newest recreational amenity is a flat fountain with about a dozen water nozzles that randomly squirt water into the air.

"It really adds to the park, and it takes care of everything we were looking for," Winter Springs Parks and Recreation Programs Supervisor Chris Carson said. "It's not too small and it's not too big — it's just right."

The circular fountain continuously pumps around 1,200 gallons of water, Carson said. The filtering system — similar to a swimming pool's filter — keeps the water clean, and the non-skid surface allows people to move around the fountain safely.

The splash playground,

which is one of the first of its kind in Seminole County, was funded through a \$500,000 state grant acquired by the city, Carson said. The newest recreational feature is just one of several specialty parks Winter Springs hopes to add in the upcoming years.

"We like to try to stay ahead of things," Carson said. "In the future, we'd like to see a dog park and a skate park in the city."

As for the splash play-

ground, people of all ages are invited to get drenched and play in the water.

"It's not just for kids," Carson said. "When we had the opening ceremony, we even had one of our city commissioners (Robert Miller) jump in."

For those who aren't interested in getting wet, Carson said the park offers numerous other amenities, including trails and

Commission asks Bush to reconsider budget cuts

The Seminole County Commission is sending a letter to Gov. Bush and the Legislature, asking for reconsideration of budget cuts which

would seriously affect the local screening of juvenile offenders, and the overall juvenile justice service in the county.

According to a presentation by Sally Sherman of the Community Resources department, the state budget cuts would result in a 56 percent reduction in funding for the Children in Need of Services/Families in Need of Services a state-wide program, provider for the Seminole County Girls and Boys Town.

Sherman said the impact of the cut in funding would result in cancellation of in-home counseling available for at-risk youth and the number of crisis shelter beds would be reduced. The elimination of juvenile misdemeanor assessments would mean no front-end screening to identify substance abuse and mental health issues in those offenders.

With the shifting of juvenile probation costs to the county, it would impact the General Fund budget by \$175,000 per year in staff costs alone, and the figure for assuming predisposition detention costs would be over \$1.5 million annually.

"In other words," she said, "With kids not getting prevention, it means there will be more in our jails."

In the wording of the recommended letter to the Governor, the Board of County Commissioners is requesting reconsideration of the reduction in funding levels for prevention/intervention programs presently in place, and the proposed elimination of juvenile misdemeanor assessments, as well as the shifting of juvenile misdemeanor probation and predisposition detention costs to counties.

The vote to send the letter, and an accompanying resolution requesting the reconsideration of state budget cuts, was accepted unanimously by the commission.

Vigilante memorial project nears completion of Phase 1

SANFORD — When the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee formed about three years ago, they had the goal of obtaining a historic U.S. Navy aircraft and erecting a monument that would serve as a reminder of the airport's glorious military history.

Now in a little under two months, the fruits of their labor will be on display for all to see. On May 30, a vintage RA-5C Vigilante aircraft will enter the sky once again, mounted on steel pylons for public viewing at the airport's entrance.

"We're about 85 percent finished," said

Patty Mahany, vice-president of the committee. "There is some painting left to finish and markings."

Since acquiring the aircraft in 2001 in poor condition, some 20 people have spent a year and a half restoring the plane to its former glory. Many of these workers are part of the Aircraft Restoration Committee, a group of 15 mostly retired military men.

"Our group has restored the aircraft and done an amazing job," Mahany said. "It's absolutely beautiful."

The plane will serve as the centerpiece of a small memorial park that will also include such features as memorial benches and plaques. Unfortunately because of

lack of funding the park will not reach completion in time for the unveiling of the plane. The committee hopes to have the park open by the fall.

Mahany estimated that it will take another \$60,000 to finish the park project, but said that funds are still coming in at a steady pace. So far the committee has received \$150,000 from the state under a performance-based contract and raised another \$115,000 from private donations, mainly local military people. Still, Mahany said contributions have come from many sources.

"We've had tremendous support from

Today there were some pretty shady-looking characters on my porch asking to come inside and steam-clean my carpets. Have you any advice on how I can politely but firmly get rid of solicitors so I can feel safe in my own home? Thanks, Abby.

AFRAID TO FIND OUT WHAT'S BEHIND DOOR NO. 1

DEAR AFRAID: First of all, never open your door without first checking to see who is there. If this means having a peephole installed in your front door, it will be money well-spent. If the person standing there is a stranger, don't open the door.

Second, people who go around neighborhoods selling services that haven't been previously ordered, or merchandise that "just fell off a truck," are usually scam artists and should be avoided at all costs. Caveat emptor (let the buyer beware!)

Morgenstern, Ellenburg receive Award of Merit

Last month, Sanford Police Chief Brian E. Tooley honored officers David Morgenstern and William Ellenburg with the department's Award of Merit for their outstanding police work, exceptional bravery and valiant efforts to save the life of a local citizen.

