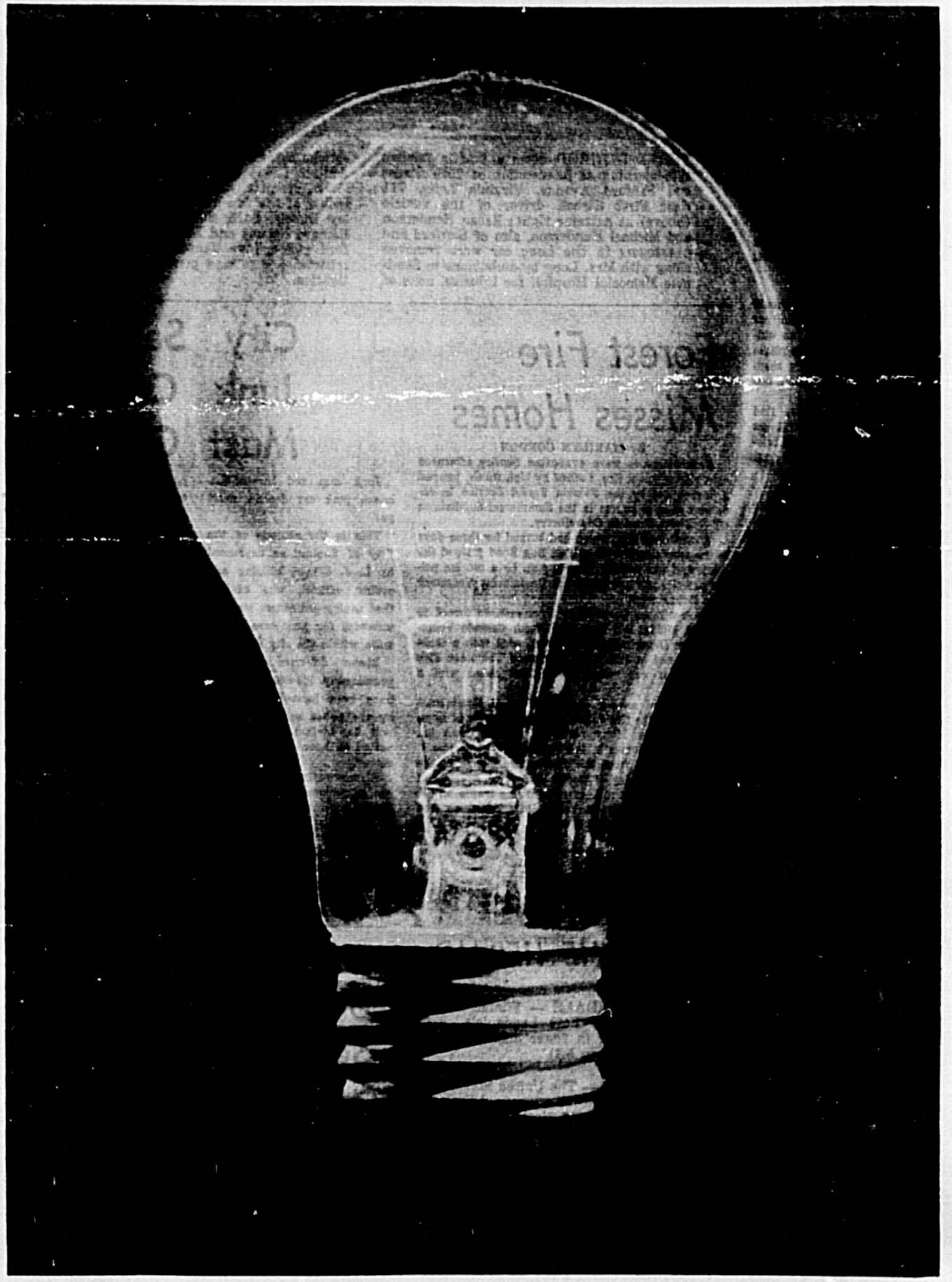

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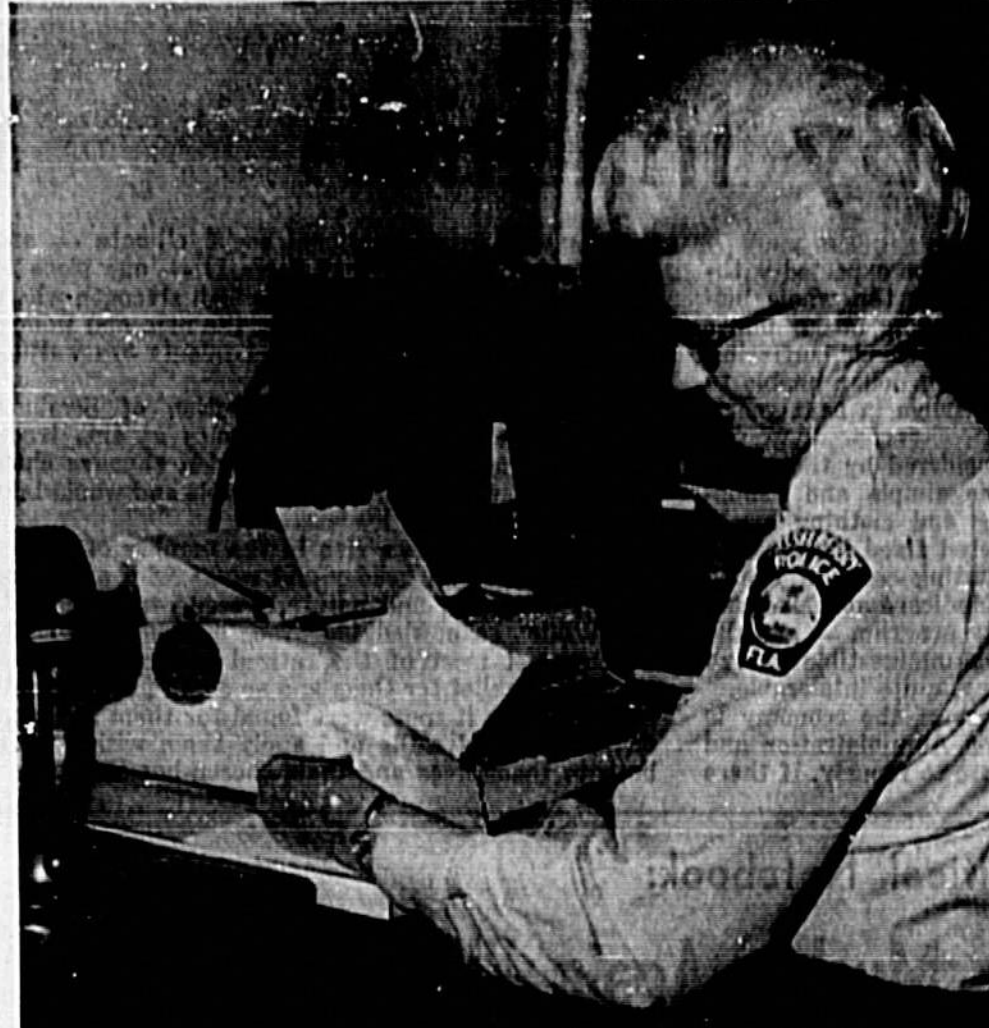

Casselberry PD Showing Communications Growth

A new piece of equipment in computer form has been added to their communication room at the cost of \$1,900. This is known as the Florida Crime Information Center System or by those in the field the FCIC System. It has a keyboard printer terminal for transmitting and receiving information of communications facilities.

The FCIC is a service function of Florida's State Government dedicated to providing services for interstate communication of vital statistics and information relating to crimes, criminals, and criminal activity. The Governor and Cabinet and the board of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and the Florida Legislature have provided the necessary commitment for FCIC to be the finest computerized justice communication and information system in the nation. Basically, FCIC contains three major types of on-line information, vehicle, persons and property.

