Sleep Lots? Why Not Sleep Well?

Sleep takes up a third of your life, so why not sleep well? Help your family sleep well by selecting a mattress and springs carefully. Whether you choose innerspring or foam construction, buy good quality.

Innerspring mattresses have two types of basic construction -open coll and Marshall unit. The open coils can be joined several ways. However, more flexible joining means more in dependent action for each coll which, in turn, means a mattress that supports you better.

Marshall unit coils are cased individually in cloth pockets made of heavy sheeting. Each coil can react to your weight independently, giving you more uniform support. The coll count should be approximately 800 for a good quality regular size mat-

Latex foam rubber and urethane form are both excellent mattress materials. Urethane is lighter and does not have an odor, however, it doesn't have the resilience or "fight-back" resistance of lates. Higher quality urethane gives the best sup-

Look for other details when you buy a mattress. Performated metal or plastic ventilators provide circulation. There should be at least four ventilstors to keep your mattress fresh and free from musty odors. All mattresses have to be turned occasionally. Sturdy handles will help make this chore easier. The outer cover ing should be firmly woven and sturdy. A fancy covering? It may be pretty, but it won't add

The new ageratum Fl. "Summer Snow," has dwarf, prominent flowers with a great deal of uniformity. If you're looking for a new geranium Fl. you might try "Carefree Fickle Rose," a pleasing bi-color of bright rose and white colors. "Apollo," a new marigold

flowers. It's a dwarf and has a maximum height of about 14 inches. It has very large flowers that are often three inches in diameter and are round, double and uniform. Apollo will flower in 70 to 85 days.

There are several varieties of petunia Fl. "El Toro," which was actually introduced in 1976. was very popular because of its bright red color. "Ambassador" is another bright red which is earlier than "Et Toro." "Apollo" is an early white variety, and "Chiffon Cascade" give you light pink

Last week accolades were bestowed upon County Commissioner Sid Vihlen Jr. for his attendance as the only representative of Seminole County at a March 24 meeting in Orlando

Drummond said that he, too, accorded plaudits to Vihlen, who, he continued, received notice of the meeting for the first time (by word of mouth) 15 minutes prior to the start of the meeting. Drummond explained that Vihlen absented himself immediately from a commission work session when apprised of the meeting on mass transit.

County Chairman Drummond, however, is







Tax Collection

Because Uncle Sam has made the employer his tax collector by requiring the withholding of taxes from pay the checks, many Americans don't find government spending and taxes as painful as they otherwise might.

Indeed, most employes think in terms of "take-home pay" and labor unions even negotiate on this basis.

The Tax Foundation is pointing out that the average American works more than a fourth of his time just to pay his taxes - that taxes take more working time than the hours required to pay for food, or housing, or clothing, or transportation.

Altogether U.S. taxpayers turned in about \$282 billion to federal, state, and local collectors last year - nearly \$6 billion more than the preceding year. Still this was not enough to keep governments at every level out of the red.

One wonders how long it will be before the American wage earner spends more time working for the tax collector than for himself.

Points Well Made

It was one small step for the Supreme Court but a giant leap for common sense when Justice Hugo L. Black ruled recently that long hair is not necessarily a subject for Supreme Court attention.

In ruling against an El Paso, Tex., student who chellenged the right of his high school authorities to prescribe limitations on hair length, Justice Black stressed two points; that hair fads are not constitutional rights of minors; that the Supreme Court has more important business than "supervising the length of hair that public school students should wear. He also chided the bar for harassing the high court with "emergency motions" that are in

We hope that this ruling underlines a continuation of the trend toward judicial restraint.