The Award of Merit is second only to the Award of Valor and is presented to an employee for conduct depicting sound judgement and exceptional bravery at the risk of imminent danger of great bodily harm.

Tooley said, "The actions of officers Morgenstern and Ellenburg display their strong

commitment to providing a safe environment for all citizens. As chief of police, I am always pleased to here of outstanding police work, but especially pleased that these officers were able to officiate their duties to preserve a life regardless of personal danger. Officers Morgenstern and Ellenburg serve as role models of courage and tenacity to their colleagues at the police department."

Upon being dispatched to a call and finding a locked residence and an unresponsive resident, Morgenstern and Ellenburg continued to investigate the scene and discovered a natural gas odor coming from

inside the home. The resident was found in a semi-conscious state in a room filled with an overwhelming odor of natural gas.

Despite the risk of explosion and being overcome by the fumes, the officers turned off the gas and ventilated the home. Being unable to move the citizen, the officers monitored his vital signs until rescue personnel arrived on the scene. The citizen has recovered from the ordeal.

According to rescue personnel responding to the scene, the fumes would eventually have fatally overcome the citizen, and the risk of explosion inside the residence was great.

Engineered Homes surpasses \$70M mark for second consecutive year

Tip leads to arrests in Flagler

OCALA — Four Flagler County men returned from a day of fishing last Sunday (March 23) only to find a couple of Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) law enforcement officers waiting for them when they tied their boat to the dock behind a Palm Coast residence.

FWC Officers Scott Dack and Eric Meade received an anonymous tip through the Wildlife Alert Hotline that four men would be arriving at #7 Crossway Court East in a 23-foot fishing boat with numerous illegal fish on board.

The officers arrived at the location just prior to the boat's return and set up a surveillance. Within minutes the vessel arrived with four men on board, who tied it off to a dock. Officer Meade remained hidden and out of sight so he could watch for any suspicious behavior while Officer Dack approached the men in his patrol vehicle. As Dack drove toward the men, one of them spotted him coming, and thinking he wouldn't be seen, threw a large, weighted burlap sack into the bushes next to the residence. However, Meade, who was still concealed, watched the man throw the sack, which he then recovered when he joined Dack at the home.

The sack was tied tightly and was full of undersize red snapper and one undersize gag grouper. There were fish in the vessel as well. In all, officers seized 35 undersize red snapper and one undersize gag grouper.

The fact that the burlap sack was tied shut and had a weight attached, indicates to us that the men wanted to be able to get rid of the evidence if they were stopped by a law enforcement officer on the water. That's premeditated possession of illegal fish," said FWC's Lt. Bob Lee, who supervises officers in Flagler and Putnam counties.

The following four men were each charged with possession of undersize red snapper and possession of over the bag limit of red snapper:

* Kevin Leroy Danner, 39, Palm Coast.

* Lance Lalomia, 39, Palm Coast.

* Allen Swilling, 46, Palm Coast.

* Glenn Arrington, 42, Palm Coast.

Swilling was also charged with possession of undersize gag grouper. The charges are all 2nd degree misdemeanors and carry a maximum penalty of 60 days in jail and a \$500 fine. Court is set for April 15 at the Flagler County Courthouse.

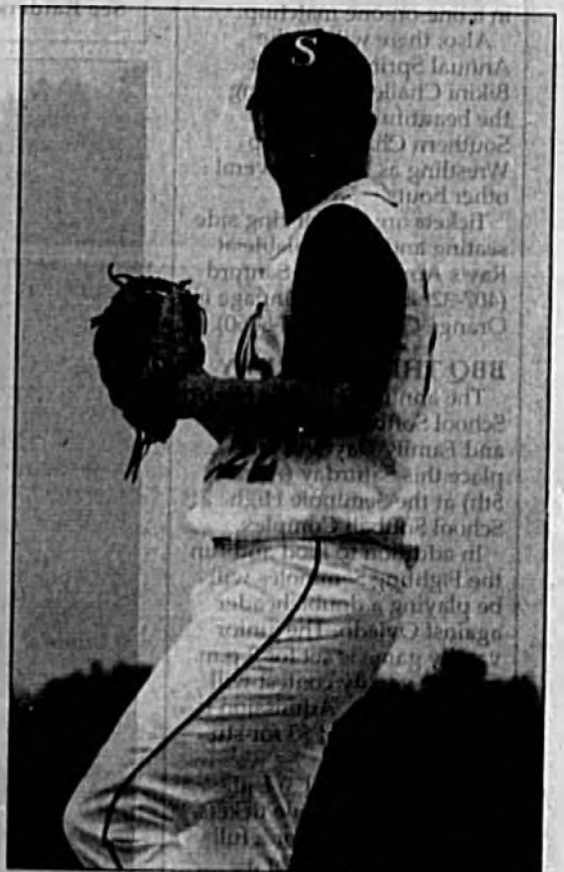
SCC's long run came in the sixth inning when Quartararo reached on an infield single and later scored on a single by Greear.