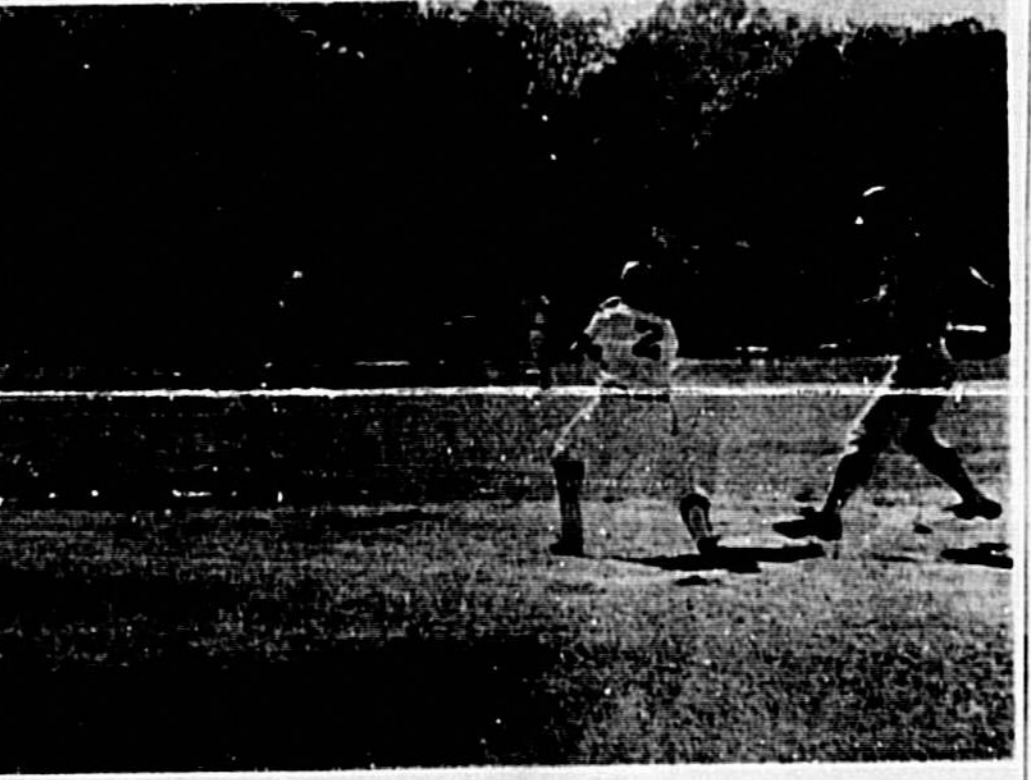

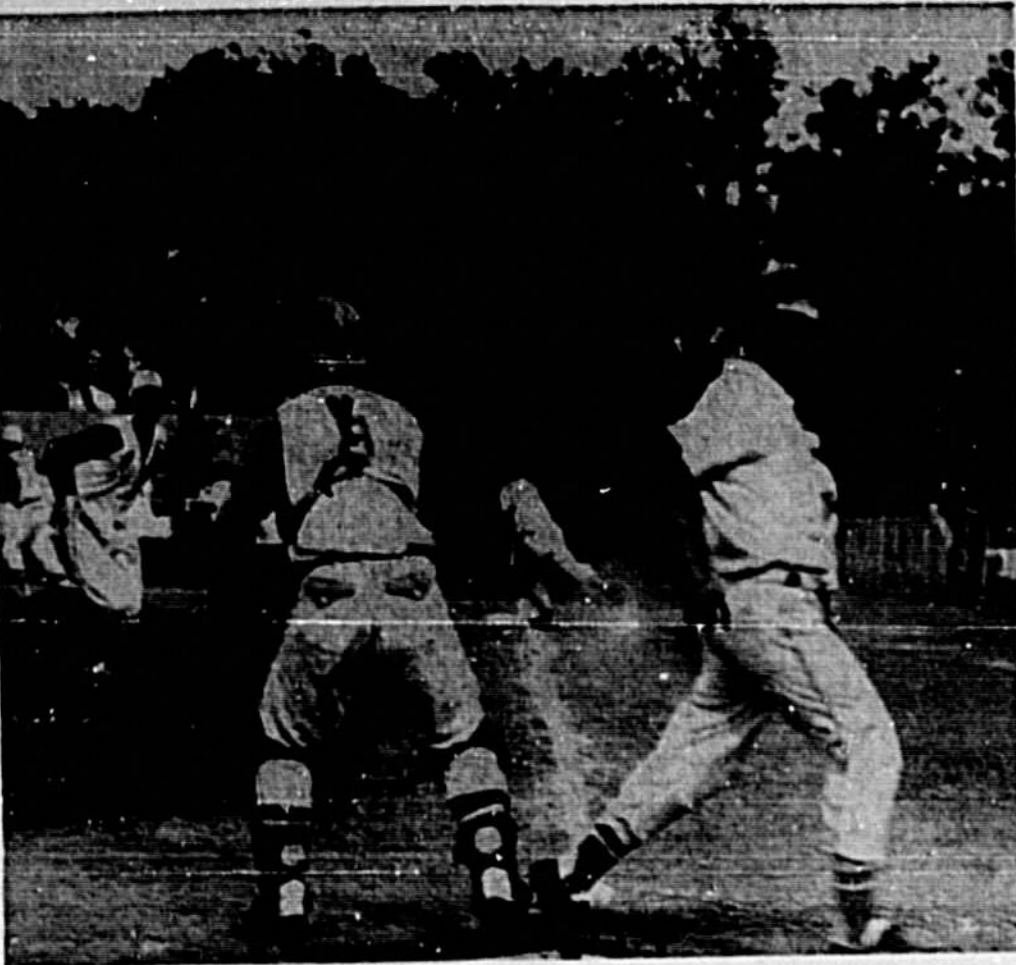

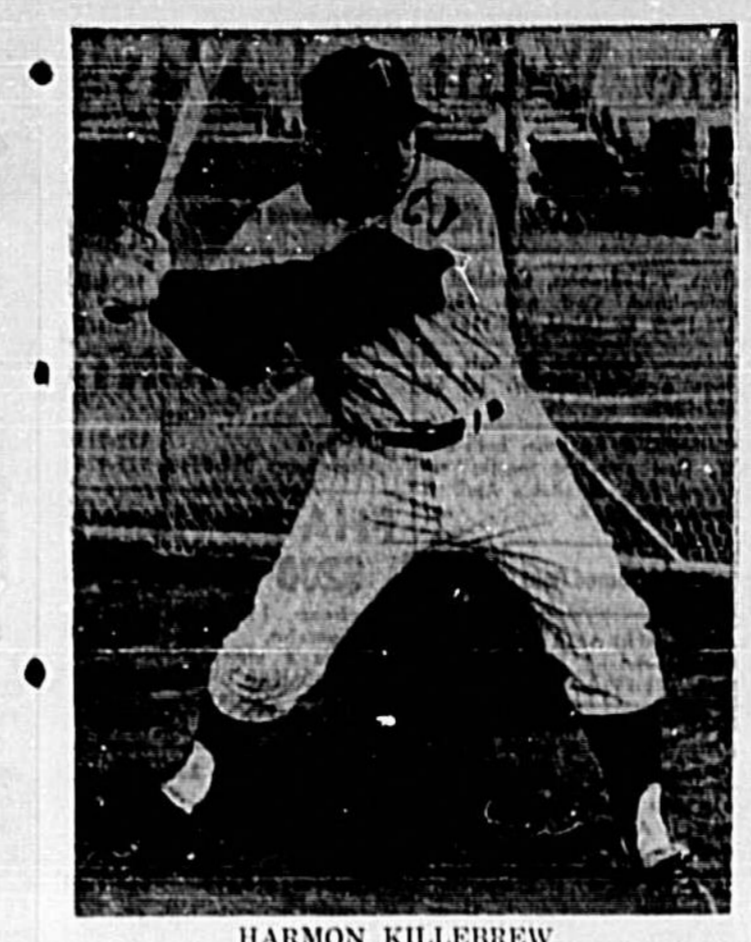
Raiders On Road Tomorrow

Harmon Killebrew Stalks Ruth's Record

ORLANDO (NEA)—It was the first day of spring training and Harmon Killebrew reported to the Twins' camp in Orlando, weighing 210, four pounds less than at the end of the 1970 season. "I'm in great shape, for the shape I'm in," he said.

He is 34 years old, now. He is bald and his sideburns are almost completely gray. He is heavyset and, sitting on a metal folding chair in front of his clubhouse locker, he looked more like a coach.

Still, he is powerful and his knees aren't giving him pain. He indeed is in great shape for the start of his 15th full season in the major leagues.

He is in great shape in a non-physical sense, too. He is on the verge of becoming one of the greatest home-run hitters in baseball history, perhaps the greatest, but says he is unaware of it.

His statistics are as impressive as one of his towering blasts over an outfield fence. He ranks second only to Babe Ruth as the most consistent home run hitter in history. He is the leading active slugger in the American League with 467 homers and needs only seven more to pass Lou Gehrig and move into 10th place among the game's all-time home run hitters.

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Justice Adopts Uniform Approach

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—After April 26, all traffic courts in Florida will dispense the same brand of justice under uniform rules adopted by the Florida State Supreme Court.

Major departure from existing procedures is provision for establishment of a traffic violations bureau under the traffic court to do everything a judge can do, except for the most serious cases.

The rules mandate that persons accused of offenses involving drunk driving, reckless driving, including exceeding the speed limit by more than 15 miles an hour, failure to stop for a school bus or leaving the scene of an accident, must appear in court.

They cannot post bond and forfeit it.

But Chief Justice E. K. Roberts and Associate Justice James Adams said in an interview that this practice is followed in many traffic courts now.

Where it isn't, it ought to be, Roberts said.

The new rules also gives the arresting officer the power to order a "personal appearance" in court for any other violation if he thinks unusual circumstances warrant it.

Attorney who helped draft the rules as part of a national model program of the American Bar Association, said it should put an end to "ticket fixing."

"It also will bring some dignity to traffic courts which, in some country towns, have been held in the backyard with the

judge in jeans raking leaves," he said.

The rules were presented to Young Miami and Joseph S. Clark, Clearwater, chairman of the State Association of Traffic Court Judges, participated in their drafting.

"Two often," Adkins said, "we concentrate on courts the public never sees. The only court experience of a majority of the people is with courts of limited jurisdiction."

"We need to give them an idea of what justice is like."

The rules apply to all traffic cases and specifically to municipal courts, mayor's courts, magistrate courts, County courts, county judge's courts, justice of the peace courts and metropolitan courts and, to juvenile courts where juvenile traffic offenders are involved.

Adkins does not foresee any problems. He disagrees with fears expressed in some quarters that the non-forfeiture provisions will jam the courts.

"It was a traffic judge (in Gainesville) for two years and pretty well followed these general procedures," he said.

Republican congressmen visiting Sanford last night to speak at the GOP Lincoln Day Dinner were visibly shocked when informed by the news media at a press conference before the dinner that U. S. Army Lt. William Calley, Jr. was convicted by a court martial of murder in the killing of civilians in Vietnam.

Returning from a visit to New Smyrna Beach in time for the Seminole County Republican Party festivities held at Sanford's Civic Center, U. S. Reps. James Hogan of New York, Lawrence Hogan of Maryland, Earl B. Rith of North Carolina and Lou Frey, Jr., Florida's Fifth District Congressman, were surprised to hear the verdict which came Monday afternoon.

Rep. Rith advised "we will be getting bushels of letters about this," and stressed this would not be a popular decision.

Rep. Hogan expressed hopes the court action would not have an adverse effect upon the morale of the American fighting man.

Camille was arrested by police acting on the girl's identification and resulting inquiries by police have brought out the man is wanted in connection with a reported parole violation from the Mass. Correctional Institute at Walpole, where he was convicted on assault and battery, dangerous weapons and robbery charges in 1967.

His parole was revoked Feb. 8, 1971 and authorities there have been searching for him, Judge Hall Monday appointed Altamonte Springs Attorney Orville Johnson to represent Camille.

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Police Patrolman Offers Resignation

 CANCELLER — The city council last night accepted the resignation of Police Officer Timothy McEvers, and exposed the fact that McEvers had been charging gasoline for his private vehicle to the city.

Mayor Curtis Blaw presented a bill to the council from Tom's Arco Station on Red Bug Road, and stated that the amount listed (\$64.90) had been spent by McEvers on gas and oil for his own private vehicle. The entire amount was charged to the city.

McEvers supposedly was using his own car for investigations into city cases—in particular a number of drug and narcotic cases. According to information, he used both the car and instructions from former Police Chief Donald Brunley. The charging of the gasoline occurred after Mayor Blaw had issued an order to the police department that private vehicles were not to be used, according to City Attorney Ken McIntosh, this use would leave the city open to "legal exposure."

When asked by Council Chairman Edith Duerr for an assurance that an encroachment of his former order would not happen again, Mayor Blaw stated that the order had been rescinded. The council authorized the payment of the amount charged to the gasoline station.

In other action at last night's meeting, the council adopted a classification schedule for civil service. The schedule, which was recommended by the Civil Service Board and approved by the council, is a step-schedule which creates salary increases (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 1)

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
